Corporal Punishn HICKSVILLE PUBLIC Upon" By Sche "169 JERUSALEW AVE NY 11801

The topic of corporat punishment was briefly discussed at Wednesday evenings meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education held at Willet Avenue School

Secretary Bill Bennett, when questioned by this reporter on Hicksville's policy concerning corporal punishment, stated that under Section 16 of Board policy covering "Student Discipline..." the policy on corporal punish-ment was as follows: "While not unaware of the principle 'in loco parentis', the Board of Education strongly frowns upon the use of physical restraint and punishment as contrary to sound educational philosophy in establishing and maintaining proper decorum necessary for

proper decorum necessary for educational excellence."

Corporal punishment in the schools has become a much discussed topic nationwide as well as locally. Mr. Bennett stated that the New York Board of Regents are examining this issue. Up to the present, responsibility for implementing a policy on corporal punishment has been delegated to local school

Newsday on Tuesday has listed Hicksville as one of the school districts that "allowed corporal punishment, but had no written

policy according to the (State Education Department) survey." Vice President John Ayres questioned how this wrong in-formation was received by Newsday. Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins commented that he had "not been contented by he had "not been contacted by Newsday or the State Education Dept. nor had any member of the staff." The Board agreed to contact Newsday to correct the

ormation.

Dr. Hawkins introduced the district's new Director of Cultural and Performing Arts, Dr. Terrell Stackpole who began working in this position last



Town Accepts Master Plan For Tobay Beach

The Oyster Bay Town Board has accepted a consultant's master plan for Tobay Beach as a comprehensive guide to meet the Town's future recreational needs and preserve what has been appeared by cutting the comprehensive guide to meet the comprehensive successful to the comprehensive an outstanding natural

Tobay Beach consists of about Tobay Beach consists of about 756 acres on the Jones Beach Barrier Taland just east of that State park. Its two miles of uninterrupted white sand beach offers oceanfront swimming and surfing plus calm water bathing on the bayside. A protected boat basin and an internationally re-

In addition to a phased devel-opment of recreational activities, Town Supervisor Joseph Colby noted that, "the plan places major emphasis on beach erosion major emphasis on beach erosion control as a primary environmental problem with direct impact upon future recreational development." Dune restoration and stabilization are recommended south of Ocean Parkway, and a new ocean beach pavilion be built on the north side of the Parkway adjacent to the pedestrian underpass."

Colby said that the plan suggests expanding parking

facilities from the present 1800 cars to almost 2100 spaces, introducing additional active and passive recreation areas on the bay side, and constructing a recreational vehicle campsite adjacent to the boat basin, which already is undergoing expansion and improvement. A separate section deals with improving visitor access and educational opportunities at the J.F. Kennedy Memorial Wildlife Sanctuary.

Today's Town Board action also authorized the consultants, Lockwood, Kessler & Bartlett, Inc. of Syosset, to develop preliminary design concepts for the proposed improvements.


