Assistant Superintendent For Elementary Schools Appointed

Dr. Catherine Fenton was named assistant superintendent for elementary schools by the Hicksville Board of Education at its meeting Wednesday evening. The appointment is effective July 1 at a yearly salary of \$41,000.

Absent from the meeting were Trustees Iris Wolfson and John Ayres.

Dr. Fenton has been Director of Personnel for the Roslyn Public Schools for the past two years. In this capacity she has been responsible for personnel procedures for over 500 professional and civil service employees as well as for negotiations, contract management and grievance procedures.

Dr. Fenton began her educational career as an elementary school teacher and has 13 years experience in that area. Later she became an assistant principal for an elementary school in Setauket.

Prior to being Director of Personnel, Dr. Fenton was principal for two K-3 grades primary schools, with an enrollment of 950 students, in Roslyn.

Dr. Fenton, whose areas of subject specialization are reading, language arts, and thinking skills, received her doctorate from Teachers College, at Columbia University and her B.S. and M.S. degrees in elementary education from Queens College.

She has been an instructor on the college level and has written articles for professional journals.

In recommending Dr. Fenton, to the Board, Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins stated, "Dr. Fenton has been highly recommended by the Superintendent in Roslyn, who stated to me their loss was our gain."

Dr. Fenton stated to this reporter "I am glad the strike is over and we can refocus our energy to the education of our children and regaining the joy one usually has in the teaching profession. I look forward to working with the teaching staff

During the public speaking session, several parents asked the Board to reconsider their position of extending the school year to June 25. The Board has designated Monday, June 25 as the make-up day for May 14. Dr. Hawkins explained that this was part of the settlement with the Hicksville Congress of Teachers. Resident Arlene Rudin asked the Board to reconsider and "find an alternative such as a conference day for the teachers. It is unfair to penalize the kids who did attend and therefore have fulfilled their 183 days of attendance."

Trustee Neil McCormack suggested that the Board and central administration "go over alternatives on the issue, and come up with a final answer."

Also coming under heavy attack by residents was the subject of substitutes on the junior high level. Resident Steve Katz objected to his son having four teachers out on the junior high level. "He had four periods of babysitting," he questioned the procedures for "auditing substitutes" which, according to Dr. Hawkins, is the responsibility of the building administrator. "The principal has the authority to put substitutes on a priority list."

Mr. Katz also stated that perhaps the rate of pay for subs, which is \$35 per day, could be a factor in the difficulty the administration is having in ob-

taining subs. Dr. Hawkins stated that "it could be the problem, but other districts pay less and some pay more."

Dr. Hawkins stated that "there were 71 teachers out today, district-wide, with 33 out on the junior high level."

The normal absentee rate on the junior high level averages 7 to 8 per day and district-wide averages 26 per day.

Peg Costigan, a junior high honors math teacher, who has been teaching in the district for 10 years, spoke on the conditions in the junior high. She stated she was concerned with the education in Hicksville and took exception to these conditions, which included, among others, the students roaming the halls, making it difficult for her to teach her classes; the lack of a response when trying to communicate with the principal's office about the problem; the lack of educational supervision and school supervision. "There was a time when the assistant principals were assigned to each corner at the beginning and end of the school day. This is no longer true." She also questioned the end-of-year testing schedule, which calls for one test a day the last two hours of the day. "This is not practical in June."

Dr. Hawkins gave the following information to questions asked by various residents:

- the total cost to the district for the "authorized absence" on May 14 was \$7,000. This cost was for subs, security guards, and newspaper ads.

- the roll-over funds for this year will total \$300,000 plus.

- the proposed budget calls for a 90 cent increase;

- the Council of Administrators and the Board's negotiator were working toward a settlement of their contract, which expired June 30, 1978.

The annual budget hearing will be held on Thursday, May 31 at which time residents can inform the school board of any changes in the figures they wish the Board to consider.

Escalators To MTA

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark has announced the formal approval by the Town Board to transfer ownership of the escalators at the Hicksville railroad station to the Metropolitan Transportation Authority as of July 1, 1979.

"This places responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the escalators where it belongs, with the agency that operates the railroad and maintains the stations," Clark said.

Town Supervisor Joseph Colby reported that MTA Chairman Harold Fisher has informed him that the agency plans to install new escalators to replace the present ones at the Hicksville station. The installation is expected to take 42 weeks from the time of the awarding of the bids.

The Town had to form an Escalator District to pay for the installation of the escalators 20 years ago because the Long Island Railroad would not do so when it elevated the tracks at that time.

the children of Hicksville, the Board of Education "won" the following:

- At the end of the 1979-80 school year, there will be no contract provisions or guarantees of jobs for teachers of art, music, and physical education in the elementary schools. Some of these programs have already been curtailed by staff reductions. With further reductions, how will the children receive what is rightfully theirs?

- By the end of the 1980-81 school year, the number of certified librarians, special education teachers, guidance counselors, speech therapists, psychologists and school-nurse

teachers will be drastically reduced with the removal of pupil-teacher ratios in these areas. How will the Board of Education meet the needs of special students as legislated by federal and state laws with the curtailment of such services?

Under the guise of concern for the children, the Hicksville Board of Education has repeatedly stated that these demands were necessary in order to improve the education in the district by giving them greater managerial control. What qualifications do the Board members have to make such indiscriminate decisions regarding the education of all the children in their charge? What do they really know about the complicated and multi-faceted process of education? It appears that their concern was directed more towards "controlling" teachers than educating children.

As a teacher in Hicksville, I find it very difficult to comprehend how these actions will provide quality education in the years ahead. I wonder how many parents feel the same as I.

More Elderly Will Qualify For Tax Exemption

Under a bill sponsored by State Senator Ralph J. Marino and passed by both houses of the Legislature, more homeowners over the age of 65 will be able to apply for a 50 percent exemption from the bulk of real property taxes they pay. Marino, who co-sponsored the bill with State Senator John Caemmerer (R-East Williston), announced that the income eligibility level has been raised to \$8000. Currently, a homeowner's income must not exceed a \$7200 ceiling in order for a senior citizen to qualify for an exemption.

If signed by the Governor and adopted by local governments, the benefit would be retroactive to January 1, 1979. Marino, a Syosset Republican, said in that eventuality, the May 1 deadline for filing would be extended to August 1, 1979.

In Nassau County, a 50 percent exemption is allowed on school, county, town and highway taxes on real property to eligible applicants. Incorporate villages may also adopt their own 50 percent exemption. However, special district taxes for sanitation, police,

water and lighting are not reduced. For the purpose of eligibility, income includes earnings, social security, pensions, capital gains, interest and dividends.

Marino is urging citizens to write to Governor Hugh Carey, Capitol, Albany, New York 12224, to urge his approval of bill No. S. 7.

Fried Chicken For Sylvia Lane?

An application has been filed with the Oyster Bay Town Board for the downzoning of property at the northeast corner of the Plainview intersection of Sylvia Lane and Old Country Road from "Residential D" to "Business F". The applicant wants to put a "Church's Fried Chicken" on the property, with entrances and exits both on Sylvia and on Old Country Road. The Town Board Hearing on the application has been scheduled for June 26.

The Greater Plainview Community Association has announced its opposition to the proposed zoning change. "Those of us who are familiar with the

already incredible traffic situation at this intersection (only 75 feet west of the Seaford-Oyster Bay Expressway exit) find it difficult to believe that anybody could seriously consider compounding the problem even further with a fast food restaurant on this site," observed GPCA President Carol Eisenstein. "A similar application for downzoning this property was turned down by the Town Board in 1966, and we hope that our Town Fathers will do the same on this one."

GPCA efforts in this matter are being coordinated by Mickey Holtz (433-6733) and Mike Polansky (433-0919).

Receives Award

I was greatly disappointed to read in the May 10th edition of the Herald a letter from an individual, who should be considered among those who share some responsibility of community leadership, totally misdirecting the residents of Hicksville.

In his letter, Dr. Walter Dunbar, Hicksville Chamber of Commerce president, recognizes that the State is responsible and authorized to maintain Route 106/107 in Hicksville, but he advocates that the people demand that the Town of Oyster Bay undertake this duty. He urges that letters be written to Town Councilman Thomas Clark.

His reasoning is that because the State isn't fulfilling its responsibility, then the Town of Oyster Bay should handle it. How many times must the people of Hicksville pay taxes for the maintenance of Route 106/107? They are already paying the State for this maintenance. Should they now be asked to pay someone else to obtain a service for which they are already paying to the State?

I'd suggest that Dr. Dunbar re-examine his thinking. If the State is not maintaining its roads, then the people should voice their demands to State authorities, not to a town councilman. The most a town councilman can do is voice the demand to the proper authorities.

Instead of misdirecting the efforts of the people, I believe Dr. Dunbar would better serve the Hicksville community if he told the people that they should register their demands with the State Transportation Department with copies sent to the five State Legislators elected by Hicksville residents to make sure Hicksville is receiving its share of State services. Don't ask the people to pay again for a service they have already paid for. Urge instead that they demand the State to give Hicksville some of the services the State is responsible to provide this community.

To the Editor:

The new contract negotiated by the Hicksville Board of Education with the teacher's union will enable the board and the administration to better manage Hicksville's huge school budget. In fact, the proposed tax rate increase of \$1.79 has already been reduced to under one dollar and will probably be reduced even further before being presented to the voters for approval. The new contract and lowered tax rate increase will not in any way lower our Hicksville standard of education.

Over the years as I attended school board meetings closely following board operations and becoming familiar with school budgetary procedures, it was readily apparent that my accounting education and extensive management background served me well in understanding the issues before the board. However, I began to wonder how residents without that background could understand the budget. Questions asked at board meetings were usually answered by advanced degree educators with long and complicated answers in educational jargon. Thus residents would leave board meetings feeling frustration and perhaps even anger which would vent over at the polling place and defeat school budgets. Those budget defeats, affecting only students and parents, created animosity among students and animosity between neighbors.

To have a sound education system in Hicksville, it must have the support of all Hicksville residents. To gain that support residents must understand what they are supporting. The budget spells out the school's goals and objectives in monetary terms. Therefore the budget must be made simpler for people to understand. If it is, then unnecessary spending and bloat will be highlighted and easier to eliminate. AND budget simplification is one of the goals of my candidacy for the school board. In this way, the concerns of students and parents can be coupled with the concerns of the poor, those with low/middle income, and the elderly whose incomes for the most part are fixed.
