## Fact Finding Is Not An Easy Process

Hicksville Congress of Teachers President Bob Zaleski announced during the public speaking session at Wednesday night's Board of Education meeting that the HCT "will enter into the fact-finding process." He also announced that at an HCT general meeting held late Wednesday afternoon, the general membership overwhelmingly "voted to authorize the executive committee to call a strike at 11 p.m. on May 11 if a contract agreement had not been reached. We are placed in this position by the Board and its demands," he concluded.

Before this statement, Mr. Zaleski explained the general meeting was lengthy since the decision arrived at greatly "affected the lives of the teachers and students."

He added that most important were the children. "If we didn't think the children were important, we would have gone out in September with a 'no contract-no work' attitude."

At the start of the meeting, which was heavily attended and emotional at times, Hicksville School Board President Tom Nagle stated that the Board gave "not" to sabbaticals and retirement inducements. The Board also demands that the HCT President must teach full-time. Currently, the HCT President is assigned only three periods.

Mr. Nagle also stated that the Board was "ready and willing to negotiate." He added "We're not that far apart. We have made movement."

He also read a memo written by Supt. Dr. Wilber Hawkins to staff members concerning sick leave, elimination of "special," and the ten-percent "wobble."

According to the memo, specials in the elementary level such as librarians, physical education, art, music, etc., will not be eliminated for 1979-80. Dr. Hawkins states "I have arrived at the numbers of staff members in each school in concert with each principal, separately. These staffings were based on projected enrollments and reflect the ratios and class sizes in the expired contract. In addition, the special teachers, librarians, etc., were not reduced in those projections."

The memo also states that the Board was prepared to guarantee in June the number of

individual staff members needed for 1979-80 based upon enrollments.

When asked by this reporter if the Board was using the 10% "wobble" to eliminate 10% of the teaching staff, Mr. Nagle stated, "No."

Dr. Hawkins then explained the 10% "wobble" using a kindergarten class as an example. Currently, the district-wide average for that class is 22 students.

"If total kindergarten enrollment is 220, the present contract would call for 10 teachers. Some classes would be small, some larger. If the total kindergarten enrollment increases to 222, the contract says we must add a teacher."

"The Board is asking that a 10% increase, or, as in this example, a total kindergarten enrollment of 242 be reached, before a teacher is added. Likewise, total kindergarten enrollment would have to decrease 10%, to 198, before a teacher would be let go," he explained.

At this point, HCT Treasurer Max Josephs stated that this item "would not be a part of a contract, but a codicil."

Dr. Hawkins stated, "Yes, this WOULD BE in the contract."

School Board attorney and negotiator Joseph Campanella also said, "Yes" to this point and added that "the guarantee" and names of individual teachers for 1979-80 would be separate from the contract."

HCT Recording Secretary Mike Senna later stated in regard to class size and district wide averages that the HCT had told the Board several times that they "would discuss and handle situations as they arose in each grade level." He later told this reporter "We will make every effort to work out a contract that's fair and equitable, but we won't capitulate."

Dr. Hawkins told this reporter, "Obviously, with declining enrollment there will be a reduction in class size but the guidelines of the contract will be used." He added that the specials were planned for in the 79-80 budget.

After Mr. Zaleski announced HCT's plans, Mr. Nagle stated that "non-mandated items come off the table automatically including the job security and class size already offered by the Board."

Mr. Zaleski answered that the guaranteed staffing offered was for 79-80. "It means devastation to the district the year after in our opinion," he said.

Also discussed was the opportunity for both sides to speak publicly and Mr. Zaleski mentioned the PTA Council's offer of an open forum back in January.

Mr. Nagle stated he "will speak in front of teachers anytime." Mr. Zaleski then invited Mr. Nagle to speak to his membership on Wednesday, March 21 at 4 p.m. at the senior high. Other Board members and Dr. Hawkins also were extended an invitation.

In response to Dr. Hawkins staff memo, Mr. Zaleski stated that the statements contained in the memo were "confusing" because each item would have to be dealt with separately and "we could refute or deny most of them."

Various teachers, some speaking emotionally, commented on the negotiation issue. Also discussed during the public speaking session was the status of "Serendipity", the district employee newsletter. Dr. Hawkins answered, when asked by teacher and resident Phil Provost if the publishing of this newsletter was stopped, "yes, in its present form." Dr. Hawkins stated it was administration's intent to "upgrade the publication."

Vandalism was discussed during the last public speaking session. After Dr. Hawkins revealed that damages for the period ending Dec. 31 totaled \$14,369, Paul Vetrano, a social studies teacher at the senior high, asked what the district and Board were providing in the way of security at night and during week-ends. He also asked if any kids have been apprehended and what action was taken. He added that the Board "must show unwavering support" to these teachers who enforce discipline in the halls. He stated that repercussions from students are felt when teachers cars are damaged. He suggested that another plan be "executed" since the present one is not working.

Other members of the public also spoke on the subject and President Nagle stated that the Board "appreciates the information" and a meeting would be set-up to develop a criteria to deal with the problem.

Board business and action will be reported on next week.

The purpose of the meeting is to learn what constitute Child Abuse as compared to Child Neglect, the emotional trauma involved on the part of parent and child, our responsibility when we suspect it is occurring in our immediate area, and other related information.

## Dear Friends . . .

This newspaper is attempting, to the best of its ability and its "reliable sources," to bring a clear understanding of just where negotiations between the Hicksville Congress of Teachers and the school district stand, each week. As you will be reading in Linda Strongin's article on page one of the Hicksville edition, Wednesday was a busy day in this particular arena.

At four pm the HTC held a general membership meeting and voted to strike by 11 pm on May 11th if a contract agreement had not been reached at that time. At the Board of Education meeting held on Wednesday night, much discussion occurred with apparent misunderstanding by some teachers and some resident taxpayers, as to what items were actually being negotiated. Mrs. Strongin's article is clear, as far as what was discussed at the school board meeting is concerned.

This brings us to one conclusion - everything negotiated should be either in writing or taped, since memory seems to conflict on some vital issues. For example, The class size demand with the 10% "wobble," explained in Mrs. Strongin's article, was offered by the Board of Education to be contained in the new contract and NOT in a separate letter outside the contract as contended by representatives of the HTC. This has been verified by the State Mediator, Mr. M. Scheineman.

We believe both sides are sincerely trying to negotiate but, the very fact that there could be a difference of opinion on what actually was said, points to the fact that better records of negotiating meetings are needed so that the truth can then be verified before any action, or either side be taken. Why? Because some of these unintentionally misinformed actions can be harmful to the children.

## A Message From Sup. Colby

Governor Carey's effort to force property tax increases by reducing State aid to Oyster Bay school districts by about \$7.4 million and by more than \$14.9 million County-wide is "the first shoe."

The "other shoe" Carey is ready to drop consists of still further reductions in State aid, this time to be stripped from local municipalities other than school districts.

Aid distribution by the State is, in effect, the return of dollars to the taxpayers who paid them out in the first place. In Nassau County, residents get back only \$1.00 for every \$3.60 they pay to the State. The Governor seeks to lessen that return by denying aid to schools and by taking some \$7.5 million away from the County. Nassau Towns and Villages in the next two years.

In Oyster Bay, the Governor proposes to lessen aid to the Town and Villages by about half a million dollars in the State's fiscal '79 year, and by almost \$900,000 in fiscal '80. This loss of about \$1,350,000 would be compounded for local taxpayers by the fact that the County government would lose an additional \$619,000 during the same period,

for a total loss in returned State tax dollars of almost \$2 million. Large numbers sometimes roll off the tongue rather easily, so, to put the aid loss into some perspective, consider the fact that a person with an annual salary of \$15,000 would have to work for more than 133 years to earn \$2 million.

Curiously enough, the Governor's plan, as it affects Villages, takes the most away from the more populous incorporated areas in Oyster Bay. Bayville and Sea Cliff would both lose more than \$15,000 in the next two years. Farmingdale would lose almost \$28,000 and Massapequa Park would lose more than \$71,500.

How can the County, Towns and Villages make up for these losses? The drastic aid reductions proposed by Carey for school districts would mean a significant disruption to educational quality and/or increased property taxes levied by local school boards. Similarly, the reductions in money to other municipalities would mean the loss of services they now perform and/or property tax increases. The battle by local State legislators against Carey's

proposed cuts is, therefore, critically important.

What's ironic about the situation is that the Governor has had the sheer gall to propose the creation of a State board to tell local governments how to cut property taxes. I think the board could be useful if it is established in such a way that school, village, town and county officials will have the opportunity to forcefully object to aid reductions and can achieve reforms of the forced spending that State mandates presently impose on local governments. The State board will need look no further than the administrative offices in Albany to discover local governments' biggest problems.

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## Pre-School Amblyopia Screening

The Hicksville Council of PTAs is again conducting its annual eye screening program for pre-school children in the district. The program is aimed primarily at detecting early cases of amblyopia (lazy eye) which can be treated successfully by covering the better eye and requiring the child to use the poor one. This condition must be treated before the age of six or vision in the weaker eye will be permanently impaired.

PTA volunteers from each of the elementary schools have been given training in this area by the Industrial Home For the Blind. They will carry out this testing in various locations and on different dates. The test is done in the form of a "game" so as not to frighten small children.

Parents of children 3 to 4 years and 11 months are urged to take advantage of this opportunity. They are advised to contact the PTA at the school their child will

attend. The unit presidents' names and phone numbers are in the school calendar. They may also call the schools directly for information.

Three of the schools have made their schedules available:

Lee Avenue ... Hicksville Public Library, Monday, March 19th 9:30AM - 12 Noon and 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM.

East Street ... March 28th, room No. 114 at the school, 3:15 - 4:00PM. Children who will be eligible for kindergarten in the fall of '79 may be tested.

Burns Avenue ... March 27th, 28 from 2 - 3:30 at the school for ages 3 and 4.

Some additional information: Amblyopia cannot be outgrown. The testing is free, and parents are urged to refer to the testing as a "game" when bringing in their children.

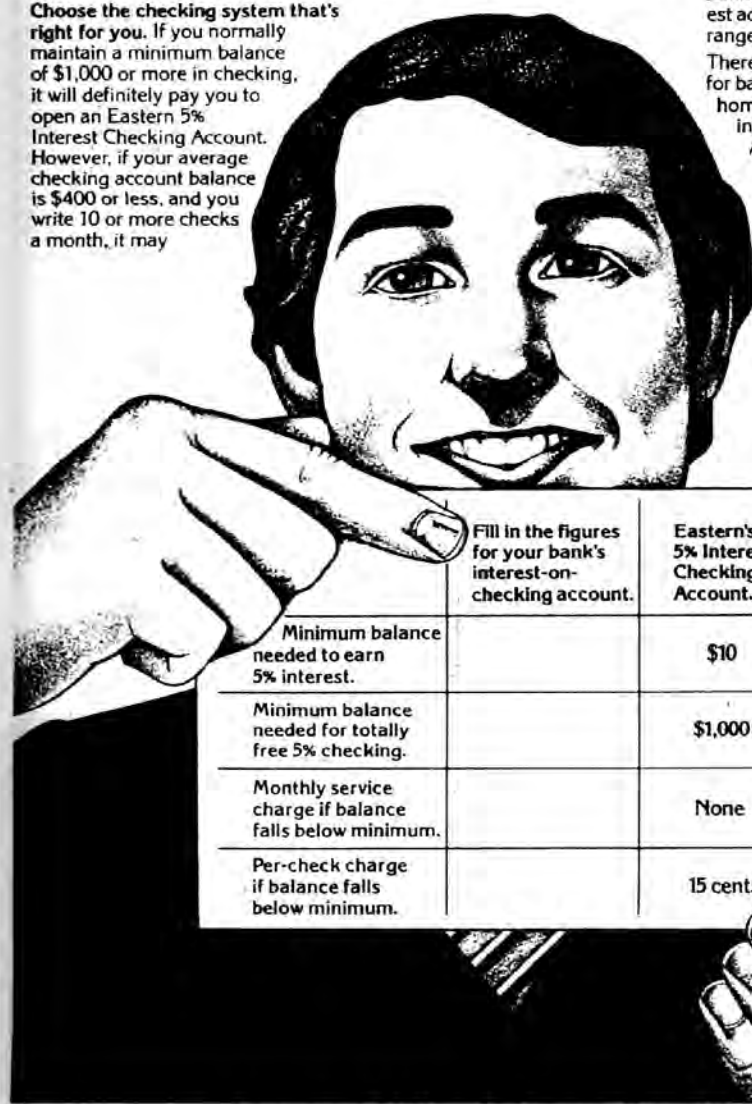
