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"Replace...Don't Renovate Hicksville Escalators," Yevoli

Assemblyman Lewis J. Yevoli (D-Old Bethpage) has charged the Metropolitan Transportation Authority with skirting both the letter and intent of state legislation that calls for replacement of two deteriorating escalators at the Hicksville station of the Long Island Rail Road. Legislation appropriating a total of \$700 thousand was included in the 1978 state supplemental budget and provided for the building of escalators at the Lynbrook, Valley Stream and Floral Park stations, and for replacement of two existing escalators at Hicksville.

In a letter to M.T.A. Chairman Richard Ravitch, Yevoli termed

the repairing of the old Hicksville escalators "a blatant misappropriation of funds...and patently illegal". The Assemblyman officially requested the M.T.A. to immediately cease all renovations on the old escalators and proceed with their replacement as the legislation mandates.

Stated Yevoli: "When you realize that upwards of five thousand riders use the Hicksville station daily, this is a very serious situation. We have cardiac cases, disabled persons and senior citizens among those travelers and they are entitled to

get to their trains with minimum discomfort. The M.T.A.'s attempt to repair the obsolete equipment is a sham".

The appropriation of the \$220 thousand for the Hicksville replacements culminated a three year crusade by Yevoli to get the equipment under state authority and successfully terminated the Town of Oyster Bay's jurisdiction after more than a decade of mismanagement.

Yevoli also called on State Attorney General Robert Abrams to investigate the M.T.A.'s actions in connection with the escalators.

Reflections On A Closing

Museum Commentary

They came steadily all last week to savor, once again, the nature exhibits and 'Old Hicksville' historical displays in the Hicksville Gregory Museum they knew so well. Some came for the first time, to marvel at Gregory Museum they knew so well. Some came for the first time, to marvel at what they never realized exists within the historic Old Heitz Place Courthouse-Jail. They all had heard it was closing on June 30th, and nobody could tell them with certainty if the Earth Science Center would reopen.

The Museum Director was on hand, as was the Curator and some of the Trustees and volunteers who have loved the museum and served it faithfully.

On the faces of the volunteers had young Curator there were lines of concern and disbelief but no despondency. "Economic needs may be compelling a suspension of Museum services to the public, but the struggle for survival of the Museum will go on," the Director was assuring one and all who asked inevitably worried questions while they made a last tour and took part in a search for bargains in the Museum's Gift Shop 'Clearance Sale'.

"We have applications filed for Federal and State 'support and program' grant funds", the Director was heard saying. "Also, Town Supervisor Colby's staff has told us that a Federal 'community development' grant may very well be available in October if the Museum's survival need is demonstrably clear to the House Urban Development Agency people."

It is understood that this H.U.D. grant is a matching

grant, contingent on the Hicksville Gregory Museum's oft-proven ability to raise much of its own sustenance funds. Such a grant may well provide a year's time in which the Hicksville and Long Island communities can enlist a museum Board of Trustees with broad fiscal and support resources which will enable the Museum to remain in Hicksville, an emerging transportation hub, and in the private sector of administration and funding.

Then, too, we understand, there is no reason why the many school districts whose students visit our unique museum cannot work out a museum service contract which could provide much of the Museum's annual fiscal support.

One must believe in the existence of leaders and people of good will and vision who can find ways to preserve our cultural and spiritual wellsprings. This writer refuses to think that institution which was created by the sacrifice of community volunteers and under the inspired leadership of the Gregorys, and which was dedicated so enthusiastically at the Old Courthouse, seven and half years ago, shut its doors permanently on June 30th.

The absence of mourners and last rites, Monday afternoon — the non-presence of community leaders, political chiefs, parents, religious and educators suggests to me that no one really believes that the Gregory Museum has died.

HOW TO COPE WITH FEAR AND ANXIETY

In television advertising we are led to believe that the greatest catastrophe that could befall us is "ring around the collar," or "medicine breath." Undue emphasis upon the importance of the body and the temporal quality of life has created a mind-set which is often more concerned with the accommodations of life's journey than its destination. Modern fear and anxiety is not directed toward the real, valid, justified fears such as an eternity without God. This is worthy of fearful consideration.
Many people today are more afraid of living than dying. Much of what we fear, much of what makes us anxious, is unnecessary fear, unnecessary anxiety. Jesus once asked, "Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?" Fear and anxiety result when we are putting the emphasis on the wrong syllable.

Whenever our hopes are centered in anything short of God and His will for us, we're going to have problems. When we make anything else our goal, frustration and defeat are inevitable somewhere down the line. All else in life is temporary. Eyes on Christ are eyes directed toward the source of balance and security and peace.

Now God has never promised to remove all our troubles and problems. In fact, the truly committed Christian is often in conflict with the society around

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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

As a concerned parent in the Hicksville School District, I would like to voice a complaint against the School Board and Administrator of the Hicksville Schools.

A unique situation has arisen in the Dutch Lane School. For three years now, grades K-2 have had a small group of children and have been divided into two classes. These children are now entering third grade and have been told they will all be put in one large class, which is estimated at twenty eight. (This does not include the mainstreaming of Learning Disability children who will enter for Art, Music, Physical Education, etc. during the day nor any children from the program who will mainstream for academic learning.) The School Board intends to group these youngsters in one class all the way through, sixth grade which means there will be no

opportunity for them to learn how to adjust to new people and new environment every year.

This alone is not the entire problem. There are three sets of twins in this class, two of which are identical, and one pair of cousins. This would mean severe competitiveness beyond the normal stresses for these siblings and will reduce the chance for these children to emotionally and academically develop as other children. As a parent of one set of the twins, I resent my children being treated this way and have worked very hard over the years to encourage individual growth for them. All this will be put to waste if they must continue to be together for four years.

Dr. Hawkins' solution is to bus these children to other schools. How often must these children adjust to new environment? They have had to adapt themselves to being a twin and developing self identity, entering school where people constantly compare and

have trouble identifying them and finally making a separation in school. Now you ask them to leave their school, which they have developed bonds to, and start all over at the age of eight. Would you want your child to go through this? I am sure you would not.

When a School Board forgets that children are human beings with feelings and emotions and not a chart of numbers and statistics, there is something seriously wrong in our district. Our main objective should always be the well being of the child and their educational future.

As a long time worker in the Hicksville P.T.A. and community I am deeply saddened to see how this unusual problem is being handled. I only hope other parents will not have to fight like we are for what their children are entitled to.

"State Health Dept. Slow On Hooker Chem. Study," Lent

One year ago, I requested the New York State Department of Health to make a health study of the workers at the Hicksville plant of the Hooker Chemical Company. Constituents who were former employees of the plant had expressed concern as to possible effects on their health from the toxic chemicals produced at the Hicksville plant. I felt a thorough study was essential to resolve these understandable concerns.

Dr. David Axelrod, State Health Commissioner agreed that such a study was necessary, and promised that it would begin as soon as possible. Recently, I wrote Dr. Axelrod asking for a report on what progress had been made in the Hicksville plant study. My concern has been heightened by the new scientific surveys of the health of the residents of the Love Canal area in upstate New York, where buried wastes in an old dumping ground used by the Hooker Chemical plant at Niagara Falls

have caused many health problems.

I have just received a disappointing response from Dr. Axelrod. Although he agrees with me that recent events at Love Canal have—in Dr. Axelrod's own words—"made the need for the study all the more compelling" it does not appear that much has been accomplished.

In fact, Dr. Axelrod indicated that his major accomplishment in the past 12 months had been to work out an agreement with the Hooker company to share information from "certain elements" of a health study being done on the Hicksville plant by the University of Cincinnati. Dr. Axelrod also reported that he and the Hooker have agreed on "certain essential elements to ensure the accuracy and completeness" of the information made available to the N.Y. Department of Health.

While this is undoubtedly a useful step, I am greatly concerned that there seems to have been little independent activity

on the part of the State Department of Health. I feel there is a definite need for scientists other than those hired by the Hooker Chemical Company to conduct the study. I am well aware of the problems the State Department of Health faces in marshalling the resources necessary to deal properly with this extremely complex and difficult matter, but as Dr. Axelrod himself points out: "...recent events make the need for the study all the more compelling"

Therefore, I am urging Dr. Axelrod to do his utmost as Commissioner of Health for the State of New York to get his Department study of the Hicksville plant workers into full operation. Every day of delay only prolongs the anxiety and concern of those workers, and their families. Until the study is completed there is no way for them to determine whether those working in a plant dealing with toxic chemicals may have been exposed to health hazards.

Campsites Available

Twenty year-round campsites for mobile, self-contained rigs are now available for rental at Nassau Beach Park in Lido, it was announced by Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks Commissioner Abram C. Williams.

Water and facility for emptying holding tanks are provided but there are no electrical hookups, Williams pointed out.

The sites, adjacent to ocean or pool swimming, rent for \$4 a day from June 27 through September 4. Sites must be rented for a minimum of 7 days Friday through Friday unless the facility is not fully rented. Then a shorter

stay may be arranged. After September 5, the fee is reduced to \$3 per day.

Each site has a grassy plot and picnic table. Ocean swimming is free upon payment of the regular parking toll of \$1 weekdays or \$1.25 Saturday, Sunday or holidays. Campers staying more than one day pay the toll only the first day. Admission to any of the 5 pools at East Central and West Terraces is 75 cents for children and \$1.50 for adults.

through September 1. Campers are welcome to use any of Nassau Beach Park's recreational facilities. There are handball, basketball and tennis courts, steam rooms, playgrounds, picnic areas and concession stands.

Williams said that reservations must be made in person at Nassau Beach Park's East Terrace on Lido Blvd., daily from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M. A Leisure Pass is required. For further information, call 889-5661.
