## Schools To Open Wed., Sept. 3

The Hicksville Public Schools will reopen for the fall on Wednesday, September 3. Teachers will return for pre-opening inductions on Tuesday, when they will be welcomed back by Superintendent of Schools Dr. Wilber Hawkins. After a brief conference at the high schools, each building's staff will assemble in its own school for meetings.

The 1980-81 school year promises many new and exciting programs for the education of the Hicksville students. Part of the district's secondary reorganization plan, for example, calls for the establishment of an alternative school at both the junior and senior high schools. Students who do not perform well in the usual academic realm will participate in the alternative program.

The Hicksville School District has instituted a program for gifted and talented children, and will launch it this year in kindergarten classes across the eight elementary schools. Screenings were conducted earlier this year, and those who have been identified as gifted or talented will receive the encouragement they deserve in pursuing those gifts.

A crisis counselor has been established at each of the secondary schools, to work with those

students who face extraordinary problems.

During the summer months, two library-media centers were created at both Burns Avenue and Woodland Avenue Schools. In the secondary schools, the guidance offices have been redesigned for maximum usage.

During the upcoming school year, two Title-IV grant proposals will be implemented in the Hicksville Public Schools. They are entitled, "History Speaks" and "The Precision Fluency Shaping Program," and they are the work of staff members Alene Cohen and David Jaffe. The proposals were recently approved by the State Education Department and will be completely funded through that agency.

There are other happenings in

the Hicksville Schools and the district welcomes the interest and participation of all residents. School calendars for 1980-81 are currently being mailed out to the community and open house dates are prominently listed. All parents are urged to attend these forums, so that they may keep informed on the progress of their children and the events in their children's school. NEW PERSONNEL

New administrators to Hicksville include Marie Marshall and Gerald Klein. The Board of Education recently named Mrs. Marshall as science chairman at the junior high school.

Mr. Klein has been appointed principal of the junior high school.

# School Board Makes New Appointments

Personnel matters and awarding of bids highlighted the brief meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education Wednesday evening. The meeting lasted less than two hours, with one hour spent in executive session.

Upon returning from the executive session, the Board approved the appointment of Dr. Donald J. Haggerty as Chair of Math in the junior high school at a salary of \$31,605. Trustee John Ayres was absent from the meeting. He was on vacation.

Dr. Haggerty was most recently Chairperson of the Elementary Education Program, State University of New York, Stony Brook. He also taught math

in the Smithtown and Oceanside School Districts.

The Board also abolished the position of Chairperson of Department, Health and Physical Education, Junior Senior High School, and the position of Director of Physical Education and Health, and created the position of Supervisor of Physical Education. After terminating the services of Richard Hogan from the abolished position, the Board appointed Mr. Hogan as Supervisor of Physical Education at a salary of \$34,122.

The Board awarded bids for transportation-non-public schools outside district to Tomfor Transportation and We Transport for a total of \$8,850.00.

Transportation-special schools outside district were awarded to several bidders for a total of \$9,648.50. The Board also awarded bids for biology supplies to several bidders totaling \$3,318.18; to Holmes Security Corp. for approximately \$5,000 to supplement the district's security system; for library book shelving, \$6,856.62; to Nickerson Corp. for faculty room furniture in the senior high school, \$1,979.90; and for audio visual equipment and computers, \$14,636.10.

During the public speaking session, resident Arlene Rudin requested the Board change the September 10 meeting since it is the even of Ros Hashanah, the Jewish New Year. Mr. Nagle

stated his announcement of September 10 was in error. The meeting has been rescheduled for Tuesday, September 9.

Mrs. Rudin also asked why medial forms were not provided in the 9th graders' report cards at the end of the school year. She stated she thought it "was policy to have them in the 9th grade report card."

Mrs. Rudin also inquired about the status of the 3rd grade enrollment at Dutch Lane School. Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins stated the enrollment was currently at 26 students.

Mrs. Rudin also stated she could "not understand why data was still not available" concerning the number of students who had failed on the secondary

level. Dr. Dan Salmon, Assistant Superintendent, Secondary, stated "the data has never been collected in that form." It is now being developed and the data should be available soon. Mrs. Rudin also asked the number of students attending summer school outside the district and how many of these students had passed.

## Right to Life News

By Doug Harknett

The big news coming out of the Right to Life Party convention this past weekend, in the writer's opinion, was not so much Eller McCormack's nomination for the Presidency, but our belief that Ronald Reagan is in favor of abortion in enough circumstances to completely vitiate any claims he could make to being pro-life.

In Right to Life circles in recent weeks, attention had centered on George Bush's poor position on the issue, but the Right to Life perception had been that Reagan himself was pro-life. All of this changed when Reagan phoned the Right to Life Party convention last Saturday, and asked for the party endorsement. Party Chairman Mary Jane Tobin and others spoke with him for 45 minutes, and during the conversation asked him directly each of the 5 right to life questions that all candidates are asked, and he answered each affirmatively. However, surprisingly, as the questions became more detailed, he revealed that he favors abortion where the health of the mother is en-

dangered and in some other cases.

He was then asked how he could admit all these exceptions now, when before the New Hampshire primary he had assured Nellie Gray, leader of the annual March for Life, that he favored the Helms-Dornan Amendment which provides for no exceptions. Reagan replied that he thought the amendment she had been referring to was the Hyde amendment, which in the latest version does include exceptions. The confusion apparently was complete because the Helms-Dornan Amendment goes to the heart of the matter in that it would amend the U.S. constitution itself, and would prohibit all abortions; while the Hyde amendment does not touch the constitution, and only prohibits U.S. funding of abortions in some cases.

After the phone call when all had time to reflect, some Reagan delegates still seemed unable to believe that Reagan really meant what he had said, and attempted to have the nomination postponed until September 13. During the

interval they proposed to send several Right to Life Party people to meet with Reagan personally, and spend several hours with him to try to persuade him to change his mind. However, this was voted down, with most people feeling that it would be fruitless, since he had already met with other right to life people and still obviously believes in some of the exceptions.

There immediately followed the vote on the nomination, which Ellen McCormack won by more than 2 to 1 over Reagan.

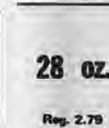
