## Don't Forget To Vote!

Hicksville School Superintendent Dr. Frederick Hill urged voters to make a special effort to vote on a forthcoming school referendum on Thursday, September 15.

During the past few weeks, voters in many school districts on Long Island have voted favorably upon the acceptance of federal funds for various Public Works Projects in their respective districts. Here in Hicksville, school authorities worked very closely with Supervisor Colby and Town of Oyster Bay officials in establishing a priority list of projects which would be most useful in serving the public interest and providing employment to construction trades workers in our area.

Hicksville has applied for two federal grants, not to exceed \$531,000. The first grant for \$381,000 would be used for replacing two dilapidated fifty-year-old wood farm barns with a modern District Maintenance Facility and Spectator Restrooms. The second requested grant is for \$150,000 to

modify entrances, elevator, and toilet facilities at the Library in order to permit access by handicapped persons and older residents who cannot now climb stairs or use facilities on the lower and upper floors.

Hicksville Public Schools were allotted the sum of \$381,000 for the cost of constructing a new maintenance facility and garage for servicing and housing the district's trucks, tractors, lawn mowers, sweepers, and similar rolling equipment. The new building would save on operating costs because of modern, efficient heating and lighting equipment and would have toilet facilities to be used by spectators attending football games and many outdoor activities on the high school athletic field. This would increase public convenience and provide security for much valued equipment and would also reduce potential vandalism. It would enable the district to provide safe working conditions for its maintenance people and would permit us to remove inadequate, dilapidated

and antiquated structures which are an eyesore and do not meet safety standards. Hill commented, "This work would be done at no cost to the district. We have already been informed by Congressman Lent's office that the money is available for our use if voters approve accepting it. The money will be redistributed to other school districts and municipal agencies if the majority of the voters in our school district do not vote 'Yes' on the proposition. In other words, if our voters do not accept these funds, other districts would be given the benefit of our federal tax dollars and our community would be deprived of these benefits. We urge you to vote 'Yes' for this proposition and for the Library proposition on September 15th."

## At The School Board Meeting

Superintendent Dr. Fred Hill announced at last week's meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education meeting that official word had been received from Congressman Lent's office that our application for \$381,000 in Federal Funds has been approved. If voters approve on September 15, the public works project to construct a maintenance facility could proceed almost immediately without additional cost to the district. (See legal notice for specific details on this referendum vote.)

Also heard at the meeting was a "State of the District" address delivered by President Tom Nagle, in which he stated his goals for the year: "...to build on the strong foundation already created" and "to develop the best education for all the citizens of Hicksville within reasonable taxable restraints." He also hopes not only to maintain the same tax rate but to "try to reduce cost without affecting programs or personnel." He also plans to have one business meeting per month except during budget time or emergencies.

Mr. Nagle applauded the Hicksville teachers; "the most qualified in New York State"; as well as the administration; "most capable." He noted the capabilities of central ad-

ministration officials and the individual attributes of school board members. "With these people as members of the team, we can't fail as a Board of Education."

A lengthy discussion transpired after Trustee Bill Bennett spoke out against sending two guidance counselors to a seminar sponsored by Nassau County Coalition for Family Planning. The Board had voted this action at its June 29 meeting at which Mr. Bennett and Vice President John Ayres were absent. After having contacted many of the groups listed on the Coalition's letterhead, Mr. Bennett stated his "personal view" that the groups "represent all one viewpoint of abortion and birth control. The Board should reconsider its action." Among the groups cited by Mr. Bennett were Eastgate Medical Center and Planned Parenthood of Nassau County. Also listed among the forty participating groups and agencies are American Red Cross, Nassau County Chapter; Association for Help of Retarded Children; and the North Shore Child Guidance Center.

According to parliamentary rules, however, a reconsideration of this action cannot be done unless a board member who

voted on this motion wishes to change his vote. Trustee Neil McCormack moved to change his vote; however, it was pointed out that he had originally voted against this motion. He did not wish to change his vote.

Vice President John Ayres then voiced his opinion. "I agree with those Board members who voted to send our counselors to this seminar. And, I want to defend my employer, Long Beach Schools," (which is listed on the Coalition's letterhead as a cooperating agency). "We have a School Age Mother program. It is an alternate school program which has proved very successful." He also stated that "we could no longer put our heads in the sand and hope the problem (of teenage pregnancies) will disappear."

Trustee Pete Fujimoto suggested to Mr. Bennett that when other groups offer programs, "we could then send our counselors to them." He also pointed out that sending the counselors to this seminar "in no way changes the existing health curriculum." All curriculum changes must be approved by the Board. The original motion did not change.

## Capa Workshop Registration

Hogan noted that there are many special workshops for teens and children. They are given after school and on Saturday mornings and include such activities as Science,

"This year's CAPA workshop program is one of the most extensive and diversified offered in the program's eleven years of operation," Hogan commented. 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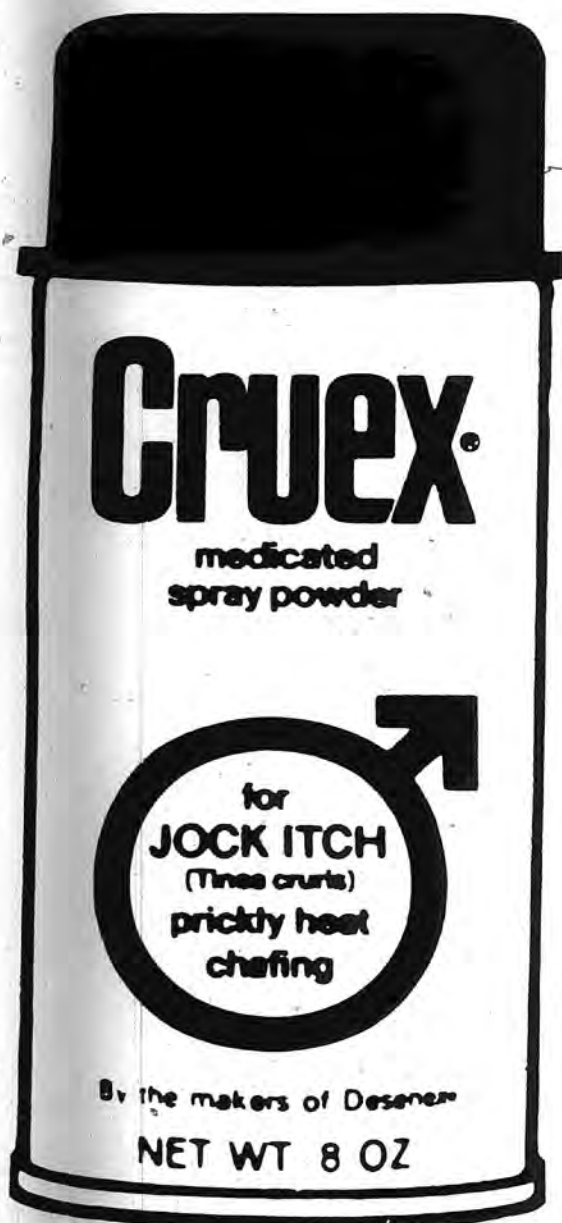

## At The Town Board Meeting

The Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday, September 6th adjourned at 12:15 and the informal talk that followed concluded at 12:35.

The calendar was composed of 21 items, 5 hearings and the balance resolutions.

The lead item was a Finance Hearing to consider proposed uses of Entitlement Funds prior to enactment of TOB Budget for Fiscal 78.

The 2nd item was the petition of Frank and James Ballella for a change of Zone from Res. D to Bus. F District at Syosset, as well as Jackson and Edward Avenue.

The reason for the change is to erect and maintain an Arthur Treacher's "Fish N' Chips" restaurant.

The hearing was scheduled for a night continuance since there was a minimum of speakers present for the day session. About 100 persons opposed to the granting showed up for the night hearing.

The attorney for the petitioner, Mr. Owen McBride made his opening comments but they were of a brief and cursory nature.

Speaking in opposition to the granting were Gene Hanbach, Mrs. Kluge, Mrs. Espenare and Robert Fitch, all of Syosset. They claimed that the restaurant would generate excessive traffic and change the character of the area.

Third item on the agenda was a petition of Woodbury Bowling Corp. for a Special Use Permit to alter, erect, maintain and operate a bowling alley at South Oyster Bay Rd. and Woodbury Rd., Hicksville.

The petition was presented by its corporate president, Mr.

Dankoff, who informed the assemblage that all the work requested for approval would be of an internal nature to modernize and improve the existing conditions. There were no objecting comments from the audience.

The fourth and fifth items on the calendar were related and dealt with amending Local Law 2-1974, relating to the establishment of a Dept. of Community Services and to consider a new law relating to the establishment, maintenance and operation of a Youth Bureau in TOB.

The purpose would be to shift control over youth services directly to the Executive Dept. of TOB in order to qualify for N.Y.S. Funding.

Speaking in favor of the granting were Sandra Magers, Pres. of Oyster Bay-Locust Valley Youth Council; Frank Gilles, Commissioner of Youth Board TOB; Larry Sims, Director of the Bethpage Adolescent Development Center and Joseph Eisner.

In the informal session that followed the regular meeting, Michael Polansky Democratic candidate for Town Council, addressed the assemblage relative to the proposed amendments to the TOB sign ordinance. It was a form of comic relief to a dull meeting, as he displayed colored photographs of various campaign signs claiming that they could create a distraction to a driver and were, in effect, hazards. Naturally, all the signs represented the opposing political party.

Judy Jacobs addressed the assemblage relative to the need for maintenance and/or widening of Picquets Lane in Wood-

bury. The additional traffic created by the opening of the Royal Lancer II restaurant, she stated, will only increase the number of potholes and other vehicular hazards on the road. Mrs. Jacobs pointed out, in addition, that if the Town-owned property on the west side of Picquets north of the intersection with Kristi Lane was maintained, it would offer an unobscured view to a driver entering Picquets from Kristi. Presently there is hardly any view of autos traveling south from Jericho Turnpike, because of the overgrown shrubbery.

Supervisor Colby heartedly agreed with Mrs. Jacobs, thanked her for her concern and stated he would give it his immediate attention.

## Levine Named L.I. Chairman Of State TV Committee

Stuart R. Levine of Farmingdale, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Long Island Educational Television Council, Inc. (LIETV), has been appointed Long Island Regional Chairman of the state-wide organization, People for Public Television, now in formation. Levine, presently General Sales Manager of UNICO Service Corp., is a former New York State Assemblyman.

In announcing the appointment, LIETV Board President J. Oliver Crom said: "Because of his state-wide stature and associations, as well as his knowledge of the legislative process in Albany, Mr. Levine is uniquely qualified to help in the formation of this important support group for public television in New York State." Crom, Executive Vice President of Dale Carnegie and

Associates, and a resident of Laurel Hollow, has been invited to serve as LIETV Board representative to the organization.

An initial committee of 100 leaders from business, industry, the professions, entertainment and the arts who have supported public television stations in New York State will form a nucleus of People for Public Television. The organization will work to strengthen the stations' programming capabilities through seeking sound funding for their operations. The Committee is expected to work closely with the office of the Governor and members of the Legislature in increasing the effectiveness of public broadcasting in communities throughout the Empire State.

## Woodman Spare That Tree

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr., this week announced that two Parks Department employees have been authorized by the Town Board to issue and serve summonses for violations of the Town's tree preservation ordinance.

Adopted in 1973 at Hogan's request, the ordinance requires a property owner to obtain a

permit from the Commissioner of Parks and Recreation to remove mature trees on property that is subject to further subdivision.

The summons authorization was given to John Malloy and Donald Calemno, Parks Department horticulturists who review tree removal permit applications and conduct field inspections.

## Housing Authority Chairman Reappointed

On Aug. 30 Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced that the Town Board has approved the reappointment of Jesse Harmon as chairman of the Town Housing Authority for a five-year term.

A resident of Oyster Bay hamlet, Harmon was originally appointed to the Authority in 1963 and became chairman in 1971.

The Housing Authority is an independent agency responsible

for planning and maintaining housing for senior citizens and others on a fixed income. To date, eight complexes totaling 653 units of housing have been completed in seven communities.

Other members of the Authority include Vice Chairman Ernest V. Dieterich, Secretary Salvatore J. Nicolsia, and Commissioners Harold R. Kraft and Frank J. Swit.

NORAD, a U.S. - Canadian joint command, headquartered at Colorado Springs, Colo., conducts the exercise quarterly to provide a realistic look at how its people and systems perform under attack conditions.

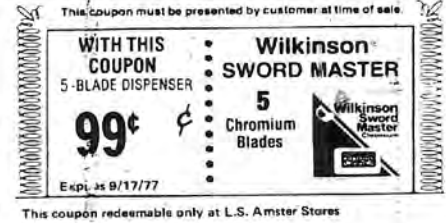

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### BOARD MEETING

During the public speaking session, senior high student Carrie Clark and former student Ilene Wolfson spoke in favor of a sex education curriculum in the high school. "Hicksville schools are behind," commented Miss Clark. "We read more and more about the high rise in teenage pregnancies." She quoted a recent Daily News article which estimated one million teenage pregnancies annually. Miss Wolfson spoke about a sex education program in Carle Place that has proved successful and also urged the Board to implement a sex education curriculum.

Also speaking during the public session was Mrs. Judy Lynam,

Chairman, Adult Education Advisory Board. "We recommend that Mrs. Marge Giannelli serve as Director with a \$5,000 salary and that she be given an assistant and secretarial help. We also would like a room at Burns Avenue School for our oil burner course." The Board will take the recommendations under consideration.

A parent asked the Board to reconsider the application for transportation of her child from a parochial school to the public school in order for the child to continue in the learning disabilities program. The parent had not been made aware of a June 1 deadline, mandated by the State Education Department. "I was not told about the June 1 deadline," she informed the

Board. The matter was referred to the appropriate administrative personnel.

In other Board action, a tax rate of \$16.31 per \$100 of assessed valuation was set. The figure represents \$15.76 for school tax and \$.55 for library tax. Superintendent Fred Hill pointed out that this figure was 1.07 cents less than last year's rate. Administration officials had predicted a one-cent decrease.

The Board voted to adjust the salaries of clerical personnel if an extension of the teacher contract has not been reached by December 1. The clerical union had asked for the adjustment at this time but the Board said that a condition had not yet been met. A difference of opinion concerning the definition of "extension" and "negotiation" was discussed. Voting no on the motion was Vice President John Ayres who felt the salary adjustment should be paid at this time.

The Board also approved an in-service training program for non-sexist education, as mandated by Title 9 under the Education Amendments of 1972, at a cost of \$100. Voting no were Trustees Bill Bennett and Neil McCormack.

The Board approved district long-range plans for pupils with special educational needs, which was recommended by the administration and required by state law. Assistant Superintendent Dr. Manus Clancy explained the complicated state reimbursement procedure in which "we must show we are spending a certain amount of money or the money gets deducted from our state aid."

Also approved by the Board was student insurance under the New York State Athletic Protection Plan for 1977-78 at a cost of 70 cents per student from grades K-12.
