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**One Week Away**

With just a little more than a week away, the Labor Day Committee has received 25 applications for competition in the Fiftieth Annual Labor Day Parade and Drill.

This year's festivities have been altered to allow two separate tournaments. On Sunday, Sept. 3, members of the 9th Battalion will compete in the Old Fashion Tournament. The Old Fashion events, which feature manpower as opposed to machinery, will begin at noon and the competition will include, Hicksville Bethpage, Carle Place, Farmingdale, Jericho, Plainview, Westbury and South Farmingdale.

Following the Old Fashion Tournament and beginning at 5 p.m., the Fiftieth Annual Labor Day Parade will step-off from the front of Headquarters at

Gebhardt Plaza. The Hicksville Fire Dept. under the direction of Chief William Ferber, will go down West Marie St., turn south at Jerusalem Ave. Enroute toward Old Country Rd., it will be joined by six divisions which will include approximately 30 departments. The parade will east on Old Country Rd. and then turn north on Broadway, up to East Barclay St., the parade will continue east on Woodbury Rd. and then turn north on Bethpage Rd., where it will turn into the Water District Property and continue down the course and under the arch.

On hand Sunday night will be refreshments and a block party to accommodate the anticipated crowd. The St. Ignatius Girls Cadet Corp will be entertaining the audience as well the Com-

machie Raiders following the parade.

On Monday, Sept. 4, beginning at 9 a.m., the Fiftieth Annual Labor Day Drill will begin. There are 25 departments scheduled to compete in the annual tournament, according to the Chairman Pat Scanlon and three people will be honored by the committee. Henry Schnepf, who was Chief 1919 to 1921, Jack Leckie who ironically was a member of the Glen Cove Fire Dept. through 1930 and competed against the Hicks in the First Annual Labor Day, and Elsie Callahan, the resident dispatcher of many fire calls.

The officers and members of the Hicksville Fire Dept. are pleased to present their Fiftieth Annual Labor Day and look forward to having you share it with us.

## Raquet Ball Club Hearing On Sept. 26

Upon formal request of the attorneys for Clip Clop Stables Inc., the Oyster Bay Town Board postponed the hearing date of an application for a special use permit to allow the operation of an indoor raquetball club in Hicksville.

The hearing, which was to have been held on August 15, 1978, was

postponed until September 26th, when the attorneys requested an adjournment because an expert witness could not be available for the original date.

"Although we find it most disturbing to schedule a hearing and then be asked for a cancellation at the last minute," Town Councilman Thomas Clark commented, "the courts

have made it clear that we would not have the right to force the applicant to proceed on the originally scheduled date."

Clark said that the application for a 10-court club on property adjoining the Town parking field on Table and Barter Lanes, will be scheduled for a 10 AM hearing in the hearing room of Town Hall East in Oyster Bay.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 11 GARBAGE, LITTER AND WASTE - BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, that

Article V of Chapter 11, Garbage, Litter and Waste, of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, be and the same is hereby amended by adding a new Division 4, Litter Receptacles in Private Parking Lots, Sec. 11-122. Definitions. Litter - shall mean "garbage" and "rubbish" as defined hereinafter: Rubbish - shall mean nonputrescible solid wastes consisting of both combustible and noncombustible wastes, such as paper, handbills, placards, posters, wrappings, cigarettes, cardboard, cups, cans, wood, glass, plastic and similar materials. Garbage shall mean putrescible animal and vegetable wastes resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking and consumption of food. Parking Lot - shall mean any privately owned parking facility with spaces for more than ten (10) vehicles and which serves a retail establishment in the Town of Oyster Bay including, but not limited to, shopping centers, department stores, shops, stores and fast food restaurants. Authorized Litter Receptacle - shall mean a litter storage and collection receptacle larger than ten (10) gallons in volume capacity but less than thirty (30) gallons in volume capacity. Sec. 11-123. Litter Receptacles Requirements. (a) The owner of a parking lot with a capacity of less than one hundred (100) parking spaces and which serves any commercial establishment, other than a fast food restaurant, shall install one

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

Dear Governor Carey:

I am certain you are aware of the unique and devastating effects the Plainview area encountered as a result of Saturday's (8-13) minitornado and torrential rains as confirmed by the U.S. Weather Bureau.

The intensity of the storm centered around the Industrial Park, and struck several commercial buildings on Dupont Street. Fortunately, it occurred during the weekend when hundreds of employees were at home. At least four buildings were partially demolished when roofs were torn off and walls collapsed. These buildings have been condemned for occupancy and restoration will take approximately three to six months. In the meantime, hundreds of employees' jobs are jeopardized as are principals whose

businesses are interrupted.

The storm was not limited to the aforementioned area, other communities were also affected.

I am requesting that your office give every consideration to designating those areas of Long Island which were severely impacted by the storm as "Disaster Areas". By taking such action you will allow those communities and businesses to seek any federal assistance which may be forthcoming.

I have already visited the Plainview area and I will be available to assist your office in any way possible in this critical situation.

## Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

The American Institute of Architects report on downtown Hicksville's G-1 Zone is ridiculous; however, it does include one good point.

The continuation of Duffy Avenue straight through to meet East Marie Street at Broadway has some merit when considered in conjunction with the closing of some small streets to allow the assembling of large parcels of land for development.

The report is extremely slanted in its opinion trying to jam high rise, low income apartments down our throats. In 1971, the residents of Hicksville came out in force and told the then Town Board, "We do not want high rise apartments." My advice to the seven-member Task Force is to take their ten-story high rise buildings and stick 'em up in their own home town.

Let me make a quick review of this concoction of psychological garbage.

The attack on Hicksville begins by telling us that we have all types of traffic congestion. The truth is that these non-residents of Hicksville are annoyed because they cannot drive ninety miles an hour through our town, or because the ingress and egress to the MTA's railroad station was poorly laid out by a task force or development group who jammed it down our throats, causing the traffic congestion.

Hicksville has approximately 50,000 residents, a large suburban area; that's just fine. We do not want a New York City in our community.

These experts say that ten-story apartments generate no additional cars; all the residents can take a bus to wherever. Why not put the ten-story monsters in the experts' towns and let buses and taxis do the transporting? I am sure that taxi service would be available. Hicksville has no magic hold on taxis.

The Task Force goes on to claim the land to be too expensive for office buildings and the area too congested. I guess that we are to expect apartment builders to be given the land free, and the nonsense about apartment dwellers not owning cars is too much to swallow. Take a look at Lefrak City.

The idea is then expanded to building the monsters higher, thereby lowering the rents and destroying our town and whatever is left of our suburban community by instituting low income apartments.

I did not ask for this report. I did not select the Task Force. I disagree 95% with the report and strongly recommend that, if they want high rise monsters, then build them in their own area.

As expected, Mr. Yevoli, in response to my "blast for his failure to take any action to move Assembly Bill No. 12387," which bill guarantees that no school district in New York State would receive less than a 3% increase in operational aid for the 1978-79 fiscal year" resorted to his oft used political stratagem of seeking to mask his ineffectiveness, by placing the blame elsewhere.

He was most concerned, it seemed, with what he characterized as "partisan bickering" that might upset the local bipartisan support the bill enjoys. He needn't concern himself about that. I am certain that the Republican legislators in the Assembly will continue to support this bill which has already been adopted under Republican leadership in the Republican controlled Senate. It's the support from his own Democrat party, the party that controls the Assembly, that he needs, but which he can't and will not get. That's the point he should have kept in mind when he voted for and praised Carey's budget.

Under Carey's budget 96% of the total \$140 million school aid increase will go to communities outside Long Island despite the fact that we pay one of the largest shares of revenues to the State Education Fund. And even prior to that time, when he voted to put control of the State Assembly in the hands of Stanley Steingut, a

man from New York City, whom Mr. Yevoli should have known would have as his primary concern the interests of his New York City constituency and not Long Islanders. All of the vigor he can now muster in support of the bill is meaningless in light of the fact that he rendered himself powerless by his previous votes.

Yevoli apparently feels that gathering petitions is an effective way to influence governmental action inasmuch as he has been devoting much time lately to that task. Why then did he not gather petitions to force Governor Carey and the New York City oriented Democrat Assembly to act affirmatively on the bill, or is Yevoli's petition gathering merely just another of his ways of getting his picture in the papers?

The public is tired of elected officials who specialize in headline hunting, who harp on a cause for its publicity value, fan its flame and then, when it can no longer be exploited, promptly forget it. Yevoli will nevertheless continue to run around waving copies of the bill with his name on it as chief sponsor. Maybe someone ought to remind him that only sponsoring a bill is no accomplishment.



**Free-Standing Sign:** A sign and sign support structure that is permanently placed and not attached to, or part of, a building.  
**Identification Sign:** A sign containing only the name, address and identifying symbol or device of a business, industry, service, eleemosynary institution, or other similar agency.  
**Illuminated Sign:** A sign which is illuminated by an artificial source of light either internally, externally, or by luminous tubing as an integral part of the sign.

**Leading Edge:** The edge or portion of a sign or sign support structure nearest to that property line from which a minimum setback shall be measured.

**Motor Fuel Sales Sign:** A sign advertising the selling price of motor fuel in accordance with Chapter 538 of the New York General Business Law, to be placed on the individual pump or other dispensing device for motor fuel.  
**Petroleum Product Canopy Sign:** A sign advertising only the brand name or symbol of one (1) manufacturer or distributor of petroleum products.

**Petroleum Product Identification Sign:** A sign advertising only the brand name or symbol of one (1) manufacturer or distributor of petroleum products.

**Petroleum Product Price Sign:** A sign advertising only the prices of petroleum products.

**Polygon:** A closed plane figure bounded by straight lines.

**Sign:** Any name, identification, description, pictorial matter,



device, material, flag, pennant, fluttering matter, illustration or illumination that may contain colors, letters, numbers or symbols, which are affixed to or painted, represented or otherwise installed on any part of a building, structure or otherwise placed in view of the general public, such illustration directing attention to, or otherwise advertising or announcing, or acting as an attention-directing device with relation to a person, institution, organization, activity, place, object, product or business.

**Sign Area:** The surface area measurement of a sign installation shall include the background area of the sign when computed by standard mathematical formulas for known or common shapes. Irregular shapes, independent letters, numbers, symbols, devices, or illustrations, shall be determined by measuring the smallest polygon which encloses all of the said shapes, letters, numbers, symbols, devices or illustrations, as they are intended to be displayed.

**Sec. 126 Signs Permitted in All Districts Without Permits**

The following signs are permitted in any building zone district without a sign permit.

- (a) Danger or cautionary signs relating to a premises; notices required by law or legal proceeding; or directional, directory, and announcement signs, when installed by a public agency or authority.
- (b) Danger or cautionary signs relating to a premises; notices required by law or legal proceedings; illuminated directional signs at the entrance or exit to an off-street parking

facility; when installed by other than a public agency or authority; said signs not to exceed four (4) square feet.

(c) One (1) sign identifying a permitted home occupation not more than two (2) square feet in area, bearing only the name and profession of a resident practitioner, and shall be non-illuminated except for a sign indicating the office of a physician.

(d) One (1) "For Sale" or "For Rent" sign, not larger than four (4) square feet in area, advertising only the property on which the sign is placed when located in Residential Districts. In all other zones, signs shall not exceed sixteen (16) square feet. Information on the sign may include: the offering price, the telephone number and firm name of one (1) real estate broker. Such sign shall contain no more than three (3) colors including the background and shall be attached to the face of the building on the property for sale or rent. In the case of a vacant lot, the sign may be freestanding and shall be placed parallel to the abutting public street.

(e) One (1) identification sign for a place of worship, and other similar community service or eleemosynary organizations and permitted clubs, or other non-residential uses, not exceeding twelve (12) square feet.

**Sec. 127 Signs Permitted in All Districts With Permit**

The following signs are permitted in any building zone district upon the issuance of a sign permit by the Building Division.

- (a) Subdivision signs-

(1) Not more than one (1) freestanding sign for each five (5) acre portion of a platted subdivision, not larger than twenty-four (24) square feet in area, advertising only the premises on which erected, and one (1) directional sign not larger than twenty-four (24) square feet in area, advertising only the name and directions to the subdivision, may be erected on property other than the subdivision subject to approval by the Board of Appeals.

(2) Any sign permit issued pursuant to this subsection shall terminate six (6) months from date of issuance unless renewed and be conditioned upon the filing of a Surety Bond, cashier's check or certified check in the sum of \$200.00 guaranteeing the removal of said sign or signs.

(b) All signs of temporary nature, such as posters, banners, promotional devices and other signs of a similar nature, may be granted a temporary permit for a period not to exceed sixty (60) days provided that such signs are not attached to fences, trees, utility poles or the like and further provided that such signs are not placed in a position that will obstruct or impair vision or traffic or in any manner create a hazard or disturbance to the health and welfare of the general public. No single such sign shall be larger than forty (40) square feet. A fee of \$15.00 shall be paid upon the issuance of a permit for said sign and a cash deposit for a like amount shall be deposited with the Building

Division to insure the removal of said sign at the expiration of the permit. The Building Inspector after ten (10) days written notice to the permit holder to remove the sign and after the failure of the permit holder to do so, shall cause said sign to be removed and the cash deposit shall be forfeited to help defray the cost of removal.

(c) One (1) illuminated announcement sign not more than twelve (12) square feet in area, and/or, if temporary, for a period of not more than thirty (30) days, one (1) announcement sign not more than thirty-two (32) square feet in area, when erected or maintained by a public or semi-public agency, eleemosynary organization or permitted club.

(d) One (1) illuminated sign not more than nine (9) square feet in area for permitted apartment residence uses, indicating only the name and address of the building or the management thereof.

(e) For any business in the unincorporated area of the Town of Oyster Bay by nature of location being difficult to find, one (1) illuminated directional sign not larger than eight (8) square feet may be erected on property other than that of the owner, subject to approval by the Board of Appeals.

Sec. 128 Signs Permitted in Business or Industrial Districts With Permit

The following signs are permitted only in Business or Industrial Building Zone Districts upon the issuance of a sign permit by the Building Division except where expressly provided otherwise in this article.

(a) One (1) illuminated wall sign attached to or incorporated into the wall of the building or premises, advertising only the business and the produce or services sold within, provided that said sign is placed upon a wall parallel to the lot line along a public street, highway or parking area with a minimum width of at least fifty (50) feet; and provided further that said sign shall not:

- (1) Exceed in area two (2) square feet for each horizontal foot of such wall, but shall not exceed a maximum of three hundred (300) square feet;
(2) Exceed five (5) feet in total height;
(3) Exceed seventy-five (75) percent of the horizontal length of wall upon which sign is affixed.

(b) One (1) illuminated freestanding or identification or directory sign, not larger than thirty-two (32) square feet, may be erected. For each foot of setback in excess of ten (10) feet the area of the sign may be increased by three (3) square feet to a maximum of one hundred fifty (150) square feet. In a commercial location containing three (3) or more tenants, one (1) illuminated freestanding or detached directory or identification sign may be erected along each public street or highway.

(c) An illuminated sign attached to the underside of the soffit or ceiling of an arcade or unenclosed sidewalk. The face of the sign shall not exceed twelve

(12) inches in height, to be measured at right angles to the soffit or ceiling nor to be over fifty-four (54) inches long and must have clearance of eight (8) feet from sidewalk to bottom of sign.

(d) Where a building is designed with a canopy projecting more than two (2) feet from the face of the building, one (1) illuminated canopy sign may be erected one (1) inch minimum back from the leading edge of the canopy provided that the sign does not exceed two (2) feet in height; and, there are no wall signs erected on the same wall of the place of business intended to be advertised.

(e) Petroleum Product Service Station signs are permitted, provided:

- (1) One (1) illuminated freestanding Petroleum Product Identification Sign may be erected where no canopy sign is erected or maintained. Such sign shall not be larger than thirty-two (32) square feet and shall not exceed twelve (12) feet in height. In addition, a petroleum product price sign may be permanently attached to the pole, and may not exceed six (6) sq. feet in area.
(2) Motor Fuel Sales Signs for the advertisement of the sale price of motor fuel shall be provided without permit and shall not exceed one (1) foot in width or in height.

(3) An illuminated Petroleum Product Canopy Sign shall be permitted on each vertical face of any canopy over the service area; provided:

- (i) that such canopy shall not exceed twenty-five (25) percent of the area of the plot on which the gasoline service station's use exists, and provided that such canopy shall not exceed four (4) feet in vertical height. Any such sign shall not project above or below any canopy, nor project more than six (6) inches beyond the face of the canopy and shall not exceed twenty-five (25) percent of the horizontal length of the face, nor exceed one (1) foot in vertical height on the vertical face of the canopy.

(ii) that the facade of the canopy shall be opaque and all lights shall be under the canopy and shielded, directing the illumination downward, so as not to cause glare outside the service area.

(4) One (1) sign advertising the sale of cigarettes, tobacco, milk, soda or any other non-petroleum product shall be permitted provided that it is no larger than ten-by-twelve inches (10" x 12") and contains the word cigarette, tobacco, milk, soda or any other non-petroleum product broadly printed thereon.

(f) On a one story building on which no fascia signs are maintained, one (1) illuminated, identification sign may be erected above the soffit, and set back a minimum of one (1) inch, but no more than one (1) foot, from the edge of the soffit, provided it does not exceed four (4) feet in height and does not exceed the area of a wall sign as provided elsewhere.

Sec. 129 Sign Heights and Setbacks

All signs permitted by this Article shall be erected and maintained pursuant to the following heights and setbacks:

- (a) When permitted pursuant to Sections 126 or 127

of this Ordinance, no sign shall be more than six (6) feet in height nor less than ten (10) feet from any property line.

(b) When permitted pursuant to Section 128 of this Ordinance, no sign shall be more than twelve (12) feet in height nor less than ten (10) feet from any front property line; nor less than twenty (20) feet from any other property line abutting Residential property, otherwise no less than two (2) feet from any other property line.

Sec. 130 Sign Illumination

(a) Sign illumination, internal to the sign, shall not exceed twelve (12) watts per square foot with an opalescent material shield in front and in the rear when a two-sided sign is used. If incandescent lamps are used, diffusing shields shall be installed.

(b) Sign illumination by external light source shall be installed and shielded as not to cause glare or undue reflection outside of the sign area. Illumination shall not exceed twelve (12) watts per square foot. Lamps shall not project more than two (2) feet from the face of the sign and shall not extend above the top and sides of the sign more than six (6) inches.

(c) Illuminated signs of a temporary nature shall have an approved electrical source within three (3) feet of such and be protected by a ground fault indicator.

Sec. 131 Prohibited Signs

The following types of signs are prohibited in all districts:

(a) Revolving signs and signs which are lighted with intermittent, flashing, or animated illumination, except that time and temperature signs may be permitted.

(b) Free-standing or illuminated signs except as permitted elsewhere in this ordinance.

(c) Signs which project more than twelve (12) inches over a street line or sidewalk.

(d) Any sign, or artificial lighting source or reflector connected to or used therewith, where such sign or lighting conflicts with, or may be mistaken for, a traffic signal.

(e) Illuminated signs or lighting devices outlining any part of a building such as a gable, roof, sidewalk or corner.

(f) Any sign painted, erected, affixed or maintained on the roof of a building, or on any tree, stone or other natural object.

(g) Any sign which covers or blocks any door, window other opening in a building or structure.

(h) Any sign which projects above the lowest point of roof, parapet, or mansard roof whichever has the greatest height above grade, except where expressly provided otherwise in this Article.

(i) Any sign which projects more than one (1) foot from the wall surface of a building.

(j) No sign shall be maintained which may cause danger to traffic by obscuring the view.

(k) Unless otherwise provided, no sign shall be erected or maintained above the soffit of a building.

Sec. 132 Fees and Permits

(a) Application for Permit No permit or license to erect a sign shall be issued unless same shall adhere to the provisions set forth in this

article and said application or permit shall be in writing accompanied by appropriate drawings, approved by the Building Division. The applicant shall comply with all provisions of this Article showing that the construction and erection will be in conformity with all good building standards and practices to be approved by the Superintendent of the Building Division. Illuminated signs shall have a Certificate of Approval by the New York Board of Fire Underwriters.

(b) Permit Fee

No permit shall be issued until payment of fee of twenty-five cents (\$.25) per square foot, when measuring the greatest height by the greatest width for each face of the sign and in any event no less than a minimum fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00).

(c) Display of Permit Number

Such sign shall bear the permit number and name of the sign erector and his license number prominently and permanently affixed on the face thereof. Failure to so affix the permit number shall constitute cause for revocation of the permit by the Building Inspector in addition to any other penalties or remedies prescribed by this Ordinance.

(d) Renewal

Except as otherwise provided, each permit shall be deemed to expire on the second January 30th after the issuance of said permit, but can be renewed for an additional three (3) year period subject to the following: Application for renewal must be made ten (10) days prior to the expiration date together with the payment of a renewal fee of twenty-five cents (\$.25) a square foot for each face of the sign but in any event no less than a minimum fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00). Expiration dates may be staggered at the discretion of the Superintendent of the Division of Building.

(e) Changes and Maintenance

No sign, whether new or existing, shall hereafter be altered, rebuilt, enlarged, extended or relocated except in conformity with the provisions of this Article, nor shall the wording or lettering of any sign be changed without the approval and issuance of a new permit by the Building Division except for signs designed to be changed. However, notwithstanding any provisions contained herein, the sign shall be kept clean, neatly painted and free from all hazards, such as but not limited to, faulty wiring or loose fastenings, and shall be maintained at all times in such safe condition so as not to present a hazard to public health or safety.

(f) Revocation

In the event of a violation of any of the foregoing provisions, the permit, or certificate, may be revoked upon written or personal notice from the Building Division to the named owner of the sign and/or the named owner of the land upon which the sign is erected, which notice of revocation shall be sent by certified mail to the last known addresses stated in the application for such sign permit as above provided. Thereupon, the sign shall be

removed by the owner of the sign and or the owner of the land as aforesaid within ten (10) days from the date said notice of revocation was either served personally or by certified mail to the last known address as provided above.

Sec. 133 Non-Conforming Signs

All signs presently existing and not conforming with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be discontinued and removed within five (5) years following the adoption of this Article as amended, it being the intention of this ordinance to fix the discontinuance and subsequent conformity to the provisions of this Ordinance within a period of time permitting the owners and users of such signs the amortization of investment for the construction of such signs prior to the enactment of this Ordinance, unless an extension of time is granted by the Board of Appeals subject to such safeguards and conditions as they may deem proper.

Sec. 134 Approval by Board of Appeals Required

Except as in this Article hereinbefore allowed, no signs shall be erected or placed upon any premises in any use district unless approved by the Board of Appeals, after a public hearing, subject to such safeguards and conditions as they may deem proper. In determining any application for permission to erect a sign pursuant to this Article, the Board of Appeals shall consider the character of the neighborhood, the existence, size and nature of other signs in the vicinity, whether or not the sign proposed is customarily incidental in the Town of Oyster Bay to the primary use of the premises, whether or not the sign proposed, by reason of its proposed form of construction or location, will interfere with light or impair property values or otherwise endanger the public or be in conflict with the purposes enumerated in Sections 261 and 263 of the Town Law, as amended.

Sec. 135 Political Campaign Signs

Political campaign signs shall be exempted from the provisions of this Article when erected not more than one hundred and twenty (120) days prior to the election to which they apply; provided that said signs shall be removed within fifteen (15) days following the election to which they apply.

Sec. 136 Penalty

Failure to comply with any of these provisions of this Article shall constitute an offense and the offender shall be liable to a fine of not more than two hundred-fifty dollars (\$250.00), and each day such violation shall be permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense.
