 A spectacular mid-afternoon blaze on March first destroyed three attached stores in Hicksville at 545 So. Broadway.

The fire was reported at 2:45 PM at City Line Business Machines.

Hicksville Vamps were on the scene in minutes and according to firemen on the first due engine, the flames were coming out the roof. Other stores destroyed were Tom Farrells Lounge And Antiques, Inc.

The fire started in the rear of the City Line Store where cleaning solvents were used and spread rapidly. Two vamps were injured.

## Fire Guts 3 Stores

The Bethpage F.D. sent a crew and one engine to the fire and the Jericho F.D. stood by at Hicksvilles Headquarters.

Chief Schaaf commended his officers and men, for their swift actions. The fire was knocked down and extinguished in about two hours. Three alarms brought out 90 men. Eight pieces of apparatus responded.

Damage was described by the chief as considerable.

### Fire Report

During the period Feb. 15 thru March 1st Hicksville Vamps responded to 54 alarms. There were 28

fire calls, 17 rescue calls and 9 false alarms.

Hicksville vamps responded on mutual aid to Plainview Feb. 22 at 10:05 AM to stand by while they fought a house fire. On Feb. 24 a bedroom fire caused by careless smoking caused some damage at 190 9th St. Time of the alarm was 1:59 AM. The occupants escaped injury.



# Table Coliseum Mall Plans

The Nassau Board of Supervisors postponed action this week on County Executive Caso's plan to lease 36 acres at Mitchell Field for construction of a Sears shopping center.

Led by Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Francis T. Purcell, the Board voted unanimously to table the proposal on grounds that the site just east of the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum "is too valuable to commit to a shopping center without a full public airing of all the pros and cons."

Purcell said he had already received information indicating that the proposed shopping center would have a negative economic impact on neighboring communities.

Some 20 speakers, most of them opposed to the project, presented their views during an informal two-hour "hearing" that followed the Board's vote.

Those speaking in favor of the \$20,000,000 project included Nassau Commissioner of Commerce and Industry James R. Wells, County Planning Commission Chairman Owen Smith, and real estate developer Wilbur

Breslin, who is seeking a 50-year lease on the property for the center. All claimed it would benefit the county by creating new jobs, rental and tax revenues.

Opponents at the meeting, including the Levittown, Hempstead, Merrick and East Meadow Chambers of Commerce, League of Women Voters and an unaffiliated member of the Council of East Meadow Community Organizations, among others, said the proposed Mitchell shopping mall could be "the final straw" that would force dozens of struggling retail outlets in those communities into bankruptcy.

Hempstead Mayor Dalton Miller pointed out that merchants in his village were battling to revitalize commerce in the downtown area. Miller said the large Sears department store plus smaller satellite stores planned by developer Breslin would attract more business from Hempstead "and defeat anything we've been working so hard to achieve."

Hempstead Councilman Greg Peterson urged defeat of the

plan, warning that "you may find that you've built a new shopping center at Mitchell Field, only to create a ghost town of empty stores and declining property values all along Hempstead Turnpike as far as Levittown. You can't plan these things in a vacuum," he declared.

Nearly all of the opposition speakers predicted that another major shopping center in the area would cause the loss of more jobs than it would create, and said sales tax revenues needed by the county also would decline if small stores in nearby communities were shut down.

"There will be no net gain for county taxpayers in this proposal," warned Freeport's Mayor William White.

Presiding Supervisor Purcell, who urged County Executive Caso to unveil a comprehensive plan for the total development of Mitchell Field, said the Board expected to weigh additional comments from other interested Nassau residents before making its final decision which, he added, will probably not come for "several weeks."

# State Funding Cutbacks Threaten HAD

Help-Aid-Direction (H.A.D.), a non-profit youth and family counseling, drug and alcohol abuse prevention and treatment center, is currently facing a very severe curtailment in its counseling services. This potential reduction in services is due directly as a result of a cutback of state funds recently proposed by Governor Carey in his budget message to the New York State Legislature.

Governor Carey has proposed a twenty-five (25) per cent reduction in state funds to community counseling programs which are funded from the Youthful Drug Abuse (Y.D.A.) line of the New York State budget.

H.A.D. which serves free-of-charge teenagers, young adults and their families living mainly in the communities of Hicksville, Jericho, Plainville as well as portions of Syosset, Bethpage, Levittown, and East Meadow would be in very serious financial

difficulty if this 25 per cent became reality. In the past two years, H.A.D. has had to sustain a reduction in state funding of 10 and 15 per cent respectively. Any further cutbacks would necessitate layoff of competent counseling staff and potentially jeopardize H.A.D.'s continuing existence.

Help-Aid-Direction appeals to its friends and supporters residing throughout these areas for assistance in overcoming this very serious threat to its very survival.

H.A.D. requests that community leaders, community-service clubs, fraternal and religious organizations, as well as individual businessmen and local residents write the following government officials on its behalf. It hopes that those who write these representatives will stress H.A.D.'s seven years of community service to troubled

individuals and emphasize that state funds be restored to "Y.D.A.-funded, local-assistance counseling centers."

The time is growing short. NYS legislators will vote within thirty days for the 1977-78 state budget. H.A.D. will most definitely be financially hurt if these cuts are permitted to become law unchanged.

# Book On Solar Energy for Schools

Solar energy, as old as the universe and as new as tomorrow, is the subject of a guide book prepared for Nassau classroom teachers. County Executive Ralph G. Caso announced today.

"This subject is so new, so little known, and so vital to our future that we felt it necessary to provide schools with a teaching tool," Caso said. "With this free 'Guide to Developing a Solar Energy Unit' I believe we are helping classroom and science teachers to prepare their students for

an understanding of the subject."

The guide book - which is 20 pages long - contains explanations, sample lessons, experiments and a reading and reference list.

It was prepared by the Nassau General Services Department's Bureau of Energy Resources, under direction of Francis E. O'Connor, commissioner and energy administrator.

"This book is available to elementary and junior high schools in the county," Caso said. "Letters have been sent to principals of these schools with

an offer to provide the guides to staff members without charge.

"We'll simply respond by mail with a requested number of books or we'll give them out in conjunction with a lecture on solar energy by a person from the bureau."

The Hearing to consider the Creation of Nassau Shores Park District within the Massapequa Park District, was the first of eight hearings at the Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday March 1st.

Among the nine members of the audience who addressed the Board relative to the matter were Norman Heischouer, who submitted a petition containing 122 signatures requesting a night hearing as well as a referendum vote. Don Josling, Pres. Nassau

Shores Civic Assoc., Mrs. A.G. Beyer and Phyllis Singer.

The cost of acquiring the land would be approximately \$370,000 and it would affect the 1700 homes in the immediate area.

The Five Hearings that followed went unchallenged and were passed in order.

The balance of the day's business was resolutions that completed the 79 item calendar. All were passed in quick succession except for the final one.

## Sewer Plans Go Forward

The Nassau Board of Superintendents is expected to approve plans for the construction of the sewerage collection district in the county, to serve residents of Hicksville, Plainview and Bethpage.

A public hearing on the proposal, held Monday in Mineola, failed to draw any opposition from property taxpayers whose homes or businesses will be linked to the system as part of Nassau Sewage Disposal District No. 1.

Engineers estimate the total cost of construction at \$10,000,000 of which 75 percent will be paid by the Federal government and the rest by property taxes levied within each of the new collection districts.

### Sewer Construction Time Table

The Hicksville Collection District, serving a population of approximately 74,000, involves seven separate construction districts tentatively scheduled to begin in July.

The Plainview Collection District, serving 4,000, will have five contracts. This work is set to begin early next year.

Construction is expected to get underway on the Bethpage Collection District in April 1978. It will involve five contracts and serve 4,000 residents.

A spokesman for the county's Department of Public Works said construction on all three new collection districts is expected to be completed in 1981. Sewage from these districts will flow by large diameter pipes, known as interceptors, to the Cedar Creek Water Pollution Control Plant at Wantagh for treatment.

### Sewer District Boundary Lines

Here are the boundary lines to

be drawn-out for the new sewerage collection district.

Hicksville Collection District: Eastern boundary is the northern boundary of the Nassau Sewage Disposal District No. 1 with minor exceptions. The north-easterly boundary is in part along the Seaford/Oyster Bay Expressway and the Long Island Expressway. The easterly boundary is in part along the Port Jefferson Branch of the Long Island Railroad and the topographic divide between the proposed Hicksville H. Collection District and the Levittown Sewage Collection District boundary north of Jerusalem Road. The south-westerly boundary runs along the Wantagh State Parkway to the Northern State Parkway. The north-westerly boundary is the topographic divide between the proposed Hicksville H. Collection District and the Collection District areas to the west.

Plainview Collection District: The general area in which the sewerage boundary is in general the easterly right of way line of the Seaford/Oyster Bay Expressway to the southern boundary of Old Country Road. Various property lines west of Margaret Drive, Gramma Lane, Hay Park and Spruce Avenue are under line of Stewart Avenue. Various property lines north of Sycamore Avenue, the westerly right of way line of 12th Street, the northerly right of way line of Thomas Avenue, the southerly right of way of the Long Island Railroad to the westerly right of way of the Seaford/Oyster Bay Expressway to the northerly right of way of Powell Avenue. The southerly boundary is the southerly property line of Beth-

page State Park. The eastern boundary is the Nassau collection boundary line. The northern boundary is various property lines south and north of Jericho Turnpike to the easterly right of way line of the Seaford/Oyster Bay Expressway.

Bethpage Collection District: To serve the general area in which the westerly boundary is the westerly right of way line of the Port Jefferson Branch of the Long Island Railroad, the northerly boundary is the center line of the Long Island Expressway. The easterly boundary is the easterly right of way line of the Seaford/Oyster Bay Expressway. The southerly right of way line of Old Country Road. Various property lines west of Gramma Lane, various property lines east of Gramma Lane and the property line of Stewart Avenue. The southerly right of way of the Long Island Railroad. Various property lines west of South Oyster Bay Road. The easterly line of South Oyster Bay Road. The southerly line of Old Country Road and the Long Island Expressway.

## Colby Blasts Renewed Calls For Bridge

I can't believe that we are once again hearing calls for the construction of that ill-conceived bridge that was finally laid to rest after years of opposition by residents and their village, Town, State and Federal officials, Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby said today, after reading reports that the idea of an Oyster Bay to Ilye bridge has been resurrected again in Albany.

"It was not surprising to see reports that Robert Moses had continued to press for its construction, even after the Martino-Reilly bill legislation sponsored by Senator Ralph J. Marino and Assemblyman Joseph M. Reilly was signed putting an end to the immediate threat," Colby said.

"But since that time we have had legislators and organizations advocating a very short-sighted view on the need for this span."

Colby noted that solely because jobs would be created by this construction is not a very sound

reason for going ahead with a construction project that is unwanted, unneeded and unsound. The evidence made it very obvious that the idea of a span from Oyster Bay would bring more destruction than anything the proponents listed as plusses. It will destroy homes, communities, and the environment while turning this Town into nothing more than a truck corridor for interstate traffic.

"It is not, under any circumstances, a plus for the future growth of Long Island. One need only examine the areas where major future growth is still possible to realize that, if a span is going to be needed to bring about development, it will be needed in an area far east of Nassau County," Colby said.

Those advocating a bridge from this Town either haven't done their homework or are attempting to make themselves more appealing to a struggling construction industry on Long

## Urge Tax Relief For Those Installing Solar Heating

Solar energy needs support from the state legislature and the governor if we expect any progress this year," according to Assemblyman Philip Healy at an interview in Mineola. Healy was on hand to announce the introduction of legislation to allow tax relief to homeowners who harness energy from the sun.

Accompanied by Richard Rocchio, Director of the Nassau County Bureau of Energy Resources, Assemblyman Healy sponsored a demonstration in which a solar panel took in outside cold air at 29 and discharged it at 119 Fahrenheit without moving parts.

"This type of system could be in many of our homes today if the economies were improved," said Healy. "A bill introduced by Senator Marino (Oyster Bay) and myself would eliminate property taxes on solar heating equipment for the first \$3,000 value, beyond that we would give a ten year tax holiday for more expensive equipment."

"With present hot water solar energy systems costing \$1,000 or more and property taxes added on, homeowners see little incentive to adopt this technology. By eliminating tax costs, we can get an industry going while reducing dependence on imported fossil fuels."

Last year Healy introduced a bill with a restrictive time limit. After consultation with Nassau's Energy Bureau he deleted the non-productive provisions.

If adopted, New York would join ten other states which have eased legislative and tax road

blocks to solar energy.

"A few years ago we took our first step on the moon. It's time now for exploring and demonstrating the sun's tremendous potential for energy in our factories, offices and homes," Healy concluded.

## Town Hires Handicapped

The hiring of eight handicapped students from the Human Resources in Albertson to work with the Town's Handicapped Services Division was approved by the Oyster Bay Town Board on March 1.

Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr. explained that the eight students will be hired to work as Recreation Aides with the Group Activities Program (GAP) for the Handicapped

which is conducted by the Town's Handicapped Services Division. Four will work with the summer program, and four will be hired for the fall-winter program.

Funding will be equally shared by the Town and the State Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, which will channel its money through the Human Resources Center. Salaries will be \$2.50 an hour with a maximum of \$75 for summer aides and \$250 for fall-winter aides for the duration of the program.

"The Town of Oyster Bay has found the idea of having handicapped teens work with youngsters to be a solid one," Hogan stated. "This cooperative program with the Human Resources Center has been going on for several years with the result that handicapped teens who might not otherwise have a job opportunity, gain that experience, and the youngsters have a chance to see what a handicapped person can achieve."

Island, which is more in need of realistic programs than pie-in-the-sky projects that can never get off the ground because they are unsound at their foundation. ments to the Code of Ordinances, Building Zone Ordinances, S-1 Zone, Senior Citizens.

Councilman Saladino cast the first vote in the affirmative and spoke at length prior to his vote on the fact that the vote that was to follow by his brother councilmen reflected the high ideals of democracy and that the Board was not a rubber stamp group.

Councilman Carman followed with another affirmative vote and in addition presented for the record a petition of 40 names requesting a Senior Citizen Home in Farmingdale. The final "aye" vote was cast by Councilman Hogan who stated that "we owe loyalty to our Senior Citizens who have paid taxes in the past and who have steered our country through periods of dark hours."

Councilman Diamond, Mosca and Clark each voted in the negative. Councilman Clark stated that to relinquish another level of "Home Rule" to the Federal government would negate the very purpose of Town Government. The passage of this resolution would permit HUD to permanently maintain authority over the projects. Through the defeat of the resolution the Town could now judge each application on its own merits.

Supervisor Colby abstained from voting and stated that he acknowledges the fact that by abstaining he in fact defeats the resolution. The Supervisor stated that the defeat in no way, shape or manner represents the slightest decrease in concern over the Senior Citizen Program which is respected as the finest program in the country; it does, however, reflect a growing suspicion of HUD policies. The right of the various communities to grant or reject must be mirrored by the Board.
