"Meals On Wheels"

Seventy year old Mrs. J. who lives alone, was recently discharged from North Shore Hospital, after a debilitating bout with diabetes. Shopping and preparing her own meals was too difficult; and, ordinarily she would have had to enter a nursing home to convalesce. However, thanks to a special Home-Bound Meal Delivery program funded by the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs,

two nourishing meals a day are delivered to Mrs. J's home, and she is regaining her strength.

\$100,000 has been allocated to the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs through the N.Y. State Office for the Aging under Title VII of the Older Americans Act to conduct a one year demonstration project for Home-Delivered meals. The program, which operates in 22 communities, provides 100 persons age 60 and over with two nutritionally balanced meals a day, five days a week for 250 days a year. The meals are prepared at three Nassau County hospitals and provide two-thirds of the Recommended Dietary Allowance as established under federal guidelines. They are delivered by volunteers who are recruited and supervised by Visiting Home Health Services, Inc., the agency which is

operating the program under sub-contract from the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs. Eligibility for enrollment is determined by Visiting Home Health Services, with referrals from physicians and hospitals receiving priority attention.

Because the program is funded to operate only until June 30, 1978, Commissioner Adelaide Attard of the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs is urging the passage of pending legislation which would allocate funds for the continuance and extension of a "Meals on Wheels" program. "Unless bills HR6336 and S1283 are passed, this vitally needed program will almost certainly have to be discontinued," noted the Commissioner. "We urge the public and concerned seniors to write their congressmen and senators to press for the passage of these bills," she said.

On Tuesday, November 15, Mr. David L. Jaffe, Speech and Language Clinician at the Woodland Avenue School will present the second half of his talk and video taped program "The Dynamics of Human Love." Some Hicksville residents will recall that Mr. Jaffe facilitated an Adult Education course (winter 1975 and spring 1976) of the same title.

Mr. Jaffe is presently conducting research on the phenomenon of love as it affects the learning ability of children and adults. An Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Communication at Nassau Community College since 1968, Mr. Jaffe facilitates courses in interpersonal communication and personal growth. As Co-Director and Licensed Speech Pathologist at the Brookhaven Center for Communication Disorders in Selden, N.Y.,

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At The Town Board Meeting

It appeared as if the 19 item agenda, at the Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday October 23rd, would terminate at an early hour. However, it didn't conclude until 12:15.

The first item, To consider the Preliminary Budget for the T.O.H., occupied the major portion of the meeting.

Judy Jacobs was the first to speak on the proposed budget. Ms. Jacobs felt an illusion was being created, in that there was no increase in the budgeting over last years, while in fact, there was an apparent increase of \$392,000.00. She also stated that the proposed budget and the final adopted budget have never been close in the past few years.

Councilman Diamond and Supervisor Colby both discussed

the issues with Mrs. Jacobs. Councilman Diamond produced 1976-1977 budget and Supervisor Colby stated that it indicated the proposed and adopted budgets were identical.

Mario Calolouri followed Judy and gave various explanations of technical methods of adjustments in budgeting. He briefly spoke on the Federal Revenue Sharing and N.Y.S. Subsidies and indicated that he was opposed to Federal Revenue Sharing. He stated he believed that surplus funding was too high and the taxpayer is paying unnecessarily for it.

Supervisor Colby stated, without the surplus, the \$200,000.00 that was needed for extra hours during snow clearance last year, would have had to come from some other department and be an extra tax burden.

Michael Polansky and Laura

Valenti also spoke relative to the budget. Mr. Polansky would like to see a citizen review board have access to the proposed budget well in advance in order to study it and make observations and suggestions. He also requested that the Board of Appeals be reduced from 7 to 5 people.

Mrs. Valenti reviewed the salaries of several employees in the proposed budget only to find out from Councilmen Diamond and Hogan, and Supervisor Colby that the positions were not adopted.

Ann Manelski reviewed her position on the widening of Miller Place in Hicksville. Speaking for her mother, Miss Manelski stated that too much land was being taken from her, that she had not been compensated in the past for land acquired by the Town and that their present garage would actually be in the street. Council-

men Diamond, Saladino and Hogan, in turn reassured Miss Manelski that she would be compensated for loss of property, time and inconvenience. Councilman Clark promised to investigate any reimbursements due her for anything in the past.

Prior to starting on the resolutions, Supervisor Colby, presented a Proclamation from the Town of Oyster Bay Board, recognizing the League of Women Voters and all of the valuable work they perform in the interest of their community.

Items 14, relative to Steakhouse Enterprises Inc. for a special use permit to renovate, operate and maintain a restaurant on the E/S of Brush Hollow Road and Jericho Turnpike, in Jericho, was denied.

The proposed site for an Arthur Treacher's Fish and Chips, item No. 15, S/W of Jackson and Edward Avenues in Syosset, was denied.

The balance of the 14 items were passed in order.

ARC Instructors Course

Nassau residents all over the county can look forward to a fall and winter recreation season this year that will be jammed pack with things to do.

On Saturday, November 19 there will be a High School Invitational Volleyball Tournament at Nassau Community College in Garden City.

"More and more teams apply each year," says a representative for Tony Panzerella, the public relation officer for the parks and recreation commission. "We started with eight teams in 1972 and today we are up to 32."

Interest in the event grew as a result of word of mouth from athletic directors throughout the county. Letters of invitation were sent to all Nassau high schools and once the 32 teams applied registration was closed.

The Saturday event will run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and teams will be eliminated after a single defeat. The tournament will be held in Building J in cooperation

with the National Board of Women's Officials.

The Board uses the tournament to train future volleyball referees that will later officiate at high school games.

On the following Sunday, November 27 a mini-marathon will be held at Eisenhower Park in East Meadow. This 13 mile run which is half a full marathon will be the second such event this year.

"The first one had 300 runners," a representative from the parks and recreation office noted. "And the reason we have so many runners is that residents in Nassau have become part of the physical fitness craze sweeping the country."

The Parks and Recreation Commission is sponsoring the race and about 100 applicants have been accepted so far. However there is no deadline for the race and registration can be made up until 8 a.m. on the day of the race, at the Lakeside Theater in the park.

The race will be run within the park and runners should be ready

to run on grass and asphalt surfaces.

The commission has a regular marathon each March, an event that began as the Earth Day Marathon but now is called the Nassau County Marathon. Marathon officials say a doctor will be present if a runner needs medical attention and that experienced runners will be on hand to insure the participants do not over exert themselves.

Nassau residents also have a Christmas season of recreational activities to look forward to.

From December 26 - 30 there will be a volleyball tournament sponsored by the Women's Holiday Festival Tournament and is to be held in the Nassau County Community College, Building J in Garden City. The games will be for adults over 18 and they must be members of a team.

Those that are interested are urged to call the Sports Unit of the Parks Commission at 292-4284 by the December 12 deadline. The contests will be held from Monday through Friday from 7 to 10 p.m.

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Portrait Of A Venerable

The Galileo Lodge of Hicksville has become prominent in a span of a few years. Obviously, behind every rapidly-moving and advancing organization there is a human force which is capable of moving men, however diverse in thought and action, into areas of action.

Such a force is Anthony Monteforte, the present Venerable of the Galileo Lodge who was born January 10, 1929, in Westbury, just a few blocks from his present address, where he lives with his family: his wife Mary, two daughters named Betty Ann and Nicky, and his son John, who is the youngest officer in the Galileo Lodge, and in the whole order of the Sons of Italy in America.

When the Galileo Lodge was in its formative state it had the usual growing pains that were bound to arise. Anthony Monteforte's contagious qualities of leadership developed an esprit-de-corps resulting in group enthusiasm, devotion and dedication to principle. For example, when Anthony Monteforte became Venerable of The Galileo Lodge, he was faced with a \$16,000 deficit. Immediately he ordered austerity measures, an Advisory Board, an Entertainment Committee to run fund-raising dances, a ways and means committee, a Program and Feast Committee. Within one year the total debt was paid up in full, with monies to spare. Anthony Monteforte was the man responsible for these results. He also worked diligently to bring about harmony within the Lodge.

Anthony Monteforte has an amazing list of distinctions to his credit. He is a member of the W.A.B.A., Planning Board,

Environmental Commission Extension Service, President of Westbury Soccer Club, President of Tony M. Realty, President of A.M. Landscape Construction Corp. and a degree in Horticulture and Landscape Design. He has received citations from Grand Venerable Joe. E. Fay, Town of Oyster Bay Supervisor James Colby, Town Board and many Lodges in the Order, including his own, the Galileo Lodge, from whom he received many honors and awards. In 1976, Anthony Monteforte was chosen as a member of the Grand Lodge Arbitration Committee of the Order of the Sons of Italy in America. His rise in the Galileo Lodge was meteoric. He joined the Lodge before the Charter was issued in 1972, and six months later he was appointed to the Board of Directors. Six months after that he was elected 2nd Assistant Venerable and then finally he was chosen as the Venerable.

With the aid of the membership, he led the renovation program which added a delightful decor to the inner Lodge. It has a ballroom effect, with a carpeted dining area, a spacious dance floor, a modern kitchen and two

tiled bathrooms. The outside of the Lodge was stucco painted.

He is now working with the Hicksville Community Council on a project to build a permanent monument at Kennedy Park, Broadway, Hicksville. This will be an everlasting tribute to America's Bicentennial. Mr. Monteforte was also instrumental in forming the Ladies Auxiliary.

In keeping with Anthony Monteforte's programs to aid the community and its people, the organization has pledged the sum of \$2000 to the St. Francis Hospital cardiac unit.

To Sum Up

What we have here is 'a man of all seasons,' a man who has instilled such high spirit, as to make people, as well as organizations, great.

In January 1978, an era will end. Anthony Monteforte will turn over the reins of the Galileo Lodge to his successor. But he will remain on the Board of Directors and will also serve as ex-Venerable. And future plans and programs of the Galileo Lodge Sons of Italy will go forward, building their future on a past that has been masterfully molded by Anthony Monteforte.

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Ice Skating Schedule

Schedules and fees for public sessions and skating instruction at the Town of Oyster Bay's three ice skating rinks for the 1977-78 season were approved by the Town Board on Tuesday, October 18. The rinks are located in the community parks at Bethpage, Syosset-Woodbury and Massapequa (Marjorie R. Post).

"The schedule of fees for the public sessions will be the same as those charged for the past eight years, and, for the fifth year, there will be no increase in the fees for skating lessons," Town Supervisor Joseph Colby said.

The general admission for adults and children at all public sessions will be 75 cents for each two-hour session. In addition, youngsters 15 years of age and under can purchase discount books of 10 tickets at a price of \$5.00. These books are good only for the 1977-78 season, which starts on Friday, November 25, 1977 and ends Sunday, March 12, 1978.

"Arrangements can also be made for the rental of an ice rink to groups upon written request to the Commissioner of Parks and Recreation," Colby noted. The charge for such rental is \$50.00 per hour.

The daily schedule of public sessions has been set to conform with the demand experienced at each rink and therefore varies from rink to rink. Schedules will be available at each rink, local libraries, and the Department of Parks and Recreation, 800 South Oyster Bay Road, Hicksville.

Skaters of all ages and degrees of skill can again avail themselves of professional skating instruction at each of the rinks. Professional instructors will provide both private and group lessons at the beginner, intermediate, and advanced levels for tiny tots (3 to 5 years), children, teenagers, and adults.

In addition to the general skating instruction, special instruction for advanced groups will be given in free style, ice dance, and power skating.

Registration for all skating instruction is scheduled as follows: Bethpage skatehouse: Thursday, November 3, from 4 to 6 PM and 7 to 9 PM. Marjorie R. Post skatehouse: Friday, November 4, from 4 to 6 PM and 7 to 9 PM. Syosset-Woodbury skatehouse: Saturday, November 5, from 10 AM to 12 Noon and 2 to 4 PM.

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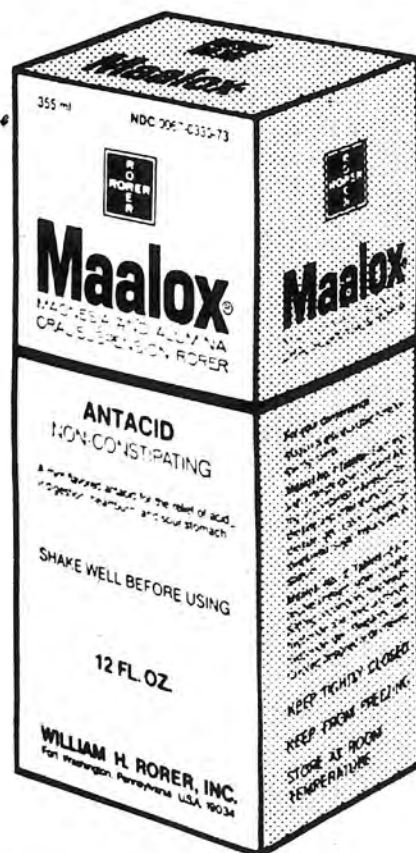
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A Message From Our Postal Service

Notifying friends and other mail sources at least a month before you move will help insure prompt receipt of correspondence and save post offices thousands of dollars in processing costs, the U.S. Postal Service said today.

More than 12 million American households changed their mailing address last year alone, producing more than 3 billion pieces of mail that were undeliverable as addressed. The cost of extra handling required

for forwarding that mail was more than \$300 million, the Postal Service said.

Postal authorities say advance change of address notification would significantly reduce the number of pieces of "moved mail" currently handled by the Postal Service. Notifying publishers and businesses a month in advance of your move allows them to reflect the new address in their next mailing cycle.

It can also mean avoiding

service charges on bills and timely receipt of magazines or newspapers, the Postal Service said.

A simple, eight-part Change of Address Kit, available free from letter carriers and post offices, speeds change of address notification, the Postal Service said. Each kit contains seven Notice to Correspondents and Publisher cards and one Change of Address Order card for the post office.

No Leaves In Road

"There is a certain amount of confusion because some villages allow residents to rake leaves

and branches into the road for village forces to pick up," Plock said. "But this rule applies only to village roads not County roads."

"If you don't know whether or not your street is a County road, call 938-8110 and our Road Maintenance people will advise you," he added.

Plock also urged people not to stuff leaves or branches down drains because if followed by rain, flooding can occur since the runoff has no place to go.

"Bagging leaves and bundling branches for pickup by local sanitation departments is the best disposal method," Plock said.

Nassau Consumer Affairs Busy

If you're paying an extra two to ten cents a gallon for unleaded gasoline, you'll be glad to know that Nassau Consumer Affairs inspectors do special tests of the anti-pollution fuel to make sure you get what you pay for—no excess lead that could damage your car.

Consumer Affairs Commissioner James E. Picken announced recently that his office has received a grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency of \$5,600 for the year to continue its special lead-content monitoring program. Thirteen states and four cities conduct similar programs, but Nassau is the only county government that does it. This will be the second year it is receiving the grant.

Last year, according to Picken, 10 cases of excess lead contamination were found at gasoline pumps in Nassau and turned over to the EPA, which subsequently fined the station owners a total of \$39,800 in penalties.

Approximately 25% of motorists today purchase unleaded, Picken said, and the number will continue to grow as more consumers buy new cars which require it. A lead content of more

than .05 grams per gallon could prove hazardous to the catalytic converters in late model cars.

Picken said, "we originated the program in 1975 out of concern that unleaded gasoline not be adulterated with regular gasoline, which costs less. Some years ago this office discovered premium gas being mixed with regular grade. As a result the county now makes routine tests for adulteration as part of its inspection activities."

However, he pointed out, the lead content testing needs special equipment and must be done in a lab with a test tube sample taken from the pump.

In a related matter, Picken hailed a new state law which will make it easier for consumers to compare gasoline prices. Taking effect this Friday, the law will require the price to be posted over the pump on a sign at least one foot square.

"We've been pushing for this for years," Picken said, "and the legislature finally came through."

Attends Conference

Tom Bannan of Hicksville High School represented the Long Island Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa International at the professional fraternity's 36th Biennial Council and Third Conference on Educational Issues, held at the Concord Hotel, Kiamesha Lake, N.Y., from October 20 to 23.

Planning an action program for PDK's international headquarters in Bloomington, Ind., and 500 chapters located chiefly in the U.S. and Canada, 800 delegates and officers studied a list of 19 issues facing education and chose to focus heavily on five of them in the next two years.

Noting that many states have mandated "competency-based examinations" in the public

schools, the delegates called for a task force to determine what basic skills all youth should acquire.

In view of the continuing financial troubles in education, the council also resolved to set up a commission on public school finance. It could involve representatives not only from education but from business, industry, and government.

PDK also called for a commission to study programs for the identification, training, certification, evaluation, and professional growth of educators. A big factor in this decision is the Gallup poll published by PDK, which reveals strong public concern for the quality and credibility of professional education at all levels.

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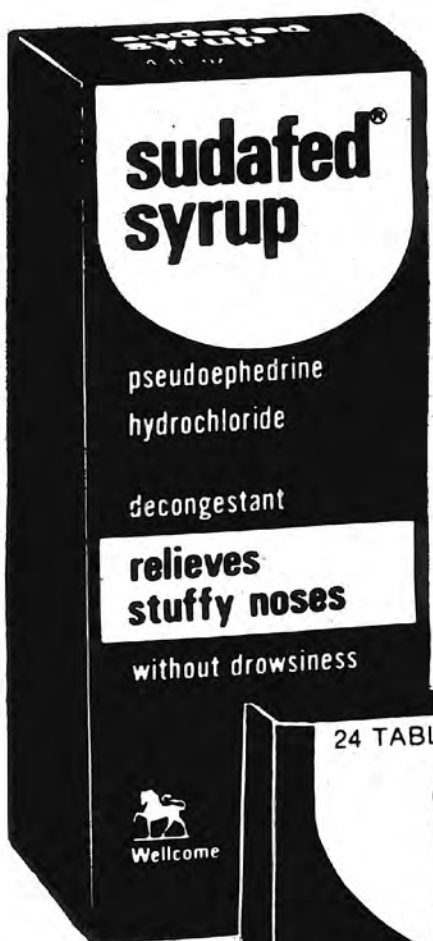
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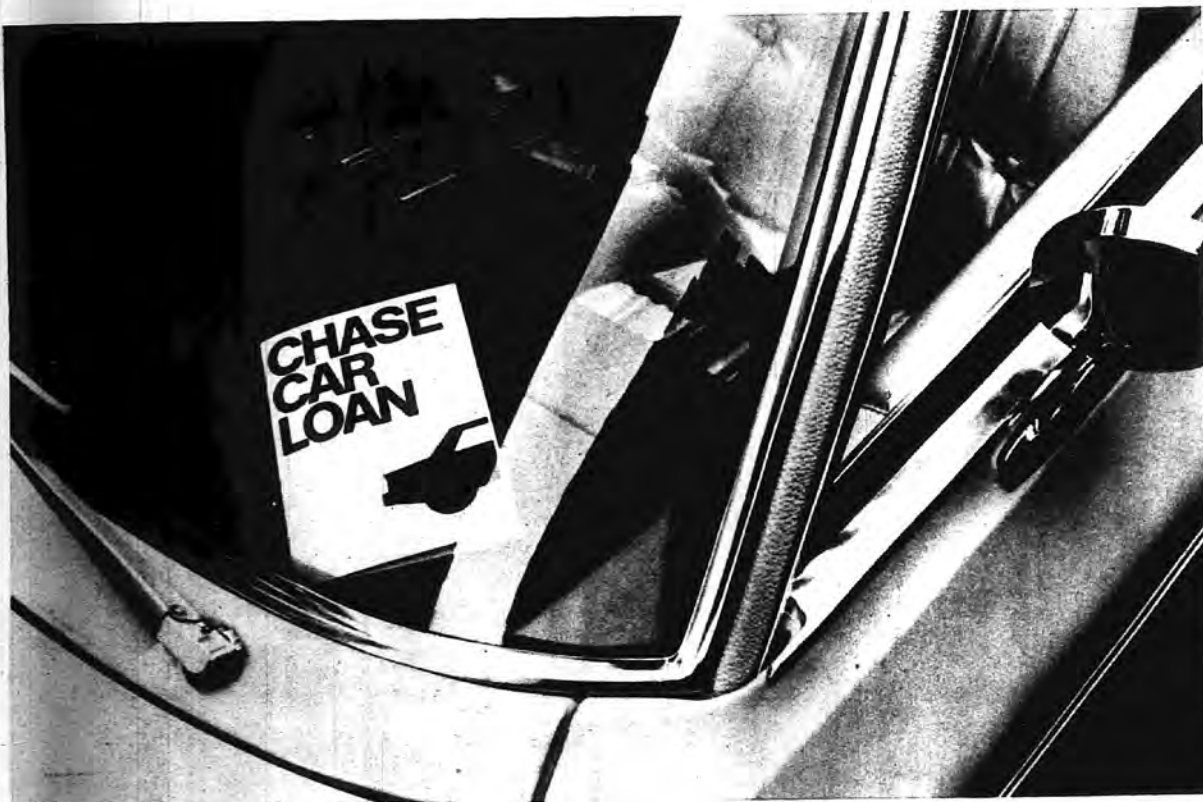
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
