# Hix Vamps Mourn Loss Of Ex-Chief Henry Gebhardt

Life-Active, Ex-Chief Henry Gebhardt, 86 Hicksville Fire Departments' oldest Active Fireman Died April 11th After A long illness. A record turnout of Hicksville firemen is expected at services Wednesday April 13. The Levittown Fire Dept. under Chief Kelly is also expected to attend, along with Vamps from all over Nassau County. Ex-Chief Gebhardt was a member of just about every Fire Service Organization in the Area.

Back in 1970 Hicksville Firemen Dedicated the 42nd Annual Parade & Drill to Henry. In the Printed Journal that year a story on Henry Gebhardt by an unknown author said it all. In Honor of my Beloved Pal, advisor and fellow Fire Fighter I, Along with all Hicksville members share our memories of "Mr. Fireman" Henry Gebhardt... Into every lifetime, at least once, a man appears whom you not only respect, admire and revere, but honor as a person of integrity and as someone you really relate to. Normally this is a national hero, an athlete or star. Seldom do you find such a man in a comparatively small group that is so honored by all who know him. This is the case however, in the Hicksville Fire Dept.

Henry Gebhardt, Ex-Capt. Ex-Chief, Counselor, Advisor, Confessor, confidant and friend was just such a man. "Gebby" as

he was affectionately known does not simply belong to one HFD company, but to the whole of the department and has become a legend.

In the image of Don Quixote, Walter Raleigh, the Lone Ranger and the U.S. Cavalry of Old, Gebby was always there when you needed him the most, inspiring, directing, giving you the benefit not only of his firematic experience but his personal contact with life itself.

"Gebby" was a Guide & Council to all the members of HFD for all of his 66 years of service.

Just how many members have joined, served twenty or more years, retired, some having answered their final alarm, and those of us here now, all under the

tenure of Henry Gebhardt is difficult to determine. But all have benefited in knowing this man. He has imparted his knowledge, advice and experience unhesitatingly to all who have sought his council.

This 1970 Journal goes on to say... "For his unselfish devotion to duty, His camaraderie with his fellow man, the outstanding year after year firematic performance, for his leadership and inspiration to his brother firemen we of the Hicksville Fire Dept. and proudly so, Do Dedicate in the name of Henry Gebhardt this day (Sept 7, 1970) Labor Day - The Parade and Drill all our thoughts and deeds, our love and affection..."

In due respect to my fellow members, there will never be another Fireman in Hicksville, the likes of Henry Gebhardt. As time passes by we will come to realize even more, Gebby was one of a kind. The pain and suffering is over, ex chief Henry A Gebhardt - 66 years a Fireman - has answered His Last Alarm. Thanks Gebby for all you gave us. Rest assured your ideals, devotion to duty, service to mankind will be carried on. Your presence among us will be missed. We are all much richer for having known you.

## Set Hearing On Hicksville Escalator

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced that the Town Board has set a hearing date of Tuesday, May 10, to consider Town Supervisor Joseph Colby's proposal to transfer the maintenance and operation of the escalators at the Hicksville station of the Long Island Railroad to the Metropolitan Transportation Authority.

"I am delighted that the MTA has responded favorably to my suggestion that it assume this responsibility," Colby commented. "It is a much more logical arrangement in that the

MTA is better equipped to maintain this facility than the Town which has had to contract for these services."

The Hicksville Escalator District was established by the Town Board on April 20, 1959, pursuant to a special act of the State Legislature, to finance the construction, operation and maintenance of escalators at the Hicksville station following the elevation of the tracks in that area. The district roughly encompasses the communities of Hicksville, Jericho and Plain-

view with an estimated population of 88,700, according to the Nassau County Planning Commission.

"If the Board approves the proposal," Clark said, "the next step, dissolution of the Escalator District, will be undertaken when all of the outstanding indebtedness relating to the escalators is cleared up." He noted that the escalators are currently being overhauled under a \$31,180 contract, a portion of which will be paid off by the end of this year.

## At Planting Fields

The annual pageant of spring flowering shrubs has begun at Planting Fields Arboretum, the Long Island State Park and Recreation Commission's horticultural display and exhibition center near Oyster Bay, where seasonal outdoor and indoor events delight many thousands of visitors throughout the year.

Forsythia, early magnolias and early rhododendrons are leading the procession along with winter hazel and andromeda. Soon to follow will be delicate bridal wreath, flowering quince, almond and cherry and, mountain laurel. They will usher in viburnums, later magnolias and finally, dogwoods and pink, red and white rhododendrons of which the Arboretum has massive plantings blooming into June and preceded by the display of azaleas.

The Easter show of lilies and hydrangeas will take center stage in the main greenhouse, beginning April 10. Orchids in

hundreds of varieties from the tiny white to the large showy, multi-colored types add to the color spectacle.

Claiming part of the outdoor spotlight along with the flowering shrubbery will be wildflowers in profusion and naturalized and bedded bulbous plants of which more than 130 varieties of narcissi are to be found in the Synoptic Gardens alone.

The greenhouses will feature the Cactus Garden with its expanding collection of specimens; the fruiting banana trees, bean-bearing coffee trees, sugar cane and citrus plants.

Ample parking space is available at the Arboretum which is open to visitors daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. There is an admission charge of \$1.50 per person on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays until April 18, at which time admission will be charged seven days a week. Children under 12 are admitted free.

## Attendance Record High

Long Island Congressman Norman Lent has chalked up one of the highest voting attendance records in the Congress so far this year. The New York Republican has maintained a 97% attendance record for the first three months of 1977, missing only six of the 200 votes recorded since Congress convened in early January.

Lent, serving his fourth term in the House, in addition to his legislative committee assignments, was recently named to an important leadership post within the Republican Party. Congressman Guy Vander Jagt, the Chairman of the National Republican Congressional Committee, announced that Lent has been named Vice Chairman for Finance and Audit of that Committee.

"Norman Lent has continuously demonstrated his leadership ability both in the Congress and within the Party,"

Vander Jagt stated. "This is one of the most important areas within the scope of the Republican campaign effort. I know he will bring great expertise as well as unending energies to this post."

The National Republican Congressional Committee expects to raise several million dollars for the 1978 elections. The funds will be used to identify, recruit, train and finance Republican candidates for Congressional races.

"The leadership post offers a tremendous challenge," Lent said. "The Republican Party may be undermanned in Congress today, but its future is bright and I strongly believe that through a determined effort we can produce the candidates who will become tomorrow's leaders in Congress. I am very honored by the confidence in me that has been demonstrated by my colleagues."

## Seek Nominations

Would you like to see a deserving young person achieve national recognition for an outstanding act of bravery or exemplary community service?

The opportunity to focus national honor on young people selected to receive the prestigious Young American Medals for Bravery and Service was announced today by the New York State Division for Youth.

The Division for Youth is seeking nominations from the public for the Young American Medals, according to Peter B. Edelman, Director of the Division. The medals are designed to honor deserving youths 18 years of age or less at the time of their acts of bravery or service. Presently being considered are nominations for bravery or service occurring during calendar 1976.

The Young American Medal for Bravery is designed to honor a young person who exhibited exceptional courage, extraordinary decision, presence of mind, and unusual swiftness of action, regardless of personal safety, in an effort to save the life of another person whose life was in actual imminent danger.

The Young American Medal for Service is designed to honor a young person who has performed outstanding or unusual service to others.

The Division for Youth is responsible for review and processing of nominations for submission to Governor Hugh L. Carey who will forward the most outstanding nominations to the National Young American Medals Committee, United States Department of Justice. Medal winners will receive their awards directly from the President of the United States in an appropriate ceremony in the Nation's capital.

Full documentation covering the act of bravery or record of service must accompany each nomination. This must include time and place, supporting statements of witnesses or persons having personal knowledge of facts, authenticated evidence of the date and place of the candidate's birth and a biographical sketch. A recent photograph of the candidate, suitable for reproduction, should also be sent.

No nomination can be considered unless all supporting materials are submitted. All documents will be returned upon request.

Nominations for these awards should be submitted to Young American Medals, New York State Division for Youth, 84 Holland Avenue, Albany, New York 12208. Deadline for receipt of nominations is June 1, 1977.

## LIFT "Expo '77" Symposium

Three of the nation's most notable and distinguished technological experts will address the subject "The Next 50 Years" at Polytechnic Institute of New York's Farmingdale Campus on Route 110, on May 19.

The three are: Dr. Hans M. Mark, Director of the NASA-Ames Research Center in Mountain View, California, who will speak on Space Exploration and Utilization.

Dr. Robert C. Seamans, Jr., former ERDA (Energy Research and Development Administration) Administrator who will speak on Future Solutions to the World's Energy Needs.

Dr. Peter C. Goldmark, President of Goldmark Communications, Inc., former head of CBS Laboratories, pioneer in color television, and inventor of

the long-playing record, who will speak on The Future of Communications and Information Systems.

Other topics to be covered will be: Aviation; Ground Transportation; and Technology and Public Policy.

The Symposium is the first-day event of the 4-day LIFT EXPO 77, and exposition of L.I. technology to be held at the MTA Republic Airport and Polytechnic Institute, May 19 through 22, commemorating the 50th Anniversary of Lindbergh's flight to Paris.

LIFT (the acronym for Long Island Forum for Technology) is an organization of Long Island business, government and academic leaders dedicated to the expansion and development of technological industry on Long Island.

## Relief Costs Diminishing

The number of people receiving financial assistance in Nassau County continues its steady decline.

Statistics covering the first quarter of 1977 show 30,957 people on the welfare rolls at the end of March, as compared to 31,108 at the end of 1976 and 33,681 a year ago. In 1971, 50,536 people were on welfare.

The most significant decrease for the quarter—7.4 per cent—comes in Home Relief, the category of assistance funded jointly by the state and the county, with no federal participation.

"Our aggressive public work program, as well as tight administrative procedures on the part of a trained and competent

staff, are successfully controlling what only two years ago was the area of assistance escalating out of sight," said County Executive Ralph Caso.

There were more than 5,300 persons receiving Home Relief in April, 1975. The number stands at 2,808 today.

This reduction in Home Relief is reflected in the Department of Social Services' budget. In 1976, the County budgeted \$9,590,000 for Home Relief. Actual expenditures, however, amounted to three million dollars less than that. This year, based on a slow, but steady, declining caseload, the County is estimating expenditures of \$6,700,000 for the Home Relief program.

Pipe Band. The Shields - Nassau County is a fraternal association of professional police men and women, the majority of whom are Nassau County residents. It was founded in 1969.

The organization, in its charitable work, has donated to various charities including the Nassau County Medical Center. They maintain a scholarship program for children of their members and maintain a death benefit fund for its members and any police officer who works or resides in Nassau County killed in the line of duty.

## Letters To The Editor

To The Editor:

One of the hoariest legends of suburbia is the new housing development in a sort of no-man's land, where neighbors on opposite sides of the same street have different telephone exchanges, different ZIP codes, different fire and police departments, and send their children to different school districts.

Like most legends, this one has some basis in fact. Suburbs everywhere sprouted up almost overnight during the mass migration out of the cities following World War II. The vast migrations of ancient times, the movements of masses of people that shaped and sometimes toppled civilizations, leaped continents and spanned centuries but were not even discernible during the lifetime of any single individual. But the great outward migration into America's suburbs took only two decades and changed the face of the nation. It shifted lifestyles, realigned political power and set into motion potent economic and social forces that we are only now beginning to grasp. During and just after World War II, the suburbs had been a kind of economic and political third world on the American scene—neither urban nor rural, neither densely nor sparsely populated—and the rest of the nation largely ignored them, and continued to

ignore them as they began to grow.

With growth came the need for services—agencies and institutions to provide police and fire protection, pick up the garbage, clean the streets, educate children. And since the suburbs everywhere grew so haphazardly, with sudden and unpredictable population explosions now here and now there, the institutions of government proliferated just as haphazardly. The needs were here and now and could not wait for long-range regional solutions. Nassau County's population explosion produced 398 separate units of local government. New York State has 2,363-57 counties, 62 cities, 357 villages, 775 school districts and 931 towns. Nationwide, there are some 78,000 units of government—hardly the neat and tidy arrangement that we studied about in our civics or social studies classes in our school days.

Nassau's efforts to unravel the tangled skein of government following creation of a Multi-Municipal Task Force have broad implications for local governments elsewhere. Governmental studies refer to Nassau County as a "mature suburb" because its days of spectacular growth are behind it.

The immortals of sport have no more avid fan or champion among spectators than Past Commander Tom Nikitas of the Charles Wagner Post, Hicksville. A long-time professional football enthusiast and historian, Nikitas has gathered over the years an outstanding collection of gridiron photographs. Going back to the origins of professional football in 1895, the collection consists of many autographed photos of such legendary coaches and players as Curly Lambeau who fielded the Acme Packers of Green Bay in 1919, Vince Lombardi, Sammy Baugh, Bronko Nagurski, Dutch Clark, George McAfee, Ken Strong, Paul Hornung, Jimmy Brown and a host of other football giants.

Nikitas' collection was accorded a distinct honor recently when one of the Long Islander's nearly unique pictures was accepted for inclusion in the collection of Pro Football's Hall of Fame. On a visit to the football shrine at Canton, Ohio, Tom offered, and had accepted, an early Kodak color-processed

photograph of Carlyle Indian College's immortal Jim Thorpe. and because the institutions needed to meet emerging needs have already been forged. But because Nassau County was one of the earliest and fastest growing suburbs, many of the solutions that it evolved to meet suburban problems have been studied and copied by other later-blooming suburbs. Nassau County today has a population of nearly 1.5 million. It has more people than 15 of the states. If it were a city instead of a county, it would be the sixth largest city in the nation—smaller only than New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Philadelphia and Detroit. So what our Multi-Municipal Task Force does to make local government more effective in Nassau is important not only to us but to many other areas that are watching to see if we can succeed.

veterans. Even if this were not so, isn't the veteran entitled to the best medical treatment rather than trial and error treatment.

## To the Editor:

This is in response to Evelyn Hack's letter of March 31st in your "Letters to the Editor" column. I strongly object to her gripes about Hicksville taxpayers not having provided her with a pool park complex as surrounding communities have done for their residents. As far as I can ascertain the communities of Jericho, Bethpage and the two communities Plainview - Old Bethpage - the latter two combined to build their parks long before the inflation started and the economy slumped. All of them were rural areas before 1950 who sent their children to Hicksville Jr. and Sr. High schools. After the building boom started quite a few affluent people left the metropolitan area and settled hereabouts. Hicksville's tax base shrank considerably due to the fact that Broadway was widened to accommodate the sudden influx of heavy traffic. We lost our business district on the west side of Broadway and inherited a Nomans land instead. Taxwise this was bad news. On top of that the enormously inflated population had to be provided with schools and other municipal services. It is to the credit of our early planners that our town retained its excellence as far as our educational system is concerned, one of the best. The money was wisely spent. We did not overbuild, therefore, have no empty schools - white elephants - on our hands. We have one of the finest libraries that serves as a cultural center, a highly efficient fire department, an old courthouse now proclaimed a HISTORICAL SITE by the

federal government converted to a museum with the fabulous Gregory collection of rocks and minerals, a historical room and classes in geology and mineralogy, all this, and many fine active organizations. I myself enjoy swimming and the outdoors. But when Evelyn Hack proclaims in her letter, and I quote: "Give me a recreational park" does she mean at the taxpayers expense? I am afraid the necessities of life are more important at present such as sewer installations and the ever rising cost of living. Many of my neighbors use Catiague Park. After all, we already pay taxes for it. There, surrounded by factories, the din and clamor of happy children at play is far removed from any residential area. In addition to this beautiful park we have world famous Jones Beach, and other beaches along our shores. We also have sports facilities owned by commercial enterprises, where for a fee, people can exercise to their heart's content. Parents should not expect the property owner to be saddled with a Five Million Dollar pool park complex.

I have lived and travelled in Europe for many years. I remember its beautiful parks: the fountains, the flower beds, marble statuary and the landscaping. There, vandalism and littering are punishable by a stiff fine of jail. Parents are held responsible for the misdeeds of their children. I am fully aware that this type park would be an impossible dream for Hicksville. However, a small park as I suggested in my letter to the editor, could be well policed by security guards. Planners for Long Island suggest green spaces (oasis) between homes as a welcome break from the monotony of roof tops. We are all fully aware of what happened to a near neighbor of ours, a once prosperous metropolis, whose inhabitants, by demanding free goodies, now have their city fathers scraping the bottom of the barrel.

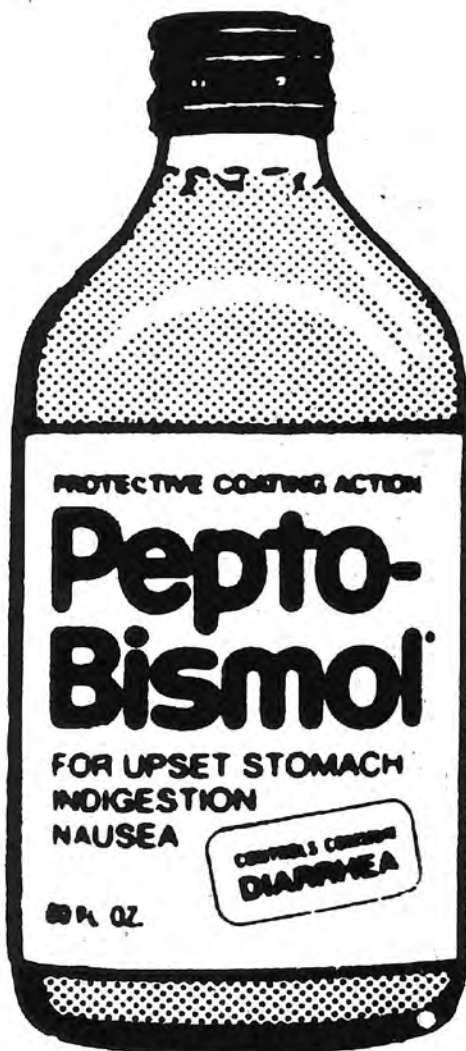
