Vamps, Cops Free Pinned Drivers

Hicksville firefighters along with Nassau County Cops worked for over one hour to free two drivers trapped in their vehicles following a severe head-on collision on Nov. 17 on Woodbury Rd. at Ketcham Rd., Hicksville.
 Several Hurst rescue tools were required to extricate the victims. Mutual aid assistance was requested from the Plainview F.D. and Nassau County Police Emergency service units. The Jericho F.D. stood by for any additional rescue calls.
 The alarm came in at 2:55 a.m. One victim was pinned so badly

that the roof of his vehicle has to be removed. He was treated and given IV's while vamps and cops worked to free him. Other vamps washed down leaking gasoline to prevent a fire from starting. Both drivers suffered severe injuries, but were reported to be in stable condition as of mid-day Nov. 17. One passenger was injured but not seriously.

Chamber Opposes Taking G-1 Land Off Tax Rolls At Present

In an all-out effort to see that no additional property is taken off the tax rolls, the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, at a well-attended general meeting held at the Milleridge Inn on Tuesday, Nov. 20, voted unanimously to approve the following motion and to send the following letter to Town of Oyster Bay Supervisor Joseph Colby:

Dear Supervisor Colby:

Please be advised that at today's General Membership meeting of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, the following motion was unanimously approved: "That the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce go on record as being opposed to the acquisition

of any additional land in the Hicksville area by the Town of Oyster Bay for parking purposes, until such time as all existing facilities owned by the Town in this area are thoroughly studied, analyzed, and investigated as to potential improvement for any usage for additional parking purposes."

Our Chamber of Commerce membership respectfully requests that the Town Board recognize this position before any "stop-gap" decisions are made which could effect the proper development of the Hicksville area.

- (4) usage of air rights over the LIRR tracks.

Board Approves Job Descriptions

The Hicksville Board of Education approved various job descriptions at its meeting last Wednesday. The job descriptions had been discussed by the Board at a special meeting open to the public the previous week. Job descriptions for the following positions were approved: Assistant Superintendents for Elementary and Secondary; Director of Pupil Personnel; Assistant Director of Pupil Personnel; Director of Personnel; chairperson of Department, Foreign Language, 7-12; and Director of Evening High School. Absent from the meeting was Trustee Neil McCormack who was away on vacation.

Trustee Virginia Germer questioned the responsibility of the Chairperson of Department, Foreign Language 7-12 as it pertained to the elementary foreign language program. "I know that on the elementary level the foreign language teacher reports to the building principal. Does the chairperson

have any contact with the elementary teachers?" Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins replied that any contact would be "through the assistant superintendent for elementary and in the case of a principal asking for help with programs or evaluations."

Concerning the job description for Supervisor of Cultural and Performing Arts, Mrs. Germer questioned the certification requirement being in only one of three areas: music, art or the performing arts. "How can a person be in charge of all these areas and have certification in only one?"

Dr. Hawkins explained that this was often the case with a generalist and gave an example of a foreign language supervisor "not speaking all languages," yet being responsible for teachers teaching the various languages. He added it would be difficult to find a person certified in two or three areas, but it would be most desirable.

Mrs. Germer was hesitant on approving this job description

asking if it would "water down the existing music program." Dr. Hawkins stated this was not the intent. He added, "Art has not had any supervision nor has performing arts." Mrs. Germer voted no on this job description.

The job descriptions for Director of Physical Education and Health and for Chairperson of Department, Health and Physical Education 7-12 also were discussed at length. Vice President John Aynes stated a "superman" would have to be found to carry out all the responsibilities and duties listed. He asked several times, "How can one person do it?"

Among the duties and responsibilities of this position are teaching two classes; overseeing physical education teachers in two buildings; scheduling and overseeing interscholastic sports; keeping an athletic inventory; preparing an athletic budget; evaluating personnel; preparing a schedule of athletic events; and super-

Individuals Must Learn Self-Protection Against Fire

You owe it to your loved ones, when a fire starts in your home, or when your smoke detector alerts you, to have a well-rehearsed plan to escape. An alternate exit should be set up in case a normal one is blocked. Once outside, a pre-determined spot for everyone to meet should also be set up.

With new building materials and heavy use of plastics and synthetics, we are continually increasing our chances of dying by fire. Arson is also rising at an alarming rate. When visiting strange buildings, don't assume there is a second exit - seek one out - it could save your life. The Beverly Hills Supper Club disaster in Kentucky is a prime example. Many there did not know the way out, and perished as a result. Any locked or blocked exits should be reported and corrected at once. Whenever you sleep, eat, work, play, shop, entertain, always have two ways of getting out in case of emergency.

Exit violations are most prevalent on holiday nights and weekends, when fire inspectors are not

working. Death knows no holidays. The fire inspector is not there, but you are. Your presence demands compliance. Call the fire department if all else fails to correct a violation. You are the authority over your life. Don't gamble or press your luck - learn not to burn - look for two ways out.

On vacation - keep a flashlight handy at night. Make it part of your luggage when you travel. Many resorts don't have fire alarms or smoke detectors. Bring along a smoke detector. It could be your only warning. Before you retire at night, count the doors from your door to the exit. This will be valuable to you in event of darkness or smoke conditions or panic.

Just last year many people were killed in a motel fire in upstate New York. Many did not know how to get out of 1st and 2nd floor rooms. There were no fire alarms.

Protect your loved ones - buy an approved smoke detector. Remember, smoke detectors never sleep.

The F-18 is being developed and produced by McDonnell Douglas, the prime contractor, in association with Northrop, the major subcontractor. The Navy and Marine Corps plan to purchase 1,366 of the new multirole aircraft which is designed to replace two existing planes, the F-4 Phantom Fighter and A-7 Corsair light attack aircraft.

Letters To The Editor

To The Editor:

About a year ago Ellen Massey, head of the Nassau County Coalition for Family Planning (NCCFP) was invited by the PTA to explain Strand III - sex education to Dutch Lane parents. That coalition includes Planned Parenthood and the East Gate abortion clinic. According to one of their newsletters, one of their major issues of concern is potential services to minors without parental consent.

We wondered aloud, "Are they looking for customers?" We felt the answer was obvious, - of course they are. Planned Parenthood has invaded schools all over the country looking for customers. But in Nassau County things apparently haven't been moving fast enough.

For instance, the drive to introduce Strand III into Hicksville has been stalled because of parental opposition. So now they've started advertising on the radio. Heard on WGBB in recent days, one part of the commercial goes, "I don't want to tell you how to live or what to do, - that's not my place. But I do want you to learn the facts for yourself so you can make the best decision for you. Confidential birth control information or referral is available free at any age." Then later, "This message brought to

you by the Nassau County Coalition for Family Planning."

It's bad enough this is on the radio, without being in the schools where the authority of the teachers and the school would be behind it. Certainly no parent would want their 10 year old daughter deciding for herself that she would like to become sexually active.

At this point it's well to remember that the PTA makes no bones about its approval and encouragement of sex education, and that it was the PTA that invited the NCCFP into our schools. This could be a very potent combination, - the PTA leading unsuspecting parents and their children down the garden path to the contraceptive and abortive services of the Nassau County Coalition for Family Planning through sex education in the public schools. In their haste, though, they've smoked themselves out into the open. Now it's up to parents to react.

There are at least two things that parents can do: first call a school board member on the telephone and tell him (her) that you don't want Strand III, and secondly, tell the officers of your local PTA unit that you want the PTA to drop its endorsement of sex education. Now is the time that they start preparing

resolutions for next year's New York State PTA convention. If you don't do it, who will?

clude what will happen to your estate if you die without a will, what the layman should know about estate planning to save taxes, the need for an experienced executor, the pitfalls of being an executor and how they can be avoided, the necessity for appointing a guardian for infant children, rights of surviving spouse, adopted children, illegitimate children, formalities

of will-drafting, estate administration, the attorney's role in estate planning and estate administration, how soon an estate can be completed, cost in administering an estate, emergencies that arise in estate administration, jointly-held property, trusts, small estates and other matters generally dealing with estates.

A question period will follow.

A Message From Sup. Colby

Last week there was again a hearing by the State Public Service Commission to take testimony relating to another rate hike request by another public utility.

Whether it's the telephone company, the water company or Lilco, these hearings always seem to have one theme in common: costs for the utility have gone up and rate hikes must be granted so the utility can keep pace.

Despite constant calls by elected officials for the utility to share the inflation burden that we all face, the rate hike hearings are almost unanimous in the theme that attempts to just pass the costs along to consumers.

The hearing last week discussed a 2.5 percent rate hike requested by Lilco. My colleague on the Nassau County Board of Supervisors, North Hempstead Town Supervisor Mike Tully, submitted testimony which echoes the often repeated and common sense conclusion that cost increases should not automatically be passed on to consumers. "Like all concerns in a free enterprise system, Lilco's return should vary with the market conditions," Supervisor

Tully stated.

What he was talking about was the PSC use of a common equity ratio of 13.7 percent as the amount of return allowed to Lilco. I'm sure any businessman who was guaranteed a profit such as that would have very little incentive to make his business run more efficiently so his costs would be cut. It certainly seems to me that the guarantee return is a matter the PSC should be reconsidering.

When elected officials prepare budgets, they don't automatically pass along cost increases. Efficiency within Oyster Bay Town operations has been a constant guide and despite the inflation rates of the past few years, we have managed to hold the tax line on the General Town Budget for three straight years and now will be lowering that tax for 1980.

Perhaps if Lilco or other utility stockholders were not assured of a certain return, they too would feel the need to incorporate management techniques that could make operations more efficient. While any utility may be doing a good job, its ability to just pass along cost increases to its customers and to be assured of

a certain return despite the efficiency or inefficiency of operations, certainly does not provide a sufficient encouragement for increasing operating efficiency.

While the responsibility of the elected officials to cut costs is enforced through the elective process, there seems to be no outside incentive that could force utility stockholders or management to be constantly searching for more efficient operations.

While you may believe this to be common sense, these arguments have been presented time and again and the result has been PSC approval of rate increases. There is no doubt in my mind that the result of the PSC hearing last week will result in some rate increase being granted to Lilco.

Perhaps the State should reorganize the PSC.

Exploring Long Island

Fourth graders from Wilket Avenue School, Hicksville, with teachers Roselyn Katz and Doris Phillips, had a glimpse into the history of their region with a fascinating day at the Garvies Point Museum and Nature Preserve.

A tour of the museum's exhibits included regional geology and a glimpse at how the Indians lived in this area.
