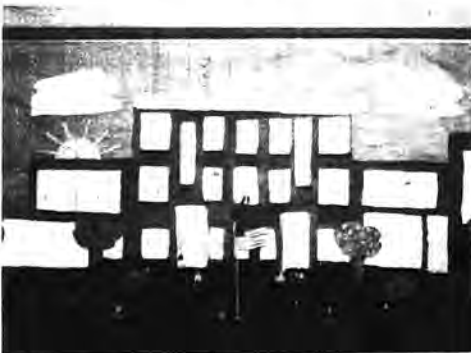

Board Adopts Budget Figure

The Hicksville Board of Education voted last week to adopt a budget figure of \$27,445,927 for the 1977-78 school year. This is a net decrease of \$5,213 from last year's budget and also a net decrease of \$ 0.11 in the tax rate estimated at \$15.77.

The budget includes all recommended changes and earmarks such costs as \$943,985 for transportation; \$1,969,211 for operation and maintenance; and \$4,838,527 for employee benefits such as retirement, Social Security, and health insurance among others.

The budget figure does not include an additional \$108,000 for transportation costs, provided in Proposition no. 2, which can pass only if Proposition no. 1 (annual budget) is approved by the voters. If both propositions are approved, the tax rate would increase approximately \$ 0.09 over last year, to an estimated \$15.87.

Also included in the budget is the expenditure of \$15 per student (both public and non-public) for textbooks, which was recommended by the Budget Study Committee. The Committee suggested several budget cuts to provide sufficient monies for this expenditure.

Also speaking in favor of the \$15 per student allotment were Sister Kathleen Hennessy, Principal of Our Lady of Mercy; and Sister Kathleen Murphy, Principal of St. Ignatius. Both

principals emphasized that \$15 be allotted for every student in the district, non-public and public.

The parochial school principals aired their views during an informal public speaking session before the official board meeting could begin due to a lack of a quorum. Absent were Trustee Dan Arena, for personal reasons; and Trustee Cornelius McCormack due to illness. President Iris Wolfson arrived late and a quorum was then present. Vice President Tom Nagle presided.

At the request of President Iris Wolfson, Dr. Fred Hill, Superintendent, explained the revenue sources for the school budget. Aside from property-levied taxes, totaling an estimated \$18,162,982 (representing 66 per cent of the budget) revenues are expected from such sources as adult education tuition; Nassau County Narcotics Program; tuition charges to other districts for foster children; health services (7 per cent) and state aid (27 per cent), both totaling \$9,282,945.

"The Board is to be commended," said Dr. Hill, "You have not given a figure to the public that has not been met." Dr. Hill also emphasized that the budget "does not reduce educational services."

President Iris Wolfson added that although enrollment may have declined and residents expect a school budget to decline also, the Board was faced this year with "changes in mandated costs, such as Social Security and unemployment benefits, totaling over a half-million dollars."

A public hearing on the budget, which by law can be changed by a school board ten days before the vote, will be held on June 8 at the Senior High School. The budget vote is on June 22. All citizens are urged to participate.

The parochial school principals also expressed their opposition to a school-hours change for their respective schools. "We are not opposed to a change of hours for the public schools; however, we

will not accept a 9:30 to 3:30 day," stated Sister Katherine Murphy, principal of St. Ignatius.

A letter from the Hicksville Council of PTA's was read, which favored a school-hours change since it would educationally benefit more Hicksville students.

Vice President Tom Nagle stated that "the school hours will not be changed for the sake of changing hours. We will try to do what is best for everyone, taking cost into consideration."

The Board approved the appointment of Mr. John Pitrelli as Assistant Principal of the Senior High School effective September 1, 1977. Mr. Pitrelli, a Hicksville resident and currently a social studies teacher at the high school, fills the position vacated by Mr. Chet Jaworski, who is retiring after 29 years with the district.

The Board ratified a new contract with HCT Secretarial Employees which covers salary increases for 1975-76 of 3.6 per cent and for 1976-77 of 4.5 per cent; increments where applicable; step increases; and holidays.

Also approved by the Board for the 1977-78 school year is a study on the Effects of a New System of Handwriting on Dysgraphic Children. The study, completely funded by the State Education Department at a cost of \$2,600, was proposed by Renee Powers, Learning Disabilities teacher at Fork Lane. Dr. Manus Clancy, Director of Curriculum, briefly explained the program and informed the Board that it met with BOCES approval.

School Board candidates Mr. Pete Fujimoto, running for the seat being vacated by Mr. John Lari; and Mr. Bill Bennett, running for the unexpired one-year term of the late Mr. William Bruno, were introduced by President Iris Wolfson. Also running is incumbent Mr. Dan Arena. Because these candidates are running unopposed, Mrs. Wolfson moved to seat Mr. Bennett, effective immediately.

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Board Appoints HHS Assistant Principal

On May 25 the Hicksville Board of Education appointed John F. Pitrelli Assistant Principal of the Hicksville Senior High School. This will become effective on September 1, 1977.

Mr. Pitrelli, who is 41, has been a resident of Hicksville since 1961, but taught in the Hicksville school system before that. He taught at the Hicksville Junior High in the Social Studies Dept from 1959 to 1966. From 1966, he taught Social Studies in Hicksville's Senior High.

In addition, he was a professor of History and Political Science at Nassau Community College; Lecturer, Graduate School of Engineering, Stony Brook University; Teacher Participant, Regional Program in Drug Education; Grade Coordinator,

Social Studies, 8th grade; Coordinator, American Studies; Curriculum Consultant, Social Studies, grades 10, 11; and for a year (1974-75) was administrative assistant, Office of the Assistant Principal (Mr. Olvany).

His educational background includes a BA from St. John's University, 1958, History; MS Hofstra University, 1964, Secondary Administration; New York University, 1958-59, Graduate Study; CW Post College of LI University, 1959, Graduate Study; and Adelphi University, 1960, Graduate Study.

His professional licenses include Permanent Certificate, Secondary Schools, Social Studies, Feb. 1, 1961; and Permanent Certificate, Secondary School Principal, Sept. 1, 1964.

Professional organizations that he has belonged to include Zeta Sigma Pi, National Social Science Fraternity; Omega, 1955-58, Alpha 1958-; National Council for Social Studies; New York State Council for Social Studies; L.I. Council for Social Studies; Director of Publicity; New York State Assoc. of Junior College Teachers; National Education Assoc.; N.Y. State Teachers Assoc. (NYSUT) Presidents Committee; Hicksville Classroom Teachers Assoc. of which he served as Pres., Vice-Pres., Treas., Chairman, PR & R, Negotiator, Parliamentarian, Liaison Committee; Adjunct Faculty Assoc., Nassau Community College, Chief Negotiator, Grievance Committee Chairman, Contract Administrator.

He has served as Director H.A.D.; on the PTA; Chairman Student Activities Committee, Jr. High School; Hicksville Republican Party; Sons of Italy, Galileo Lodge; Pioneer Rifle and Pistol Club; and various Board of Education Committees including Educational Liaison Panel; Educational Goals and Objectives Student-Staff Relationships; Chairman BOCES Liaison Committee.

On Dec. 21, 1970, he received a commendation from the Board of Education, Hicksville School Dist. No 17; and in June of 1970, Hofstra University, Graduate School of Education, presented him with a commendation for Professional Contributions in Teacher Education.

Physician's Assistant

Henry Marano, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Marano of HICKSVILLE, is completing his training as a physician's assistant with six months of clinical work under the supervision of Bradford K. Struck, M.D., of the family medicine program at Harrisburg Hospital, Harrisburg, Pa.

Marano is a student in the Physician's Assistant (PA) Program at Hahnemann Medical College & Hospital of Philadelphia, one of only two accredited programs in the state of Pennsylvania.

The PA is a relatively new type of allied health professional who works under the direction of a licensed physician in providing primary care services. These may include physical examination, patient instruction, minor surgical procedures, physical therapy, lab studies and other routine medical care.

Marano graduated from Hicksville Senior High in 1971. He attended the State University of New York at Farmingdale where he received an associate degree in 1973.

The first year of Hahnemann's PA Program consists of classroom and laboratory in-

struction and rotations in obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, medicine and surgery. The second year involves a clerkship to familiarize the student with delivery of primary health care in various settings and the six-month preceptorship where the student gains an in-depth exposure to patient problems.

To The Editor:

In May I wrote to the Superintendents of school districts throughout the Town of offer job placement opportunities for youngsters within the districts who are eligible for summer employment under provisions of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). The section of CETA that provides summer work opportunities is administered locally by the Nassau County Youth Corps which, under the parameters of the legislation, makes job slots available to school districts. Students within the districts make application for employment through their schools.

Experience last year with this program showed that, because the activities and workload within school districts are diminished during the summer months, it might not always be possible for individual districts to utilize all of the openings made available to them. In one instance

last summer, a local school placed a number of students in the program who, through the co-operation of the Town, worked in one of Oyster Bay's beach facilities. The practical concern of establishing sufficient job slots is of greater magnitude this year in that local share of funding for CETA summer employment has been increased.

It was with this in mind that I canvassed various agencies within the Town to see if work experience and training opportunities could be made available to participants of the CETA program at Oyster Bay facilities. Such openings do exist, as I indicated in the letter to the school districts, in our Departments of General Services and Parks and Recreation, the Divisions of Environmental Control, Central Vehicle Maintenance and Beaches, the offices of the Town Clerk and Comptroller and in the Personnel Office.

Work experience that can be provided through the Town cannot only help the school districts realize their full potential in the program and benefit the maximum number of local students, but will also provide varied opportunities for practical work experience and training and which in turn, can serve to assist Town forces in their activities on behalf of Oyster Bay residents.

VAMPS SAVE A LIFE

Hicksville F.D. Rescue Squad responded to a call for a man choking on May 24. Upon arrival at 355 West John St. - the County Home - Vamps found a 67 year old resident barely breathing.

Efforts to remove the object were unsuccessful. He was rushed to the County Medical Center. During the trip, his vital signs were maintained. At the Hospital, doctors had to use special tools to remove a 2" x 4" piece of meat. Doctors praised the professional job done by the Vamps. The patient was treated and released.

RESCUE SQUAD HARASSED AT ACCIDENT SCENE

Hicksville firemen responded

to a call for help Sunday, May 29 when a child was struck by a car on Bond La. in Hicksville. As most residents are aware, the members of the Rescue Squad - Paramedics and Emergency Medical Tech's are state certified after undergoing months of classroom training and on the job training. Many folks here owe their lives to these Volunteers. One can figure on the unexpected in the Fire & Rescue Service, but the Rescue Squad didn't expect the following abuse they received at the Bond La. alarm. First arriving Vamps and others, as they arrived, were continually harassed as they tried to work on the child. The person causing the problem was a New York Police Officer who lives in Hicksville.

Vamps were incensed over his abuse and had difficulty working on the victim. County Police on the scene had to remove him from the area. The child was removed from the scene and transported to the County Medical Center. This was a disgusting incident. It was found he was a Police Officer. It is our hope that in this Village, an incident of this type will not be repeated. The residents of Hicksville can be proud of the restraint shown by fireman at this incident. It was not easy to ignore threats and abuse while trying to help the injured

FIRE REPORT

APRIL 19 to MAY 29

During the past 5½ weeks Hicksville Vamps were extremely busy. Firemen responded to 187 alarms. There were 70 rescue calls, 74 fire calls, 43 malicious false alarms. 12 of those false alarms were turned in at the Jr. High and 5 from the Sr. High School. Most of these were turned in during the custodian strike by students taking advantage of the situation. There were also complaints from parents that numerous fires in the Jr. High were not reported.

HOUSE FIRES

Since the last fire report there were several house fires. On April 27 an un-occupied house at

Tile La. & Newbridge Rd. was heavily damaged by a fire of suspicious origin. One civilian who was burned was being questioned. During the fire a propane tank ignited and caused some concern. The flames were kept in check until the gas was expended.

On May 1, a vacant house at 235 So. Broadway was gutted. The fire was set. It tied up Vamps for 2 hours. 1 Vamp Fireman Pietzak of Co. 4 suffered a back injury. On May 13, at 5:26 A.M. a family at 48 Ash La. escaped with their lives when a fire destroyed the attic of their home. A SMOKE DETECTOR here would have given a much earlier warning.

A house at 189 9th St. sustained heavy damage on May 19. The alarm came in at 11:44 p.m. A neighbor said the occupant was inside, and at great risk to themselves, Vamps entered the flaming structure and found no one. One Vamp Fireman Rose of Co. 3 was cut by flying glass during the search.

A fire at 25 Buckner Ave. damaged the roof on May 21. The alarm came in 5:13 P.M. 1 Vamp Kevin Farrel suffered a throat injury due to heat and smoke. It is hoped that before the Herald goes to print this week, pictures of the gas tanker incident will be available, if not they will appear as soon as possible.

Election District No. 3 Woodland Avenue School

On the North, Northeast along the District's North line, from Miller Road, as projected to the District's North line, to the District's East line.

On the East, South along the District's East line, from the District's North line, to Columbia Road.

On the South and West: Columbia Road, from the District's East line, West to Berkshire Road, then West along Berkshire Road into Haverford Drive, then North and Northeast along Dartmouth Drive to Ardsley Gate, then Northwest through Ardsley Gate to Woodbury Road, then Southwest along Woodbury Road to Ronald Avenue, then West along Ronald Avenue to Miller Road, then North along Miller Road and

continuing thereon as it is projected, to the District's North line.

Election District No. 4 Lee Avenue School

On the East-Northeast, the Long Island Railroad, from its intersection with Old Country Road, to the Southerly point of the District's East line.

On the South, the District's South line, from the Long Island Railroad, Southwesterly into Michigan Drive, then South along said District line to the Hempstead Township line, then Northwesterly along the District's South line to Jerusalem Avenue.

On the West and North, along Jerusalem Avenue, from the District's South line, to Salem Gate, then West along Salem Gate to Salem Road, then North to Harkin Lane, then Northwest along Harkin Lane to Division Avenue, then North along Division Avenue to Glenbrook Road, then Northwest along Glenbrook Road to Newbridge Road, then Northwest along Newbridge Road to Old Country Road, then East along Old Country Road to the Long Island Railroad.

Election District No. 5 Fork Land School

On the East: Jerusalem Avenue from Salem Gate, to the District's South line.

On the North: Salem Gate, West from Jerusalem Avenue, to Salem Road, then North along Salem Road to Harkin Lane, then Northwest along Harkin Lane to Division Avenue, then Northwesterly along Division Avenue to Glenbrook Road then West along Glenbrook Road to Newbridge Road.

On the West: Newbridge Road, from Glenbrook Road on the North, to the District's South line.

On the South: The District's South line, from Newbridge Road, on the West, to Jerusalem Avenue on the East.

On the East: Newbridge Road, from Elmira Street, to the District's South line.

On the South, the District's South line, from Newbridge Road, on the East, to the District's West line.

On the West: The District's West line, from the District's South line to Arrow Lane, as said Lane is projected West to the District's West line.

On the North: from Arrow Lane, as projected to the District's West line, East and along said Arrow Lane, to Levittown Parkway, then South along Levittown Parkway to Beech Lane, then East along Beech Lane to Blueberry Lane, then South along Blueberry Lane to Elmira Street, then East along Elmira Street to Newbridge Road.

Election District No. 7 Old Country Road School

On the North and Northeast: the Long Island Railroad from the District's West line to the intersection of the Railroad with Old Country Road.

On the South and East: Old Country Road from its intersection with the Long Island Railroad, Westerly to Newbridge Road, then Southwest along Newbridge Road to Elmira Street, then West along Elmira Street to Blueberry Lane, then North along Blueberry Lane, then North along Blueberry Lane to Beech Lane, then West along Beech Lane to Levittown Parkway, then North along Levittown Parkway to Arrow Lane, then West along Arrow Lane, and as projected to the District's West line.

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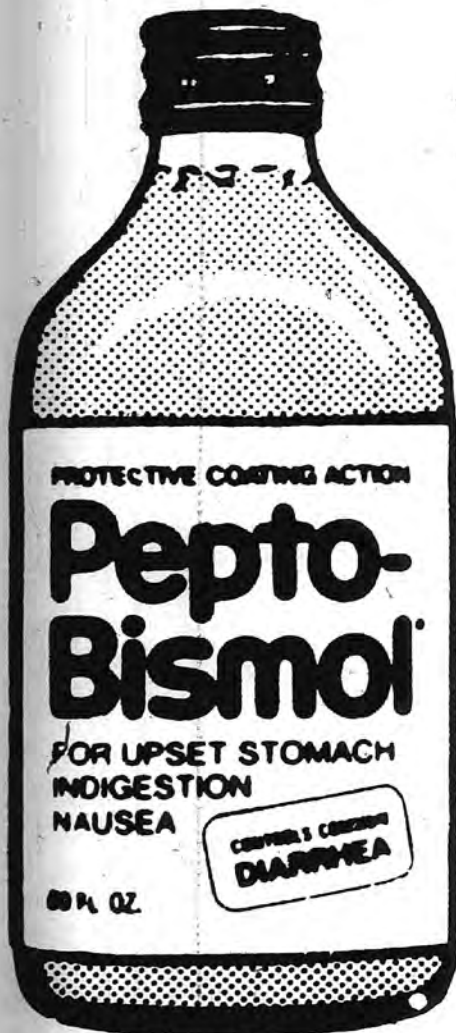

Disembarking From Plane
 Martha whistled a sigh of relief when the airplane touched down safely at her destination. "This was my first flight," she explained to a nearby stewardess. But as Martha emerged from the exit door, she failed to notice a sharp drop to the platform of the ramp. She lost her balance, fell, and suffered injury.



Shortly afterward she filed a damage action against the airline, charging negligence. And after a court test she won a substantial verdict. The court pointed out that the stewardess, aware of Martha's inexperience, should have given her fair warning of the danger at the doorstep. In its role as a common carrier, an airline bears a high degree of responsibility for passenger safety during embarkation and disembarkation. This involves not only "fair warning" about hazards but also the proper maintenance of boarding facilities.

Thus, liability was imposed in a second case because the retractable stairway was not firmly anchored in place. Under the weight of a departing passenger the stairway shifted position, dumping him down the steps. Again, the court said this was the kind of mishap that due care by the airline could have forestalled.

Of course, the passenger has responsibilities as well. Take this case: An elderly traveller, handicapped by arthritis, started down the steps with a steady hand on the railing. But he let go before he reached the bottom and lost his footing. In this situation a court decided he could not blame the airline, since it had been within his own power to prevent the accident. The court noted also that he was accompanied by a companion who, if asked, could easily have lent him a helping hand.

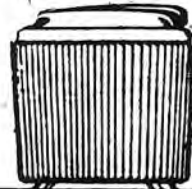
