# Willet Ave. Students Preview Temple

The theme for this semester's "Special Events" program in the Willet Avenue School Media Center will focus on preparation for class trips to the King Tut exhibit

in January and February.
As an introduction, on Saturday
September 23rd, a committee of September 23rd, a committee of teachers and sixth grade students attended the members' preview of the Temple of Dendur. This exquisite little building, constructed on the banks of the Nile around 15BC, commemorated the death by drowning of two sons of a local official. The outside of the temple is beautifully decorated with picture stories carved in relief. It also bears the inscrip-tions of a series of Egyptologists whose graffiti record their historical study of the temple. The building was presented to

the United States by the Egyptian the United States by the Egyptian government in return for assistance in saving other ancient treasures threatened by the Aswan High Dam project. Many museums vied for the prize exhibit, but the Metropolitan offered the best exposition plan with a climate controlled glass enclosure—the new Sackler. with a climate controlled glass enclosure — the new Sackler wing, which will open to the public on September 27th. The Temple was disassembled, block by block, packed in 640 crates, and shipped to New York for meticulous reconstruction.

Dear Mr. Purcell

I hope that Nassau County will maintain its contribution to the Nassau Library System. The \$299,000.00 of County aid tun-\$299,000.00 of County aid (un-changed since 1970) represents a very small part of the County budget while helping to support a library program that saves every local taxpaying citizen money by performing many of the time consuming tasks that are necessary for the operation of any library. any library.
Nassau County has one of the

Nassau County has one of the best library networks in the United States. The 54 public libraries serving more than 1,300,000 people circulated over 11,000,000 books last year from a book stock of five million volumes: These statistics, im-pressive as they are, reflect only

reasonably adequate service to a sophisticated clientele that includes many students, business-men and professional people. The cost is estimated at under \$20,00 per capita for staff, books, periodicals, childrens services, audio-visual materials and the audio-visual materials and the many, many requests for reference assistance. New York State Library Systems, largely state financed, are considered by many to be models of cooperative planning and resource sharing. The System undoubtedly saves Hicksville taxpayers, alone, a minimum of \$25,000.00 annually by centralized operannually by centralized operaannually by centralized opera-tions. Greater discounts on book ordering, faster and less costly book deliveries, central book deliveries, central cataloging and processing, and talking book service to the blind are a few of the ways the Nassau Library System saves local tax dollars and provides service to those who need it most. There are no "frills" here. If local libraries were forced to perform some of these functions on their own the saves are would be paying a taxpayer would be paying a higher tax than he does now for a less efficient operation

We hope that in the general effort to fight high taxes that the

County Executive and the Board of Supervisors do not damage a program that has already saved many thousands of dollars by judicious planning, resource sharing and careful manage-ment. Remember library service is for everyone - men, women and

#### Pinball Ban To Consider Town Board

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced that the Town Board will consider ban-ning pinball machines in all public places except where a special use permit has been obtained. A public hearing on the proposed ban is scheduled for Tuesday, October 17, 1978, at the Town Board meeting beginning at 10 AM at Town Hall.

'At present, the Town controls

"The Town has received many complaints about unsolicited advertising material, many centering around the fact that it

gives burglars a tip as to when gives burglars a up as to when someone is away as homeowners someone is one of stopping delivery," Carman explained. "This ordinance would provide with someone should residents with recourse should they not wish to receive such material."

The ordinance would make it illegal for anyone to distribute commercial handbills, circulars or the like unless the name and address of the distributor is alarghe printed on the material clearly printed on the material and unless the recipient has not sent a written request that he not receive such publications

"The ordinance would only apply to advertising material delivered by means other than the Postal Service." Carman stated. "It is in no way intended to interfere with lawful distribu-

tion of commercial material through the mail."

If adopted, the ordinance would go into effect on January 1, 1979.
Penalties for violation will be a \$250 fine, a maximum of 15 days imprisonment or both.

The meeting will be held in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay beginning at 10 AM.

Section 1 Designation: This ordinance shall be known and designated as the "Com-mercial Handbill Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay

Section 2, Prohibitions: It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, cast, place or distribute, or cause or permit to be thrown, cast, placed or distributed, any commercial handbill, circular, card, booklet or other similar booklet or other similar commercial or advertising matter or publication whatseever upon any places in or upon any public place or in or upon any part of private property or dwelling or in any letterbox or receptacle on said premises unless the name and address of the distributor thereof are clearly and boldly printed thereon and unless the vners or parties in possession of the properties thereof have not sent a written request to the same name and address printed thereon via the United States Postal Service, certified mail, return receipt requested, asking that the said owners or parties in possion not receive such pulications; provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to tained shall be deemed to prohibit the distribution of such matter by the United States Postal Service, or prohibit the distribution of sample copies of newspapers regularly sold by the copy or by subscription. This section is not intended to prevent the lawful distribution of anything other than matter by the United State of anything other than com-mercial or business matter or material.

Which directs attention to or

advertises any meeting, theatrical performance, exhibition, or event of any kind, for which an admission fee is charged for the purpose of charged for the purpose of private gain or profit; but the terms of this clause shall not apply where an admission fee is charged or a collection is taken up for the purpose of defraying the expenses in-cident to such meeting, the atrical performance, exhibition, or event of any kind, when either of the same is held, given or takes place in congiven or takes place in con nection with the dissemination of information which is not restricted under the ordinary rules of decency, good morals public peace, safety and good order; Provided, that nothing contained in this clause shall be deemed to authorize the deemed to authorize the holding, giving or taking place of any meeting, theatrical performance, exhibition, or even! of any kind, without a license, where such license is or may be reiquired by any law of the State, or under any ordinance of this municipality; or 5. Which, while containing reading matter other than advertising matter is distributed or circulated for advertisement purposes, or for the private benefit and gain of any person so engaged as advertiser or distributor. B. "Distributor" shall mean

any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind which actually delivers or causes the delivery of any commercial handbill as herein defined.

C. "Person" shall mean and c. "Person" shall mean and include any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind. D. "Private Premises" shall mean and include any dwelling,

mean and include any dwelling, house, building, or other structure, designed or used either wholly or in part for private residential purposes, whether inhabited or temporarily or continuously uninhabited or vacant, and shall include any yard, grounds, walk, driveway, porch, steps, vestibule or mailbox belonging or appurtenant to such dwelling, house, building, or other structure.

E. "Public Places" shall mean and include any and all streets,


