Mr. Davis has announced his candidacy for re-election for the five year term of Hicksville Fire Commissioner. He has served for six years as a District Commis-sioner, and is an Ex-Chief of the Hicksville Fire Dept., and was voted Fireman of the Year in 1971. Board Rejects Supt's Recommendation

The Hicksville Board of Education rejected by 5-2 a recommendation from Dr. Fred Hill, Superintendent, that no appointment be made at this time to fill the position of assistant superintendent for administration. ministration. According to state education law, only the superintendent can make recommendations for appointment and the board can then act on it

act on it.

For more than an hour, a discussion ensued between the board and Dr. Hill. Dr. Hill detailed the chronological history of the search for an assistant superintendent which included the screening of more than 100 applications narrowing those down to 33: on-the-job visitation and interviews by board members; and finally resulting in the selection of five possible candidates.

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
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
