# Town To Board Up Dangerous Building

At their regular meeting on Tuesday, July 22, the Town Board acted as follows:

advised the Town's Commissioner of Public Works by memorandum dated July 11, 1980 that inspection reports made by his Division showed that dangerous buildings were located on the premises known as Section 45. Block 285, Lot 12, said premises being known as 459 premises being known as 439 Newbridge Road, Hicksville, New York, and that, in the interest of public safety, it is essential that certain of said structures be boarded up and repaired and others demolished

reparter and others demonstred as soon as possible; and "WHEREAS, Robert W. Sch-midt, Deputy Supervisor, after review of the above-noted memorandum and the inspection reports with respect to same deemed it essential and in the noblic interest that the subject deemed it essential and in the public interest that the subject premises be made safe and, by memorandum dated July 15, 1980, authorized the Commissioner of Public Works to make the emergency repairs required and to demolish the dengerous structures as dengerous structures as described in the July 11, 1980 memorandum from the Superintendent of Buildings:



# Statewide Coalation Against Reassessment

WHO: We, the Civic Organi-zations affiliated with S.C.A.R. (Statewide Coalition Against Reassessment) formerly known as the MACD Committee, have enlarged and expanded our activities to become a statewide organization. We have been in existence since early 1979, involved with the issue of 100%

Reassessment.
ISSUE: In 1975, the N.Y.S.
Court of Appeals ruled in favor of
an irate Islip resident who,
contending he was unequally
taxed, sued and won. This has
been called the Hellerstein Decision. been called the Hellerstein Decis-ion. Plainly speaking, the decision states that for 200 years a legislative statute (section 306 of the Real Property tax law) which says that all real property must be assessed at full value, had been ignored but now must teasistically speeced. This change be strictly enforced. This change in our assessment practic forced us into a tax crisis.

Two bills have been introduced in the Assembly. The Esposito bill A6136, in essence, expresses the voice of the people which is, we wish to continue our 200 year old de facto tradition of tax assessment. We do not want to pay one penny more taxes. On the other hand we have the Fink Bill A10,000 which sets up a classified system of assessment. His bill uses full value as the basis for this system. However, he uses the words base-value and describes it as "fair market value, the amount which a willing buyer would pay a willing seller." Yet, any layman can recognize the fact that this means full-value or 100\$ assessment.

AIM: The aim of our organization is to protect all homeowners from the devastating effects of 100% reassessment. We are

100% reassessment. We are unequivocally opposed to any real property tax hike. PLEDGE: We pledge to carry this message to Albany and impress upon our legislators that at this time only one bill protects

the homeowner, namely the Esposito Padavan bill and we therefore insist upon the passage of this bill in the Assembly.

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
