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## Peaceful Job Action: Meeting Set

Nearly 250 district employees representing teachers, clerks, secretaries, maintenance workers and custodians demonstrated in front of the administration building preceding a meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education. The "informative demonstration" was the second in a series of planned job actions by the Hicksville Congress of Teachers. The representative group had demonstrated before the Junior High Open House on last Monday.

The demonstrators carried signs reading "Meaningful Talks" and "We Want a Contract," and many of them wore "Negotiate" buttons.

Bob Zeleski, President, Hicksville Congress of Teachers, stated "We are asking for meaningful negotiations with all groups."

The Board meeting was moved to the senior high cafeteria to accommodate the large crowd of people.

Later, Board President Tom Nagle informed the public that a meeting was scheduled for October 4 with HCT President Bob Zeleski; Vice President Elliot Rains; Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins; School Board negotiator Joseph Campanella; and himself. The purpose of this meeting was to schedule several negotiating sessions and to set-up guide-lines for these meetings.

Mr. Nagle also stated that representatives of the Board meeting with the HCT negotiating team from December to June. "We are not hiding; we are available."

Board Vice President Dan Arena stated "The Board never stopped negotiations. The Board is ready anytime."

During the brief business meeting, the Board approved extra-duty compensation for driver education instructors. An eligibility list of 28 instructors was approved by the Board. Mr. Nagle stated that the administration "has the flexibility" of using as many instructors as it deems possible, but "must come within the \$60,000 budgeted for the program."

Also approved were coaching assignments for sports and clubs, totaling \$24,145. This includes, among others, soccer, football, cheerleaders, Coquettes, leader's club, and volleyball.

Also included is a new offering, senior high girl's soccer, which was made possible, according to Assistant Superintendent Dr. Manus Clancy, "due to a reduction in certain sports. We anticipated a greater need for female offerings and are striving to comply as close as possible to Title IX."

The Board also approved extra-

duty compensation for music, band, orchestra, newspaper and grade advisors; and Comet Shop advisor, among others, for a total of \$12,165.00.

After a discussion on a request from the Hicksville Police Boys Club for use of an elementary school gym on Saturdays during the school year, the Board approved its request. Mr. Bill Becker, Director of Buildings and Grounds, assured the Board the request "will not hamper other groups" who also use the schools on Saturday. Supt. Dr. Hawkins recommended that the request be approved.

The Board approved policy changes in its family eligibility criteria for free lunch and special milk program in the junior and senior high school as requested by Mr. Richard Weigang, District Business Manager. The changes are now consistent with those authorized by the State Education Department.

The Board awarded bids totaling \$25,968.97. The cost includes sheet music (\$7,332.60); industrial arts-woodworking (\$6,316.44); non-public transportation (\$5,838.93) and special education transportation (\$6,471).

Dr. Clancy informed this reporter when asked about the status of the HAD (Help-Aid-

Direction) drug program which the Board had approved in the spring, that the program "would be implemented in the junior and senior high schools next week."

In answer to this reporter's question at previous board meetings as to the total cost to the district of the superintendent search, Mr. Nagle informed the public that the total cost was \$7,831.85.

The Board held a brief executive session to discuss a negotiations contract for school board attorney Joseph Campanella. The Board then approved a two-year contract in the amount of \$16,500, for each year. The contract covers negotiations with all groups. Litigation, however, is an additional \$75 per hour.

In other developments, it was announced that Adult Education would begin the week of October 30. Brochures would be mailed to residents shortly. Also being mailed shortly is the first issue of "The Bulletin Board."

Holidays for the custodial and clerical employees were announced: October 2, 3, 9, 11; and November 23, 24.

The next meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education is scheduled for October 18, 8:15 p.m. in the conference room of the administration building.

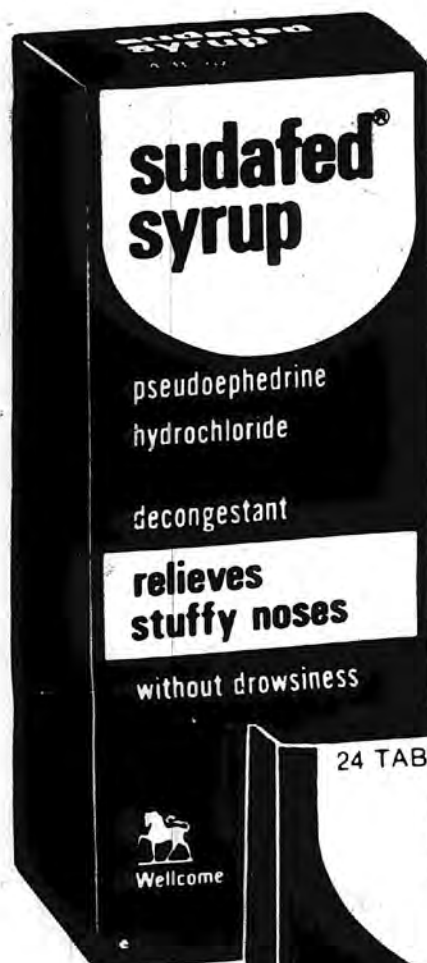

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## School Taxes Increase In Nassau County

Tax rates in 60 of Nassau County's 62 school taxing jurisdictions are up an average of 73 cents per \$100 assessed valuation for the 1978-79 school year, topping the 1977-78 average increase of 63.1 cents, according to a report released today by Abe Seldin, chairman of the Board of Assessors.

The average school tax rate rose 79 cents per \$100 in 1976-77 and \$1.07 per \$100 in 1975-76. For the current school year, tax rates went up in 56 of the districts and declined in three. One of the districts showing a decline is Levittown, however, even with the decrease, Levittown continues to have the highest school tax rate in the county.

After Levittown, the highest school tax rates are in Valley Stream, 24, \$22.27; Plainview-Old Bethpage, \$21.63 per \$100; Plainville, \$21.01; North Merrick, \$20.66 and North Bellmore, \$20.27.

The average for the county is \$16.98 per \$100. A tax rate of \$16.98 would mean a school tax bill of \$1,154.84 on a home assessed at \$6,800, the average county assessment.

One of the sharpest tax rate increases occurred in Hempstead - up \$1.648 per \$100. Uniondale, West Hempstead, and North Merrick, all showed a tax rate increase of more than \$1.00 per \$100.

Tax rates rose an average of 92.8 cents per \$100 in the 31 districts within the Town of Hempstead. Tax rates in the ten districts within the Town of North Hempstead rose an average of 60.5 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Tax rates in the 19 reporting districts within the Town of Oyster Bay rose an average 47.3 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. Rates went up in 18 districts and down in one, the Nassau County portion of the Cold Spring Harbor Central School District.

## The Learning Connection

The Learning Connection, a "people-to-people" encyclopedia for Nassau County, will be launched on Wednesday, October 4, with registration forms available in all of the County's public libraries for individuals who want to sign up as learners, teachers or sharers on a one-to-one basis. Registration forms will be available at the loan desks of the Hicksville Public Library and at the Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library.

A federally-funded service of the Nassau Library System, The Learning Connection is a pilot project in this area and is a library-based "human data bank." The thrust of its services will be to match up people who have skills, expertise and know-how with those in need of similar information. Acting as a referral service, the Learning Connection will assist an individual who wants to take up a new hobby, perfect a handicraft or improve a talent to get in touch with someone offering to teach in these areas. The teacher-registrants do not need formal training to be qualified because, in many cases, their know-how will be based on direct life experience.

"Sharing" is the third category in which registrations will be accepted. This will involve matching up individuals who want to meet other people with similar interests from swapping stamps to planning museum visits.

"Anyone can register in all three categories," Barbara Sussman, manager of operations, explained. "since we are convinced at The Learning Connection that every teacher is a learner, every learner is a teacher."

The mechanics of The Learning Connection are simple. After the registrant's application has been verified, he or she will be given the name and telephone number of someone whose abilities meet the need for help. It is then up to the learner and teacher to make their own arrangements for "connection" in terms of time, meeting place or any other considerations. There is no obligation on either part to continue the connection beyond the first meeting.

The referral services of The Learning Connection are free, although in some cases a teacher's fee may be involved.

The libraries have booklets describing the referral service in detail.

You want obedience...forget about me and just follow You.

And into the jungle of these dark feelings, the phone rings...it's Jesus. "Come, man..." He says, "I need you." Impossible we feel, but scrawled across the pages of scripture over and over is a God

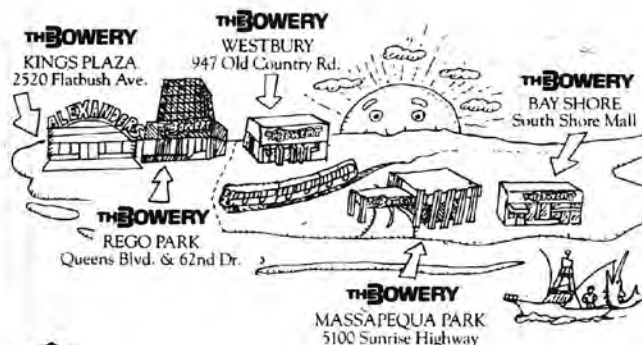
