Colby Details Mass Transit Needs

Recommendations and priorities to improve mass transportation in the Town of Oyster Bay were submitted in a report this week to State Senator John Caemmerer, chairman of the state legislative committee on critical transportation choices, according to Town Supervisor Joseph Colby.

"Some of these recommendations, such as the electrification of the Long Island Railroad's Oyster Bay line and the reopening of the Landis station, we have been requesting for a long time," Colby noted. "Others are an outgrowth of recent demands resulting from the rising costs and potential shortages of gasoline."

Included in the recommendations was the financing of additional commuter parking facilities by the Metropolitan Transportation Authority to make the railroad more attractive and available to the commuter. Colby noted that the Town already has redesigned and

rebuilt parking fields in Syosset, increasing parking capacity there by over 40 percent, and a similar project will be carried out in Massapequa this coming spring.

Colby also called for a greater effort to promote commuter use of bus service. "Many Long Islanders were pleasantly surprised by the convenience and comfort of bus travel when forced to use it during the recent LIRR strike," Colby said. He also cited the need for greater public awareness of local MSBA bus service links with Long Island Railroad stations and the critical need for north-south bus service in the Town, which is virtually nonexistent now.

Fire Department Visits Local School

Since 1968 when Hicksville Protection Hook and Ladder Company No. 1 was organized (Equipment: 1 wagon), and 1890 when \$700 was raised by public subscription for a hand and horse drawn hook and ladder truck, there has been great public interest and pride in the Hicksville Volunteer Fire Department.

With sophisticated modern equipment for both rescue calls and fire emergencies, it is important to residents that they be aware of the many services available from the department, and the skill of the trained volunteers.

Fireman Bob Williams has three sons in Willet Avenue School. Under his leadership, and coordinated by School Nurse Teacher Bridget Herzlinger, an instructional program has evolved at Willet Avenue that could easily be adapted to other schools or groups, and has in fact already been presented at Woodland Avenue.

It includes fire prevention, safety, demonstration of equipment, and an overview of fire department services in administering CPR and first aid on rescue calls.

Each visit by the firemen was planned for a different grade level grouping. Students were divided into Kindergarten, grade 2, grades 3 and 4, grades 5 and 6. Different fire fighting equipment was brought to the school for each session, and lessons were tailored to the maturity of the students in each group.

For the youngest grades there was an introduction to the firemen as people who would help them in an emergency. Mr. Williams explained that the men all lived and worked nearby and were alerted by special radio "scanners" which told them the nature of the emergency and where to go.

The children saw a fireman don his gear item by item, and the special need for each was explained — a coat and boots for protection even in summer; a helmet with a long back brim so water could run off, and a point on top to break glass if necessary. They learned about the different kinds of axes used to break through walls to get at a fire and get people out. Fireman Larry Puccio donned air mask and Scott Pack and cautioned students not to be frightened if, in a fire, they saw a man in such gear approach them in their homes. The firemen stressed the advantage of having the children come to them or get to a window, but told them never under any circumstances to hide under a bed or in a closet.

Students were also instructed in how to conduct fire drills at home, how to feel a door to learn if the fire was behind it, how to break a window and jump into the arms of a fireman. They were asked about smoke detectors in their homes and warned about the danger of false alarms.

Then came the exciting part. Out in the school parking lot was Engine No. 3 with firemen Terry Farrell, Larry Puccio, Joe DiFranzo, and Ray Seeley ready to explain and demonstrate the equipment. The children examined the engine inside and out and loved the highpoint of the day — a demonstration of the powerful hoses in action.

A week later, third and fourth

graders found their outdoor demonstration to be really thrilling. Fireman Bob Hammond Jr. joined the group on this occasion. The new aerial ladder truck had just been delivered and students saw how it could accomplish a rescue at a height of 100 feet. Principal John Maher, who was privileged to go up as a passenger, reported that he could see for miles.

Students also saw "victim" Fireman Larry Puccio ascend strapped into the Stokes Stretcher, which was suspended below the platform of the aerial ladder.

Emphasis for 5th and 6th graders was on rescue apparatus and techniques, and on first aid. This was correlated with the health curriculum for this grade level and was done in two sessions.

During the first presentation Fireman Williams showed and explained the function of all the tools and apparatus used in rescue attempts. With the help of Joe DiFranzo and Terry Farrell he demonstrated use of the trauma box containing all the equipment necessary to prepare a victim for the hospital, including the air bag with oxygen to assist breathing. Students saw the orthopedic stretcher which is used to scoop victims out of bed, and the stair chair, used in upright position when a victim has broken limbs or cannot breathe in a prone position.

They also learned that E.M.T. means Emergency Medical Technician and A.M.T. means Advanced Medical Technician, and that the volunteer firemen who qualify for these designations have spent many hours in

intensive paramedic training.

With two models of "Resuscitator" whose heart and lungs are visible to demonstrate the effects of mouth to mouth resuscitation and CPR, the firemen gave students an idea of these procedures. Then everyone went outside to examine the Rescue truck inside and out.

The final lecture concerned First-Aid. Bob Williams and Joe DiFranzo returned — this time with fireman Eric Pietzak as "victim."

Mr. Williams demonstrated use of various splints and slings, stressed the need to stop bleeding and to keep wounds as germ free as possible. Students were especially interested in improvisational techniques — such as splints from rolled newspapers tied with a "cravat."

The final question and answer period was a lively one, since both students and teachers were curious about the training of firemen, the various pieces of equipment, and the general operation of the department.

They were surprised that a piece of major equipment, such as one of the trucks, is in operation at least 20 years before replacement, and that the dispatcher (one must be on duty constantly) is the only paid member of the department.

Some had also been unaware that volunteer firemen receive such intensive training.

It's hoped that as a finale for this program some classes will be permitted to visit the Bethpage Fire Service Academy and see the volunteers gain on-location experience in extinguishing real fires.

Spirit of Christmas

The annual drive for toys for needy children, conducted by the U.S. Marine Corps, brought out the best in the ninth graders who participated in the project.

On hand to receive a certificate of appreciation from the Marine Corps for their timely efforts were JHS Student Council President Natalie Sarle, 9th grade class President Geri Gerhardt, Secretary Donna Bock, Treasurer Gail Hubbs, Student Council Advisor Mr. William Owens, 9th grade

Assistant Principal Mr. Joseph Gambino and JHS Principal Mr. William Feigin.

Meanwhile, other junior high students were showing their appreciation of the holidays in another way: by letting other Americans know they are not forgotten at this time of year. Mr. Donald Groening and Mr. Stephen Boyle, social studies teachers, and their classes, took time out to remember the 50 Americans held hostage in Tehran, Iran. They sent postcards and letters wishing their countrymen well during this season, joining other Hicksville students districtwide, and other Americans nationwide in this sign of unity.

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Definition Of A "Fast Food" Restaurant

At their Dec. 18th meeting, the Oyster Bay Town Board approved a resolution amending the TOB code of ordinances and defining more clearly what "fast Food" means.

This newly-approved definition states:

DELETE: From Section 1, "Definitions", of Article I of Appendix A, "Building Zone Ordinance", of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay the definitions of "delicatessen" and "fast food restaurant" in their entirety.

DELETE: From Article VI, "Commercial Districts" of Appendix A, "Building Zone Ordinance", of the Town of Oyster Bay, Sections 462 (n.2), 465 (1.1), and 499 (e) (iii), in their entirety.

ADD: To Section I of Article I of Appendix A, "Building Zone Ordinance", of the Town of Oyster Bay, the definitions of "delicatessen" and "fast food restaurant" to read as follows: Sec. I Definitions.

A Delicatessen is a store that

sells prepared foods, such as cooked meats, relishes preserves and similar items.

A Fast-Food Restaurant is a restaurant which has as its principal business the sale from a limited menu of prepared or quickly prepared food or drink packaged in disposable containers or wrappers, served with disposable eating utensils, dispensed at counters without table service, intended for immediate consumption inside the building or outside the building, or to be carried away by the purchaser to parked cars and eaten there, or otherwise carried off the premises.

This term does not include a retail grocery store, delicatessen, dairy store, candy store, or other outlet selling food items primarily for home preparation and/or home consumption; and does not include a restaurant providing a minor proportion of carry-out service, provided that such carry-out service is clearly not the principal business of such restaurant.

AMEND: Article VI, Section 462, "Permitted Uses" in an "F" Business District (Neighbor-

hood Business), by adding to Section 462 a new subsection to read as follows:

"(n.2) Fast food restaurants, when permitted by the Town Board as a special exception after a public hearing."

AMEND: Article VI, Section 485, "Permitted Uses: in a "G" Business District (General Business) by adding to Section 485 a new subsection to read as follows:

"(1.1) Fast food restaurants, when permitted by the Town Board as a special exception after a public hearing."

AMEND: Article VI, Section 499 "Permitted Uses" in a "G-1" Business District (Central Business), by amending Sub-section (e) (iii) of Section 499 to read as follows:

"(iii) Restaurants, specifically excluding drive-in restaurants of all types and fast food restaurants of all types, provided that (1) not less than ninety (90) per cent of all seats shall be at tables, (2) services shall be provided only within the building or at tables on an adjacent terrace. A restaurant may occupy the highest floor of the building in which it is located."

Tax Exemptions For Seniors And Vets

Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes Solomon Newborn reminded senior citizens and veterans that applications for the 1980 property tax exemptions should be filed with the Nassau County Board of Assessors between January 1 and May 1.

"Now is the time for seniors and veterans to obtain applications for the 1980 property tax exemption," Newborn stated. "Seniors must file for their exemption each year, while

veterans' exemptions, once obtained, are permanent until the property is sold."

Newborn noted that applications for both exemptions may be obtained at the Board of Assessors Office, 240 Old Country Road, Mineola, 11501.

As a symbol of our support and a reminder to all Town residents, we have fitted all Town vehicles with American flags, and we residents to display the flag in their homes or places of business as a gesture of support.

As individuals, there is little else we can do to rectify the situation, except to give our moral support to the efforts of those who are working toward its successful resolution.
