Many Americans complain about actions of local, state and federal government - and then stay home on election day when they have an opportunity to select officials who make and administer the laws. This "stay-at-home" vote really hinders good government in the United States.

Tragically the vast majority of "stay-at-home" voters are good citizens with a stake in their communities and an understanding of public issues. But they don't match their actions with their understanding.

It isn't enough for a citizen to study the issues and comprehend the forces at work in his community or in the nation at large. Comprehension has to be followed up by registering to vote and then going into the polling booth and making convictions count.

Some people say: "Oh, one vote doesn't count. There is no need for me to stand in line to cast my ballot." Wrong. One vote can spell the difference between the election of a petty politician and the election of a statesman. Moreover, the good citizen's defeatism about the political process constitutes major assistance

to the least-qualified candidates. If every responsible citizen exercised his right to vote, the country would be in a much healthier condition.

Some people say they don't want to have anything to do with politics, alleging that it is a dirty business. That's a terrible self-defeating attitude. Politics is a part of community and national life. Responsible citizens should not be reluctant to organize to achieve worthwhile governmental aims. They should feel an obligation to campaign vigorously for candidates they know to be qualified for public service. Inaction in politics is an invitation to the worst forces in society to control and dominate the political process.

True, some of the people and forces in politics are not honorable or progressive. But that's all the more reason why good men and women should be willing to make a commitment of time and money to political activity. For our towns, cities, counties, states and country to be better off, it is essential that the good people of America struggle hard to improve politics.

Some people will participate in

politics in a variety of ways. They will give money to good candidates. They will serve as poll watchers and percent officials. They will ring doorbells and sign political advertisements. Not everyone will have time for these activities. But every responsible citizen can and should vote. That's the essential activity for citizens who want to protect the American way of life.

A good citizen who fails to exercise his right to vote is helping create conditions in which corruption can thrive. Moreover, the responsible voter can be sure that these corrupt elements will do everything they can to herd irresponsible voters to the polls, to register those least able to understand the issues or to make a wise choice.

It is more important now than ever before for responsible voters to cast their ballots on election day. In the privacy of the polling place, each voter can make up his mind and act free of coercion. This is a great privilege and opportunity conferred on free men. Don't ever neglect it.

TAXES

Mr. Purcell believes in giving the best possible municipal services for every tax dollar spent. As a fiscal conservative he will work to reduce the size and cost of county government as he has done in the town where the tax rate has increased an average of only 2 1/2% a year under his administration.

JOB

At The Town Board Meeting

There was nothing of local concern in the forty-two resolutions that made up most of the calendar at the Town Board meeting held on Tuesday, August 30th.

All three hearings that led off the morning session were of local interest and took over three hours before concluding.

The first item was to consider proposed amendments to the Code of Ordinances, T.O.B. Building Zone Ordinance, relating to "A" Family. The purpose of the hearing was to expand the coverage of "A" Residence to include non-related parties living together under the same roof. Basically it has been designed to permit senior citizens to rent rooms to other senior citizens in homes to supplement their incomes and assist them in satisfying their financial obligations.

The first speaker to address the assemblage relative to this hearing was Michael Polansky. He was in high agreement with the amendment and only speculated on the possibility of its inadequacy and the amount of time required for it to reach the stage.

Every councilman commented in reply to the speaker making it obviously clear to everyone that the proposal has been under consideration for several years, guided successfully by Councilman Saladino up to the present. The legal ramifications including the threat of unconstitutionality had to be dealt with.

Supervisor Colby recognized several speakers that included Marion Gold, Gladys Nelson of Syosset, Judy Jacobs of Woodbury and Adele Attard, Commissioner of the Nassau County Senior Citizens Affairs. Commissioner Attard strongly urged passage of the proposal zoning amendment and thanked the Town Board for their genuine concern.

Supervisor Colby playing left tackle and Commissioner Diamond shooting in through the left guard slot subtly pulled a very neat mouse trap play on an obvious political aspirant.

The Supervisor stated in the open discussion with Commissioner Attard that she was unquestionably the most

knowledgeable person present. He thanked her for her past contributions, her comments of the present, and her future assistance. The Commissioner acknowledged the Supervisor's remarks, thanked the Board for their actions and pledged her future assistance.

Before closing the Hearing, Councilman Diamond asked Commissioner Attard if in her opinion she would want to improve upon the amendments as they were written.

The commissioner stated that she was well aware of the many legal ramifications that were necessary to overcome before any amendment could be considered and she was very satisfied with the amendment as published and appreciated the privilege to comment on it. Thus the mouse trap play was completed.

The second Hearing was the petition of Parent Productions Ltd. for a special use permit in Bus F District to construct, operate and maintain a restaurant at Jericho, N.Y. at the intersection on S. S. Jericho Tpke and E. S. of Robbins Lane.

The proposed building is 5300 square feet on a half acre with twenty-five parking spaces and seating of not more than 200. The petitioner was represented by Jacob Bernstein.

The hearing was to be continued at an evening session, however, after a brief presentation by Mr. Bernstein, Supervisor Colby permitted the following to speak: Katherine O'Rourke, John Clark, John Crudo, Ilene Halpern, Gladys Nelson and Nellie Zaff, all of Syosset, who were opposed to the granting. A 1000 signature petition in opposition was presented, in addition to a list of 53 existing restaurants within a three-mile area. It was also suggested that preferential treatment might be given because the law firm representing the petitioner was State Senator Ralph Marino's. Senator Marino is a Republican leader of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Councilman Diamond reassured those present that any decision rendered would be based solely on the merits of the application. He cited several applications turned down recently that had been presented by

Republican law firms.

The concluding hearing was the petition of Steakhouse Enterprises, Inc. for a special use permit to renovate an existing one-story building to operate and maintain a restaurant at Jericho at the intersection of S. S. Jericho Tpke. and east side of Brush Hollow Rd.

The petitioner was represented by Mr. Goldberg of Spero, Goldberg, and Margolis. The new operation would be approximately 9,000 square feet, seating 160 with parking facilities for 55 cars.

FALLACIES -- errors in reasoning or judgment -- make the article published in your last week's issue as justification for Proposition 2, in my opinion, are numerous. Here are some of them:

1. Fallacy of Appeal to Authority (ad verecundiam fallacy). This fallacy occurs when one attempts to support a conclusion by endorsement of another who is not an authority on the subject. In this case, costs, financing, and tax effects are

major subjects of Proposition 2 (installation of elevators etc. in the library). So a librarian, obviously not an expert in those areas, substitutes for the library board and writes an article urging support of the proposition. Apparently the title of "librarian" was to blindfold the eyes of the voters to the other fallacies used.

2. Fallacy of Appeal to the People (ad populum fallacy). This is a fallacy widely used as an emotional appeal to the people its purpose is to arouse the feeling of people for a particular project -- without having to present reliable evidence upon which to draw a rational conclusion. The librarian used supposed benefits to the elderly and handicapped, without

The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the grading, drainage and paving of the parking and storage areas located at the Department of Public Works Complex of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, on Miller Road, west of South Oyster Bay Road, in Syosset, New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$198,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

factual substantiation, as an emotional argument to justify Proposition 2. Perhaps the librarian will furnish data as to costs, benefits, and the number of elderly and handicapped benefitted to prove the worth of the initial and the ever-increasing annual service charge which will be borne by the taxpayers. For example: if the initial cost is \$1,000,000 and the "yearly service contract" costs \$10,000 and the number of elderly and handicapped, who will use the facilities because of the elevators, increases by ten, then the initial cost of \$100,000 per person and the yearly cost of \$1,000 per person is not within the realm of cost-effectiveness. However, their data would - like my example, be conjured up out of thin air.

3. Fallacy of Special Pleading. This occurs when one gives only the reasons that support his views. In this case the librarian used the elderly and the handicapped as his major, his emotional, and his ONLY argument without evidence to support his views - and I hope that argument was not an admission that the handicapped have previously been excluded from employment. Nonetheless, the elderly and handicapped is his only argument unless you consider the following statements of his as arguments for:

a. Even if the proposition is APPROVED - the library probably would not get the money anyway.

b. Even if the proposition is DEFEATED they could apply for the funds anyway - without voter approval (a perfect case of the "tail wagging the dog").

4. Fallacy of Division. This fallacy is committed when one contends that something which is true of the whole is also true of its parts taken separately. In this case, the whole problem of the handicapped in the United States is used to justify Proposition 2. However, absolutely no facts have been presented to prove that there is a significant, like problem here in Hicksville that will be significantly alleviated by the expenditure of a large sum of money initially and a "yearly service contract" charge thereafter. If the Hicksville problem is not significant, then the elevators become just a new toy for librarians.

The above are only some of the reasons for rejecting the logical spending of taxpayer money. There are many others. In addition, alternatives should be explored such as library rearrangement or installation of ramps only. After all there is only a basement area in addition to the main floor.

Therefore, on September 15th, taxpayers MUST VOTE AND MUST VOTE "NO" on Proposition 2, the library board boondoggle, in addition to VOTING "NO" to Proposition 1, the school board boondoggle. Taxpayers must not allow educators and librarians to spend large sums of "free money" which in the long run will significantly

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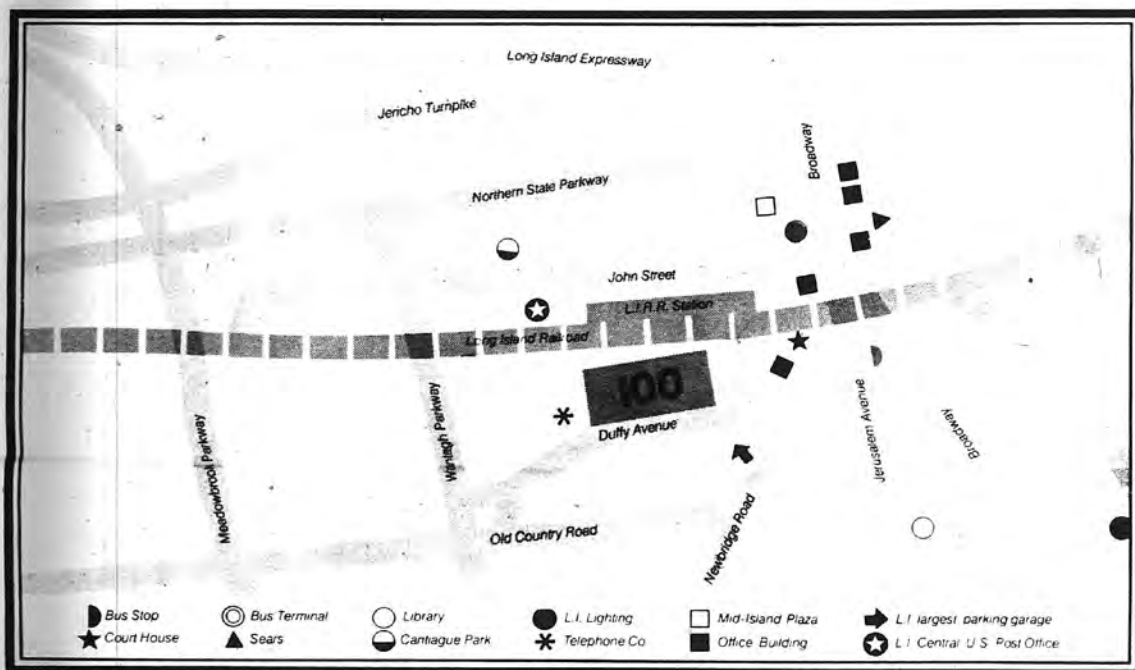
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
