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Launch Drunk Driver Program

In a two-pronged action focusing on both enforcement and public awareness. Nassau County Police Commissioner Samuel J. Rozzi today launched the department's annual holiday campaign against drunk drivers. The tibn cub. for biotechical The plan calls for the establishment of selective enforcement areas coupled with an expanded public education program to cut the number of traffic accidents and deaths during the coming holiday nervod.

Roza. "The week including
Christmas is the most active time
for drunk driver arrests, and
alcohol related deaths and accidents in the county For this
reason we maximize our efforts

The Nassau County Police
Department has designated 12
primary enforcement areas,
throughout the county that will
receive special attention from the
Highway. Patrol enforcement
cars. Precinct sector cars and
TEAM grant personnel during
the next six weeks. (TEAM
personnel are federally funded
police officers assigned strictly to

police officers assigned strictly to traffic enforcement.) The areas traffic enforcementa. The areas were chosen based on an analysis of traffic accidents, traffic deaths, speed controls, previous drunk driving arrests and the density of establishments serving alcoholic beverages. With the concentration of enforcement efforts in systematically selected trouble areas, the department expects to impact not only the drunk driver but any driver violating the vehicle and traffic laws.

These primary enforcement areas include: Hempstead Turnpike from Suffolk County line to Hempstead Village line: Pemnsula Boulevard from Peninsula Boulevard from Sunrise Highway to Rockaway Turnpike: Broadway, Hicksville from John Street to Jericho

Turnpike
The department declines to identify all of the areas so as not to compromise its enforcement

The second part of the plan calls for a greater public in-formation effort to make the residents of the county more aware of the problem. Com-missioner Rozzi has sent over 2.000 letters to large/corporations and businesses in the county tisking for their help in curbing the drunk driver problem.

"During the nonday season it is the so called "office party" that generates a high percentage of drunk driver problems," stated Rozzi "Our goal is to ask employers to be more aware of the problem this year and try to make some provisions to avoid a

make some provisions to avoid a tragedy."
"Our goal is not to arrest a record number of drunk drivers during the holiday season," stated Rozzi, "We want to prevent that driver from drinking and becoming a menace on the road. Each year the media carries a tragic story of a family injured or killed in an auto accident caused by a drunk driver. I cident caused by a drunk driver. I want to make an effort to prevent that from happening this year."

New Food Stamps Rules

New food stamp rules to help elderly or disabled persons will go into effect on January 1, 1980, go into effect on January
State Social Services Commissioner Barbara B. Blum
announced recently

announced recently
The changes will provide
special medical and shelter
deductions for persons who are
age 80 or older, or who receive
Supplemental Security Income
ISSI or disability payments
under the Social Security Act,
Mrs. Blums and

under the Social Security Act, Mrs. Blum said.

Because food stamp eligibility and benefits are based largely on net monthly income after certain deductions are subtracted, the new deductions will help more

households qualify and will mean extra benefits for some.

Under the new regulations, disabled or elderly persons can deduct from their incomes medical costs exceeding \$35 each month which are not reim-bursable by third-party in-surance. The revisions also allow deduction of shelter costs which exceed half of adjusted income.

The new guidelines will benefit the elderly and disabled who have been hard hit by this year's federal food stamp eligibility rules, which eliminated medical deductions and placed a limit on shelter deductions

have long been recognized as substitute parents. At recent community meetings, and in this and other local publications, the organized opponents of the Strand III Mental Health curriculum have not only purposely and falsely misrepresented the concepts and content of the curriculum, but have launched an unwarranted attack on the quality, qualifica-tions, sexuality, and sensitivity of

our K-3 teaching staff.



During World War II, he organized and was "Chief Observer" for the Plainview Post, Army Air Force I fighter command aircraft warning ser-vice under the direction of Mit-chel Field and the War Depart-ment, Washington, D.C. 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abolish the one-year proba-tionary period. It is the aim of the New York State School Boards New York State School Boards Association to reinstate that provision. Without the penalties of the Taylor Law, there will be few incentives for unions to settle strikes. The result would be protracted struggles to the detriment of everyone involved. Parents and taxpayers should become aware of legislation that attempts to weaken the Taylor attempts to weaken the Taylor Law. They should contact their local representatives in the State Senate and Assembly to let them know that the public is watching them and that the Taylor Law should be strenghtened NOT

WEAKENED.

In a related matter, a resolution was presented and accepted that would regulate the structure and organization of public employee organizations to guarantee free and democratic elections by secret ballot, prevent corruption, require complete audits of the union's fiscal affairs, require filing and public disclosure of detailed public disclosure of detailed reports on their assets, liabilities. individual salaries and expense of officers and employees, and

prohibit loans or gifts to officers, employees or members. In the private sector, labor unions are governed by the Taft-Hartley law the Landrum-Griffin Act. However, public employee organizations are not covered by either law. One of the points. organizations are not covered by either law. One of the points made on this issue was that permitting public employee organizations to conduct their activities without regulation and public scrutiny invited abuse and the corruption of a democratic society. There exists no mechanism for requiring free and democratic splicition of union. and democratic election of union and democratic election of union officials or access to union records and decision-making structures. Such guarantees exist in the private sector and there is

in the private sector and there is reason to support similar legislation in the public sector.

In another labor-related resolution, the delegates agreed to seek legislation that will equalize influence over legislators and the laws they produce by making employee groups subject to the same restrictions on political campaign contributions and financial disclosure statements, as are now in effect CRACE EXPLINICE.
