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Declining School Enrollment Accelerates

School enrollment in Nassau County has been declining at an accelerated pace, according to a report released today by the Nassau County Planning Commission. It is an update of a report on school enrollment and school costs prepared by the Commission in 1975.

Owen T. Smith, Chairman of the Planning Commission, said the new report confirms projections of a decline in the youth population and school enrollment that have been previously made by the Commission. The decline was greater in the past two years, however, than it was in the four previous years. School enrollment decreased by 8,600 a year from the 1970-71 school year to the 1974-75 year and by 11,375 per year from 1974-75 to 1976-77. Total enrollment was 326,598 in 1970-71 and 269,477 in 1976-77.

In announcing these figures, Smith cited "the need for careful planning to effectively utilize the school buildings that have become surplus as a result of the decline in school population." He pointed out that some schools have been sold to private developers for single-family building lots and that this year the Planning Commission has considered subdivisions on several school properties. A total of 30 schools have been closed in Nassau since 1970, and the Planning Commission report

provides an appendix on what has happened to them. Twenty-four schools have been put on the market. Four have been sold, four more are in the process of being sold, seven have been leased, two are in the process of being leased, six have been retained by the school districts for partial or total use by the districts.

Three of the schools that have been sold will be demolished for construction of one-family residences. The Plainview-Old Bethpage School District has closed the most schools - four. East Meadow, Levittown, Great Neck and Roslyn have each closed three schools. Smith urged school districts to carefully review easier to redevelop school properties in or near commercial districts than those in residential areas. By surplus school properties in commercial areas, school districts can find short-term relief for their taxpayers. Long-term relief for local property owners will depend on a revised mechanism for financing public education.

The report points up the fact that school taxes in Nassau continue to rise, notwithstanding the steady drop in enrollment. "Under the state's school aid formula, the proportion of state aid to the total school budget decreases when the assessed value behind each pupil increases," Smith pointed out.

"The falling enrollment in Nassau schools has meant an increase in assessed value behind individual pupils. Therefore, the state's contribution to local school budgets dropped from 38.4% in 1970-71 to 32% in 1976-77."

The Commission report said the average cost per pupil climbed from \$1,801 in the 1970-71 school year to \$3,057 in 1976-77. The increase was approximately 40%, while the student population dropped by 18%. The report projects another enrollment decline of approximately 33% by 1985, which would further reduce the proportion of state aid. This could force local property taxes still higher, unless there is either a change in the state formula, a reduction in local school outlays, a change in the method of financing education, or a substantial increase in assessed valuation. There has been an increase in the assessed valuation of property during the past six years, but the report says the increase has been so small that the cost per student that has to be raised from property taxes has been increasing at the rate of 11% per year.

Smith said the Planning Commission would continue to monitor trends in school enrollment and costs and issue follow-up reports when appropriate.

Special aids are supplied by the County's Recreation Department so everyone can bowl despite their disability. Guide rails are provided for the blind, ramps for persons confined to wheelchairs and balls with devices designed to overcome gripping problems.

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At The Town Board

Herb Ballin, Attorney for Monterey Development Company, the petitioner, on the first item of business at the Town Board Meeting, held on Tuesday September 27, presented only a sketchy description before the Board, as he reserved his full presentation for the evening hearing.

Phyllis Singer, representing the East Massapequa Civic Association, declared her organization strongly opposed to the granting. In addition to Mrs. Singer, Rose Hobbins, of North Massapequa Civic Association, spoke in opposition to the granting.

The Monterey Development Company is requesting a change of zone from Business F to business G in order to establish a Pop Shoppe on the N W corner of Jerusalem Avenue and Hicksville Road in Massapequa. The petition is required because the facility will contain its own bottling system.

The second item on the calendar was the petition of A.P. Restaurant Corp., for a special exception to a permit in G Business to erect, maintain and operate a restaurant having a take-out window.

The restaurant is Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger and the franchise is Alan J. Bernstein. The property is on Jericho Turnpike, on the N S at the intersection of Cantiague Rd. in Jericho.

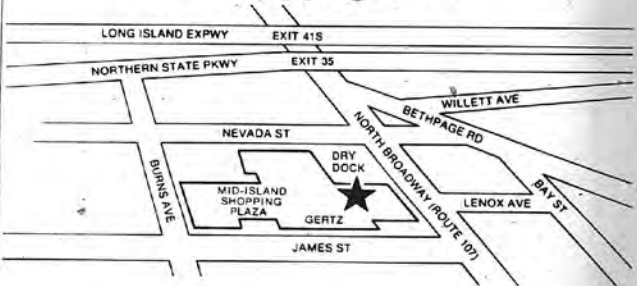

Hicksville Firemen Offer CPR Training

The Hicksville Fire Dept. will be offering a C.P.R. - Basic Life Support training program to the residents of Hicksville. This program in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation will teach people how they can help a person who is having a heart attack. Topics include how to recognize a heart attack, what to do for a person who is not breathing and has no heart-beat, and how to clear an obstructed airway. Seconds count during an emergency and basic life support often means the difference between life and death. C.P.R. is basic life support. It is not something that can be learned by simply watching it on TV. It requires hours of training and practice under supervision.

The program is conducted by

members of the Emergency Medical Training Committee of the Hicksville Fire Dept. and was made possible by the Joseph Barry Council of the Knights of Columbus (Hicksville) who have donated to the fire department many of the training mannequins used in this course. Topics and skills in the program will be taught in accordance with standards as prescribed by both the American National Red Cross and the American Heart Assoc. Members of the Emergency Medical Training Committee of the Hicksville Fire Dept. will instruct the program. All members are certified as instructors by both the American Heart Assoc. and the American National Red Cross. Upon successful completion, students will earn a certificate issued by the American National Red Cross.

The Hicksville Fire Dept. will be holding a series of C.P.R. programs throughout the year. The first program will begin on Tuesday night, Oct. 4, from 7:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. and will continue for four consecutive Tuesday nights. Attendance is required at all sessions. Registration is limited and is open only to residents of the Hicksville Fire District who are 14 years of age or older. The cost of the program will be \$2.50 per person. This charge will cover the cost of all textbooks and training guides used in the course and is not a fee

to the fire department for instruction. This fee is payable at the first class session. Registration is being taken by the Nassau County Chapter of the American Red Cross, 747-3500 ext. 15, 17, weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. When you register, please be sure to leave your name, address and phone number. Do not call the Fire Dept. to register. This would interfere with emergency phone calls and procedures.

All classes will be held at Hicksville Fire Dept. Headquarters, 20 East Marie St., opposite the Hicksville Movie Theatre. Students are expected to park in the Town of Oyster Bay parking field on the east side of the firehouse and not in the firemen's parking area on the west side of the firehouse. (This would interfere with firemen responding to emergencies and could result in a dangerous situation.)

REMEMBER: Pre-registration is required and is being taken only by the Red Cross. Students are requested to dress casual for the program as much of the program is spent in working with training mannequins on the floor.

This life-saving program is being conducted by the Hicksville Fire Dept. as part of an untiring effort by Hicksville firemen to serve and protect the Hicksville Community.

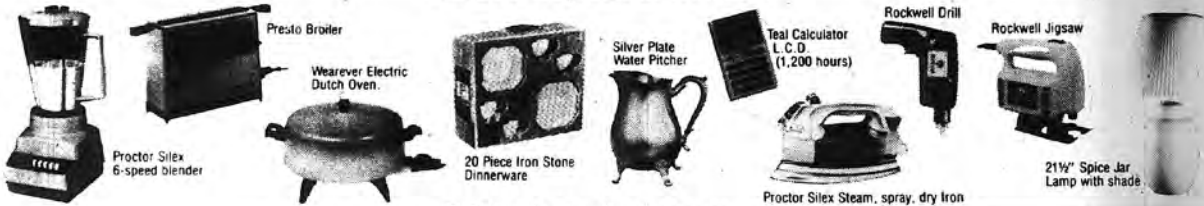
