The Hicksville Kiwanis Memorial Fountain Committee announced this week that it has the necessary funds on hand to assure completion of the project. Accordingly, the Kiwanis Board of Directors at its latest meeting, authorized the Committee to proceed with the drawing of the necessary contracts leading up to actual construction. Once the necessary preliminary details are resolved, construction should be commenced within two or three weeks, weather conditions permitting. After construction is under way, completion is expected within thirty days.

Response of Hicksville residents, both present and past, together with major support of local business establishments, was most encouraging to the Committee in its efforts to raise the necessary funds. Contributions are still being accepted from those wishing to be included as part of this major improvement in the business area. TOB Sets April 10 on Hicksville Zone Revision

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announces that the Town Board will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, April 10, to consider revisions to the "5-1" Central Business District zoning ordinance. This special zoning had been adopted for the so-called Hicksville Triangle downtown business area in September 1971.

"Despite the avowed intention of the G-1 zoning to encourage an orderly development of the area," Clark said, "it is evident that such has not been the case." No development has occurred in the area, which is bounded by Broadway, Old Country Road, and Newbridge Road, since the ordinance's adoption.

Town Supervisor Joseph Colby, after discussing the matter with Clark, directed the Town's Planning and Development Department to review the zoning and suggest amendments for the Town Board's consideration.

The proposed amendments would allow an increase in the permitted floor area of a building for incidental uses, from 10 percent to 33 percent with a minimum of two stories in building height, and bars, cabarets and night clubs on the top floor of a building would be allowed as a special exception if granted by the Town Board after a public hearing. Also proposed

are a decrease in the minimum lot size from 20,000 to 17,000 sq. ft. and an increase in the total percentage of a lot that may be developed from 60 to 70 percent with a minimum area of 10 percent for greenery, and deletion of floor area ratio regulations.

Underground or within-a-structure parking requirements would be eliminated and screened off-street parking areas allowed.

"It is hoped that the less stringent zoning requirements will spur development of the area in a manner compatible with both the suburban nature and the economic needs of the community," Clark said.

Serving As Chairperson

Diana D'Avino, District Director of Health, Physical Education and Recreation for the Hicksville Public Schools, is serving as Chairperson of the Dance Committee for the 1979 Convention and will be participating in the 56th Annual Convention of the Eastern District Association of the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education and Recreation to be held at the Statler Hilton Hotel in New York City February 28 through March 4.

The Eastern District is the largest of the six Districts in the Alliance with a membership of over 10,000 professionals and several thousand college and university student members. One of the primary purposes of the Alliance is to promote and recognize high quality educational programs in the fields of health, physical education and recreation.

The Convention is expected to attract 2,000 persons from eleven northeastern states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

RESOLUTION NO. 93-1978

BOND RESOLUTION DATED JANUARY 23, 1978
A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$245,000 SERIAL BONDS AND \$13,000 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF AN ADDITION TO THE PARKS DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATION BUILDING IN HICKSVILLE.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the construction of an addition to the Parks Department Administration Building of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, located on South Oyster Bay Road, in Hicksville, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus therefor.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is \$258,000 and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- By the issuance of \$245,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the Local Finance Law, and
- By the issuance of \$13,000 capital notes of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor in

accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of such specific object or purpose is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivision 12 (a) (2) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said Town, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, capital notes and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Mid Island Herald and Mid Island Times, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum.

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Margiotta To Be Honored

Nassau County Republican Chairman Joseph M. Margiotta will be the recipient of the "Friend of the Young Republicans" award given by the Young Republican National Federation, at a dinner to be held March 3, in Washington, D.C.

Sharing the dais with Margiotta at the dinner, part of the annual Young Republican Leadership Conference, will be former California Governor Ronald Reagan and freshman U.S. Senator John Warner (R-Virginia).

The "Friend of the Young Republicans" award is given to political figures who have contributed significantly to the development of Young Republicans at either the national, state, or county level. The award is presented only to those whose efforts have gone above and beyond the call of duty.

Joe Margiotta has consistently supported Young Republican activities in his home county of Nassau and in New York State, noted Young Republican National Chairman Roger Stone. "The delegation he annually sends to the Young Republican Leadership Conference is larger than any other state delegation, and his efforts have been exemplary in developing youthful and dynamic leadership in the Republican Party. A Letter From Cong. Symms

Dear Friend,
Did you know you worked 153 days last year just to pay taxes?

That's right. It wasn't until 7:12 a.m. on June 2, 1978 that you started to keep the money you earned. Up until that time, every penny you earned and every hour you worked was only toward paying your taxes.

When you come right down to it, FORTY-TWO CENTS out of every dollar goes right to the government for taxes. It sounds unbelievable but that's only because the government is so crafty in hiding the total number of taxes it takes from you. For example, when you include all the hidden taxes there are 52 different taxes on a single egg and 108 taxes on a loaf of bread.

If the percentage of your income which goes toward paying taxes were decreasing, I wouldn't be writing you today. But the simple truth is that you pay more every year for taxes.

For example, in 1948 24.2c of every dollar went for taxes. In

1957, 35.5c went for taxes. In 1968, 39.2c went for taxes. And in 1978, a whopping 42c of every hard earned dollar went for taxes!

The only way this trend toward higher taxes can be stopped and reversed is with planning, effort, and contributions.

The good news I have for you is a plan called "constitutional tax limitation." It makes sense and it's workable. The "tax limitation" idea was developed by men such as Nobel Prize-winning economist Milton Friedman.

The nationwide organization which is behind this idea is the National Tax Limitation Committee (NTLC).

Expert Reverses Previous Recommendations

"Concentrate on rebuilding and revitalizing the established downtowns of Long Island such as Hempstead and Hicksville and land bank the yet undeveloped area of Mitchel Field until economic and growth conditions warrant" was the advice of Regional Plan Association President John P. Keith while addressing the weekly downtown L.I. Breakfast of leading area executives at the Hofstra University Club on Wednesday, Feb. 21.

Reversing his recommendations of the late 60s when he advocated the strong development of Mitchel Field as the major business center for Nassau County, Keith said that the leveling off of L.I. Growth

now make it more feasible to put every effort into a strong revitalization of existing downtowns. This supported the concept of the recently established Hempstead Revitalization Committee spurred by Hofstra University President James M. Stuart and Hempstead Mayor Dalton R. Miller.

This group now has the active support and commitment of Nassau County Executive Francis T. Purcell, Hempstead Presiding Supervisor Alfonso D'Amato, business and education leaders, devotees of the arts, and a representative group of civic and community leaders. A leading firm of planning consultants is now preparing a comprehensive plan for Hempstead's revitalization.

Keith described the unbelievably successful redevelopment programs in Stamford, Conn., White Plains, N.Y., and New Brunswick, N.J., all of which were similar in area and population and had comparable conditions to Hempstead in their downtowns. He said that even Newark and Jersey City, with far worse conditions in their central cities, were experiencing amazing improvement through sound redevelopment programs.

He suggested that Nassau officials hold back on further development at Mitchel Field until conditions were more favorable. He also advocated stopping new development in such strip areas as Jericho Turnpike, Lake Success, Route 110, etc.

Help For Long Island

On Feb. 16 U.S. Rep. John W. Wylder (R-N.Y.), Chairman of the Long Island Congressional Caucus, announced that the Caucus would meet with the Action Committee for Long Island.

"The establishment of the Congressional clearinghouse to let Long Island double its federal funds for research and development is the single most important action taken by a unified and bipartisan Congressional Caucus," Rep. Wylder said.

"Our goal is simply to double research and development dollars for Long Island within five years by a concerted effort of industry and Congressional Representatives working together."

"We are bringing into focus the

Long Island Action Committee, which is obtaining the information from the various Long Island companies interested in research and development work, and the Bicounty Planning Commission, which will put the information obtained in useful form," stated Congressman Wylder. "The data and support materials will then be sent to Washington, to receive the unified effort and support of the Congressional delegation."

As Chairman of the Long Island Caucus, Rep. Wylder will direct

the operation. He stressed, "I am happy to receive the full cooperation of the Long Island Action Committee in this endeavor. Working together, we can be successful."

Attending the Friday morning meeting, which will be held at the Crest Hollow Country Club in Woodbury, will be the six-member Long Island Congressional delegation as well as representatives of Long Island business, labor, science, education and finance.

How many of your parents taught you to sin as a child? If you want a first-hand demonstration of our sinful nature, just remove a bottle from a hungry infant's mouth. You'll see anger and rage right before your eyes.

Now, rather than being captured by our sin, we can ex-

perience freedom in two important ways. First there is the freedom from the sin-produced spiritual death. Jesus took your place on the death tree. His blood dripped from the nails instead of ours. Brutal pain consumed His flesh as ours stays warm and comfortable and relaxed. And when with eyes fixed on Golgotha we say of Him, "My Lord and My God," all the benefits of His substitution become ours. That's a miracle of undeserved kindness.

We also have freedom in another way. Freed from sin that leads to death, we now have freedom for a life that leads to God. Yes, a life that can lead to increased meaning and joy and fulfillment as we seek discipleship. How? Jesus gives this answer, "If you continue in My Word, you are truly My disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." Most of us grievously disappoint Christ at this point. When we come to faith, we cross

the border into His kingdom and then settle in it-but little by little. Often I've been part of a conversation that goes something like this, "Yes, Pastor, I was confirmed at St. John's Lutheran Church in 1943."

"Have you studied His Word much since then?"

"No, I can't say that I have, but I believe in the golden Rule and the Ten Commandments. I try to lead a good life," but there is so much more. It is infinitely better to press on to win the fullness that there is for us in Him. We must grow up in Christ rather than remain crude, immature, undeveloped and childish. The life of Christ is like climbing a mountain which seems constantly to draw back its head, so that each peak gained reveals another, and that in turn another. Standing at the bottom of the mountain, we did not realize that such grandeur was possible for us to behold.

But it was always there-the foolish stayed on the plateau and did not venture forth.

Bible Series at Holy Trinity

Lent is like mid-Winter: it leads into Spring. The Spring of Lent is Easter, filled with an overflowing of promise. This direction is strongly suggested in the Gospel of St. John, which is the subject for Lenten study at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, Hicksville. The Right Rev. Jonathan G. Sherman, the Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Long Island and currently Professor of Biblical Studies at the George Mercer Jr. Memorial School of Theology, Garden City, will be presenting a series of insights into the Biblical literature of St. John the Apostle and Evangelist on Tuesday evenings at 8 P.M. at Holy Trinity Church, beginning March 6. Holy Trinity Episcopal Church is located at the corner of Old Country Road and Jerusalem Avenue in Hicksville. Last year Bishop Sherman presented a study in St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans. His "Tour of the Scriptures" has become increasingly popular, both in the Episcopal Church and other Communions, because of the Bishop's winsomeness, his skill at story telling and his ability to make the rich and deeper meanings of Holy Scripture clear and understandable.

An open invitation is extended to all persons interested in hearing the Bishop and participating in the Biblical discussions on St. John's Gospel. Following the presentation, refreshments will be provided. Persons attending are encouraged to bring their favorite scripture texts with them, as well



as pad and pencil for note taking. The series will continue through Tuesday, April 3.

Last Friday evening members of Holy Trinity Church gathered at the Holiday Manor to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the founding of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church. From very simple beginnings in 1899 the parish was incorporated in 1964, rising from Mission to Parochial status in the Episcopal Diocese of Long Island. The first all-purpose

building constructed in 1900 was succeeded by the second building in 1942, with the construction of a Parish House in 1964 and subsequently the building of the present Church edifice in 1963. Sunday services at Holy Trinity are held at 8 and 10 A.M. with Church School and nursery care at 10 A.M. Members of the community are also welcome at the 9:30 A.M. Wednesday morning service which is followed by breakfast and Bible study.

Since 1968 the Chamber has been active on numerous fronts. We now have nearly 100 members representing banks, insurance companies, realtors, retail merchants and educational and cultural institutions.

Some of our recent activities:

- We have endorsed a study made in 1968-69 by a committee of business and professional people aided by the Nassau County Planning Commission. This study proposed a comprehensive plan for the downtown area including apartments, multiple use buildings, town houses and a possible Senior Citizens complex. We also urged action on a later plan published by the firm of Raymond, Parish and Pine, Inc. planning consultants (for the Town of Oyster Bay). Both these plans were scrapped for the present G-1 zoning (office buildings) which the Chamber feels is not the ideal solution and has resulted in little construction.
- We have made numerous proposals in newspaper articles and on television regarding a proper long range plan for the Hicksville business area.
- Members of the Chamber served on a Beautification Committee in the early 1970's. As a result evergreens, shrubs and flower beds were planted greatly improving the appearance of the Kennedy Mall. For the past several years a Chamber group led by Dr. Walter Dunbar and Mr. Edward Johnson of Parr and Hanson have organized community support for an extensive landscaping project that has "greened" large areas of the Broadway wasteland.
- Some of the other concerns of the Chamber have been sewer construction, East - West traffic connections, and a parking district for downtown Hicksville. We have not eliminated the problems - we have identified many of them and have acted as a spokesmen for what we consider the best interests of the community. We need your support and, most importantly, your input.
