At their annual reorganization meeting held on July 5, the Hicksville School Board elected officers as follows:

Also on this Board are trustees Cornelius McCormack, Iris Wolfson, William P. Bennett and Pierre K. Fujimoto.

The Board then appointed Marie Egan to the office of District Clerk, Solomon Newborn to the office of Auditor and Joseph Campanella to the office of Attorney. The office of Treasurer is still open.

The Board decided, on an experimental basis, for the months of July and August, to hold only one meeting each month. These meetings, which are scheduled for the last Wednesday of each month, will be held on July 27th and August 31st.

School Board Approves Dropout Program

The Hicksville Board of Education at its final meeting of the 1976-77 school year voted last week to participate in a Dropout Alternatives Program for 1977-78. Dr. Manus Clancy, Director of Curriculum and Instruction explained that the project, under the Title IV Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (C.E.T.A.) is completely funded at a cost of \$29,176, by the Nassau County Office of Manpower Programs.

"The program," Dr. Clancy informed the Board, "is designed as a counseling and placement service for persons 16 to 48 years old, who have dropped out of school."

Mr. John Maniec has been named coordinator of the twelve-month program, which began on July 5. The staff also includes two counselors and a secretary and will be housed in the administration building.

Trustee Cornelius McCormack questioned whether the program "would be in competition with our own Opportunity High School." Dr. Clancy assured the Board that the program would "tie in" and cooperate with the Opportunity High School staff. He pointed out that the C.E.T.A. program also offered other alternatives in addition to returning to a high school program.

The Board formally approved the appointment of Dr. Manus Clancy as Assistant Superintendent of Instruction and Personnel Services. His new position begins July 1.

The Board voted to accept the recommendations for a school lunch service program for the

junior and senior high school as outlined by Mr. Richard Weigang, Business Manager. The recommendations included the withdrawal from the National School Lunch Program. According to Mr. Weigang, the State Education Department is proposing new guidelines and our continued participation in the National School Lunch program will become "another cost to the district. The federal government dictates how it will be run and the district ends up subsidizing the program."

Instead, the lunch service program will be operated under a private contract with Interstate United. They will undertake the total operational burden, reserving the right to set prices and choose menus. The Board questioned price increases due to the withdrawal from the federal program. Superintendent Fred Hill informed the Board that increases ranged from five to ten cents on a few items, but were still within reason.

The district is, however, still participating in the special milk program without the "red tape," according to Dr. Hill.

The Board adopted a resolution authorizing the Superintendent to negotiate with the Town of Oyster Bay concerning the funding of public works projects. Dr. Hill explained that the town is scheduled to receive approximately 4.2 million dollars from the federal government. The Hicksville school district is applying for funds, totaling \$579,000, to finance the construction of a maintenance garage; a ramp to a basement storage area at Lee Avenue

School; and a ramp and elevator for the public library. Mr. McCormack requested that application for funds should also be made to finance the building of a swimming pool at the senior high school. After a lengthy discussion concerning priorities, it was decided that the swimming pool item be added in the second round of applications as an item of lesser priority.

The Board approved instructional personnel-tenure recommendations as well as recommendations on security protection measures. Also approved were the actions of the Committee on the Handicapped and coaching assignments and extra duty compensation for interscholastic sports for fall 1977-78.

The Board approved routine expenses; various retirements and appointments. An executive session was held to discuss various transfers, promotions, and appointments and other personnel items were tabled until the next business meeting July 13.

Mrs. Iris Wolfson thanked the Board members and the administration staff for their cooperation during her two years as president. "I now relinquish the president's seat after serving for two years, to give another board member this opportunity."

MR. John Lari expressed apologies for his tardiness at Board meetings, but business commitments and travel made it difficult. "I wish my successor, Peter Fujimoto, Good Luck."

The next business meeting of the Board will be held July 27 at 8:15 p.m. in the conference room of the administration building.

According to Colby, the Town, in cooperation with other applicants, has the responsibility of dividing the funds. "Obviously, it is going to be difficult to arrive at the solution that will best meet the needs of the Town residents," Colby said. "However, I believe that the difficult decisions that will have to be made will be best made after all parties are brought together for a full explanation of the situation."

(1) The parking of any vehicle is prohibited wherever a No Parking sign is posted on Bethpage Court, between Bethpage Road and Park Ave. in Hicksville, New York and wherever a No Parking Fire Zone is painted on the roadway of said Bethpage Court, between Bethpage Road and Park Ave.

(2) An offense against this section is punishable pursuant to Sec. 17-247 of this Article.

All persons interested shall have an opportunity to be heard upon the said proposed amendments at the time and place aforesaid.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$30,500 SERIAL BONDS OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF A LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL FIELD AT ABE LEVITT FIELD IN AND FOR THE HICKSVILLE PARK DISTRICT IN SAID TOWN.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, has heretofore determined it to be necessary and in the public interest to construct the improvement hereinafter described; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to provide for the financing thereof; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the construction of a little league baseball field at Abe Levitt Field in and for the Hicksville Park District in the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$30,500, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$30,500 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen years, pursuant to sub-

division 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11 00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will not exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. There shall annually be assessed upon all the taxable real property in said Hicksville Park District, at the same time and in the same manner as other town charges an amount sufficient to pay said principal and interest as the same become due and payable, but if not paid from such source, all the taxable real property within said Town shall be subject to the levy of ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution, which takes effect immediately shall be published in full in Mid Island Herald and Mid-Island Times together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81 00 of the Local Finance Law

In a meeting with Martin Gach, Director of Public Transportation in Nassau County, representatives from Hicksville, Plainville, and Old Bethpage discussed the necessity and existence of present bus routes. In this time of energy crisis and rising gas prices, buses are a necessity and will become more so in the coming years. Three years ago, Nassau County bought out 9 privately owned bus companies and formed a publically owned transportation system. They have

added and subtracted routes, trying to make the system profitable. But our demands are unique, for we are in the middle of a county, surrounded by trees, miles from stores and doctors. Of the county population of 1,400,000, 200,000 are senior citizens.

We have buses running in Hicksville, but are they convenient for the people of our town? During the next several weeks, the Hicksville Community Council will present, as a public service, maps of existing bus routes and schedules of pickup times. Each week we will discuss certain aspects of the meeting

with Martin Gach and try to increase your awareness of the existing system. At the end of the series, we will ask your opinion of the services - whether they are adequate, whether the times are convenient, or whether new routes should be formed.

This week we are beginning with the N73 - a bus that begins at Mid-Island Plaza and ends in Wantagh. The bus fare is 50c, 25c for senior citizens, and 35c for students.

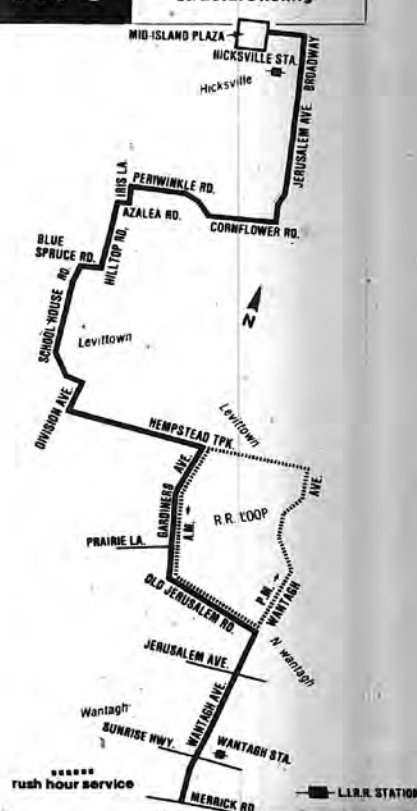

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Mail Program Offers Savings

Many commercial mailers have achieved significant savings and at the same time helped post offices process their mailings by taking advantage of a simple workshop program, the U.S. Postal Service said today.

The program, called Presort First-Class Mail, offers mailers a one cent per piece lower rate on all presorted first-class mail meeting certain requirements. The Postal Service has handled more than one billion pieces under the program.

The Postal Service estimates participating mailers have saved more than \$10 million since the program began in July, 1976.

To qualify for the lower rate, there must be at least 500 pieces in the mailing. The mailer must presort the mailing to five digit ZIP Codes whenever there are 10 or more pieces having the same ZIP Code. After presorting as much as possible to five digits,

the mailer must then presort the remaining mail to three digits whenever there are 50 or more pieces.

The Postal Service provides necessary trays and the mailer bundles and packages the mailing for delivery to the post office. Each piece must be printed or stamped with the words, "Presorted First Class." Payment for postage is made by postage meter or permit imprint.

Postmasters set local requirements for acceptance hours and deposit points, but in general want the mail deposited between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Postmasters, however, will work with customers to adjust these requirements if necessary to meet special customer needs, the Postal Service said.

In addition to the lower rate for each piece presorted by ZIP Codes to five and three digits, customers benefit by establishing

their mailing lists in ZIP sequence. Once a list is sequenced by ZIP Code, mailers can better schedule mailings for uniform delivery and also isolate customers geographically, such as types of residential areas, for other communication purposes.

The Postal Service benefits because presorted mail bypasses many handling operations and is already sequenced by ZIP Code. This helps assure consistent and reliable first-class mail service.

Customers likely to take advantage of presort savings in clude utilities, retailers, oil companies, publishers, banks and credit card companies, stock brokers, insurance firms and also Federal, State and local government agencies.

Details on the Presort First-Class Mail program are available from postmasters or postal customer service representatives, the Postal Service said.

"In effect, this would permit senior homeowners, whose children have grown and moved to their own homes, to legally rent out a room to a boarder, as has been sought by Councilman Joseph Saladino," Town Supervisor Joseph Colby explained. "This would not only provide much needed living space to those seniors who have sold or wish to sell their houses, but also

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE APPENDIX A

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Division I, "Generally" of Article III "Provisions Applicable to all Districts" of "The Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay", as revised and amended, and now set forth as Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto the following new section:

Sec. 116 Requirement to construct within eighteen (18) months.

The following restrictions shall be applicable in all residential districts:

(a) Every application for a rezoning of a parcel to one of the several residential districts provided in this ordinance which is granted by the Town Board shall be subject to a requirement that all necessary building permits be obtained and physical erection and construction of the principal building or structure related to the rezoning so granted be commenced within eighteen (18) months of the date of the Town Board grant. In the event said erection or construction has not been so commenced, the Town Board is authorized to hold a public hearing, under the provisions of this ordinance, to determine whether to rezone said parcel to same zone which existed before the time of said Town Board grant. A copy of the notice of public hearing shall be mailed to the owner of said parcel not less than seven (7) days before the date set for said public hearing.

(b) The Town Board, for good

cause shown, may grant an extended period of time for commencement of the erection or construction of the principal building or structure related to a rezoning, provided, however, that the application for said extension of time shall be made within eighteen (18) months from the date of said Town Board grant. In determining whether good cause exists for said extension, the Town Board shall consider, among other things, the nature and extent of the construction, the complexity thereof, practical difficulties tending to delay such construction, the availability of utilities, strikes, scarcity of labor or materials, war or acts of God.

Braun's Ice House To Be Moved

The Oyster Bay Town Board recently approved acceptance of the Braun Ice House in Hicksville as a gift to the Town.

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced that the Gregory Museum, which is acquiring the Ice House to expand its facilities, offered the late nineteenth century structure to the Town as an addition to its historical holdings.

The Gregory Museum is housed in the Heitz Place Courthouse to which site the Ice House will be moved from its present location on the northeast corner of Broadway and Old Country Road. The Courthouse is owned by the Town, which as a 37-year agreement with the Museum for use of the building provided they

maintain it to the satisfaction of the Town. The same arrangement will now extend to the Ice House. All moving expenses and insurance for the building will be the responsibility of the Museum.

The brick exterior Ice House was part of a three-building meat packing complex operated by the Braun family from the middle 1800's to the early part of the twentieth century. Ice was obtained from Jericho Pond, which was eventually capped and is now the site of the Milleridge Inn.
