To Elect Fire Commissioner

The voting for Hicksville Fire Commissioner will take place on Tues., Dec. 13, from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. at Station No. 1, Gebhardt Plaza (E. Marie St.) Hicksville. Candidates are Clifford G. Davis and Eugene J. Pietzak, Sr.

Mr. Davis has announced his candidacy for re-election for the five year term of Hicksville Fire Commissioner. He has served for six years as a District Commissioner, and is an Ex-Chief of the Hicksville Fire Dept., and was voted Fireman of the Year in 1971. He is a third generation Hicksville Fireman having served 29 years with Hicksville and has resided in the Hicksville Fire District his entire life. He is an active member of County, State, and International Fireman's Associations, a past President of the South Shore Fireman's Assoc., and presently the Chairman of the Ninth Battalion Fire District, and Chairman of the Nassau County Fire Commis-

sion. Mr. Davis was a local businessman in Hicksville for over thirty years, and presently employed in the Building Dept. for the Town of Oyster Bay. He also serves as Nassau County Director for the Fire Fighters Burn Center Foundation, (for better burn care for people in the New York and Long Island area.) Anyone who is a registered voter in the Hicksville Fire District may vote.

Eugene J. Pietzak, Sr., Mr. Gene Pietzak, a resident of Hicksville for 20 years, and a businessman and administrator for 25 years, resides at 5 Pine St.

A member of Our Lady of Mercy Parish, he is active in the C.Y.O., the Knights of Columbus, and the Holy Name Society of Our Lady of Mercy.

Mr. Pietzak believes that "a taxpayer should be on the Fire District's Board of Commissioners, representing the taxpayers of the community as well as the firemen."

Board Rejects Supt's Recommendation

The Hicksville Board of Education rejected by 5-2 a recommendation from Dr. Fred Hill, Superintendent, that no appointment be made at this time to fill the position of assistant superintendent for administration. According to state education law, only the superintendent can make recommendations for appointment and the board can then act on it.

For more than an hour, a discussion ensued between the board and Dr. Hill. Dr. Hill detailed the chronological history of the search for an assistant superintendent which included the screening of more than 100 applications narrowing those down to 33; on-the-job visitation and interviews by board members; and finally resulting in the selection of five possible candidates.

Also discussed was the definition of "administration."

Form New Teachers Union

Because of dissatisfaction with the present teacher union representation in Hicksville, a group of district teachers have joined to form a new unit, the Teachers Professional Union.

Citing a complete breakdown in determining 1977-78 salaries, failure to handle grievances effectively and no communication on the building level, a T.P.U. spokesman stated that the new union could work much more effectively for teachers because "we're closer to them and do not have the top heavy bureaucracy that saps the time and strength of union delegates."

The new group will put heavy emphasis on professionalism, and work towards restoring the image of the teacher as a professional person, thus moving away from the money-hungry, power-mad caricature created by past actions of other teacher unions.

"One way to do this," the T.P.U. spokesman continued, "is to put stress on teaching and teaching environment. We want to teach effectively," he said, "and one way towards restoring the teacher to his rightfully respected status is to produce results."

the job description advertised; and financial remuneration.

President Tom Nagle stated that "there is a need for a person but we can't agree on the position." The Board was to meet this week to discuss the matter further.

Voting to accept Dr. Hill's recommendation were trustees Neil McCormack and Bill Bennett.

Vice President John Ayres announced publicly his resignation from that office and his wish to be reelected as a trustee. He stated there was "a lack of leadership and openness in stating true feelings" on the Board and that there were "delays in making decisions." President Nagle accepted his resignation and reelected Mr. Ayres as a trustee.

Dr. Walter Dunbar requested that the Board establish a closed campus for the junior and senior high schools. He stated that in addition to traffic obstruction, noise and litter, "drug and alcohol abuse have now come into the scene."

Also urging that a closed

campus be instituted was Mr. Seig Widdler who read a prepared statement alluding to the drug and alcohol problem. He questioned the attention span of these students in class. "Stricter controls are needed or the kids will cheat themselves," he concluded.

Barbara Goldman, President, Senior High Student Government, stated that "closing our campus is not a solution to any of these problems. We need to institute a program for students to help combat the drug and alcohol abuse."

Mrs. Fran Lolicano stated it was the duty of a citizen to call the police to report any trafficking in drugs. She also objected to the slandering of all students and invited the residents to meet with junior and senior high PTA representatives to work out a solution. "As a parent of students in the junior and senior high, I am concerned that this type of problem exists."

Board members also commented on the problem. Trustee Iris Wolfson took exception "to

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At The Town Board Meeting

The 20 item calendar that made up the Town Board Meeting, held on Tuesday Dec. 10th concluded at 12:20 P.M.

Steven Shapiro, attorney for Joseph Corsentino, presented his case for the petitioner for a change of zone from Res. D to Res. E District at Bethpage. Burt Nelson, appeared as a professional real estate appraiser and gave his views on the affect: on the community if the petition was granted.

The local people were opposed to granting the building sites of 60 x 100 but their basic opposition was the fear of losing their dead end area.

On the local scene a townwide drainage program will be advertised for a Hearing date of January 17, 1978, estimated cost is \$11,000,000.00.

An extension of time was granted on the completion of improvements to the parking fields at Locust Valley.

The final acceptance was made on the General Construction of the Refuse Compactor Building in Bethpage.

In the event that T O B makes

an agreement for the use of the Black Clausen, the compactor will be able to compact and bale 6 truckloads of garbage, etc., into one truckload.

The Board amended Rules, Regulations governing the use of T O B Beaches as regards Senior Citizens and disabled persons. What was done, was to modify by definition a broader interpretation of disabled people.

The petition of A.P. Restaurant Corp. for a special use permit at JERICHO, was granted. Wendys - the juicy hamburger, will be located next to the Howard Johnson installation on Jericho Turnpike in Jericho.

The Woodbury Road Runner Motel, Inc. was granted a Special Use Permit for modification at Woodbury. The approval provides for a 2nd story to be built onto the existing most westerly set of motel units. Originally, the application provided for the construction to be built onto the units closest to the Woodbury Condominiums.

Indoor Skateboard Arena

The highlight of the day was the approval of the petition of Nick Pappalardo for special use per-

mit at Plainview.

The granting will now allow the construction of the 1st Indoor Skateboard Arena in Nassau County and the largest indoor arena on Long Island.

The Long Island Skateboard Arena, as it will be called, will be located on Old Country Road in Plainview, west of Round Swamp Road near the Mergenthaler Building.

The proposed Grand Opening hopes to accommodate the youthful population sometime during the Christmas vacation. The facility will include a 135 foot half pipe area, that ends up in a banked free-style area. The jump area will be on a tri-level basis, ranging from a low of 2 feet to a high of 8 feet.

A pro shop will be located on the site. It will have all the latest skateboard equipment for sale and or rent.

Safety requirements will be imposed which will necessitate wearing a helmet, elbow and knee pads. Skaters will be charged \$2.50 per hour for the use of the facilities. Parents and friends will be permitted to observe from a platform gallery.

We read with interest your article on councilmanic districts in the Town of Oyster Bay. The

League of Women Voters was organized to promote informed and active participation of citizens in government. The League does not support or oppose any political party or candidate. It does take positions on governmental issues, after thorough study.

Based on a study initiated in 1975, the League of Women Voters is in favor of a COMBINATION system of 4 councilmembers elected from districts (legally known as wards) and 2 elected at large.

Our consensus was that this combination provides the best of

the two methods of electing councilmembers. The four members elected from districts would be directly and legally responsible to the voters of their district. The two at large would continue to represent a town wide point of view. By keeping the council at the same size there would be no added cost. It should be noted that both the State and Federal Governments use a form of combination system.

The persistent efforts of Steve Didier, Co-chairman of the Permanent Bicentennial Memorial Committee neared fruition as "ground breaking" ceremonies for the handsome red brick and marble wall with its lettering bearing the name "Hicksville, U.S.A.", took place at the north end of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Mall on Broadway.

On hand for the traditional pre-construction ritual with "golden" spades were: Oyster Bay Town Supervisor, Joseph Colby, who

untangled bureaucratic snarls in Albany to expedite final State approval of the project; Town Councilman Thomas Clark of Hicksville, who supported the project, and Hicksville Bicentennial Memorial Committee Co-chairmen, Steve Didier, Millie Pino and Richard Evers. Representing the Galileo Lodge of the Sons of Italy, Hicksville, which is generously funding and constructing the memorial, were Lodge Venerable, Anthony Monteforte and Anthony Previte. Also present was Dorothy Horton McGee, Chairman of the Town of Oyster Bay American Revolution Bicentennial Commission, the still very active body stimulating and coordinating the on-going Bicentennial activities.

The permanent Bicentennial monument, at John Street and Broadway, will serve to identify attractively the Hicksville community for motorists and truck drivers approaching the village from the Long Island Expressway and Northern State Parkways to the north. The wall and its lettering, "Hicksville, U.S.A." will be the result of plans drawn up by the Hicksville Bicentennial Committee during 1976 "to create a lasting memorial" to the great spirit and togetherness which prevailed in the community during the celebration of the nation's 200th Birthday year.

It is planned that the reverse side of the memorial wall will eventually have affixed plaques featuring the logos of the many Hicksville organizations which took part in the many and well-remembered events of Hicksville's Bicentennial Year.
