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Board Sets June 21 For School Budget Vote

The Hicksville Board of Education adopted a resolution at its meeting last week setting June 21 as the annual meeting and school budget vote to be held at the seven election districts. (See legal notice for particulars.) June 7 is the date set for the public hearing on the budget, which will be held in the senior high auditorium at 8:15 p.m. Registration will be held at the election districts on June 14 from 3-8 p.m.

Nominating petitions for school board vacancies are now available from the district clerk, Mrs. Marie Egan, at the administration building. A separate petition is required to nominate a candidate to each separate office and must be signed by 153 qualified voters of the district. This represents 5% of the number of voters who voted in the previous annual meeting. Petitions are due on May 22, between 9 and 5 p.m. On May 23, a drawing will be held for position of the candidates on the ballot.

The vacancies to be filled are three-three year terms (ending June 30, 1981) currently held by Cornelius McCormack, John Ayres and Bill Bennett.

The Board adopted a policy code change, which entitles senior citizens 65 years old to free tuition to adult education classes. Persons 60-64 years old with handicapping conditions could also have tuition waived at the discretion of the adult education director.

After a lengthy discussion on a motion to amend Board policy on the complicated Freedom of Information Act as it pertains to tapes, Trustee Bill Bennett withdrew his motion. The discussion included a recommendation by Superintendent Fred Hill that a

small cassette could be purchased and a copy of Board meetings be taped simultaneously with the original taped by the district clerk. There would be a need however, to change the cassette tapes during the meeting.

Mr. Bennett discussed the library's procedure of loaning cassette tapes in which the original tape is kept; a copy is made on the spot; and this copy must then be brought back in one week. Borrowers must also have a library card.

Vice President John Ayres pointed out that "we are not addressing ourselves to the original specific request," in which the Hicksville Congress of Teachers requested copies of the tapes of Board meetings and also asked the cost of such taped copies. Mr. Ayres asked central administration for a dollar figure for this request which would include the cost of materials and the cost of the method to be used.

Mr. Bennett was to meet with Dr. Hill and discuss possible recommendations to submit for Board approval.

The Board was presented with a plaque by Peter Collins, President, Hicksville American Soccer Club, for its support in the program. Also honored were Mr. Dick Hogan, Director of Athletics, and Mr. Bill Becker, Director of Buildings and Grounds.

In presenting the plaques, Mr. Collins spoke of the 1,100 children ages 5-19, who participated in the program. He also applauded the "support of the schools and community," in this activity.

During the public speaking session, Mr. Max Josephs, math consultant, reported on the results of the recent PEP scores (Pupil Evaluation Program) in the math area. The tests are given to all third and sixth

graders in New York State. In a five-year overview, Hicksville students have made "great strides" in three of four areas, according to Mr. Josephs. On the third grade level, 4% scored in the lower range, compared to 11% in 1973. Also, in the sixth grade, 12% scored in the lower range, a great improvement over the 1976 figure of 20%.

Also, 38% of our third graders scored in the high range compared to 25% in 1973. In the sixth grade, 23% scored in the higher range compared to 19% in 1976.

The Board voted to delete \$2,000 from code 433 (auxiliary police) and add the figure to code 168 (security). The vote also discontinues the services of the auxiliary police for one year. Voting no to the motion were Messrs. Ayres, McCormack and Bennett. President Tom Nagle informed Chief Dom Lopedote, who was present and took part in the discussion on the matter, that "we appreciate your services" but the action was taken "due to the arrangement of availability and the cost." Mr. Becker indicated he would use hourly employees at the times required.

In other business, the Board approved routine expenses, retirements, appointments and school hours for special education classes for 1978-79. The Board also approved all but one conference and travel plans and requests after a brief executive session requested by Trustee Neil McCormack.

The Board will hold a public budget study session on May 8, 8:15 p.m. in the conference room of the administration building. Code 2000, staffing, will be the item discussed.

The next business meeting of the Board is scheduled for May 10, 8:15 p.m. in the conference room of the administration building.

He will also be deeply involved in Odyssey House Institute's present efforts to combat the growing trend in the United States toward child abuse and child pornography.

The entire H.A.D. organization wishes John Maniec much success in his future endeavors. At this same April 20th board meeting, the H.A.D. Board of Directors unanimously endorsed Mr. Maniec's recommendation and approved one of H.A.D.'s present part-time certified social workers as their next Executive

Director. Chosen to replace Mr. Maniec will be Mr. Alfred Peck, C.S.W. Mr. Peck has been a paid part-time employee of H.A.D. since July 1972 and he is currently a licensed Therapist in New York State. The H.A.D. Board of Directors are very excited at the prospects of Mr. Peck assuming the leadership role of the H.A.D. agency and they look forward to an expansion of services to more needy Hicksville residents under his guidance.

The H.A.D. Board is also happy to announce the recent internal promotion of Mrs. Meryl Fischer from full-time counselor to H.A.D. Program Director. Mrs. Fischer has been employed at the H.A.D. agency for over three years and possesses a Masters degree in Counseling. She is a very gifted individual who will surely excel at this important administrative position.

RESIDENTS OF EAST AVENUE in Hicksville are circulating a petition against a proposition that would turn East Avenue from a one-way street into a two-way street. Residents feel the street is too narrow to handle the flow of two-way traffic, and in addition, there is a proposition to add additional office buildings on Old Country Road. Traffic from the Unemployment Building onto West Avenue is already heavy. Old Country Road School is only a short distance away and people are concerned about the safety of children traveling to and from school on the side streets, especially if the two-way ruling is passed, making from a more hazardous condition for the children. Plans are being made to formulate a letter to Supervisor Joseph Colby protesting these propositions. We agree with the facts which these petitions will present.

In PLAINVIEW a matter is being protested regarding the fact that Topic House Drug Center which is presently situated in Mitchell Field, is being moved by COUNTY OFFICIALS, to county-owned property in Plainview. Supervisor Colby has already protested this proposed move. However, the 146 acre Plainview property upon which the Topic House will soon operate, is owned by the County, so no vote is planned or apparently necessary. It is reported that up to 75 drug addicts will reside in the staff house presently existing on this County property. We have been informed that if this move isn't made Topic House would lose \$600,000 in funds from NY State, so that is the reason for the move. We are not quite sure at this point to whom those interested should protest, but it appears that County Executive Francis Purcell, and his administration in Mineola, would be at least the right place to start. More on this later.

Letters To The Editor

An Open Letter to the People of Hicksville:

As concerned parents and community members we have met with the Board of Education, central administration and the principals of the Hicksville School District to discuss the possible ramifications of proposed staff cuts due to a deficit in the 1978-79 school budget. It is estimated that approximately 35 teachers will be dismissed throughout the district. Unfortunately, because of the concept of "district averaging" some classes will be beyond an acceptable number for efficient teaching. We have been told that because of the present tenure and labor laws, it is possible that some teachers at the secondary schools may have to teach classes out of their major areas of certification. It would seem hard to justify the use of a teacher proficient in social studies as a math instructor. In addition, cuts in staff will necessitate major reorganization and some outback of various programs, such as music and physical education.

Services in the past have been diminished and curtailed to keep the tax rate at a stable level. For example, the Hicksville School District no longer has Primary Learning Centers, pilot math and science programs, summer school and recreation, certain subject area supervisors and assistant principals in the elementary schools. For some of these cuts, adequate evaluations were not made until after the

programs were already dropped. We are only just beginning to find out what some of the consequences are to our children and the Hicksville taxpayers due to some of these cutbacks.

Through retention of staff we have instituted a variety of additional programs to benefit our students - helping math, additional remedial reading, CORE curriculum in the high school, and a modified learning mode (MLM) program in the Junior High.

While some cuts may be necessary and warranted, we would like to see further study and evaluation of all aspects involved in a reduction of staff and services before any drastic measures are taken.

We have been informed that the school budget will have a deficit of between \$1,400,000 and \$2,000,000 due to the rise in the cost of living and our very high level of inflation. It is impossible for us to continue with a "no growth" budget (no rise in school taxes) without a large reduction in staff. Such a reduction would mean that parents may have to look elsewhere for an adequate education for their children. Needless to say, Hicksville, for many people, could become a less desirable place in which to live and learn.

As citizens of this community, we feel strongly that we have a responsibility to provide a good QUALITY education for the children of Hicksville. A small increase of tax money spent now will save spending so much more

later. Support your schools. Support the School Budget.

I received many questions after my last article and a great percentage were asking information about conditions of the feet. I will try to give you the pertinent facts about nail conditions and care.

The most common conditions are the fungus and ingrown nail and callus in the nail groove.

Nails do not thicken and become discolored because we are getting older. This is due to a fungus germ which enters under the nail and caused an infection of the nail bed which in turn causes the nail plate to thicken and discolor. Pain may be present wearing closed shoes. The person usually wears closed shoes because they are embarrassed to use open shoes. Treatment is by means of internal and external medication. A nail culture will determine the exact fungus infecting the nail. A culture is essential because other conditions can simulate a fungus nail (Psoriasis or Thyroid condition).

Ingrown nail is due to the pressure of the nail plate against the soft nail flap. Normal cutting of the nail will elevate the discomfort. Normal cutting is straight across never never cut down the side of the nail this can cause an infected toe which will require removal of an entire side of the nail to open and drain the abscess caused by your improper cutting. If you insist on cutting your ingrown nail then be sure your vision is 20-20, your a contortionist and you have a sterile nail clipper. Do not cut past the loose end of the nail at the nail tip.

The callus nail groove is a build up of callus between the nail plate and nail flap. If you feel this is your problem put peroxide in the nail groove and wipe out with gauze or cotton.

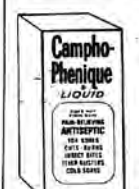


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Parola's Campaign Gets Early Start

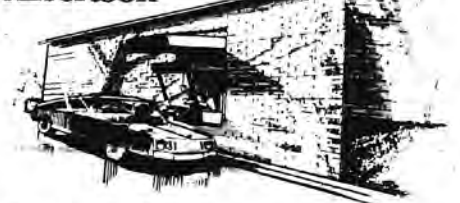
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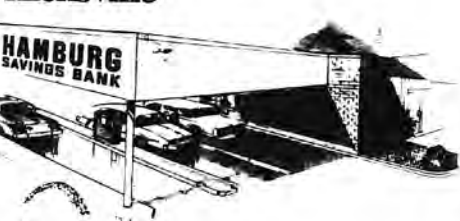
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
