On Oct. 12, at 12:38 a.m., a working fire was reported in two abandoned houses on Newbridge Rd. near the Railroad Station. Vamps, using four pieces of equipment, controlled and extinguished the fire in 45 minutes. The fire was termed suspicious. Later on Oct. 12, a suspicious fire caused minor damage to a garage behind 15 W. Nicholai St. A 2nd Pct. Police Officer on routine patrol spotted the smoke before the fire gained headway.

On Oct. 15 at 11:38 a.m., the Hicksville High School was evacuated after two fires were set by unknown persons in the building. Both fires were quickly extinguished. The Fire Marshal's office is investigating.

On Oct. 25, Hicksville Vamps responded to 9 alarms caused by the storm that dumped almost 1" of rain on the local area. Most of the calls were for downed power lines.

Community Support Needed To Curb Halloween Vandalism

Termining Halloween vandalism a community problem, Nassau County Police Commissioner Samuel J. Rozzi today called upon the parents of Nassau County and the community at large to work with the police to help curb "this almost traditional wanton destruction of property."

"Halloween is not an excuse for vandalism," stated Rozzi. "The holiday is not a license for youthful vandals to pillage a neighborhood. I am asking parents to talk to their children and monitor their actions during this holiday period. The young people performing such acts of vandalism don't come from a different country or another town... they are our children and it's up to each one of us to stop their destructive acts."

The Police Department will have additional units patrolling the streets of the county concentrating on preventing vandalism and apprehending rowdy or destructive youths. Drawn from other support units within the department, the patrols will be in both marked and unmarked cars.

"While most youngsters

try to enjoy the holiday without getting into trouble, there are always a handful who don't!" stated Rozzi. "It is upon these pranksters that the department will focus its attention."

In addition, the Department is asking that parents be concerned as to where their children go; what they eat and what costumes they are wearing. Some homemade costumes can be flammable and others restrict the children's vision when crossing streets. The Department has issued the following advice for youngsters.

- For trick or treaters:
 - Don't trick-or-treat alone.
 - Don't go inside a stranger's home.
 - Wear light colored clothing after sundown.
 - Don't wear masks that block vision.
 - Walk on sidewalks or paths, not on streets.
 - Don't eat candies or other treats until your parents check them.
- For teenagers:
 - Halloween is a time for fun and not an excuse for vandalism; damaging or defacing someone's property is Criminal Mischief - a misdemeanor.

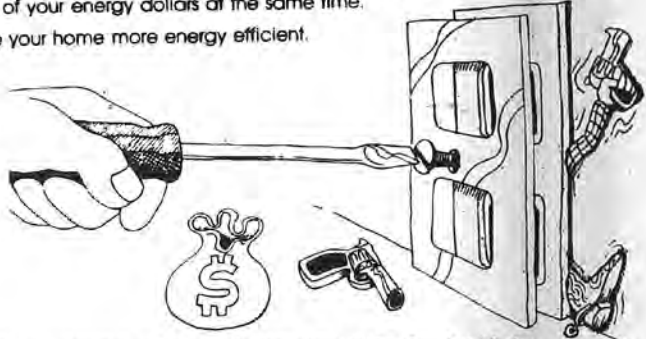

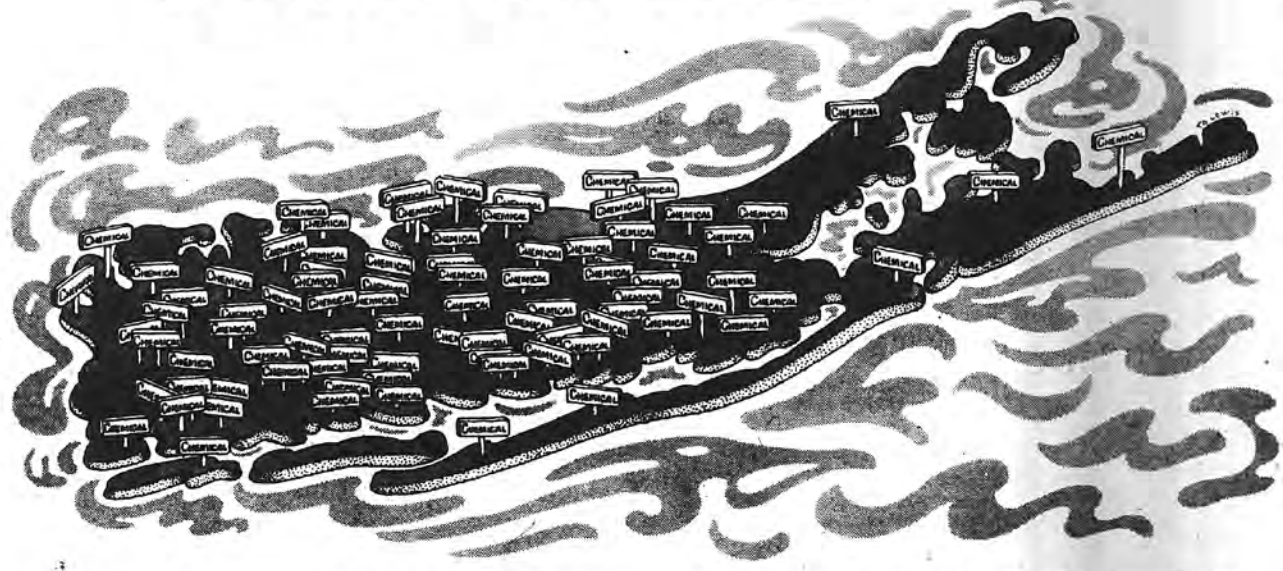

Last week at the meeting of Families for Life, the guest speaker was Ceil Herman, Conservative candidate for the 6th (State) Senatorial seat currently held by John Dunne. Mrs. Herman helped form Families for Life in 1972 and has been active in the anti-abortion and anti-ERA movements ever since.

A Conservative, Mrs. Herman sought the Right to Life line, but it was given to Democrat Tom Boyle, another active pro-lifer from Garden City who had defied the Democratic leadership last year by accepting Right to Life Party endorsement when running for Tax Receiver of Hempstead Town. For that, according to Boyle, he was punished this year by being refused the Democratic designation. Right to Life Party leaders felt strongly that because of his courage in standing up for life, and in bucking the

pro-abortion leadership of the Nassau Democratic Party, Boyle should receive the Party's endorsement this year.

A spirited discussion was also held regarding the presidential race. Mrs. Herman endorsed Ronald Reagan on the basis of the Republican platform, which is anti-abortion and anti-ERA, and because of some of his pro-life statements. Others present called attention to inconsistencies and contradictions in Reagan's behaviour, such as his selection of Bush as a running mate; his admission to the Right to Life Party leadership that he believes in abortion in cases of mental and physical health of the mother and other situations; and his recent public statement that a person's pro-abortion position would not disqualify him from being considered for a seat on the

Supreme Court.

The meeting was a lively one, with every opinion given a chance for expression. After opportunity to reflect, the writer feels that any differences among pro-lifers should be fought out in the primaries and conventions, and that they should close ranks in the general elections and support the candidate who ultimately wins the Right to Life Party line.

Families for Life is the local pro-life group. Members belong to all political parties and all religions, but unite (usually) to support pro-life candidates. Red cells, white cells, plasma, platelets, and cryoprecipitate which help save the lives of shock and burn victims, hemophilic children and adults with acute anemias, and many other medical problems.

Nassau Communities Win AAA Awards

Twenty-one communities in Nassau County have received special awards from the American Automobile Association for their commendable pedestrian safety records.

The awards were presented on September 24th by James P. Melton, New York State commissioner of Motor Vehicles, and Harold C. Meyers, president of the Automobile Club of New York, in a special ceremony in Westchester County.

Mayors or their representatives from the Nassau communities were among officials from New York State and 68 local cities, towns and villages who accepted awards at the affair. The ceremony was part of AAA's annual Pedestrian Safety Inventory program.

The Villages of Bayville, Kensington and Kings Point were awarded Special Citations for their outstanding pedestrian accident records, while the City of Glen Cove and the Village of Malverne garnered the Special Citation for outstanding pedestrian program improvement.

Other top communities honored for their fatality-free records were Lawrence (18 years, Island Park, New Hyde Park and Roslyn, each with 120 straight years without a pedestrian death.

Twelve other Nassau Communities received Pedestrian Safety Citations for fatality-free records of from one to eight years.

They were: Great Neck (8 years), Cedarhurst (3 years), East Hills (3 years), East Rockaway (3 years), Garden City (2 years), Westbury (2 years), Farmingdale (1 year), Hempstead (1 year), Lynbrook (1 year), Massapequa Park (1 year), Mineola (1 year) and Sea Cliff (1 year).

More than 2,500 communities across the nation submitted reports to AAA for scoring in the program. They were evaluated by a panel of leaders in highway and traffic engineering, motor vehicle administration, enforcement, education and traffic safety.

LILCO News

Long Island consumers saved over \$64 million in electricity costs during the last 12 months. The use of cheaper fuel in its boilers and the purchase of bargain electricity from other utilities by Long Island Lighting Company netted these considerable savings for customers.

The cheaper fuel was natural gas that became available last winter. Because of the mild weather, LILCO's customers required substantially less natural gas for heating purposes. This resulted in a temporary surplus of the fuel. LILCO put this gas to good use as a substitute for the costly OPEC oil which the utility normally burns to produce electricity. More than three million barrels of oil were

displaced by this substitution. The \$18.4 million saved in fuel costs was passed directly along to LILCO's customers through a lower fuel cost adjustment on their monthly bills.

By careful shopping for surplus electricity generated by other utilities in the northeast, LILCO was able to save an additional \$46 million and avoid burning another six million barrels of oil. These utilities use a variety of fuels to produce electricity, including uranium, coal and hydropower. Since these fuels are cheaper than the foreign oil on which LILCO is totally dependent, the electricity produced by these other fuels is less expensive. Whenever this economic electric power is available, LILCO purchases it rather than producing the equivalent amount in its oil-fired generators.

A recently built 345 kv transmission interconnection that links LILCO's system with upstate enables LILCO to import significant amounts of economy power from other utilities in the region. In addition to saving \$64,350,000 for its customers, LILCO's fuel practices displaced burning 9,400,000 barrels of oil. Customers have seen all of these dollar savings in reduced fuel cost adjustments on their bills.
