## Corporal Punishment Upon" By School District

The topic of corporal punishment was briefly discussed at Wednesday evening's meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education held at Willet Avenue School.

Secretary Bill Bennett, when questioned by this reporter on Hicksville's policy concerning corporal punishment, stated that under Section 16 of Board policy covering "Student Discipline," the policy on corporal punishment was as follows: "While not unaware of the principle 'in loco parentis', the Board of Education strongly frowns upon the use of physical restraint and punishment as contrary to sound educational philosophy in establishing and maintaining proper decorum necessary for educational excellence."

Corporal punishment in the schools has become a much discussed topic nationwide as well as locally. Mr. Bennett stated that the New York Board of Regents are examining this issue. Up to the present, responsibility for implementing a policy on corporal punishment has been delegated to local school boards.

Newsday on Tuesday has listed Hicksville as one of the school districts that "allowed corporal punishment, but had no written

policy according to the (State Education Department) survey."

Vice President John Ayres questioned how this wrong information was received by Newsday. Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins commented that he had "not been contacted by Newsday or the State Education Dept. nor had any member of the staff." The Board agreed to contact Newsday to correct the information.

Dr. Hawkins introduced the district's new Director of Cultural and Performing Arts, Dr. Terrell Stackpole who began working in this position last week.

Dr. Hawkins also encouraged public participation at the budget meetings which will begin on March 5th with General Support (Board of Education; Superintendent's Office; Business Office; Buildings and Maintenance; and Transportation) the topic of discussion.

Trustee Pete Fujimoto announced that due to very poor attendance by the Hicksville community at the last meeting of the Educational Goals and Objectives Committee, the Committee will cease. However, the Subcommittee on Drug and Alcohol Abuse and Misuse will continue.

During the brief business meeting, the Board discussed and acted on the following:

-Tabled a motion to approve the school calendar for 1980-81 until information concerning the BOCES calendar was received. Voting no was Trustee Tom Nagle. Trustee Neil McCormack was away for personal reasons. President Dan Arena was also absent. Vice President John Ayres conducted the meeting.

The proposed calendar includes 183 school days; a two-week Christmas recess; and June 28th the last school day. According to Dr. Hawkins the calendar had originally been suggested by the Nassau County Chief School Administrator's Assoc. has also been endorsed by the staff and the Hicksville Congress of Teachers.

-Approved the Superintendent's recommendation to host and co-sponsor an all-day conference with the Society For Gifted and Talented Children on April 19th.

-Approved various personnel matters.

-Discussed proposed Board policy on Selection of Textbooks, Books, Periodicals, etc.; Agenda Format; Agenda Preparation

# At The Town Board Meeting

At its regular meeting held on Tues., Feb. 25th the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay acted on the following local matters as follows:

Reserved decision on the petition of Gilbert Tiles, for a change of zone from Res. A and Res. B-A Districts to Res. D District on property on the north side of Cedar Swamp Road in Jericho. Both day and night hearing were held on this matter. About 200 were present at the evening hearing. There were 13 speakers. Six speakers were opposed to any change in the existing zone which is for 2 acres per residence. All other speakers were in favor of changing the present zone but no lower than to zone C, which calls for 100' X 100' minimum building plots. The petitioner is requesting a change to D Zone which allows for 70' X 100' minimums.

They reserved decision on the petition of Malein Auto Collision, Inc. for a special use permit in an Ind. H District to maintain and use an auto body repair shop and for permission to terminate previous restrictive covenants and/or conditions imposed by Town Board Resolution dated Aug. 2, 1954 and recited in Agreements dated June 30, 1954 and August 25, 1954 with respect to use of premises as a gasoline station on the southeast corner of West John St. and Holman Blvd. in Hicksville. Mr. Frank Drab of Byron Place, Hicksville appeared and said that while he was not against the use as a body shop he did oppose locating a gasoline station at that location.

They reserved decision on the petition of Ernest F. Rauch and Getty Refinish and Marketing Co. for permission to rescind covenant a condition recited in Resolution 115-69 dated Feb. 18, 1969, so as to permit the updating of a gasoline service station by approving the installation of a canopy over the existing pump island on the northeast corner of Jericho Tpke. and Humphrey Dr. in Syosset. No one appeared in opposition to this petition.

They reserved decision on proposed amendments to the Code of Ordinances of the TOB pertaining to vehicles for hire... taxicabs, relating to the inspection of vehicles. Some taxicab drivers appeared and pointed out that the Town might in some instances be duplicating what the State of NY is about to require. They were instructed to confer with Deputy Clerk Herbert Striker on this matter at a later date.

They reserved decision after a finance hearing to consider the replacement of the lighting

distribution system of a maintenance building to be located on Town property at Syosset and on behalf of the Town of Oyster Bay Public Lighting District.

They approved Resolution No. 156-1980 coordinating Summer Group Activities Program (for the handicapped) with school districts in the Town with the Dept. of Community Services.

They approved Resolution No. 158-1980 relating to requests of agencies, including the Nassau County Police Dept. Contraband Disposal Unit, to dispose and destroy certain material by burning in our Town incinerators.

They approved Resolution No. 157-1980 setting a registration fee of \$25.00 for each team that enters a TOB Softball League for 1980. This is an effort to cover related expenses.

They approved Resolution No. 159-1980 incorporating an additional sub-consultant's services for SPDES for proposed waste water treatment facility at Old Bethpage Incinerator Complex. This will provide more safeguards when completed.

They approved Resolution No. 161-1980 amending Resolution No. 1001-1979 in connection with an increase in engineering services to consultant on preliminary study and aid grants for Commuter Parking Facilities throughout the TOB included in the three sites is one on the north side of the Hicksville Railroad Station where a vertical upward expanded Hicksville parking garage on Duffy Avenue is being considered.

They approved Resolution No. 164-1980 which eliminates both the April 8 and May 13 Town Board meetings.

They approved Resolution No. 167-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise Notice of a March 4 hearing to consider replacement of mechanical equipment including pumps, motors and plumbing for the swimming pool and ice skating rink at the Syosset-Woodbury Park District at a maximum estimated cost of \$22,000.00.

They approved Resolution No. 169-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise Notice of a March 4 hearing to consider replacement of mechanical equipment including pumps, motors and plumbing for the swimming pool and ice skating rink at the Plainview-Old Bethpage Park District at a maximum estimated cost of \$16,500.00.

They approved Resolution No. 182-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise Notice of a Wed., March 12 hearing on behalf of the Town Board under the auspices of the Dept. of Intergovernmental Affairs at Town Hall starting at 8

pm for the purpose of obtaining views of citizens of the Town of Oyster Bay with respect to appropriate and desirable programs in the Application of Funds for Community Development available to the Town pursuant to the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended.

They approved Resolution No. 186-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise Notice of a March 25 hearing on the petition of William A. Rossitto for a change of zone from Res. D to Bus. G District and for special use permit to maintain a public garage on the northeast corner of West John St. and Wyckoff St. in Hicksville.

They approved Resolution No. 187-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise Notice of a March 18 hearing on the petition of Kirby Builders, Inc. for a special use permit to erect and maintain in an Ind. H District a one-story office building on an interior parcel on the north side of Jericho Tpke at a dead end of Willets Lane and Willets Dr. in Syosset.

They approved Resolution No. 188-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise a notice of a March 25 hearing on the petition of the Camrose Art Corp for a special use permit to use, operate and maintain for the sale at retail original art work and custom picture framing services as well as for general offices on the north side of Dupont St. east of Fairchild Ave. in Plainview.

They approved Resolution No. 190-1980 directing the Town Clerk

## Town Accepts Master Plan For Tobay Beach

The Oyster Bay Town Board has accepted a consultant's master plan for Tobay Beach as a comprehensive guide to meet the Town's future recreational needs and preserve what has been termed an outstanding natural resource.

Tobay Beach consists of about 756 acres on the Jones Beach Barrier Island just east of that State park. Its two miles of uninterrupted white sand beach offers oceanfront swimming and surfing plus calm water bathing on the bayside. A protected boat basin and an internationally renowned wildlife sanctuary are

also within its confines.

In addition to a phased development of recreational activities, Town Supervisor Joseph Colby noted that, "the plan places major emphasis on beach erosion control as a primary environmental problem with direct impact upon future recreational development." Dune restoration and stabilization are recommended south of Ocean Parkway, and a new ocean beach pavilion be built on the north side of the Parkway adjacent to the pedestrian underpass."

Colby said that the plan suggests expanding parking

facilities from the present 1800 cars to almost 2100 spaces, introducing additional active and passive recreation areas on the bay side, and constructing a recreational vehicle campsite adjacent to the boat basin, which already is undergoing expansion and improvement. A separate section deals with improving visitor access and educational opportunities at the J.F. Kennedy Memorial Wildlife Sanctuary.

Today's Town Board action also authorized the consultants, Lockwood, Kessler & Bartlett, Inc. of Syosset, to develop preliminary design concepts for the proposed improvements.

## Tobay Board Approves Appointments To Environmental Control Commission

The appointment of a chairman, vice chairman and a new member, and the reappointment of four members to the Town of Oyster Bay Environmental Control Commission were approved by the Town Board.

Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca announced the appointment of Dr. Martin Cohen of Plainview to a two-year term as Chairman of the Commission. Cohen, who has served on the Commission since 1975, succeeds Dr. Benjamin Radzka of Oyster Bay, who will remain as a

member.

Appointed for a two-year term as Vice-Chairman was Carl Marcellino of Syosset. A teacher of ecology and environmental science, Marcellino has served with the Commission since 1978.

In addition to Radzka, those reappointed to three-year terms as members include Duncan Brown of Syosset, a student in environmental engineering at Hofstra University; Norman Heischouer of Massapequa, a high school guidance counselor and social studies teacher; and Anthony

LoFaso of Bethpage, chief engineer at Sperry Gyroscope.

David Synder of Brookville was appointed to a three-year term on the Commission. A law student at Hofstra University, he has done extensive research on the various aspects of solid waste management and disposal, and on resource recovery.

Established in 1972, the Environmental Control Commission is a citizen's advisory board to the Town Board. Its members serve without pay.

## Tobay Seeks Federal Money For Sign Replacements

The Town of Oyster Bay is seeking federal funds to undertake a major traffic sign replacement and modernization program that will involve the installation of an estimated 12,000 new signs along Town roads over the next three years, Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced today (Tuesday, Feb. 26).

The Town Board approved the application for two grants that will be submitted to the New

York State Traffic Safety Committee through the Nassau County Safety Board. The first application asks for \$120,000 to cover the costs for the first year of sign materials, labor, repairs and installation, which will be performed under a contract awarded by bid.

The second application is a matching grant of \$120,000, which represents 55 percent of the personnel costs to the Town Sign Bureau for the necessary administrative and engineering

supervision for the first year of the program. Both grants, which are funded under the Federal Highway Safety Program, have options for renewal for subsequent years.

"The objective of the program is to provide a modernized traffic control sign system that will have a significant, positive effect on traffic safety throughout the Town," Colby said. The program is expected to get underway about October 1 of this year.

wording of several of these policies. The Board will vote on these policies on March 12.

After the meeting, an

educational presentation was given on "Positive Approaches to Learning: Library Media Center, Art and Helping Math." Mrs. Rosemary Barrow, Willet Avenue librarian, presented a slide presentation showing an overall view of the library-media center function on the elementary level and its relationship to other disciplines of learning. (Various programs at Willet Avenue were presented emphasizing the use of local resources (parents, Gregory Museum, Fire Department).  
Mrs. Marie Schneider, art teacher at Willet and Woodland Avenue Schools, explained the elementary art program using various student works of art.

Mrs. Schneider stated that "the parent holds the key to a child's feeling of accomplishment."  
A sophisticated audio-visual presentation, using three screens and a television, was presented by Mr. Fred Steinhardt, Math teacher at Dutch Lane School. The presentation explained the elementary math program which includes helping and enrichment math in addition to tutorial/extra-help programs offered to students.  
Resident Karen Garbus raised the question of a "district-wide curriculum in art and library." Assistant Supt. Dr. Dan Salmon stated that the "district programs covered all schools with each school having a dif-

ferent style and technique."  
Dr. Stackpole, when asked to comment, reiterated a statement made previously by Mrs. Schneider: "Art may be the only discipline in which two children work through a process, achieve totally different results, and be praised for that achievement."  
Several parents expressed surprise to discover that each elementary school does not have its own art teacher, but that six art teachers are shared among the eight elementary schools.  
Asst. Supt. Dr. Catherine Fenton explained that "as the enrollment declines, the number of classes per school decreases and therefore there is also a drop in service."

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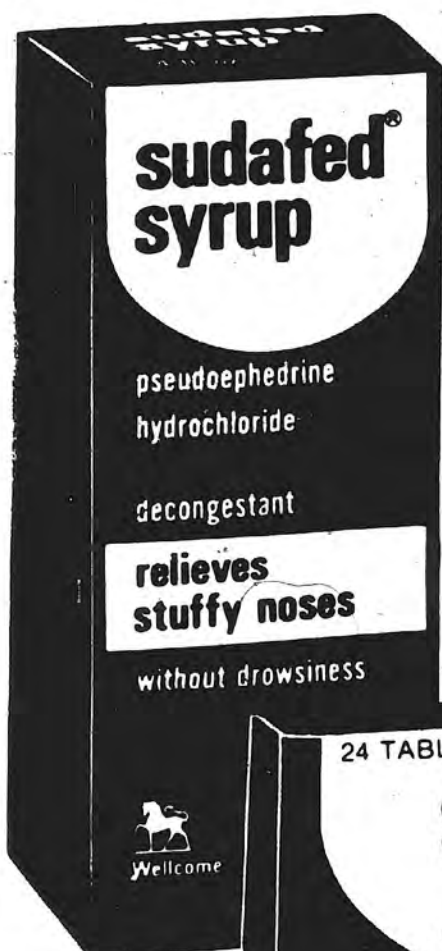

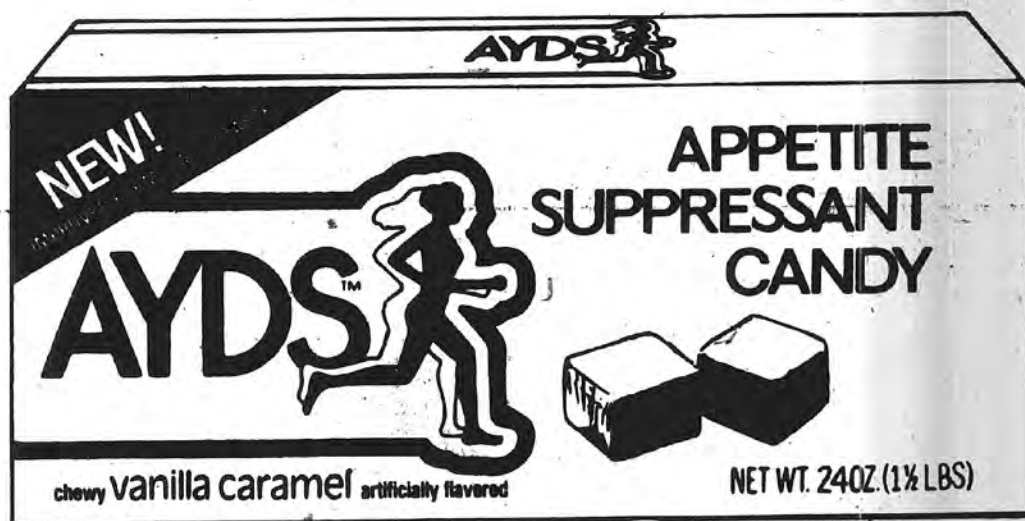
