Explains Proposal for Hicksville Park Complex

A series of presentations on the proposed Hicksville Community Park Complex is being conducted by members of the Hicksville Park Task Force at meetings of local community organizations, Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced.

Councilman Clark attended the Auxiliary's meeting to speak on the subject of a proposed recreational facility in Hicksville. Clark is the Town Board's Liaison with the Community Park Task Force.

"These presentations, explaining the type and estimated costs of the proposed facilities, are among the means being employed to be sure the people of Hicksville are fully informed prior to their voting on the proposal in the forthcoming referendum," Clark said.

The date for the special referendum must be set by resolution of the Town Board, Clark stated. "I expect the vote will be held sometime in early May." A brochure announcing the date and containing details on the proposed facilities and cost estimates will be given wide distribution prior to the referendum, he added.

Presentations have been scheduled for the following meetings: Willet Avenue School PTA on March 5 at 8 PM; Northeast Civic Association at the Woodland Avenue School on March 8 at 8 PM; Lee Avenue School PTA on March 16 at 8 PM; and the Veterans of Foreign Wars

Hicksville Fire Report

For the last two weeks (Feb. 12-26) Hicksville fire fighters responded to 44 alarms. There were 29 rescue calls, 11 fire calls, and 4 malicious false alarms.

Tire Center Blaze
 A general alarm was transmitted on early Feb. 22, when a passerby notice smoke pouring from the Doinos Tire Service Building at 544 Old Country Road West. The 2:31 a.m. alarm brought out 85 volunteers, 8 pieces of apparatus under Chief William Ferber. Vamps, hampered by thick smoke entered the building and found a pick-up truck inside, fully involved in flames. Quickly they moved to cut off the fire from the main tire storage area. Had the fire spread to this area, vamps would have been there for most of the day.

After the roof was vented, vamps moved in and doused the blaze. Damage was kept to a minimum and the owners were able to remain open.

30G House Fire
 A fast-moving blaze gutted the kitchen area of a house at 166 Division Ave. on Sun., Feb. 26. The alarm was reported by a passing police unit. Nine pieces of apparatus, 85 vamps responded under Chief Ferber. The fire generated a large amount of heat and smoke which caused vamps to take a beating searching for four victims reported to be inside. A complete search fortunately turned up no one. Some of the damage was attributed to vamps such as broken windows. The dwelling had many rooms to be searched and to do so windows

were taken out as fast as possible, to release the heat and smoke to speed up the search.

Often firefighters are criticized for breaking windows and cutting holes in the roof. These actions require a lot of work and are done only when necessary. Before conditions are stable enough to allow vamps inside the smoke and heat must be driven out. However, the Fire Dept. does not encourage citizens to open doors and windows before their arrival because without a hose line ready to attack the fire, air could spread the fire rapidly and cause more damage and perhaps trap

the occupants. Vamps consider the damage done breaking windows or opening the roof minor in comparison to the life of anyone trapped or working inside.

Vamps Aid Bethpage Fire Dept.
 Late Friday, Feb. 24, Hicksville firefighters assisted Bethpage firefighters in a spectacular blaze at the Command Lincoln and Mercury showrooms on Hicksville Rd., just outside of Hicksville. The fire destroyed a portion of the auto dealership and many new luxury autos. Cause of the blaze, which had flames as high as 100' in the air, is under investigation.

Purcell Appointments

Nassau County Executive Francis T. Purcell has named a businessman from North Hempstead Town and a planner from the Oyster Bay Town to fill two vacancies on the county Board of Assessors.

Named to succeed the North Hempstead Town member of the panel is Thomas T. Pierce, 55, of Roslyn. He fills a vacancy created by the resignation of Francis F. Doran.

Appointed to be the new Oyster Bay Town member is Arthur H. Eyer, also 55, of Plainview. Eyer is superintendent of planning for Oyster Bay Town and executive secretary of the Oyster Bay Planning Advisory Board. He served for 15 years as a member of the Oyster Bay Town Board of Zoning Appeals. He succeeds Angelo D. Roncallo, who was elected last November to the New York State Supreme Court. The Pierce and Eyer appointments are effective March 7, 1978.

The five-member Board of Assessors is responsible for all policy as it relates to property tax assessment. The board holds administrative hearings for review of property tax assessments, makes field inspections of various properties throughout the county and serves as the backbone of the department's speakers bureau. In addition, its members sit on the various subcommittees of the newly formed revaluation task force. Its members are paid \$26,006 annually.

The Board of Assessment Review meets monthly throughout the year and on a daily basis from May to July to hear assessment grievance cases. Its members are paid \$13,163 annually.

These appointments are subject to confirmation by the Nassau County Board of Supervisors at their March 6 meeting.

County Sailing Program

Though ice-boating may be more appropriate to the season, Nassau's Department of Recreation and Parks is already awash in plans for an expanded Sailing Program for County residents age 14 and over, at three of its facilities.

Added to the basic instruction to be offered this summer at Bay Park in East Rockaway, North Woodmere park, and Hempstead Harbor Beach Park in Port Washington, is a new course in intermediate sailing and a special program for handicapped adults, all available on a first-come, first-served basis.

At The Town Board

The Town Board convened at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, February 28th with a 97 item calendar as the day's business.

METROHOUSE CONSTRUCTORS, INC. was the petitioner on the opening item who were applying for a change of zone from A Residence District to B-A Residence at Woodbury, NY.

The location is 104 acres north of Woodbury Road opposite the Avery Road entrance on Woodbury Road.

The requested change is for one (1) acre residential from two (2) acres that would permit the construction of 88 homes. The attorney for the applicant was Myron Kanter.

The hearing was continued that evening at 6:00 p.m. and concluded at 12:30 a.m.

Representatives of North Woodbury Civic Association, The Gates Civic Association and the South Woodbury Taxpayers Association all spoke relative to the petition.

Public response was in majority opposed to the granting.

The second item on the agenda was the application of Mid-Island Shopping Plaza Company for special permission to construct, maintain and operate an addition to Nathan's Restaurant. The new facility would have an increase in capacity of 80 people as well as house 50 coin operated amusement type machines.

Judy Jacobs and Sarah Middelendorff spoke relative to item '6' "off street parking requirement." The major point of contention was that the requirements for parking spaces for a warehouse were minimal but in the event the tenant moves and is replaced by an organization that normally would require more spaces there wouldn't be any area left. The board reassured the audience that such a move

would require their approval on a special use permit especially if the change was to office space.

ITEM No. 15 was rescheduling of the Hearing of Thrift Auto Body, Hicksville, NY to March 7th.

ITEM No. 16 was rescheduling of the Hearing of Institute of Physics applying for driveway and entrance from Sunnyside, Boulevard, date set is March 14th.

ITEM No. 17 was rescheduling of the Hearing of Rechler, Rechler and Blumenfeld for special use permit to use Industrial H for office use at Jericho Turnpike and Michael Drive, Syosset. Hearing date set for March 7th.

ITEM No. 19 was a resolution establishing a hearing date of March 21st relative to the petition of Smith and Franchise Realty for special permission to erect, use and maintain a McDonald's Restaurant in an F Business District at East Norwich, west side Pine Hollow Road and Hawthorne Road.

ITEM No. 26 was a resolution that increased basic services. Safety Improvements on Juneau Boulevard, Woodbury, Establishment of a wider drop curb.

ITEM No. 28 authorized an increase in expenditures of legal fees relative to the appeal by T.O.B. to the recent court decision on the Acquisition through Condemnation of the Bruce Estate, Syosset.

ITEM No. 42 and 43 was rescheduling of the Hearing date to March 7th on two (2) petitions of Gilbert Tiles for special use permit to construct, maintain and use one-story office building in IND H District, Woodbury.

ITEM No. 44 was rescheduling of petition of Marriott Corporation and Plainview Shopping Center for Roy Rogers type restaurant on South Oyster Bay Road, 420 feet south of Woodbury Road. The new date is March 7th.

The County Supervisors' Meeting

LEVITTOWN

The county board of supervisor Monday approved a map showing easements to be acquired for sanitary sewers. The area involved is on the north side of Hempstead-Farmingdale Turnpike between Wantagh and Berger Ave.

Also along the north side of the turnpike from Stewart Ave. and easterly to Seaford-Oyster Bay Expressway.

Hicksville-Levittown

Land is also to be acquired for sanitary sewer purposes, on the north side of Old Country Road from Charlotte Ave., easterly for about 424 feet, and from Old Country Road southerly to Acre Lane; and on the west side of Levittown Parkway for about 152 feet south of Stewart Ave, and then northerly to Arrow Lane.

PLAINVIEW

The County Board of Supervisors Monday also approved the action authorizing the county to acquire easements for sanitary sewers along Central Park Road from Old Country Road in a southerly direction for 1320 feet and along Gerhard Road east from Old Country Road in a southerly direction for 382 feet.

In other action at the meeting David Peirez, the unsuccessful county executive candidate appeared before the panel and exchanged political blows with County Executive Fran Purcell, vice-chairman Armand D'Amato, and North Hempstead Supervisor Michael Tully.

Mr. Peirez attacked the county

executive's decision to close the Museum of Fine Arts on the former Frick Estate in Roslyn Harbor.

Mr. Peirez criticized Mr. Purcell for being on the board of supervisors when the museum opened in early 1975 which he said refused to appropriate funds for maintenance and to upgrade the condition of the facility.

Mr. Purcell invited Mr. Peirez to join him and the board after the meeting on a bus trip to the museum for a general inspection of conditions there.

Soon after Mr. D'Amato and Mr. Tully joined the discussion and accused Mr. Peirez of only coming before the board when their is a political seat available in the county.

The Great Neck businessman denied reports that the north shore residents were "elitist snobs" who did not care about the facility.

It is estimated that it would take \$500,000 to restore the museum to a point where it would be safe to keep art within its confines, and have people visit it.

There have been allegations that the building is a fire trap, but Mr. Peirez claims the fire marshal has said this is not true.

"When I visited the building parts of it were locked off from the public," said Mr. Purcell. "It took us a while to find the maintenance man to let us in. Then we found water running down pass a Picasso painting. If it were destroyed no amount of money would be able to replace it."

Mr. Purcell assured Mr. Peirez that a complete investigation into the operation of the museum is underway, and that the

irregularities he has discovered so far may only be the "tip of the iceberg," relative to what they may find in the near future.
