## Dr. F. Hill To Retire

The Hicksville Board of Education adopted a resolution authorizing the administration to invite consultants to submit proposals concerning the selection of a new superintendent. Dr. Frederick Hill, who has held that position for the past 3 years, has announced his retirement effective the end of the school year.

The proposals would include procedures, fee schedules and other pertinent information. The Board will then determine and evaluate if a consultant will be used.

Absent from last week's brief 2-hour meeting were Trustees Iris Wolfson, Neil McCormack and Pete Fujimoto, all for personal reasons.

The Board withheld its decision to advertise for a director of pupil personnel service until the job description, which administration officials had submitted, has been revised. The Board questioned the job description, commenting it included too many functions.

President Tom Nagle commended the decision to close the district's schools on Monday January 23 because of the hazardous street conditions. He complimented Mr. Bill Becker,

Director of Buildings & Grounds, and his staff who worked 72 hours to clear the snow from school grounds, doing it "faster than the town."

Dr. Hill added that "our schools were ready to open" but unplowed streets made it impossible for buses to travel and unsafe for students. The District plans to register a protest to the Town concerning the snow removal problem.

During the public speaking session, Mrs. Shirley Smith questioned the number of snow days already used and asked if vacation days would have to be used to make-up for any days.

Dr. Hill responded that four snow days had been used and that no plans have been made to date to use any of the scheduled vacation days.

A discussion between Hicksville Congress of Teachers President Murray Goldstein and the Board on the Taylor Law transpired in connection with the January issue of the Bulletin Board. President Tom Nagle stated that the Bulletin Board presented the problems we face "as a school board." He again said that school boards have been "urged to speak out."

Mr. Goldstein, however, felt the Bulletin Board was written as a "position" of the school board.

The Board approved the award of bids for musical instruments (\$4,826.01) and for two mid-size station wagons (\$9,775.00). The old cars are to be sold and the proceeds used toward the purchase of the new cars.

Before approving the recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped, Trustee John Ayres questioned the time span from an initial request for a student evaluation to receiving recommendations. Dr. Manus Clancy, Asst. Supt., informed the Board that thirty days are allowed to receive results and thirty days to recommend action. The law also requires placing a student in the least restrictive situation.

The Board approved routine expenses; travel and conference plans and requests; adult education instructors; substitute teachers and personnel appointments.

President Tom Nagle announced that TOB Councilman Tom Clark will appear at the next board meeting, scheduled for February 15, 8 p.m., in the Administration Building.

**To The Editor:**  
Band together now Nassau residents, it's later than you think. Don't believe in crossing bridges when you come to them—prepare now.

Read with disgust "Sewer Tax" article by Fred Tuclilo, Newsday, 1/23/78.

The whole tax systems in Nassau and Suffolk Counties are a disgrace. The more you improve your home, the more you are taxed. It should be in reverse. Those who keep run down homes should be taxed more so they will vacate the area for those who will invest to maintain the area thus eliminating the possible creation of a "ghetto" type neighborhood.

Suffolk County Executive Klein stated "no tax" on sewers until "wet sewers" are in operation and at present resident owners are being taxed for sewers not even under construction. Flynn and Klein state the tax will be 60 cents per \$100 "ad valorem" plus a \$50.00 annual service (usage) charge which will undoubtedly increase considerably each year to astronomical figures.

Thus, a homeowner whose assessed value is \$4000, will have paid \$216.00 per annum sewer tax and one whose home is assessed at \$20,000 will have paid \$864.00

per annum sewer tax. A family of two owning a higher assessed home will have paid triple the amount of sewer tax than a family of 5 with less assessment value. Does this mean those in higher assessed homes have more excremental activity than others?

Bad enough an elderly couple with no children pays the same rate per \$100 for school tax as one with 4 school children, now this. I'm not against school tax as it is rated. I'm glad to pay even though I have no children in school, because I want the young to receive a better education. Educated children become educated adults and thus become a credit to their community. Understand, educated adults are not always a credit to the community—some become members of the Board of Assessment and others become political figures and thus come up with these strange "tax ideas" which hurt the average homeowners and can drive them out of the area, creating "ghost towns."

Do industrial parks and complexes and shopping centers pay school tax to the communities? Of course not. If I'm wrong, I stand corrected. Will the

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## Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

In reviewing local newspapers, I read a column by Assemblyman Lewis J. Yevoli in which he urges the Town of Oyster Bay to "Stop the rhetoric and - get down to serious business" concerning examination of snow control operations that were in effect during the snowfall of January 20, 1978. I urge that he do likewise.

I was furious to read the irresponsible comments made by this public official. I am amazed that any State official would dare comment on any municipality's snow operation in view of the facts of the State's actions on Long Island. The Oyster Bay Town Board has already informed me that it believed more was necessary on the part of the Town operation and I have been directed to reexamine the past procedure to find its failings and to develop a plan that will meet, not only the average, but the greater-than-normal snowfalls. I and the Highway Superintendent are in the process of doing just that.

But, the Assemblyman chose not to take that course. Instead of this State official looking into the State's poor performance in our Town, he chose to either demonstrate his poor memory or rely on the residents to have one. Instead of finding out why the State trucks from the Syosset Yard were dispatched en masse to New York City, while the State's expressway, parkways and turnpikes remained closed in Nassau County, the state Assemblyman seeks to attack the Town operations. And, he attacks it by claiming it was the Town's abandonment of a plan he designed that caused the Town problems in handling the snow.

In his column, the Assemblyman claims that he was the designer of the snow plan that the Town adopted in 1967 and that "THE TRUE TEST OF OUR PLAN CAME IN 1969 WHEN WE HAD A SNOWSTORM COMPARABLE TO LAST WEEKEND'S".

He apparently has a weak memory or expects people to have already forgotten about the snow operation of 1969. If his claim that his plan was used by the Town during that snowstorm is true, then I suggest he explain these newspaper headlines that followed that snowfall: "Snow-

locked Pequans Furious...  
Massapequa Post, Feb. 1969; "A Scandalous Mess", Locust Valley Leader, Feb. 1969; "TOB Seeks New Snow Fighting Methods", Farmingdale Observer, Feb. 1969; "Caso, Petito (Oyster Bay Supervisor at the time) Vows Better Techniques in Snow Fighting", Long Island Press, Feb. 1969; "Snow Removal: 'Disgrace', 'Snow Job' and 'No Show Snow Plows'", Massapequa Post, Feb. 1969.

The truth is obviously that the Town's procedures under that plan were insufficient as far as the residents were concerned. Now I have been told that our Town Board members believe that we should have a plan to give us greater capability during these heavy snows.

I would also like to point out that the plan adopted by that Town Board in 1967 or 68 was one that moved the Town away from hiring local owner-operated plowing equipment to do local streets during heavy snows and moved into equipping Town sanitation trucks with plows, something that must have been ineffective in 1969.

I still believe that the concept of using sanitation trucks has its place in Town snow procedures but I am also aware that the trucks have a limited capability that proves them effective during the average four to eight inch snowfall. What the Town Board has now directed me to do is to develop options that can be employed, not for the routine snowfalls but for those that exceed the norm. The private owner-operated equipment is one of the options we will be examining.

The Town's officials have already acted to try to bring about improvement but the State Assemblyman hasn't spoken out publicly yet about the State equipment that left Syosset heading for New York City. The

State Assemblyman has yet to look into the area where he has the responsibility and capability of bringing about improvement. I would like to suggest that he take his own words seriously and "Stop the rhetoric" by trying to bring about some positive results where he has the authority, while those in the Town are doing as much where they have authority.

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# What Happened At The Supervisors Meeting

On Monday, men and women from all parts of the county, representing groups ranging from the YMCA to the League of Women Voters told the Board of Supervisors why Nassau should have a sliding scale to determine if parents of children should be eligible to use day care centers.

It was a standing room only crowd at that meeting as speaker followed speaker, all appealing to

the Board to use their power to change the Department of Social Service ruling which makes a family ineligible for a reduced day care fee if their income is above a certain level.

Mrs. Barbra Larsen representing the Advocacy Council was the first speaker to address the Board. She told the panel she was the working head of a household and mother of six who needs the facilities of a relatively inexpensive day care system in order to continue to work.

She compared her social security card to the one issued to her at her local day care center, and told the Board both are equally important documents.

Many of the women who use day care center emphasized that if the Board does not change the present ruling, many women who currently hold jobs will be forced to leave them and return to the welfare rolls.

Beth Poole, 26, of Glen Cove is one of those women.

"I plan to fight the ruling as much as I am able," she told news reporters, "being on public assistance is a lowly way to live."

As a child cried in the audience, men and women continued to file up to the lectern to tell why the ruling should be changed.

Judith Moyers, a member of the New York State Task Force on Children, Youth, and their families and a member of the Day Care Council of Nassau County, as well as the wife of CBS news reporter Bill Moyers told the Board in her charming but assertive Texas drawl there are 75,000 working women in this county who have children under 18, and that the problem of inexpensive day care centers is not just one belonging exclusively to the poor.

## Message From Supervisor

Mother Nature hasn't been too good to Long Island these past few weeks, and our response to the elements has resulted in some worthwhile soulsearching.

Actions taken by LILCO and state and federal agencies regarding the mid-January ice storm have prompted a number of requests for formal examinations into the relative effectiveness of this response. New York's Public Service Commission, the State Senate and the federal House Government Operations Committee are among the governmental bodies that have been asked to take good, hard looks into this situation.

I have made a formal request to the PSC that reflects the thinking of many Long Island officials and homeowners - that the PSC assume an active role in requiring the undergrounding of all new power lines and in encouraging the burying of existing lines.

The worst snowstorm this area has experienced in thirty years came hard on the heels of the ice storm, much to the frustration of local residents and municipal employees who worked long hours to offset its effects.

Here in Oyster Bay, Town forces did as good a job as their counterparts in other municipalities - perhaps better than some, and not quite as effective as others. Despite our concerted effort, I believe our Town should have been in a better position to cope with this extraordinary snowfall. Homeowners and businesses in Oyster Bay deserve the best performance record. I'm disappointed that we didn't respond better, and that our response was not faster.

This view is shared by other members of the Town Board, and it is the reason why Oyster Bay's Superintendent of Highways and Commissioner of Public

# At The Town Board Meeting

The formal session of the Town Board Meeting held on Tuesday January 31st concluded at 10:20.

The 21 item agenda contained one item of Townwide, as well as, local concern.

A carryover from one year to another of a surplus is prudent administration and its practical application is manifested in circumstances such as our unexpected and prolonged series of storms, he explained.

On January 3rd, Supervisor

Colby stated, after taking his Oath of Office, that work was underway to establish the 1979 Budget and that if present costs are an indication of the future, belt tightening on all fronts will be necessary if we are to hold the line on taxes.
