School Board Approves Dropout Program

The Hicksville Board Education at its final meeting Education al its final meeting of the 1976-77 school year voted last wek to part cipate in a Dropout Alternatives Program for 1977-78, Dr. Manus Clancy, Director of Curriculum and Instruction of Curriculum and Instruction explained that the project, under the Title IV Comprehensive the Title (V Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (C.E.T.A.) is completely funded at a cost of \$29,176, by the Nassau County Office of Man-

Nassau County Office of Man-power Programs.

"The program," Dr. Clancy informed the Board, "Is designed as a courseling and placement service for persons 16 to 48 years old, who have dropped out of school."

questioned whether the program
"would be in competition with

Board that the program would
"tile-in" and cooperate with the
Opportunity High School staff.
He pointed out that the C.E.T.A.
program also offered other He pointed out that the C.E.T.A. program also offered other alternatives in addition to returning to a high scho-i program.

The Board formally approved the appointment of Dr. Manus Claincy as, Assistant Superintendent of Instruction and Personnel Services His new position.

The Board voted to accept the recommendations for a school lunch service program for the

junior and senior high school as outlined by Mr. Richard Weigang, Business Manager. The recommendations included the withdrawal from the National School Lunch Program. National School Lunch Program.
According to Mr. Weigang, the

proposing new guidelines and
our continued participation in
the National School Lunch program will become "another cost
to the district. The federal

gram will become "another cost to the district. The federal government dictates how it will be run and the district ends up subsidizing the program."

Instead, the lunch service program will be operated under a private contract with Interstate United. They will understate United. They will understate United. They will understate United. They will understate United operational burden, reserving the right to set prices and choose menus. The Board questioned price increases due to the withdrawal from the federal program. Superentendent Fred Hill informed the Board that increases ranged from five to ten cents on a few items, but were still within reason.

The district is, however, still participating in the special milk program without the "red tape," according to Dr. Hill.

The Board adopted a resolution authorizing the Superintendent to negotiate vith the Town of Oyster Bay concerning the funding of public works projects. Dr. Hill explained that the town is scheduled to receive appoximately 4.2 million dollars from the federal government. The Hicksville school district is applying for funds; totaling \$759,000, to finance the construction of a maintenance garage; a ramp to a basement storage area at Lee Avenue

School; and a ramp and elevator for the publik library. Mr. McCormack requested that application for funds should also be made to finance the building of a swimming pool at the senior high school. After a lengthy discussion concerning prorities, it was decided that the swimming pool item be added in the second round of applications as an item of lesser priority.

The Board approved instructional personnel-tenure recommendations as well as recommendations on security protection measures. Also approved were the actions of the Committee on the Handicapped and coaching assignments and extraduty compensation for interscholastic sports for fall 1977-78.

The Board approved routine expenses; various retirements and appointments. An executive session was held to discuss various transfers, promotions, and appointments and other personnel items were tabled until the next business meeting July 13.

projects that . the federal government approved as eligible and these involve some 25 projects totalling \$18,223,465, Apparently, in addition to the Town application, the ap-plications of school districts and other special districts such as fire and water were also labeled eligible for funding, but only about 25 per cent of the funds needed have been made available for the projects."

According to Colby, the Town, in cooperation with other applicants, has the responsibility of dividing the funds. 'Obviously, it is going to be difficult to arrive at the solution that will best meet the needs of the Town residents,' Colby said. 'However, I beleive that the difficult decisions that will have to be made will be best made after all parties are brought together for a full explanation of the situation."

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In a meeting with Martin Gach, Director of Public Trans-portation in Nassau County, portation in Nassau County, representatives from Hicksville, Plainview, and Old Bethpage discussed the necessity and existence of present bus routes. In this time of energy crisis and rising gas prices, buses are a necessity and will become more so in the coming years. Three years ago. Nassau County bought out 9 privately owned bus companies and formed a publically owned transportation system. They have

added and subtracted routes, trying to make the system profitable. But our demands are unique, for we are in the middle of a county, surrounded by trees, miles from stores and doctors. Of the county population of 1,400,000,

the county population of 1,400,000, 200,000 are senior citizens. We have buses running in Hicksville, but are they convenient for the people of our town? During the next several weeks, the Hicksville Community Council will present, as a public service, maps of existing bus routes and schedules of pickup times. Each week we will discuss certain aspects of the meeting

with Martin Gach and try to increase your awareness of the existing system. At the end of the series, we will ask your opinion of the services - whether they are adequate, whether the times are convenient, or whether new routes should be formed.

This week we are beginning with the N73 - a bus that begins at Mid-Island Plaza and ends in Wantagh. The bus fare is 50c, 25c for; senior citizens, and 35c for students.

Mail Program Offers Savings

Many commercial mailers have achieved significant savings and at the same time helped post offices process their mailings by taking advantage of a simple workshare program, the U.S. Postal Service said today.

The program, called Presort First-Class Mail, offers mailers a one cent per piece lower rate on all presorted first-class mail meeting certain requirements.
The Postal Service has handled more than one billion pieces under the program.

The Postal Service estimates participating mailers have saved more than \$10 million since the

program began in July, 1976.

To qualify for the lower rate, there must be at least 500 pieces in the mailing. The mailer must presort the mailing to five digit ZIP Codes whenever there are 10 or more pieces having the same ZIP Code. After presorting as much as possible to five digits, the mailer must then presort the remaining mail to three digits whenever there are 50 or more

The Postal Service provides necessary trays and the mailer bundles and packages the mailing for delivery to the post office. Each piece must be printed or stamped with the words, "Presorted First Class." Payment for postage is made by postage meter or permit imprint. Postmasters set local requirements for acceptance

hours and deposit points, but in general want the mail deposited between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Postmasters however, will work with customers to adjust these requirements if necessary to meet special customer needs, the service said

In addition to the lower rate for each piece presorted by ZIP Codes to five and three digits, customers benefit by establishing

their mailing lists in ZIP sequence. Once a list is sequenced by ZIP Code, mailers sequenced by ZIF Code, mailers can better schedule mailings for uniform delivery and also isolate customers geographically, such as types of residential areas, for

other communication purposes.

The Postal Service benefits The Postal Service benefits because presorted mail bypasses many handling operations and is already sequenced by ZIP Code. This helps assure consistent and reliable first-class mail service. Customers likely to take ad-

customers tikely to take advantage of presort savings in clude utilities, retailers, oil companies, publishers, banks and credit card companies, stock brokers, insurance firms and also Federal. State and local government agencies.

Details on the Presort First Class Mail program are available from postmasters or postal customer service represen-tatives, the Postal Service said.

The proposed amendment would change the definition of would change the definition of "family" to include "any two persons not related by blood, marriage, or legal adoption, living and cooking on the premises together as a single, non-profit housekeeping unit, one of whom is sixty-two years of age or over, residing on premises which is receiving an exemption pursuant to the provisions of Section 467 of the Real Property TaxLaw

'In effect, this would permit senior homeowners, whose children have grown and moved to their own homes, to legally rent out a room to a boarder, as has been sought by Councilman Joseph Saladino, Town Super-visor Joseph Colby explained "This would not only provide much needed living space to those seniors who have sold or wish to sell their houses, but also

provides a much-needed source of supplementary income for those who wish to retain their homes."

Citing the law suit recently brought against the Town by the Civil Liberties Union charging discriminatory housing practices with regard to groups living in single-family homes, Colby noted that the date of the Town's public hearing has been put off until August 30 "Hopefully, by that time, we will have better under standing of the courts' position on this entire subject, prior to our public hearing being held," Colby

In the event said erection or construction has not been so commenced, the Town Board is authorized to hold a public hearing, under the provisions of this ordinance, to determine whether to rezone said parcel whether to rezone said parcel to same zone which existed before the time of said Town Board grant. A copy of the notice of public hearing shall be mailed to the owner of said parcel not less than seven (7) days before the date set for said public hearing. said public hearing.

(b) The Town Board, for good

cause shown, may grant an extended period of time for commencement of the erection or construction of the principal building or structure related to a rezoning, provided, however, that the application for said extension of time shall be made within eighteen (18) months from the date of said Town Board grant. In determining whether good cause exists for said extension, the Town Board shall consider, among other things, the nature and extent of the construction, the complexity thereof, practical difficulties tending to delay such construction, the availability of utilities, strikes, scarcity of labor or materials, war or acts of God.

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
