School Board Meeting

The Hicksville Board of Education voted last week to add a proposition No. 2 to its annual budget vote and election scheduled for June 22. The addition of proposition No. 2 had been recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee.

The proposition restores transportation to one and one-half miles for senior high students and one mile for junior high students at an added cost of \$108,000 to the annual budget. Currently, transportation is provided for senior high students living two miles from the school and for junior high students living one and one-half miles.

The Board adopted the resolution calling for the annual meeting on June 22 for the purpose of voting on proposition No. 1 (school budget for 1977-78) and electing two trustees. (See legal notice for specific details on both propositions.)

Absent from the Board meeting was Mr. William Bruno, trustee who is still seriously ill in the hospital. Mr. John Lari, Trustee, arrived late.

The Board approved budget code 5000, transportation, which includes \$2,000 for a survey on mileage policies and the use of buses. Mr. Richard Helfont, Assistant Business Manager, explained the details of the proposed survey. Certain

problems, unique to our district would be presented and recommendations alleviating these problems would be proposed. The cost covers only the survey and not the second phase of computerization.

Also included in the transportation code is \$15,000 for BOCES field trips to provide outdoor and environmental education programs for the students in the district. There is no cost to the district because of reimbursable aid from BOCES. Both expenditures were recommended by the budget committee. The total pupil transportation costs budgeted for 1977-78 is \$943,985.

A public hearing on the proposed 1977-78 school budget will be held on June 8.

The Board passed a motion to amend the parking resolution adopted at its April 13 meeting to change the fees involved to conform with the Town of Oyster Bay regulations. Effective May 1, towing charges are \$25.00 and storage is \$2.50 per day.

A motion to add a proposition No. 2 to conduct subsequent library elections at the library instead of in the schools was withdrawn. Mr. Tom Nagle, school board vice-president, pointed out that such a move could hurt Hicksville residents because of inadequate library parking facilities and the inaccessibility to some communities. Mr. Cornelius McCormack, Trustee, questioned why the library trustees had not notified the school board about this proposition. It was suggested that more discussion be held between the school board and the library board before such a proposition be considered.

The Board approved a report of the Committee on the Handicapped. Mr. Erwin Rozran, Assistant Superintendent, informed the Board that once a handicapping condition is identified a student cannot be moved up

unless approved by the Committee. He also informed the members of the Board that the individual files on handicapped students were available to them for their reference.

A request by the administration for the approval to allocate funds approved by the Bureau of School Libraries, under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act Title IV, was granted by the Board. Title IV is part of the Education Amendments of 1974. A total of \$29,073 (\$20,780 for public schools; \$8,293 for non-public schools) will be allocated among the district's schools for the purchase of books, audiovisual materials, equipment and the cost of acquisition. This project is federally funded.

Dr. Frederick Hill, Superintendent, reporting on the Council contract informed the Board members that they had received his recommendations last week, but had not yet met to discuss them. The matter was tabled until a further review could be made which would include figures requested by the Board.

Mr. Joseph Campanella, school board attorney, reported that the custodial members of the CSEA (who, again, loudly demonstrated before the Board meeting,) had asked for a superconductor. Mr. Campanella has asked the superintendents from the superintendents. He also reported that he is waiting to hear from the new negotiator from the clerical staff, which recently voted to join the teacher's union (HCT).

The Board approved routine expenses; awarded bids in the amounts of \$872.28 for learning materials and \$5,961.10 for general office supplies; granted several maternity leaves; and approved several retirements.

The next Hicksville Board of Education meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 11 at 8:15 p.m. in the conference room of the Administration Building.

Water District Report

The Board of Commissioners, Hicksville Water District, has been advised that construction of an interceptor sewer and lateral spurs along Bloomingdale Road and New South Road, north from the Town of Oyster Bay line to Plainview Road, thence westerly along Plainview Road to Elm Street will begin on or about May 9, 1977. In accordance with the provisions of the New York State Sanitary Code it will be necessary to maintain a chlorine residual in the water supply in the construction area.

Revise Project

The Oyster Bay Town Board authorized a additional engineering services to revise a drainage and road improvement project in Hicksville so that the installation of concrete gutters and road resurfacing can be incorporated into the Nassau County sewer construction contract.

The Town's consulting engineers, Sidney B. Bowne & Son, will revise construction drawings and specifications so that the storm drainage portion of the contract can proceed with provision for restoration of the existing pavements and sidewalks. The roads involved are Prince Street, Liberty Avenue, Reiter Avenue and St. John Avenue. Engineering costs are not to exceed \$2,500.

Custodial Strike

As We Go To Press

Wednesday, May 4 — School custodians and maintenance workers began their third day of a walkout after negotiations between the union (CSEA) and the Hicksville Board of Education resulted in "no progress", according to a union spokesman. A meeting was held Tuesday evening between the two parties until 2:30 a.m.

Still at issue is a cost of living wage. According to administrative officials, the union is split three-ways on the contract terms and the board members are also said to be in disagreement concerning the terms of the contract. A meeting of the union's executive committee was scheduled for this afternoon.

Dr. Frederick Hill, Superintendent, said "it is a most regrettable situation. The actual monetary differences are slight and sufficient funds are available if the differences can be reconciled."

While discussions were taking place inside the administration building, outside a fire was set to a car belonging to Philip Alphanos, CSEA field representa-

ive. Chief Huttle of the Hicksville Fire Department reported that two vamps responded at the scene to put out the fire. The matter is "under investigation" according to the Nassau County Police Arson Squad.

Although the strike has caused no disruption of classes, the effects of the strike in regard to sanitary conditions and fire hazards has been a concern among parents. After a few concerned parents toured the junior and senior high schools, they urged administration officials to do whatever they could to alleviate the accumulated litter.

Shirley Smith, President, Hicksville Council of PTA's, has urged both sides to negotiate. "We are concerned with the safety of our students and hope that a settlement will be reached very soon."

School board members could not be reached for comment this morning.

NEWS FLASH: As we go to press, a meeting of the union membership was scheduled for 6 pm at the senior high to vote on an offer made by the school board.

May Henry Gebhardt Be Remembered Always!

This is a story of a man who has dedicated sixty six years of his life to being a Volunteer Fireman. His name? Henry A. Gebhardt. Born in Hicksville in 1890. In March of 1911 he joined the Hicksville Volunteer Fire Department and was an active member till he died on April 11, 1977. For a time he lived in the Fire House on East Marie Street and held the duties of dispatcher. Henry's son also joined the Fire Department, but he was killed in action during World War II. Both of Henry's sons-in-law, Charles F. Saurer and Vincent Braun, joined the Fire Department and through their own abilities

became Chiefs and Commissioners.

In the sixty six years Henry was a fireman he did more for the community and the Fire Department than any many we ever knew. He was the only man to hold the office of Chief for four years. He was president of the Nassau County Firemen's Association. In 1926 he was appointed to a position as New York State Fire Warden. In 1969 he was awarded the Schaefer Fireman of the year award. The list of his achievements are too numerous to mention.

We feel that for all the years

Henry A. Gebhardt has served the community of Hicksville, that in some way he should be remembered. In doing so we would like to change East Marie Street into Gebhardt Street. It's not too much to ask of Hicksville, for 66 years of a man's life.

We have already received support from Councilman Thomas Clark, TOB Supervisor Joseph Colby, Mrs. Carole Wolf, a dedicated community leader and Sheila Noeth of this newspaper. We hope we can get the rest of Hicksville Community to along with us.

May Henry A. Gebhardt be remembered always.

Grievance Period Through May 17

Once again, taxpayers in Oyster Bay and throughout Nassau County will have the opportunity to check the assessment on their homes or business properties during the annual Grievance Period, prescribed by the County Charter and running this year from Monday, May 2nd through Tuesday, May 17th. The property assessment carried on the tax rolls is the figure determined by the Nassau County Board of Assessors that is used in computing county, town, school and special district taxes.

During the Grievance Period, property owners can examine the assessment rolls, and, if they disagree with the Board's determination, they can discuss it with department personnel or file a protest with the Board of Assessors.

For the convenience of Oyster Bay Town landowners, the tentative 1978 assessment rolls will be available for examination at the Hicksville Town Hall Annex, 65 Broadway, during Grievance Period Representatives of the Board of Assessors will be available at the Annex during this time to discuss with interested individuals their property record cards and answer questions concerning the

rationale and formula used in arriving at the assessment figures.

If still not satisfied, taxpayers have the opportunity to file protest forms with the Board of Assessors, either while at the Hicksville Annex or at the Board's office in Mineola. The deadline for such action is May 17th. The protests are forwarded to the Board of Assessment Review, an independent body, that, after careful examination and analysis of the facts, can order the Board of Assessors to reduce or raise assessments as warranted.

Chairman of the Board of Assessors Abe Seldin has pointed out that the assessment rolls will be available for inspection on weekdays from 9:00 AM until 4:30 PM from May 2nd through May 17th, and also on the Wednesday evenings of May 4th and 11th between 7-10 PM, for the convenience of working persons.

All residents are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to have their voices heard on matters of assessment and taxes. Additional information regarding grievance procedures can be obtained by calling the Board of Assessors Taxpayer Information Bureau at 535-2790.

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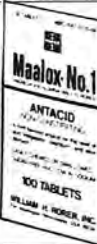
