## Guest Lecturer

Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum will be the guest lecturer in the second of the 1979-80 Cultural Series, sponsored by the Old Westbury Hebrew Congregation. He will speak on Wednesday evening, March 19, at the Temple at 7:45 P.M. His topic is "Current Perils to the Jewish Existence."

Rabbi Tanenbaum is the Director of National Interreligious Affairs of the American Jewish Committee and has been a pioneering leader and thinker in inter-religious relations in social justice movements for the past 25 years. Commentary Magazine characterized Rabbi Tanenbaum as "the leading figure among Jewish ecumenists." Newsweek Magazine recently devoted its Religious Section to an interview with him and described him as "the American Jewish Committee's foremost Jewish apostle to the Gentiles." He served as consultant to NBC-TV's dramatization of the Holocaust and served on President Carter's "Advisory Commission on the Holocaust." Two years ago, Rabbi Tanenbaum was invited by West German Government authorities and consulted with the Chermmergau officials on the revision of "Passion Play" for the removal of anti-Semitic content.

He was the only Rabbi at the Vatican Council II, where he was consulted widely by the Catholic and Protestant authorities during the Council's deliberations. He has served long and effectively as a consultant with the Protestant World Council of Churches. In March 1979, he participated in the first official audience of World Jewish leaders with Pope John Paul II in Vatican City.

## TOB Takes "The First Step" To Revitalize Downtown Hix

Here's how it read as No. 21 on the Town Board agenda for its March 4th meeting: "Resolution No. 222-1980 . . . resolution relating to Amendments to CODE ORDINANCES of the Town of Oyster Bay Amend Appendix A - Building Zone Ordinance - G-1 (Central) Business District. Hearing held up April 10, 1979. (S.M.D. 4/10/79 No. 3 and S.M.D. 2/19/80 No. 20).

Town Supervisor Joseph Colby hailed it as "the first of three steps which we all hope will correct the G-1 Zone and will then lead this important area of our Township to an orderly development."

Councilman Thomas Clark, made the following statement as he made the resolution: Mr. Supervisor:

I am delighted to make this motion; however, let me take a moment to highlight the changes:

- Permitted Uses: a) offices - public and private;

- b) Theaters and auditoriums
- c) Broadcasting studios
- d) churches, synagogues and houses of worship
- e) Personal service shops and stores for retail business; barber shops; beauty parlors; interior decorators; also restaurants, NOT drive-in fast food establishments

Any other use, upon Town Board approval, which will not have an adverse effect on property values, will not cause undue traffic congestion, and will not constitute a problem or the Hicksville Fire Department.

Minimum Lot Area: Is reduced to 17,000 sq. ft. (130' X 130') with 10% for greenery; off-street parking - it is no longer a requirement to build parking structure, one parking space for each 250 sq. ft. gross floor area, whereas "F" - 200 sq. ft.

Broadway, Hicksville - approx. 180' depth on both sides of the railroad to Old Country Road is

On Tuesday, February 19, Councilman Tom Clark appeared before the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce. I disagree with his plans.

I personally have NO special interest in any property that would be involved in the proposed Duffy Avenue Extension, or anything on the North side of the Railroad in Hicksville. But I am a very concerned citizen of Hicksville; born in Hicksville, graduated from the Hicksville School system; and have been a business man in Hicksville since 1945, in a business founded by my grandfather, in Hicksville, in 1904. On that basis, I believe that I have a right to voice my opinion.

Mr. Clark is still harping on cutting through Duffy Avenue, under Nelson Avenue to Broadway. I don't believe Mr. Clark ever checked the traffic at "evening commuter tie-up" to see just where that traffic tie-up is - it is NOT on Duffy Avenue.

At the same Chamber meeting, Mr. Clark discussed the possibility of the Town of Oyster Bay purchasing property on the North side of the Railroad, in addition to a plan for the Town of Oyster Bay to build a parking garage over one of the town parking lots, also on the North side of the Railroad. Mr. Clark, or the Town of Oyster Bay, seems bent on doing it the hard way! The simple solution would be for the Town of Oyster Bay and/or New York State to build a parking garage in the Railroad "Y" area, eliminating the need to cut through Duffy Avenue or for the Town of Oyster Bay to acquire any expensive real estate, nor incidentally taking that property off the Tax Rolls.

Joe, I would be delighted to buy you lunch, introduce you to some of my business colleagues in Hicksville who share identical

viewpoints, and you can get the grass roots opinion first-hand! I look forward to your comments, and your company!

Dear Editor:

This letter is in reference to a court ruling which requires the Nassau County homeowner to pay for givebacks on taxes to commercial interests (stores, factories etc.) by raising our property taxes, said givebacks to reach the astronomical height of \$300,000,000 dollars, this in a state which already has the second highest tax rate, outside of Alaska, in the United States.

But there is more to come! We, the homeowners of old houses going back 30, 40 or 50 years, are also facing an additional problem. Taxes on our houses are to be raised to such high market values that it boggles the imagination. The fact that we have been paying N.C. taxes for such a long time and that for the past ten years and especially since the inflation started, we have had to pay for major repairs on our homes in order to keep them in perfect condition and that in most cases they are our only hedge against inflation, the law stipulates that the profiteers in our midst, the commercial establishments, are to be the victors.

Years back when the influx of residents and commercial establishments started, streaming into Nassau and Suffolk from the megalopolis to the west of us, we were assured by our politicians: "Don't worry, the taxes will be less, because more homeowners and commercial interests will bring in more revenues." So we sat back, welcomed the newcomers, paid up our mortgages and looked forward to a peaceful, old age in

our old homes. Little did we know that we had welcomed a TROJAN HORSE into our midst.

While we were being told that this is progress, that more jobs would be available, taxes would be lower and so forth, the landscape around us began to change rapidly. Railroad embankments reared their ugly heads cutting our beautiful little town in two, Broadway also was affected, until not it resembles a bombed-out area. Our friends, the local merchants, were ruthlessly dispossessed and moved out of town. Taxes started to climb. A single family home became a liability, while the commercial establishments made hay while the sun shone, deriving their profits from the very people they are now suing for givebacks on their property taxes.

There is only one solution. We must insist that our lawmakers in Albany pass the Homestead Act, that those who need it the most, the longtime residents in our midst (up to a ten year residency in N.C.) are given relief from an intolerable burden of taxation. Florida and other states have the Homestead Act. Why not the second highest taxed county in the nation? Nassau is only topped by Alaska where the big oil's workers receive astronomical wages. If an additional tax burden is placed on the middle class single homeowner, if the law which allowed it, is not repealed, the now endangered middle class will become an extinct species in our county. The rich and the poor will still be here, but the rich usually shop at Gucci's, Tiffany's and other high class Manhattan establishments. Where will our commercial establishments derive their profits from then? It will be a hollow victory for them.

# School Board Sets Series of Budget Meetings

Hicksville Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins has presented a preliminary 1980-81 school district budget to the Board of Education and community, which calls for an approximate \$2.5 million increase over the present year's school budget. That would amount to an increase in the school tax rate of approximately \$2.50 per \$100 assessed valuation.

The preliminary budget given to board members at the February 13 school board meeting is a summation of department requests for appropriations. Dr. Hawkins noted. He told the board that a proposed budget - different and smaller than the request budget - will be developed prior to March 5, when a series of budget meetings will begin on board and community scrutiny.

Dr. Hawkins explained that each department's individual budget will be reviewed with de-

partment heads prior to March, in order to develop an accurate assessment of district needs for the coming year.

A schedule of meetings has been set for the presentation of the superintendent's proposed 1980-81 school budget. It is as follows:

Wednesday, March 12: Census and Unallocated funds.

Wednesday, March 19: Instruction.

Wednesday, March 26: Instruction.

All meetings will be held in the Administration Building, starting at 8:15 P.M. It should be noted that the March 12 and 26 dates are regularly scheduled board meeting dates, and the budget scrutiny will take place as part of the agenda for those meetings.

Copies of the detailed budget will be available to the public at those meetings. Community input will be welcomed.

now under consideration by the Dept. of Planning & Development in order to establish a new zone for neighborhood shopping which allows lot-line to lot-line coverage on smaller lots and provides off-street parking.

Last but not least, the southwest section, no specific lines drawn, would be available for garden apartments or for condominiums upon Town Board approval.

Speaking on the resolution was Mr. Vernon Wagner a community leader, a resident of Hicksville Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Wagner complimented the Board in taking this initial action and expressed the hope that the next two steps and their public hearings would be held in the near future. He questioned as to whether the proposed extension of Duffy Avenue and the exact location of another commuter parking garage was a foregone conclusion. He stated that though he realized that these two questions were not being voted on today, he hoped that they would be given much consideration pro and con.

Widder, who is also present president of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club spoke as follows: "Speaking as a past president of the Hicksville Community Council whose membership is a cross section of the Hicksville community - residents, representatives of veterans groups, fraternal organizations, service clubs, cultural organizations such as our museum, churches and synagogues... I would like to commend you on taking this initial step, to try to alleviate the some ten years of G-1 zoning restrictions which Hicksville has been subjected to. 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# Devotions

## TO BE WHAT WE ARE

Gentle Jesus, meek and mild. Sweet, passive, wishy-washy Jesus was not the man who whipped animals and beat up money changers at the annual Passover festival in Jerusalem. Tables overturned, money crashing to the floor, rolling everywhere, pigeons frantically flying for cover, men screaming in pain adding salty language to the cacophony of sound and confusion all taking place in the Holy Temple. "What has the Master gotten himself into now?" his disciples probably worried. "Take these things away," Jesus screamed, "you shall not make my Father's house a house of trade."

Slowly order was restored, perhaps coming at the point of Jesus' exhaustion. Gingerly, Jews quizzed him on the appropriateness of his behavior. "What sign have you to show us for doing this?" they asked. A reasonable question from the uninitiated. One might rather have expected a few cries of "Throw the bum out of here" or demands for retribution. Jesus probably commanded so much authority that hasty action against him was not considered wise.

Our Lord's answer to their question confused his hearers. "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up," Jesus offered.

"It has taken forty-six years to

build this temple and will raise it up in three days?" they questioned in unbelief. At the time not even Jesus' disciples understood what he was suggesting. Only after his resurrection did they realize that the temple referred to his body that would be destroyed and then resurrected in three days.

In Jesus' ministry there is evidence that he regarded his death as the means by which the old sacrificial system would be condemned and the new Israel would come into being after his resurrection. Here he refers to his body as the temple. Later St. Paul refers to the church as the "body of Christ." A body alive, growing, reaching out, ever-changing with many part working together for the good of the whole. Its hands are not made for patting itself on the back but for reaching out to the lost. Its eyes are not fixed on a rear-view mirror looking at where it has been but are busy seeking a glimpse of the Father's vision of where it should go. Its legs do not run in busy circles but walk the road of obedience. It does not lose heart confronted by risk but follows the Spirit's leading even into the unknown. Its mouth does not seek to speak of Jesus as the eschatological manifestation of the ground of our being, but as "God's gift of love and forgiveness for those who are hurting." The church is about losing its mind, that is, not

subjecting its understanding of God and his potential to the limits of its own reason. Rather it should endeavor to unite its mind with God's mind, its will with his will, its purposes with his purposes, and its plans with his plans. Seized by the Spirit of God it lives as if all depends on God, for its very life is dependent upon God. It shares with God in the salvation of his children. As it does this, it gently comforts the afflicted and boldly afflicts the comfortable. Jesus, the church's Head, its Leader, Jesus, meek and mild, sometimes: Jesus, bold and belligerent, often.

"To be or not to be," is not the question. Jesus dwells in the midst of our community. We are the church -- the body of Christ. Come Holy Spirit, we pray, help us to be more completely what we are.

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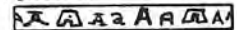
