Storm Causes Fire Siren Malfunction

A torrential down-pour on Friday, March 21, along with high winds, kayoed part of Hicksville's fire alarm system. Fire Dispatchers and police received numerous complaints on the Old Country Rd. Fire siren blowing on and off during the afternoon. The situation, due to the storm, was beyond control of the Fire Dispatcher, who can activate the alarm, but cannot shut it down. Control over the sirens is the job of the Fire District, not the Fire Department. Vamps were concerned that residents would hold them responsible for the inconvenience. Fire Department officials regret the inconvenience caused by the run-away siren and

will again request the district to take action to prevent future problems.

Open Burning Is Against The Law

With the arrival of Spring and residents out doing yard work, the Fire Department reports numerous violations have been reported concerning open burning. A reminder to district residents—County air pollution laws forbid open burning. Fire officials also state that any damage to property caused by your fire might result in you being liable for damages. Budget Vote Set; Strand III Action; COH Discussion

May 28 has been set by the Hicksville Board of Education as the date for voting on the 1980-81 school budget and for school board candidates. The Board took this action at its meeting Wednesday night.

The vote of 4 to 3 was arrived at after Trustee Tom Nagle changed his original vote from no to yes. Voting no were Vice President John Ayres and Trustees Virginia Germer and Pete Fujimoto.

Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins had originally recommended May 21, based on previous direction of the Board to "move the calendar forward."

Mr. Ayres, Mrs. Germer and Secretary Bill Bennett were concerned about the short time to consider budget appropriations and also the amount of revenues to be received from state aid. Business Manager Richard Weigang stated he was unsure when the legislature would act on state aid allocations.

Mr. Ayres had amended the original motion of May 21 to June 11, which passed 4 to 3. It was at this time that Mr. Nagle changed his vote on a previous amendment, made by Trustee Neil McCormack, for May 28.

The budget hearing is scheduled for May 7. A closed meeting to discuss staffing will be held April 9. When asked by this reporter if it was legal, under the Open Meetings Law, Dr. Hawkins stated "Yes, it is contractual personnel business."

Previous action on Strand III was brought up for discussion by President Dan Arena who moved

that the Board "declare null and void official action taken by the Board January 23." The Board at that time approved Dr. Hawkins' recommendation for the entire health curriculum to be rewritten including mandated items and those items in Strand III "appropriate" to the Hicksville Community.

Mr. Arena explained that he had spent many hours listening to the tapes of that evening and had consulted counsel. "There was confusion. It appears that a motion and an amended motion were treated as two separate motions." Mr. Arena's motion passed 6-1, with Mr. Ayres voting no.

Dr. Hawkins then repeated his original recommendation made on Jan. 23. He made three points: curriculum was already being revised in 5 areas; he had had an opportunity to discuss the Board's action with staff and community ("mostly listening"); and administration was in the process of working on a drug and alcohol abuse curriculum, which is part of the total health curriculum. "It was our intent to have the entire health curriculum K-12 a priority for next year."

"However, Strand III received a lot of adversity and this was insensitivity on my part."

Dr. Hawkins then made the recommendation that the total K-12 health curriculum be a priority for next year.

Mr. Ayres amended motion, to include the last sentence of the original recommendation was defeated 5-2. Mrs. Germer also voted yes to his amended motion.

Mr. Fujimoto questioned if there would be "road shows" to explain the curriculum to the public and if there would be community input. Dr. Hawkins answered yes to both.

Mr. Fujimoto further questioned, "If there are appropriate findings in the areas of human sexuality, family living and personality development, will these be explained to the community and brought to the Board?" Dr. Hawkins again answered affirmatively.

Mr. Arena's motion to accept Dr. Hawkins' new recommendation passed 6-1, with Mr. Ayres voting no.

Compliance with Committee on the Handicapped (COH) procedures were again discussed at length during various times of the meeting.

Resident Charlene Anci, also SEPTA President, questioned why a member of the Committee had in fact not been present at the last of several COH meetings and was she still a COH member.

Dr. David Weeks, Director of Pupil Personnel Services, stated that the COH member in question, a teacher of a self-contained cross age class, was still a member of the Committee. However, "it is difficult to find a substitute for her class. She refuses to teach there. If one cannot be found, I feel it important for her to stay in the classroom."

Resident Irwin Dunayer asked about mainstreaming at the senior high school. Dr. Weeks briefly outlined the program for

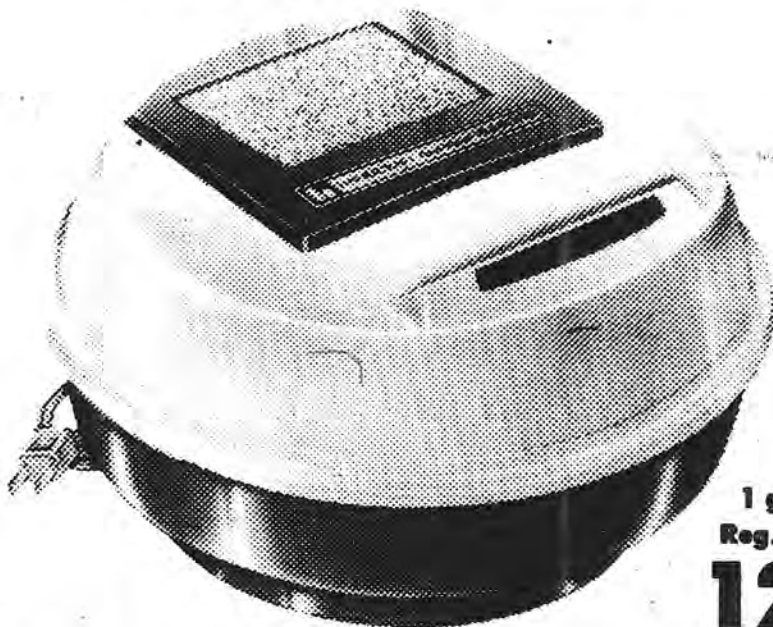

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Kennedy Wins 65% of Third Congressional District Nassau Vote

The Third Congressional District, which saddles Nassau and Suffolk counties, and incorporates most of the Town of Oyster Bay, handed Senator Ted Kennedy an impressive 65% of the vote in the Democratic primary, on Tuesday.

Kennedy won 3,777 votes in the Suffolk portion and 6,583 votes in the Nassau portion for a total of 10,360 votes. Carter received 2,580 votes in Suffolk and 3,540 votes in Nassau for a total of 6,120 votes. (All in the Third Congressional District.) The total vote in the Congressional District was 16,480, with Kennedy winning 63% of the vote. In the Nassau portion of the District, Kennedy won by 65%. In certain Assembly Districts, Kennedy's margin was even higher. For example, in the

10th Assembly District, the first District in Nassau County to come out for Kennedy last year, Kennedy won 73% of the total vote. The 10th encompasses Farmingdale, Bethpage, Plainview, Syosset, Old Bethpage and Woodbury.

Tom Stivala, the Third Congressional District Coordinator stated that he was glad to see that the issues had finally surfaced and believed that the vote was a vote for Kennedy. He added that Kennedy won a majority of every ethnic, racial and economic vote in the District.

County wide Kennedy had an impressive 2-1 win, receiving 43,303 votes to Carter's 21,218. Tenth Assembly District Leader and a Nassau Coordinator for Kennedy, Bernard Chetkof said that he was pleased to announce

that Kennedy took 67% of the vote in Nassau. He said that this was an indication that people will no longer be fooled by the rose garden technique.

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At The Town Board Meeting

At their regular meeting held on March 25th the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay acted on the following local matters:

- reserved decision on the petition on the day and night hearing of KABRO ASSOCIATES for a change of zone from Res. B to Bus F District of property on the east side of Woodbury Rd. and the north side of Jericho Tpke. in Woodbury, which, if approved would have extended a Woodbury shopping center. Approximately 40 people attended the evening session. Nine people spoke in opposition. The principal objection centered in the traffic problems which would be caused on local streets. The hearing ended at 11:30 pm.

- reserved decision on a petition of William A. Rossitte for a change of zone from Res. D to Bus. G District for a special use permit for a public garage to conduct an auto leasing business on the northeast corner of West John St. and Wyckoff St. in Hicksville. Two people spoke expressing concern as to be impact of this zone change on the residences in the immediate area.

- reserved decision on a petition of Camrose Art Corp. for a special use permit for the sale of original art work and custom picture framing services as well as for general offices in Fairchild Dr. and Dupont St. in Plainview. They want to operate as a retail business due to a change in the nature of their business. One speaker opposed this... a neighboring firm in this industrial area who felt that the increase in traffic would be detrimental.

- denied resolution 275-1980 relating to the application for the designation as a Town Landmark of the Maine Maid Restaurant, known as the Valentine Hicks House. The Board stated that the present owner had expanded this structure to a degree that it would not qualify as a landmark. The premises is presently being operated as a restaurant.

- approved resolution 279-1980 to use Federal funds in a Community Development program to reconstruct and improve existing

commuter parking fields in Hicksville.

- approved resolution 281-1980 directing the Town Clerk to advertise notice of a hearing on the application of Mac-Speed of Plainview, Inc. for a special-use permit for a drive-thru window facility at McDonald's Restaurant and for a fast food restaurant on the northwest corner of Old Country Road and Sylvia Lane in Plainview. Hearing date is April 22.

- approved resolution 286-1980 accepting \$238,447.00 relating to "cash in lieu of parks" from the Hamlet condominiums at Jericho.

The next meeting of the Town Board if set for April 15th.

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Dear Friends ---

In the last decade we have seen many instances when the grand jury system was used in attempts (most of them vain) to discredit their opponents by politicians. Now we see it being used for whatever reason, and it is temporarily discrediting two fine community leaders of our community. This is mostly because, except for lawyers, most of us do not understand the grand jury system itself.

As we understand its function, the grand jury hears only whatever facts are presented to it by the district attorney. Then it makes a decision as to whether, in their opinion, there are enough facts (all only from one source) to bring the case to trial. At this point all charges are made public and the case proceeds to trial.

In the meantime, contrary to the fact that, in our country, everyone is innocent until proved guilty... the very fact that this grand jury has after hearing one side of the case, called for a trial, has publicly smeared those involved as if they are guilty when they haven't even had the opportunity to present their explanations. Later on, many are proven innocent... but the smear remains in the minds of many who have done their own judging, perhaps because they do not understand the very grand jury system which permitted the case to be publicly presented when hearing only one side. As we have said, in the past it has been used to smear political opponents.

We are not at all sure that we believe in this particular part of our judicial system as it is presently possible for the unscrupulous to use it.

There is no way to alleviate the suffering that must be gone through by those so accused and their families, except to say that we honor you, as we have in the past, for all the fine ways in which you have served this community... along with hundreds of others, we believe in you... and more than that, we are sure that you KNOW the truth in your own hearts. This, with God's help, will sustain you all through these trying times.

WE NOTE THAT some are objecting to Sup. Colby touring some of the European sites where the latest and most successful garbage disposal plants have been operating for some years. We don't object at all. We believe that we elected our public officials to take care of all these matters for us. If, in their opinion, this is necessary, then we believe it should be done. We realize that it isn't romantic, but garbage disposal rates right up their with inflation as one of our national problems. If Europeans have solved this problem more efficiently than say, the Town of Hempstead, then we had better look into it.

We are in agreement with Newday, (and with many of you including Judge Lebkuecher), when they came out in favor of anti-littering laws. Why not write to your state assemblyman or senator and demand action on a long-stalled litter-control bill that would require every beverage container sold in the state to have a refund value of not less than 5c. The bill is numbered A2822 in the Assembly and S2153 in the Senate.

And, while on that subject, we believe that the litter picture in our area would also change considerably if all parents taught their children to place their litter in the nearest receptacle for that purpose. Also, we should ALL set an example for our children by never littering ourselves. How much lovelier our community would look then.

And while we are on the bandwagon, another petition we willingly signed recently urged legislation to eliminate taxing interest on savings account up to \$100,000. (How nice it would be to have that much!) However, we feel that there are practically NO incentives to encourage savings. Why should small amounts of savings be penalized in this way? We believe that it's absolutely wrong.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:
We were most interested in reading a story in your issue of March 13, entitled, "Yevoli To Carey: No More Gas Taxes!"

The Honorable Louis Yevoli (D. 10th A.D.), while deploring Governor Carey's "conceiving of new ways to pick our pockets," fails to mention what he is doing, "to pick our pockets."

Let's look at the record. The burning issue today is Full Value Tax Assessment, and its impact on the homeowners of Mr. Yevoli's area, as well as the rest of New York State, including our own little Bay Ridge area of Brooklyn.

With thousands of Long Island homes being foreclosed because the owners could not pay high property taxes, Mr. Yevoli made

his move "to pick our pockets," by voting against the motion to discharge the Esposito Bill, in the Assembly in June of 1980. He refused to permit this Bill out of Committee, and on to the floor of the Assembly for debate and vote.

He well knows, as do hundreds of thousands of homeowners all over Long Island, Queens, Brooklyn, Staten Island and the rest of the State, that the Esposito Bill is the only legislation that will repeal Section 306 of the Real Property Tax Law once and for all, and legalize the practice of tax assessments that has prevailed for nearly two-hundred-years.

And why did the discharge move fail by a vote of 65 to 60?

Because the politicians see a way to get their hands on unlimited tax monies, yearly, for their own pet projects, like pay raises, "Julus," and you name it. And they propose to do this by having the assessors come into our homes, to arrive at a market value price on which to base their assessments.

Mr. Yevoli, you were discussing, among other things, ways "to pick our pockets."

Thank you for permitting a "neighbor" to speak up.

Legislation To Bar Discrimination

Senator Ralph J. Marino (RC-Multonown) and Assemblyman Joseph Reilly (RC-Glen Cove) today announced introduction of legislation to bar discrimination against the elderly in rental housing.

"Senior citizens are entitled to the same rights and protections as anyone else," said Marino. Current law prohibits discrimination based on race, creed, color, national origin, sex, disability or marital status.

The recent case of an elderly couple from Glen Head who were rejected for an apartment due to their ages spurred Marino and Reilly to sponsor the measure. Reilly said, "Discrimination in public housing is not allowed today. This bill will encompass rental in the private sector and provide the same protection."

Petitions were presented the legislators on behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Reymon seeking the bill to end this unjustifiable discrimination. "Assemblyman Reilly and I feel that a strong case has been presented for this change in the law," Marino said. The measure will now be referred to the appropriate committees for consideration.

ADD: The following sentence to (1) of Section 485:
 Game rooms when permitted by the Town Board as a special exception after a public hearing; not more than two (2) pinball machines only in connection with, and customarily incident to, a bar, tavern, restaurant, bowling alley or other assembly building permitted under Section 485, when approved by the Zoning Board of Appeals.

ORDAINED, That Sec. 1. Definitions of Article I of said "Building Zone Ordinance", be and the same hereby amended by adding the following definitions thereto:

Pinball Machine: Any electrically operated machine upon which any game or contest of skill, chance or amusement may be played upon payment of a fee, charge or other consideration directly or indirectly; including, but not limited to any shooting game device in which no firearm ammunition is used; and, any game, machine, apparatus, paraphernalia, or device of the type, design, class or construction commonly known as pinball or bagatelle.

Game Room: All or any part of any building, structure, room, store or place of assembly within which is located more than two (2) pinball machines, as described in this Ordinance.

(Continued from Page 1) next year which would include a home base class in each area of Special Education for a full day. The personnel for the program "would be resolved before next year."

Later in the meeting, on the item to approve the recommendations of the COH, compliance with mandated procedures was again discussed when it was revealed that two of the four mandated Committee members were not in attendance at a recent COH meeting. Mr. Ayres was deeply concerned about voting yes to the recommendations on the one hand because of the legal question, and if voting no, could extend the 30-day limit for student placement.

Dr. Weeks again explained, as reported here last week, the procedures used when a physician is not present, as advised by the State Education Department.

Voting to accept the COH recommendations were Messrs. Arena, Nagle, Bennett and McCormack. Voting no were Mr. Fujimoto and Mrs. Germer. Mr. Ayres abstained.

COH matters still dominated the meeting when later, during discussion of claims and warrants, Mr. McCormack questioned a \$60 item which was revealed to be the fee paid to a doctor for a sports event. Having a doctor present at all sports events is required by law.

Mrs. Germer asked if a doctor was not in attendance, "is the game canceled?" Dr. Hawkins stated a doctor has always been present, to his knowledge, but yes, it would be canceled.

Mr. Ayres suggested that this was "a creative approach to doctors being present at COH meetings. If we pay to have them present at football games, maybe we should make the same arrangements for COH meetings." His suggestion was applauded by the audience.

Dr. Weeks explained that this was the fee range is \$75 to \$100. We also looked into the possibility of resident physician sitting on the COH, but those contacted felt one whole day was too much time.

Dr. Weeks added that pending legislation may make physician attendance optional in the future.

During the second public speaking session, Mrs. Anci again emphasized that the "COH is the heart of the Special Education program." She urged the compliance with the mandates and suggested parents be used on a rotating basis. "If all the mandated members are not at the COH meeting, then call the game."

Resident Arlene Rudin, although commending the Special Education program on the whole, expressed concerns regarding the mandated COH members being present, and parents not being informed of COH meeting when their child is being discussed.

It was revealed by Dr. Hawkins that a team from Albany would be in the district in April to "review all areas of Pupil Personnel." This does not include Special Education which is scheduled for a program audit for sometime this year.

Dr. Weeks emphasized, "We are more in compliance with State regulations, not less." Mr. Arena attributed this to parent awareness and demands of legal rights in this area.

A light vein in the meeting occurred during the discussion to authorize the business office to go out to bid on all transportation requirements. The run-away discussion resulted in parliamentary procedure confusion between Mr. Arena and Mr. Bennett on "point of order." It was resolved when Mr. Bennett withdrew his point of order.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 16 in the Administration Building.

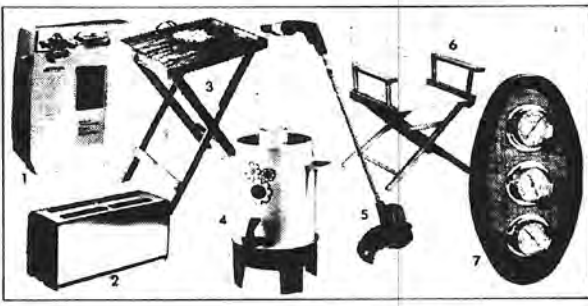

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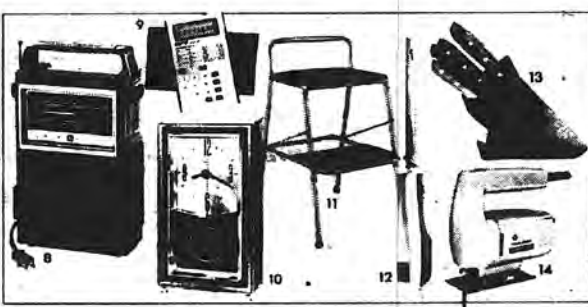

THE BEAUTY OF SELF-LOVE

When we are emotionally healthy, all of us have a rather high regard of ourselves. It is natural and normal to enjoy the beauty of self-love. Although the point of the text is not to stroke self-love, it does not deny its validity either. What the Bible does speak out against is selfish love, a love of our selves that is exclusive of God and of others... a love that has its priorities wrong. Whereas self-love is beautiful, selfish love is not.

In order to have the beauty of self-love, the Bible states that we must get our loving priorities in order. The first object of our love must be God himself. The love God wishes demands the action of our whole personality. All of our

being, moral, emotional, intellectual, and physical must go into our love of God. Only this is completely acceptable to God, and only this is adequate for His shaping of our lives. When we give God a mere fraction of ourselves, God himself becomes a mere fraction of what he might be to us.

Jesus not only wants to be in our lives but desires to be the master of our lives. He wants to be in the driver's seat. If your life were likened to your automobile, where would Jesus' place be in it? Would He be in the trunk like the spare tire to only be called forth in an emergency? Would He be in the back seat only being consulted occasionally for advice? Or, does He sit beside you, one with whom you have regular

conversation? Or is He in the driver's seat, at the controls, guiding your life in the direction He wants it to go?

For you see, when God is loved first and foremost and when we enjoy the beauty of a loving God, we next can enjoy the beauty of loving our neighbor. The word love in our text does not necessarily mean a personal liking, a sentimental affection, but rather our active good will in behalf of our neighbor. In other words, God says we are to love everyone even when we might not be able to like everyone. The chemistry is often not right between two people.
