Last Sunday At Holy Trinity Church

Striking his staff three times against the closed doors of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, Hicksville, and demanding entrance, the Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Long Island, The Right Reverend Robert C. Witcher, began the solemn and beautiful service of Consecration of the new Church building. With a trumpet fanfare setting forth the joy of the occasion, bagpipers led a procession of choristers, Wardens and Vestrymembers, Religious and the Clergy with their Acolytes around the Church and to their places. Reginald Heber's famous and beautiful hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty" was sung with full voices by choir and congregation. The service continued with solemn prayers, congregational singing and the Episcopal Consecration of the building with the Bishop claiming "this place for Christ crucified, who is the First and the Last, and the Lord of all." Having waited for many years for this occasion, the Rector of the Church, The Reverend Domenic K. Cinaella, responded quickly to the Bishop's order to read the Sentence of Consecration. With a strong voice he began, "In the Name of God. Amen."

Haydn's tune to "Glorious things of thee are spoken, Zion, city of our God." Just before the Bishop dismissed the congregation with his blessing the bagpiper's wail began the strains of "Amazing Grace." Before the last Amen was sung, Father Ciannella returned from the procession to the entrance of the sanctuary and stood before the congregation. Lifting up his hands, the final strains of Amen led into a large burst of joy and applause. The moment was electric. The sustained cheers of the congregation prohibited Father Ciannella from accomplishing his original purpose which was to

introduce the honored guests. This was attempted, however, at the champagne reception following in the auditorium.

Library Trusteeship

Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library Trustee Michael Polansky, was one of three guest panelists at the May 17 Nassau Suffolk Library Institute Program "Trusteeship: The Nuts and Bolts of It". Mr. Polansky, who has served as a Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library Trustee for six years, spoke on the relationship between the Library Trustee and the community he or she serves. He pointed specifically to the need for two-way communication between the Library and all segments of the public. "We have got a responsibility to find out what is going on in our community, to keep abreast of community affairs generally, and try and relate them to the specific interests and activities of the Library," he observed. "As

Trustees, it is not sufficient that we be merely 'Library conscious.' We must be 'community conscious' as well, and especially conscious that the community extends beyond the prime users and staunch supporters and friends of the Library." The other panelists were West Isip Library Trustee Dr. Eugene Harple, who spoke on the relationship between the Library Trustee and the Library Director, and Syosset Library Trustee Shirley Lang, who spoke on the topic of what motivates the Library Trustee. The panel was moderated by Plainview-Old Bethpage Reference Librarian Leonore Dusold, who is also a Trustee in Huntington. The program was well received by a capacity of Trustees, Library Directors, and Staff.

Rescue Two In Cave-In

An off-duty police officer called Hicksville firefighters to his home at 18 Ketcham Rd., when a cesspool caved in on a worker. The alarm came in May 22 at 12:32 p.m. Workers from MD Cesspool Co. of Hicksville were finishing up a new cesspool adjacent to the old one. One worker, Joseph McBride, 23, of Hicksville was down inside the new cesspool when the walls of the old pool collapsed flooding the new one. As the homeowner called Vamps, Fred Corodo, 27, of Lindenhurst, went down to help his co-worker. Meanwhile, Vamps at the nearby quarters of Engine Co. 2, upon hearing the alarm stowed rescue equipment in a private van and raced to the scene. (Their apparatus was out of service for a few hours due to fuel pump problems.) Hicksville Chiefs credit the quick actions of these Vamps in saving both victims. One Vamp, Thomas Sullivan, a 6 year member of Co. 2, at great risk to his own life entered the cesspool, attached a life line on one of the victims and with the help of other fast arriving Vamps, removed him from the pool. Both workers suffered from inhalation of methane gas. The Plainview Fire Dept. assisted with one ambulance. Sullivan, who wore no protective breathing apparatus because it wouldn't fit in the hole, and several other Vamps were advised by the Department Surgeon, Dr. Banik, to get tetanus shots as a precaution. The victims are doing OK at local hospitals in Plainview and Syosset. The Chiefs stated it was a very remarkable heroic rescue

and commended Hicksville Vamps and others at the scene who assisted. **Fire Alarm Report** During the period May 8 through May 22, Hicksville firefighters responded to 59 alarms. There were 6 malicious false alarms, 25 fire calls, and 28 rescue calls. **Fire Report**

I will again run for my seat on the Board of Education - it has been a fast hectic year, full of hard decisions, and many pleasant experiences. The pace of being a board member is intense, and requires hard work, and many long hours of research and study. I have attended almost all of the public and special meetings of the board, and have participated in the countless number of study sessions and briefings. Much was learned on my part and I now want to apply that knowledge and experience to practical use for the next three years.

My interest in the destiny of our children in the pursuit of their educational endeavors is the core of my thinking and outlook. For our children will be the generation of tomorrow that will maintain the growth of our Great Republic. I have had the privilege of serving you this past year as a board member and am now ready to serve a full term and apply what I have learned to the betterment of Hicksville and our school district.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$507,350 SERIAL BONDS AND \$26,700 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONS TO CERTAIN TOWN BUILDINGS.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, is the construction of additions to the following described buildings of said Town, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purposes for which such additions will be used:

- a) Highway Department Building, at a maximum estimated cost of \$479,000; and
- b) Sign Bureau Building, at a maximum estimated cost of \$55,000.

Section 2. The total estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$534,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) By the issuance of \$507,300 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the Local Finance Law, of which \$455,050 shall be allocated to the item set forth in paragraph a of Section 1 of this resolution, and

\$52,250 shall be allocated to the item set forth in paragraph b of such Section; and

b) By the issuance of \$26,700 capital notes of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law, of which \$23,950 shall be allocated for the item set forth in paragraph a of Section 1 of this resolution, and \$2,750 shall be allocated for the item set forth in paragraph b of such Section. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale, and all further powers in connection with the details and sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and of interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal and of interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. 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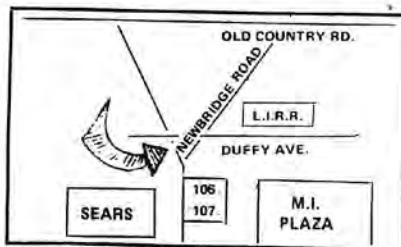
