Winter Demands "See-Worthy" Car

When it comes to winter driving, neglecting good visibility can be a dangerous oversight.

The Automobile Club of New York points out that snowy drifts and icy roads create special hazards for motorists, who have to see the dangers far enough in advance to do something about it. They can't afford to drive with windshields obscured by snow or ice.

To keep the windshield and side and back windows completely clear of snow, motorists should

always carry a can of commercial spray de-icer, a combination scraper-snow brush and a few rags.

Clearing the windshield and other windows is only part of the job, the AAA affiliate notes. Snow should also be removed from the hood and roof, so that it will not blow into your line of vision.

Don't neglect the headlights, taillights and side-view mirror, and make sure the windshield wipers and defroster are in good working order.

Village Officials Predict Large Tax Hike If Gov.'s Revenue-Sharing Freeze Accepted

Branding as "spurious" Gov. Carey's arguments for cutting \$295 million in State aid to local governments from the 1980-81 budget, the Tri-County Village Officials Association charged that Gov. Carey is forcing villages to raise property taxes to cover State budget deficits.

"The governor's proposals will require the counties of Nassau, Suffolk and Westchester to increase the already oppressive real estate tax in order to raise almost \$9 million," according to the resolution passed by the joint unit meeting in New Hyde Park last night. The Village Officials Associations of the three counties, which represent 125 villages and 800,000 people, plus representation from Rockland County, have joined efforts to deal with a variety of issues confronting local governments.

Referring to the Governor's expressed intention to "cap the burden the taxpayer bears," the village officials insisted that the Governor's proposal to freeze State aid to localities below the current level of aid would "in reality transfer higher taxes from state to village."

"These higher taxes will have to come from the regressive real estate tax, the only taxing capability permitted local government," the resolution states. The Tri-County group predicted that should the proposal be adopted, an additional \$2.8 million will have to be assessed Nassau taxpayers through county, town and village real estate taxes, an additional \$2.3 million assessed to Suffolk taxpayers, and \$3.8 million additional for Westchester residents. These predictions were for the 1980-81 tax year. Even higher real estate taxes were forecast for subsequent years as

inflation pushes costs up without a corresponding increase in State revenue sharing.

In his budget message, Gov. Carey proposed establishing a ceiling of \$900 million on local government revenue sharing for the indefinite future. Municipalities received \$879 million in State aid in the current fiscal year and would have obtained \$972 million in 1980-81 under the formula in effect to provide local governments a share of the State's personal income and sales tax revenues.

The Tri-County resolution points out that "local budgets, already cut to the bone, are dominated by State and Federal mandated programs which provide no room to cut expenditures. Our only recourse is to reduce or eliminate essential services such as recreation facilities and senior citizen tax exemptions, or to increase real estate taxes, the only taxing authority local governments have."

The Tri-County resolution points out that the State is receiving ever-higher revenues from residents through personal income and sales taxes which are affected by inflation.

"It is widely accepted that the property tax is the most regressive tax as it bears no direct relationship to the homeowner's ability to pay," the resolution continues. "Efforts are being made on a broad front to reduce reliance on this tax form. Yet the Governor's proposed action will increase the use of property tax to pay for mandated programs and essential services."

The village officials also objected strenuously to the Governor's inference that local governments could absorb the reduced revenue sharing by cutting

costs. The bulk of village budgets, they said, consists of mandated costs such as:

- * Uncontrolled police salary increases due to compulsory arbitration.

- * Programs mandated by the Office of Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

- * Facilities for the handicapped, such as curb ramps for wheelchairs.

- * Increased pensions.

- * Higher Social Security payments.

- * Tax exemptions for senior citizens.

- * Garbage collection.

"Village governments have reduced manpower levels, gasoline usage, and other services to hold the line on—and in some cases reduce—property taxes despite these mandated costs," the resolution goes on. "To keep pace with inflation, local communities should continue to receive their share of the inflated tax revenues the State is collecting from our residents."

The Nassau delegation to the Tri-County unit is led by Raymond Regan, Garden City trustee. The Suffolk representation is headed by Charles Schreier, trustee of South Hampton and president of the Suffolk VOA. George Begany, mayor of Buchanan, leads the Westchester group and is president of the Tri-County Association for the current year. Also participating in the meeting were Robert Thompson, president of the Nassau VOA and mayor of Massapequa Park, and Julius Chemka, president of the Westchester VOA and mayor of Hastings-on-Hudson. Brian Miele, mayor of Hilltop in Rockland County, attended the meeting as an observer.

Purcell Supports Alternate Summer Olympics

On Jan. 31 Nassau County Executive Francis T. Purcell pledged the full cooperation of the county in the effort to hold an alternate summer Olympics in the New York-New Jersey metropolitan region.

In letters to Sen. Daniel Moynihan, New York City Mayor Edward Koch and New Jersey Gov. Brendan Byrne, he pointed out that facilities in Nassau were an integral part of the area's unsuccessful bid to host the 1984

Summer Olympics.

"We even have more to offer now," Purcell said, noting that a 192,000-square-foot field house—more than 4 acres of active recreation facilities—has since opened at Nassau Community College.

"It is one of the most modern facilities of its kind in the region, offering a wide variety of sporting activities, including track, court games and swimming," he added.

The county executive said he

also contacted the Hyatt Management Corp. and secured its full cooperation in the use of the facilities at the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum.

"We have the ability to give our country's athletes, and those from other countries boycotting the Olympic games in Moscow this summer, a first class counter-Olympics," Purcell said. "We owe it to them to provide a showcase for the skills they have worked so hard to develop."

"All About Letters" Booklet Available

"All About Letters" is a 64-page publication designed for students in grades six through twelve. The NCTE, an organization of some 100,000 teachers of English, has been licensed by the Postal Service to print, accept orders for and distribute copies to public, private and parochial schools and the general public.

As part of its nationwide National Letter Writing Week observance (February 24-March 1), the U.S. Postal Service, in cooperation with the National Council of Teachers of English, is offering a booklet on letter writing for school youngsters according to Hicksville Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Anthony M. Murello.

Dear Supervisor Colby:

This is to inform you and the Town Board that the Hicksville V.F.W. Post 3211 strongly endorses and supports the recommendations made to your office by the Ad Hoc Committee for the Redevelopment of Hicksville, on January 21, 1980.

We urge the Town Board to remove the G-1 zoning in the Hicksville Triangle. We the members of the V.F.W. are proud of the accomplishments that our Post has made over the years, and now we would like our Town to be identified as the most beautiful Town in Nassau County. The challenge is clear. We have emerged as the Number 1, V.F.W. Post in Nassau, only to live in what appears to be a "war-

The booklet's three sections offer guidance and instruction for all types of letters. The first section, for example, includes letters from personalities such as composer-performer Stevie Wonder, the former New England Patriot star Darryl Stingley and noted columnist Abigail Van Buren (Dear Abby) and Joyce Lain Kennedy. Students will learn how to write job application letters, resumes, fan letters, pen pal letters, letters to editors, consumer complaints and how to avoid being cheated by mail fraud swindlers.

Other portions of the booklet list addresses for organizations offering publications by mail on hundreds of subjects of interest to students, from "archeological digs" to "zoo populations."

A third section instructs students on proper ways to address their mail, why ZIP Codes are important and provides a list of various postal services available to the public.

Postmaster Murello said teachers, parents and students can obtain copies of the booklet by writing to the National Council of Teachers of English, Department A, 1111 Kenyon Road, Urbana, IL 61801 and enclosing a check or money order for \$1.50 for a single copy, or 75 cents per copy when ordered in classroom sets of 20 or more copies. "All About Letters" cannot be purchased from the Postal Service; only through the NCTE which has been licensed by the Postal Service to handle orders.

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Colby On Steps To Avoid Full Value Assessment

Town Supervisor Joseph Colby commented on a report that State Governor Hugh Carey favors adoption of an assessment exemption for residential homeowners by saying "at last, after three years of lobbying by Town government and others, the State administration is taking a step in the right direction to protect homeowners against court-ordered assessment and property tax increases."

Colby's program to overcome the threat of full value assessment and to provide tax relief includes adoption of a homestead exemption, adoption of a bill to remove the court mandate for full value assessment, and adoption of a change in the rules of evidence in certiorari actions to prevent further shifting of the assessment base away from commercial properties and onto residential lands.

"I'm gratified that, finally, the State administration has realized the value of the homestead exemption concept and the importance that it can have for homeowners," said Colby.

However, the Supervisor noted that the Governor wants to undertake a physical revaluation of all properties to 100% of their full value before putting the homestead exemption in place.

"While the State administration has taken a step in the right direction, it still isn't on a course

that will provide the quickest, most effective means of protecting homeowners," said the Supervisor. "Full value assessment would take years to complete and would cost hundreds of millions of dollars State-wide. By tying the homestead exemption to completion of full value assessment, the Governor is saying that homeowners must wait for years before relief will be in sight. That's not the best way to approach the assessment issue."

Colby has been lobbying for passage of the Esposito-Padavan bill. This measure would remove a section of State law - virtually ignored for 200 years by local assessors, the courts and State government - that mandates full value assessment. Although some maintain that the bill, in its present form, may be deficient, Colby maintains that the Legislature "should unite and commit itself to non-partisan effort to fully explore this bill and, if necessary, amend it so that it can withstand any court challenge."

Detractors say that it would not be appropriate to permit local assessors to follow local practices without any State guidelines. Colby says that "if, in fact, this presents a valid question as to the efficacy of the Esposito-Padavan bill, the Legislature should be looking to remedy the problem by permitting the State Board of Equalization and Assessment to establish some

basic guidelines so that the 'un-constitutional delegation of power' argument will become moot."

The Supervisor pointed out that it is still necessary for the Legislature to enact, as soon as possible, a law to overcome the effects of the 960 Executive Towers decision. "That decision permits owners of commercial property to, in effect, compare their lands to non-income producing residential properties when they try to prove assessment inequality," noted the Supervisor. "This permits a shifting of the tax liability away from commercial properties, and forces a greater hardship on homeowners. The impact of the court's ruling was seen in very dramatic terms last week with the outcome of the Grumman certiorari case, which points up the fact that we cannot wait for three or more years before corrective action is taken."

Colby noted that he is presenting testimony on the Esposito-Padavan bill, the need for a homestead exemption and the need to change the rules in certiorari cases to the Senate Finance Committee and Assembly Task Force on School Finance and Real Property Taxation later this month, and also next Friday to the Republican Assembly Task Force on Real Property Tax Reform and Relief.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Section 21-17 "Duty of abutting owners and occupants to remove snow and ice, and to maintain sidewalks in a clean condition" of Division I, "Generally" of Article II "Sidewalks, Curbs and Gutters" of Chapter 21 "Streets and Sidewalks" of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same hereby is amended by inserting the words "or other building or structure" immediately following the word "house" on the sixth line of said section; and be it further:

ORDAINED, that Sub-section (b) of Section 21-27 "Order of the Town Board to repair or reconstruct sidewalks; notice to abutting property owners" of Division 2 "Construction and Repair" of Article II "Sidewalks, Curbs and Gutters" of Chapter 21 "Streets and Sidewalks", be and the same hereby is amended by deleting the words "registered mail" and in their place and stead, adding the words "certified mail"; and be it further:

ORDAINED, that Section 21-38 "Permit fee" of Division 2 "Construction and Repair" of Article II "Sidewalks, Curbs and Gutters" of Chapter 21 "Streets and Sidewalks", be deleted in its entirety and a new Section 21-38 "Permit fees" be added to read as follows:

Sec. 21-38. Permit fees.
By order of the Town Board, except where otherwise provided by law, or where permits required by this division are granted for work done at the direction of the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works or his designee, each application for a permit which is granted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works or his designee for a street opening or excavation in any street, highway or sidewalk in the Town for any purpose, shall be accompanied by a fee in the amount as noted herein for each such opening or excavation:

(a) PERMIT FEES FOR CURB CUT CONSTRUCTION.

Residential Curb Cut:
For a single curb cut - fourteen (14) linear feet maximum at curb line - Ten (10) dollars. \$10.00

For a double curb cut - twenty (20) linear feet maximum at curb line - Twenty (20) dollars. \$20.00

Commercial Curb Cut:
For a curb cut fourteen (14) linear feet maximum at curb line - Ten (10) dollars. \$10.00

For a curb cut twenty (20) linear feet maximum at curb line - Twenty (20) dollars. \$20.00

For a curb cut thirty (30) linear feet maximum at curb line - Thirty (30) dollars. \$30.00

For a curb cut fifty (50) linear feet maximum at curb line - Fifty (50) dollars. \$50.00

For a curb cut over fifty (50) linear feet maximum at curb line - Seventy-five (75) dollars. \$75.00

Any curb cut over thirty (30) linear feet at the curb line will require special approval in writing from the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works or his designee.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 17 MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC
