

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

She told the panel she was the working head of a household and mother of six who needs the facilities of a relatively inexpensive day care system in order to continue to work. She compared her social security card to the one issued to her at her local day care center, and told the Board both are

equally important documents. Many of the women who use day care center emphasized that if the Board does not change the present ruling, many women who currently hold jobs will be forced eave them and return to the welfare rolls.

CHAPTER 17) BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Article V. "Traffic Controls at Hospitals.
