Hicksville Fire Report

For the last two weeks (Feb. 12-26) Hicksville fire fighters responded to 44 alarms. There were 29 rescue calls, 11 fire calls and 4 malicious false alarms.

Tire Center Blaze A general alarm was tran-smitted on early Feb. 22, when a passerby notice smoke pouring from the Doinos Tire Service Building at 544 Old Country Road West. The 2:31 a.m. alarm brought out 85 volunteers, 8 pieces of apparatus under Chief William Ferber. Vamps, ham-pered by thick probe selected the pered by thick smoke entered the pered by thick smoke entered the building and found a pick-up-truck inside, fully involved in flames. Quickly they moved to cut off the fire from the main tire storage area. Had the fire spread

to this area, vamps would have been there for most of the day. After the roof was vented, vamps moved in and doused the blaze. Damage was kept to a minimum and the owners were

able to remain open.

30G House Fire
A fast-moving blaze gutted the
kitchen area of a house at 166
Division Ave. on Sun., Feb. 26.
The alarm was reported by a
passing police unit. Nine pieces of
apparatus. 85 vamps responded. passing ponce unit. Nine pieces of apparatus, 85 vamps responded under Chief Ferber. The fire generated a large amount of heat and smoke which caused vamps to take a beating searching for four victims reported to be inside. A complete search for-tunately turned up no one. Some of the damage was attributed to vamps such as broken windows. The dwelling had many rooms to be searched and to do so windows

were taken out as fast as possible, to release the heat and smoke to speed up the search.

Often firefighters are critized for breaking windows and cutting holes in the roof. These actions require a lot of work and are done require a lot of work and are one only when necessary. Before conditions are stable enough to allow vamps inside the smoke and heat must be driven out. However, the Fire Dept. does not encourage citizens to open doers and windows before their arrival because without a hose line ready to attent the fire rais results. to attack the fire, air could spread the fire rapidly and cause more damage and perhaps trap

the occupants. Vamps consider the damage done breaking windows or opening the roof minor in comparison to the life of anyone trapped or working in-side.



The Town Board convened at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, February 28th with a 97 item calendar as

the day's business.
METROHOUSE CONSTRUC-METHOHOUSE CONSTRUC-TORS, INC. was the petitioner on the opening item who were apply-ing for a change of zone from A Residence District to B-A Residence at Woodbury, NY.

The location is 104 acres north of Woodbury Road opposite the Avery Road entrance on Wood-bury Road.

The requested change is for one (1) acre residential from two (2) acres that would permit the construction of 88 homes. The attorney for the applicant was Myron Kanter.



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
