At Community Council Meeting

Part One of a Three-Part Series
 The November meeting of the Hicksville Community Council began promptly at 8:30. Joseph Colby had promised the HCC last spring that he would be the speaker at our November meeting, and even though he had to introduce speakers at a Hofstra Rally, he made sure that he visited Hicksville first.

Mr. Colby opened by saying that he does not like to leave matters lying about. The Hicksville Community Parks Task Force was developed to advise the Town Board concerning the needs of the Community in recreation. Plans are in the development stage, and the costs will be ready by January.

The G-1 Zone was a fine concept when it was developed, but it is now a blight on the Community. There is a general decay in G-1. Mr. Colby said that he would like to hold several informal meetings on the subject, and when he has received input, a formal meeting will be held and

decisions will be made. There have been a number of alternate proposals, and several ideas have come from the students of Arthur Petterino (who the HCC will have as its speakers at their December meeting), but they have to be studied. They might possibly not be feasible. But Mr. Colby set his own goal - by April 1, 1978, something must happen. He has a fear of putting it back into the F zoning, but he feels that the going is a slow process. But by mid-year, he feels the Town Board should have a plan. At the meetings with the community, Mr. Colby feels that it will be the best of the Community input talking about ideas. The meetings should not get out of hand, for he feels that cool heads will prevail to earnestly and honestly seek opinion.

In the triangular park area, permission was given for the bicentennial monument and it is nice to see more beautification taking shape. Mr. Colby feels that there should be a suitable plaque,

to honor the St. Ignatius Girls Corp, for Tom Clark brought that to his attention after last month's meeting.

In 1975, Dr. Dunbar's name first came to Mr. Colby's attention. He has developed the flowerbeds along Broadway, and has made Hicksville a model for other Communities. The Highway and Town Forces will continue to co-operate with him on future projects.

In 1978, the Town Board will hold a meeting to discuss a new type of zoning - Esthetic Zoning - which in part will be the molding of what the Town of Oyster Bay will look like in the future. Mr. Colby said that he has been watching zoning since he was in the Town Attorney's Office in 1975, and that he has been busy on that and on many other affairs since taking office 10 months ago. The administration will move forward.

New Face For The Gregory Museum

Although the building housing The Gregory Museum had been painted twice in the past five years by labor donated by the Painters' Union, blistering of the paint has been a constant problem.

After consulting with representatives from various paint companies, it was decided to remove as much paint as possible from the building.

The Pittsburgh Paint Company, 301 West John Street, Hicksville, through its Hicksville representative, Leif Holm-Andersen, agreed to furnish all the paint necessary to paint the exterior of the building. Forty five gallons of paint were donated, including oil primer and paint for the finish coats.

Five laborers were secured through the C.E.T.A. Program to do the necessary scraping and painting. They have been working on the building since July 11th. Weather conditions have hindered the progress to a great extent.

Mr. Leif Andersen, Mr. Alto Newer, Museum Architect, and Dr. Richard Smith, Chairman of the Museum Building & Grounds

Committee, have supervised the project. No paint had been applied until they were satisfied that all preparation work was thoroughly done.

It is hoped that residents of the community will stop and look at the new face of this recognized

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A Letter To Councilman Clark

Dear Councilman Clark:

Like a bad penny the intersection at Broadway and Nevada Street keeps turning up. Just recently Jim Cummings wrote about it in his column "Comings and Goings" in the Mid Island Herald. He referred to a letter that had been sent to the New York State Department of Transportation regarding the traffic situation at Broadway and Nevada Street and the problem of the Right-on-Red at Broadway and Nevada Street - southbound. The right-on-red is the least of the problem.

It appears to me that a letter to the Town of Oyster Bay is more in order due to the fact that the traffic situation on Broadway was not created by the State Department of Transportation but by the Town of Oyster Bay. The Town of Oyster Bay has allowed the traffic to both enter and exit the Mid Island Plaza via Nevada Street. Nevada Street also has to serve the residential community as far north as the Fairhaven Garden apartments, as far south as West John Street and as far west as Kuhl Ave. The entrance and exits on Nevada Street for the Mid Island Plaza are also used by cars as a shortcut between West John Street and Broadway and Newbridge Road.

Can New York State Department of Transportation be blamed for all the bad zoning decisions in this area by both past and present zoning board and town board members that have brought Broadway to its knees. Is the State responsible for the traffic brought here by the addition recently of two new banks within yards of each other, Smoke Stax, Bagel Nosh and Yummy Yogurt. The area has been choking with traffic since Sears, Twin Theatres North and South and Nathans were built.

I've taken a short walk on Broadway and the zoning board has permitted curb cuts that average every 15 feet from Northern State Parkway to the

Hicksville Railroad station. I dread what you people might have in store for Hicksville south of the railroad station and the New York State Department of Transportation will not be to blame.

I've been living on the edge of this insanity for 18 years. The solution has always been very clear to me but everytime I have communicated my recommendations to Gruenwald, Doolittle, Burke, Braun and Savage I always received the same response - a police traffic survey of the area would be requested and they would be guided by the Police traffic and Safety Recommendations. I understand that the Town of Oyster Bay does not have to accept the traffic survey recommendations (and that smacks of back-room politics). I know of at least five such surveys having been conducted in this area and the traffic situation has grown steadily worse.

I think its about time the Town of Oyster Bay got their heads out of the sand and got together with a representative from Mid Island Plaza, the Nassau County Police Department of Traffic and Safety Bureau, the New York State Department of Transportation and develop a solution to this ridiculous traffic problem.

My recommendations would be:

- 1) Nevada Street be made one-way westbound with both Jeansen and Rotary Place serving as entrances only to Mid Island Plaza from Nevada Street.
- 2) Princess Street be made one-way eastbound. In order to make this possible the median on Broadway and Princess Street has to be opened up and a traffic signal installed.
- 3) The traffic in Mid Island Plaza should be made to go one-way - counter-clockwise (as in Roosevelt field). This would
