## Differences Resolved-Strike Ends

In the matter of negotiations between the Board of Education, U.F.S.D. No. 17 Hicksville, and Nassau Educational Chapter C.S.E.A., Inc. (Buildings and Grounds Employees), the parties have agreed to:

1. Effective July 1, 1976, the 1975-76 salary schedule will be increased by 5.2 percent.
2. Effective July 1, 1977, the 1976-77 salary schedule will be increased by 4.5 percent.
3. Employees will be paid increments where applicable.
4. These modifications will be adopted and included in the present agreement. The present contract will be extended to expire June 30, 1978.

Both sides are pleased that this matter has been amicably resolved and that the men are back on the job. It is a source of gratification to both sides that classes were maintained during the week, and that the education of the children has not been seriously impeded. As of school opening on Monday, all classes were in normal session.

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## Surplus Land Sale

Nassau County will hold its largest sale of surplus land in 31 years with a public auction on May 18. County Executive Ralph G. Caso announced this week.

The auction — with 163 parcels of vacant land at a minimum sale value of \$1,211,795 — will be held starting at 10 a.m. in the Police Headquarters Auditorium in Mineola.

"The parcels in this sale were reviewed and declared surplus by the Real Estate and Insurance Bureau of the General Services Department," Caso said. "By selling property it doesn't need, the county will not only derive revenue, but put the property back on the tax rolls."

Of the parcels for sale, 127 were acquired by the county through non-payment of taxes. Taxes and interest owed on these parcels total approximately \$36,233. Most of them are not directly accessible and generally are of value only to the owners of abutting property.

The largest of the five properties to be sold is a triangle in Massapequa Park, which is 34 by 16 by 701 feet. It has a minimum price of about \$4,000.

The largest piece of property in the sale is approximately 3 acres of land on Duffy's Lane in Hicksville, near the Wantagh State Parkway, and adjacent to a county dump. It has a minimum allowed bid of \$365,300. The smallest piece of property is a one-foot wide and 58-foot long strip on Francis Avenue in Rockville Centre. It has a \$10 price

tag. The largest county surplus land sale in the past was in 1946, when 3,886 parcels were sold for \$3,896,114.

This year, for the first time, successful bidders will have a payment option. The land buyers can stretch out their payments over a period of time at 8½ per cent interest. A payment in lieu of taxes will be added, so that the county will begin deriving tax revenue from the property shortly after the sale, instead of waiting for the next year's tax rolls. The deed will be delivered after the final installment is made, giving the county further protection in having the sales contract honored by the purchaser.

Caso received approval from the State Legislature to allow time payment sales to make purchase more attractive to buyers and investors.

The Department of General Services will conduct the sale. On the parcels taken for non-payment of taxes, the department will notify owners of abutting property to invite their bids.

A catalogue on all parcels is being prepared and will be sent to realtors and developers. Some 600 will be contacted. The catalogue will shortly be available to all interested parties in the Real Estate and Insurance Bureau in the Old County Courthouse on Franklin Avenue in Mineola.

## At Black History Museum

Nassau's talented young artists will be exhibiting in "Youth on Parade" at the Black History Museum in Hempstead beginning Saturday, May 14.

The show will be judged by professional artists on opening day at 2 p.m. All the art entries will remain on display through Wednesday, June 1.

Works of youngsters from grades one through 12 will be

displayed including prize winners within three grade categories: 1-6, 7-9 and 10-12.

The Black History Museum, operated by the Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks, is open daily except Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The museum is located on 106A Main Street in the Bus Terminal Building.

## Bowling Tournament

Approximately two thousand entries have been received from senior citizens out to win the Sixth Annual Senior Citizens Bowling Tournament conducted by the Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks.

The county-wide finals will be held at Plainview Bowl on Friday, May 20, at 1 p.m. Twelve

women and 13 men high scorers will represent each of the three towns and the City of Long Beach during the bowl-out.

The tournament is co-sponsored by the Nassau Bowling Proprietors Association, the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead, Oyster Bay and the City of Long Beach.

## Secretaries Name "Boss of Year"

The Long Island Chapter of the National Secretaries Association named Commissioner Adelaide Attard of the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs as "Boss Of The Year" at its Annual Award Ceremony at Westbury Manor on April 26. The winning nomination was submitted by the Commissioner's secretary, Harriet A. Maher of Hicksville.

Nominations were submitted by Association members to a panel of judges who unanimously selected the Commissioner as the winner. Entries were identified by number, and not name to insure fairness. Judges were William Attwood, President and Publisher of Newsday; Nelson Doubleday, Executive Vice President of Doubleday and Company; and Michael J. Tully, Jr., Supervisor of the Town of North Hempstead.

Ms. Attard, a resident of East Norwich, is the first woman Commissioner in County Executive Ralph G. Caso's cabinet. Under her innovative leadership, the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs provides a myriad of services of 200,000 persons age 60 and over in Nassau County. The agency operates a main office in Carle Place, branch offices in Elmont, Freeport, Long Beach and Roslyn, a traveling information office called the Seniorsmobile, fourteen nutrition centers which serve daily hot lunches to low-income elderly and a five-day-a-week senior citizen center in Roslyn. It has been designated by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare as "one of the most effective agencies in the

nation serving the elderly."

In her winning entry, Ms. Maher called Commissioner Attard the "ideal boss" because "she is the best organized and most professionally capable individual for whom I have worked. In addition," concluded Ms. Maher, "she is dedicated to and concerned for the elderly constituency which she serves, as well as being genuinely warm toward everyone on her staff." The only other woman to win the award was State Supreme Court Justice Beatrice Burstein, two years ago.

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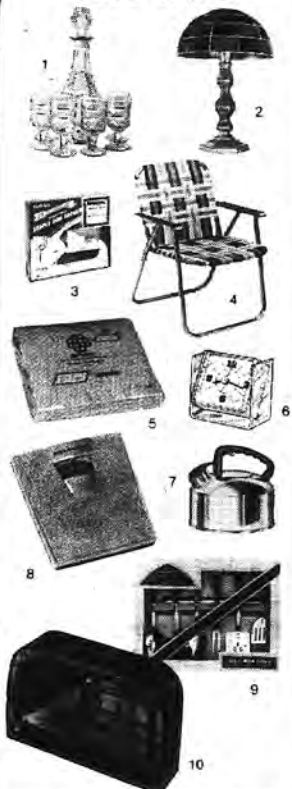
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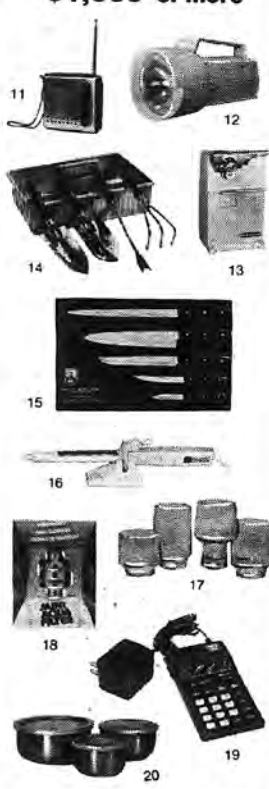

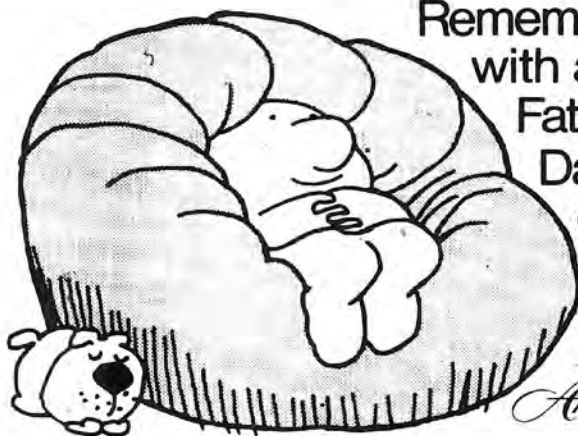

Band music and a cookout - typical summer fun to make a child smile - but special moments for the youngster pictured here. Cradled in the arms of a volunteer attendant at a Muscular Dystrophy Association summer camp, he's having the time of his life. For him and other muscular dystrophy patients, friendship and laughter, songs and games at camp are cherished experiences.

At MDA camp, young patients learn what it's like to be regular kids. For many, it's their first chance to see and touch a farm animal, or join in games like wheelchair volleyball. Being "accepted" and making real friends are probably an MDA camp's most important feature for these children.



MDA operates 64 free camps in 35 states for children and adults with muscle diseases. Young volunteers are an indispensable ingredient for any camping session. This summer, nearly 3,000 volunteers will again take on the demanding responsibility of acting as round-the-clock attendants and companions for each camper. Working with 9-to-21-year-old patients, mentally alert though physically disabled, is a difficult but rewarding task. One volunteer summed up her feelings this way: "Just that little bit of love that you usually don't even think about can be just the greatest thing in the world."
