The Council Hears The Pros And Cons Of Strand III

The second half of the October 4th Hicksville Community Council meeting was devoted to Strand III. Dr. Catherine Fenton discussed the questionnaire which will be distributed at all the school meetings to be held in the next two months, while Phyllis Hundertmark said why she is opposed to the proposal.

Dr. Fenton opened the segment by stating that the Committee to study Strand III has been in existence for a year and a half. The State Education Department created curriculum guides which they broke up into strands, including personality development, family living and human sexuality. The Board had voted for Strand III but the community feedback says that the Strand is not wanted.

So it has been decided to get parent input. There will be two meetings in every elementary school building, one during the day and one at night, with a presentation at each of what Strand III would be like from levels K through 12. There will be two demonstration lessons and then each parent in attendance will be asked to fill in a questionnaire. The districtwide results will be collected and compiled. There will be meetings in the Junior and Senior High

after December.

Dr. Fenton stressed that IF such a program were to be put into effect, she would first talk to the staff and ask them if they would feel comfortable teaching such a subject. If there are only a few children in each class whose parents would agree to the Strand, the School Nurse might teach it. At the present time, though, she is looking for parent input.

Phyllis Hundertmark, a nurse and mother of four, 2 of which attend Hicksville Schools and 2 are younger than K level, is glad that Strand III is being open to discussion. She is a Mormon with strong religious beliefs and feels that something as important as sex should be taught in the home. Each child should be taught according to their emotional maturity, for all children develop at different levels.

Mrs. Hundertmark feels that teaching sex education in schools makes the children feel that they have been given a license to practice what they have just learned, since it is taught without any moral values. She feels that sex education taught in the lower grades disturbs the latent period of a child between the ages of 6 through 10.

She is also opposed to the mental health portion of Strand

III, the sensitivity training, which encourages children to conform to the will of the group and violates family privacy.

(Both the pro and con of the Strand were very intelligently stated. The Council hopes to recall this topic at its February meeting, when the results of the survey are tallied.)

At the Town Meeting: Councilman Clark urged everyone to return the G-1 survey flyer to Town Hall as soon as possible. Deadline is October 31st. King Kelly was proud to announce that the beautiful new addition to Hicksville, the Memorial Fountain, was completed by the Kiwanis Club. King thanked all for their support. The Republican Club urges everyone to register and vote. And Father Chiannella held the blessing of the animals on Sunday, October 7th.

King Kelly reminded us that the height of Gertz is 105 feet and the railroad station is much lower, when G-1 was discussed in the paper two weeks ago.

At the next Community Council meeting which is to be held on Thursday, November 1st, there will be a "Meet The Candidates Night," where candidates from all parties for the Town and County level have been invited. Hope you will be there, for a well-informed Hicksville.

The Chamber Of Commerce Speaks Out Again On G-1

In line with the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce's intention to minutely examine the G-1 Zone in the downtown area of Hicksville, this week we would like to point out one of the basic restrictions that has made implementation of such zoning requirements almost impossible.

When we try to study the list of building restrictions, one of the first items we are confronted with is the size of the minimum buildable plot. In order to build ANYTHING in the subject area, we are told that you must have a minimum of 20,000 Square Feet of land. For the benefit of people who may not be familiar with what this means, we are talking about almost a half acre.

Upon making a study of the entire area encompassing the G-1 Zone, there are practically no plots large enough to qualify. How then can a zoning requirement be serving the general public if almost every property owner would be disqualified on only the "first" requirement, let alone the rest?

Given this impossible restriction, you may very well

reach the conclusion that it would be necessary for some owners of vacant land in the area to "join forces" and "assemble" a legally buildable plot by "banding together". This is not quite as simple or easy as it sounds, generally speaking. As an example, if interested residents and taxpayers will ride down Broadway and study the vacant, scarred, desecrated areas containing mud puddles and debris on the Westerly side, consider that in more than one of those blocks, if all the property from one side street to the next were "assembled", there would still not be a buildable plot.

This, of course, does not take into consideration many of the other impossible restrictions. Watch for the Chamber's article next week. In the meantime, interested citizens with specific questions on G-1 might do well to consult with Tom Clark, our local Councilman, or Joseph Colby, Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay. They like to know that you are interested, as you very well should be.

At the various P.T.A. meetings where the K-3 Strand III curriculum was introduced, the discussions were always prefaced by the invited speaker making reference to the deplorable increases in teenage pregnancies, V.D. and abortions. This was followed by the flat statement that, "This is why we need sex education in Hicksville".

Curiously, the curriculum is silent on the subject. Also, no where in Hicksville has the claim been made by anyone in writing or by the administration even verbally that a sex ed program would accomplish a reduction in teenage pregnancies, V.D. or abortions. The reason is clear - it

won't. Even the premiere sex ed guru in the country, Dr. Mary Calderone (of SIECUS and Planned Parenthood fame), doesn't claim it, and her most prominent associates, Dr. Lester Kirkendall and Dr. Isador Rubin emphatically reject notion.

Then why do we have this push for sex ed in the schools? Obviously there are those who are honestly trying to solve the problem for their own children at least, but are misinformed. They don't realize that sex ed is part of the problem, not the solution. Then there are the professionals who feed on the sex education industry - organizations like Planned Parenthood, the publishing houses, the pharmaceutical companies, the contraceptive industry and finally, the abortion industry. There are hundreds of millions, if not billions, of dollars to be made here. At the core are the ideologists who want to control the world's population, especially the population of the poor; and people with severe sexual hangups who desperately need public absolution.

The kind of sex education advocated by the Coalition Against Strand III (C.A.S.T.) is traditional, and focuses on each child as an individual, at his own unique stage of mental, physical and emotional development. This precludes a classroom approach. Preferably a parent should instruct the child, but if not, then someone chosen by the parents, so that the family's moral values can be taught on an individual basis. In such a setting, only enough information should be given to satisfy the needs of the moment. Sexual information given prematurely only serves to heighten anxiety and to cause obsessive thinking.

The basis of C.A.S.T.'s position on this issue is not mere opinion. The experience of Sweden with 20 years of compulsory sex education is instructive. By 1976 33% of all live births were illegitimate, even though half of all teenage pregnancies were aborted. And Sweden has the highest V.D. rate in the world. In 1973 a petition was signed by 200,000 people stating that

children misinterpreted sexual instruction for sexual encouragement. According to Sweden's National Board of Health, "The young people just don't seem to care".

Denmark is another example. Sex ed was made compulsory in 1970. In the last 10 years, assault rape has increased 300%; V.D. in the above 20 age group increased 200%; in the 16 to 20 age group 250%; and in the under 15 age group 400%. Abortions increased 500% and the illegitimacy rate doubled. The same has happened wherever sex education has been introduced.

We don't want this epidemic to happen to our children, or to yours.

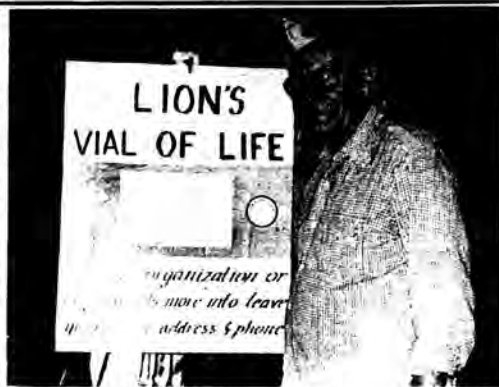

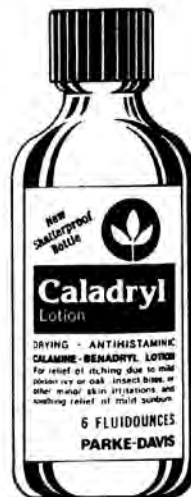

Warning To Residents

Nassau County District Attorney Denis Dillon today issued a strong warning to residents and business people who may be approached to donate money to an organization known as the New York State Detective Investigator P.B.A. Solicitors from this organization have claimed to represent officials from the Nassau County District Attorney's Office, which is not true.

Dillon said, "The Nassau D.A.'s Office neither participates in nor condones this form of fund raising activity. On the contrary, I oppose such solicitation and will take immediate and positive

action against anyone misrepresenting themselves as being affiliated with this Office."

The D.A. said his office is presently looking for two individuals who allegedly misrepresented themselves while soliciting funds for the State Detective Investigators P.B.A. Complainants report that they were told that this organization represents the Detective investigators who work in the Nassau County District Attorney's Office, when in fact, this group does not represent any of the Investigators in the Nassau D.A.'s Office. When apprehended, the individuals will be

charged with Criminal Impersonation.

Dillon said, "In approaching Nassau residents and business people, solicitors for the D.I.P.B.A. would ask that they take out an ad in your journal. The cost of a half page advertisement was \$750.00, and a full page was for more than \$1200.00. In exchange, contributors were told they would be given a bronze plaque to be affixed to their car's bumper, and D.I.P.B.A. cards. Potential contributors were told that this wasn't a license to break the law, but added, the plaque and cards are respected by all police agencies in the area."

The District Attorney said this was another example of the need for local legislation to prohibit such solicitation, Dillon said, "My office and the Nassau County Police Department have proposed legislation to the County Board of Supervisors which would prohibit such direct solicitation by fund raising organizations. Under our proposal, only solicitation by mail would be permitted. This would eliminate the hard-sell approach now being used door to door and over the telephone.

Again, I am calling on the Board of Supervisors to enact this proposal immediately."
