# 1977 HHS Team Become County Champs

The Hicksville 1977 Soccer Team became the NASSAU COUNTY SOCCER CHAMPIONS.

Highlights of the year was a 2-2 come from behind tie game with Farmingdale which just about assured Hicksville of its second Division I Championship, and a playoff win against (rated Number 1 in New York State) Plainview JFK 3-2, for the North Shore Nassau County Championship.

Hicksville scored an amazing 69 goals and the defense held opponents to only 15. Hicksville averaged 3.63 goals per

game to their opponents 0.78.

Playing excellent defense were four juniors, Alex Sakk, John Shannon, Steve Solaski as Fullbacks and Bill Dalton at Goal. Control of the middle of the field was demonstrated by halfbacks Pete Konczylo, Mike Humphreys, and the universal Norman Stafford. Lending support when needed were Joe Mullings, Jon Stafford, Anthony Luongo and Donald Anglin. The line did their job, scoring goals, Tim Cusack (14 goals, 9 assists), Kevin Anglin (14 goals, 11 assists), Jack Jablonski (14 goals, 5 assists), and

Tom Luongc (9 goals, 8 assists).

Most Valuable Player Award went to John Shannon, Fullback. John was a threat on offense as well as defense, (9 goals, 4 assists). Most Improved Players, Alex Sakk and Tim Cusack. Team Player (Mr. Universal Award) Norman Stafford. This was for his fine play at Goal, Fullback and Halfback positions.

Pete Konczylo made the Division I All-Star Team and Tom Luongo (Soph), John Shannon (Jr.) and Kevin Anglin (Sr.) all were voted on the All Nassau County All-Star Team.

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## At The Town Board Meeting

The 57 items that composed the calendar at the Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday December 20th, had prospects of being a whole day affair, but surprisingly were concluded by 12:30.

Items No. 1 and No. 2 were abbreviated due to petitions from the public that necessitated night hearings.

Item No. 1, a hearing relative to the request for a special use permit to remove an existing building and erect, alter, use and maintain in a Business District, a restaurant in Massapequa. The Petitioner, Massapequa Diner, Inc. was represented by the Honorable Angelo Roncallo. The matter will be aired at a Day and Night Hearing on February 7th. A petition by the Marriott Corporation and Plainview Shopping Inc. for special permission to erect, use, maintain and operate a restaurant with seating

capacity of more than 75 at Plainview, Woodbury Rd & So. Oyster Bay Rd. will be heard on Tuesday, Jan. 17, in a day and night hearing.

The balance of the Hearing Items 3 through Item No. 5, were amendments to the Code of Ordinances T.O.B. and Item No. 6 relating to the rental of fire hydrants from T.O.B. to the various fire districts.

Lillian Fergelbaum thanked Councilman Mosca for his efforts in obtaining Stop Signs on Oak Dr. and Cherry Drive, in Plainview.

George Rothman represented the Waste Removal Institute in voicing protests over the considered increase in tipping fees at the T.O.B. Dump.

Supervisor Colby stated that the increase was necessitated to discourage haulers to dump in T.O.B. rather than in their own

Town Dumps, due to the current lower rates at T.O.B.

The balance of the agenda was dedicated to resolutions, of local interest were:

Approving and accepting full service guarantee for new roofing at the Ice Rink, Bethpage Community Park.

A resolution directing the Town Clerk to advertise a Notice of Hearing relative to the extension of the downtown Syosset Moratorium.

During the informal discussion that followed, the Honorable Mr. Yevoli represented members of the Beaumont Dr. area in Plainview. An industrial building under construction has created unnecessary debris and accompanying hazards. The Supervisor and entire Board promised to give the complaint their immediate attention.

## The Board Of Supervisors Meeting

A Jericho man appeared at the county board of supervisor's meeting on Monday to protest the State Department of Transportation's proposal to fill "service road gaps" along the Long Island Expressway in Jericho.

William Siegel, the first vice-president of the Birchwood Civic Association told the panel the Nassau-Suffolk Transportation Coordinating Committee is expected to act soon on DOT's recommendation to close the "service road gaps" along the roadway.

The plan proposes to convert Village Drive, north of the LIE and east of Routes 106-107 in Jericho into a service road, and is unanimously opposed by the Board of Directors of the 600 family Birchwood Civic Association.

Village Drive which borders the LIE is, according to Mr. Siegel, "a quiet residential deadend street." The conversion of this street into a service road would, transform the street into a dangerous major thoroughfare which will quickly depress property rights along the street, says Mr. Siegel.

The civic leader is questioning why DOT has decided against asking for an environmental impact study on the proposed plan.

He points out that modern road planning such as the proposed service roads, do not currently allow the construction of such facilities just thirty feet from private homes.

DOT, according to Mr. Siegel, had long range plans to build the service roads but should have informed homeowners of its intent before houses were built in the area. The proposal to build the service road is part of an overall plan to help reduce traffic

congestion on the LIE.

In other action, before the board, the panel overwhelmingly approved the 1978 county budget

which includes a \$2,000 pay hike for each member. That item was objected to by Richard M. Kessel, a Merrick resident who is a self-appointed watchdog of governmental activities in the county. He says the board only waited to pass the budget containing the pay hike until after the election, and this brought a heated response from board member Alfonso D'Amato.

"This raise will be the only one we get over a six year period," says Mr. D'Amato, "and that amounts to about a 2 percent raise per year."

The new budget will decrease the tax rate 13.3 cents to \$7.34 per \$100 of assessed valuation. This means an average assessed home at \$7,000 will be \$9.31 per \$100.

# At The Dec. Community Council Meeting

Part 2 of a Two-Part Series

When voices are heard at the library, every sound can be caught, every note is heard as the perfect acoustics in the library auditorium demonstrates the quality of the pitch and tone of the music. That is why Tom O'Connor smiled when the Holy Family Players sang the final song in its repertoire. The combination of altos and sopranos singing 'Ave Maria' and 'I Believe' blended so perfectly that you could almost imagine yourself in a concert hall. The Holy Family Players, with Tom O'Connor directing and Peg O'Connor at the piano, sang eight songs - in solos, quartets and as a group of 35. They gave a festive air to the holiday meeting of the Hicksville Community Council and provided excellent entertainment to those who attended.

The meeting then moved on to the 'Hicksville Town Meeting' and Councilman Tom Clark was the first speaker. Councilman Clark presented Steve Didier with a permit that has been a long time in coming. The state finally gave consent to allow a brick wall 3 feet by 4 feet to be erected at Kennedy Plaza to proclaim our name of 'Hicksville'. Steve was very happy to receive the permit and told us that construction will begin as soon as possible.

Discussion then returned to the G-1 zone, and Councilman Clark informed us that the lot that is used for parking, across the street from the parking garage is worth 1/2 million the way it is. Along Broadway, the state bought the land, built the road, and then sold the remaining strip back to the owner. Now each one wants to be the last to sell. With the G-1 as it now exists, a piece of property must be 100 by 200 in order to build and it must provide for off-street parking. A building cannot be too high, for the owner must provide for 80% of the parking. Town is presently working on the possibility of forming an auxiliary governing body to purchase the parcels. There would be a meeting with the owners (there are 6 major owners) and it is not an easy plan.

If anyone would be allowed to build with no restrictions, there would be haphazard construction and where would you put the cars?

More emphasis should be put on the trains. The schedule for Hicksville is tops - during the day there is only a 1/2 wait between trains. There are a lot of banks coming into the area and it looks as though Hicksville is going to erupt. Jamaica and Hempstead have just about stopped growing, but we have a lot of promise.

Tom Clark urges you to talk to everyone about our problem and get back to him with suggestions for the Town Board needs ideas.

In answer to a question about the quiet manner that the Broadway Town Annex is being closed, Tom Clark mentioned that the amount of business and activity cannot justify the cost of keeping the building open. A small office will be built within the parking garage and a few parking spaces will be available for Town business. The Town Hall Annex will be put up for sale, and the parking in the back might be of some interest to the buyer.

The Parks Task Force Vote is coming closer. A brochure is being printed and the legal notice will be going out around Feb. 28. More favorable reports are being heard for an indoor pool and next month, when the Parks Task Force will be featured by the Community Council, Mr. Clark

will have a more solid dollars and cents figure. The construction industry is very slow now, and some are willing to take a cut in order to get the job.

David Blaszkowsky, a representative of the Senior High School then took the floor and told us that there is a 'High School of the Year' contest and the High School would like to get ideas of how they can help individuals or organizations in the community. The object of this project is to go out into the community and help; at present the drama and music programs go to hospitals and orphanages. A Variety Show was produced in the early part of December and the Madrigal Singers performed at the Library for Christmas.

John Budnick mentioned that the Class Reunion of '67 is being formed and if anyone knows of anyone who graduated that year, please have them notify the Alumni Association.

The Library had a full month with a movie, a play by the Repertory Company, the Madrigal Singers, Santa Claus and the Nutcracker. The Gregory Museum also celebrated the holiday shopping festival with a craft show.

The next meeting of the Hicksville Community Council will be held on Thursday.

If you think you need financial aid, your chances for getting it are best if you apply in the right way at the right time.

Following are the steps that Hicksville High School Guidance Department recommends:

1. Select the colleges that seem most appropriate to your interests and needs. Write to the admission office at each college for an application for admission and financial aid.

2. Check to see which financial aid forms are required by the colleges you are applying to and the deadline dates for each.

3. Pick up a Financial Aid Form (FAF), along with the booklet, Meeting College Costs from your counselor. The 1978-79 FAF is available after December 1, 1977.

4. Mail your FAF to the College Scholarship Service (CSS) for analyses.

The FAF can be used as an

application for the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program (BEOG) if Item 83 is checked "yes" and the form is mailed after January 1, 1978.

For an additional \$1.00, the filer may receive from the CSS an estimate of the contribution that the family will be expected to make toward educational expenses.

Filing the FAF and BEOG which is now part of one inclusive form are necessary for the college student who is seeking scholarships, loans or on campus college work study programs. 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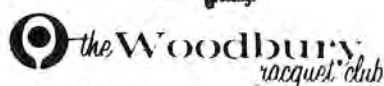

## Inside Nassau

These days, perhaps more than any other time in our American history we have greater trouble getting into the Christmas spirit. Maybe it is because we are more aware of the commercialization of the holidays, and this makes us apprehensive about becoming part of that scene.

I am one of those people. I want my nephews, and the rest of my family to get into the real spirit of this holiday which is the celebration of the birthday of someone a lot of us call the Son of God. It is not so much a Santa Claus, or a Christmas tree, or toys, that should make it a time of joy but the fact we are celebrating a special person's birthday.

The giving of gifts gets lost somewhere in the holiday season. I do not know if we really remember why we give gifts to each other. We imitate what the three wise men did for Jesus Christ. They brought him birthday presents. Let's remember that on the 25th.

And if you have a problem ever getting into the Christmas spirit, let me offer a suggestion on how to change that attitude.

During the week of the 19th, take yourself out to either LaGuardia or JFK airport and stand around. You will see thousands of people who are absolutely breaking their necks to get home to family and friends so that they can celebrate Christ's birthday. Watch them as they hurdle through the throngs of people, trying to get their luggage or make a connection to another flight in time to get home for the holidays.

You will leave the airport hopefully more excited that your family is just a few miles away, making your celebration easier.

The snow really put a lot of Long Islanders in the Christmas spirit on Sunday. I never go to the airport, the weather prevented me from doing that. Instead I went to a local tree lighting ceremony on the north shore, and there I found

enough Christmas spirit to make it well pass the 25th.

All the townspeople gathered there were dressed in the warmest garb they owned. There was a genuine excitement among old and young that the holiday season was upon us. The sponsors of the ceremony invited a group of senior citizens who they suspected would be lonely this time of the year, as well as a number of children from a local orphanage.

It continued to snow as the final touches were put on the tree, and finally the Christmas star placed in its proper location at the top of the tree. When everyone was finally gathered around the tree, the maintenance men turned on the electricity and this 16-foot-high spruce lit up like a glowing star in the wintery night.

Then a group of local musicians began to play Christmas carols and for the next half hour the entire town appeared to be injected into a joyful spirit of Christmas.

## Missing Persons

Nearly 2,700 people were reported missing in Nassau last year but thanks to the efforts of the county police department about 98 per cent of them have been accounted for.

The squad of detectives lead by Sergeant Detective G. Ralph Giardina keep tabs on missing persons from all over the United States.

"If we stop a man for a traffic violation here we check the National Crime Information Center via the computer to determine if someone is looking for him in Florida, or anywhere else," says Det. Sgt. Giardina.

Currently there are 80 actively missing persons in Nassau but 60 of them have been on file for a number of years, and most of them are children who have had fights with their families and decided to leave home.

"When we find these kids we sort of have to act like a social worker," says the squad leader. "If they are over 16 we are obliged by department guidelines to merely tell the parents whether they are found, but we don't give them the address. We then call the runaway and encourage them to call their parents and try to patch things up."

Besides young runaways, a great deal of the cases that the

missing persons bureau deals with are senile citizens, and mentally deficient people.

But it seems that the young runaways have the most interesting ways of leaving home.

"One wealthy 14-year-old kid from the north shore sold his motorbike and bought himself a one way ticket to Hawaii," notes Det. Sgt. Giardina.

Yet there are serious cases of missing persons on this county. The recent case of Plainview resident Shlomo Tai, the jewelry cutter who was reported missing by his wife was later found and he claimed he was kidnapped by the men who had murdered his partner in the city.

Still even when a family reports that a person is missing they do not supply the police with all the details surrounding his absence.

"It's usually one of three things," says Det. Sgt. Giardina. "Either there has been a family fight, the parents have abused their child, or the child isn't doing well in school."

But when the police arrive to take a report surrounding the missing person, families will hold back information because they consider the reason for his absence too personal even for the police to know.

Once a youngster is found who
