The budget includes all recommended changes and ear-marks such costs as \$943,985 for transportation; \$1,969,211 for operation and maintenance; and \$4,838,527 for employee benefits such as retirement, Social Security, and health insurance

among others. The budget figure does not include an additional \$108,00 for Include an additional \$108,00 for transportation costs, provided in Proposition no. 2, which can pass-only if Proposition no. 1 (annual budget) is approved by the voters. If both propositions are approved, the tax rate would increase approximately 5.09 over last year, to an estimated \$15.87. Also included in the budget is the evenodium of \$15 ere schedule

the expenditure of \$15 per stude the expenditure of \$15 per student (both public) and non-public) for textbooks, which was recom-mended by the Budget Study Committee. The Committee suggested several budget cuts to provide sufficient monies for this evenditure.
