Expenditures for the Sterling Forest Conference Center; the district's telephone bill; and senior high school extra-curricular activities were among the numerous topics discussed and debated on Wednesday evening's meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education.

The claims and warrants for the period ending October 24 reflected a \$1,140 expenditure to the Conference Center. This amount was the penalty to the district for canceling the use of the Conference Center. The Board, at a previous meeting, had voted to hold the annual administrative conference at a local, less expensive site.

However, the contract with Sterling had already been signed by District Business Manager Richard Weigand. He is authorized to act on behalf of the school district in signing contracts. The contract contained a pre-penalty clause that in the event the district cancel-

ed its conference, and Sterling could not book the rooms for another conference, a fee would be charged, thus the \$1,140.

Resident Frank Grimmer was concerned with the power given to the administration to sign a contract before the Board approved it. A heated discussion between Mr. Grimmer and Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins ensued, with Dr. Hawkins attempting to explain the steps in the budget procedure and the procedures in spending allocated funds in the budget.

"There was nothing done that was illegal or improper," stated Dr. Hawkins.

President Tom Nagle stated that the Board "knew the jeopardy when canceling."

The item was deleted from claims and warrants until legal counsel could give an opinion.

Also under claims and warrants, a telephone bill for \$12,613.71 was questioned by

Trustee Virginia Germer. She stated that the bill reflected \$5,089.06 for installation costs and asked where the installations had taken place.

Director of Building and Grounds Bill Becker stated that the installations were mainly at the junior and senior high school due to the reorganization of staff, and some work was done at the administration building.

Trustee John Ayres questioned the reorganization costs, stating he could not recall it being discussed or mentioned during the presentation by Dr. Dan Salzman, Assistant Superintendent for Secondary.

Dr. Salmon stated that the physical changes were primarily in the two secondary buildings but there was "no way to know the total costs" involved with the secondary reorganization.

Resident Edna Edelstein was concerned about the low moral in the students in the academic clubs at the

senior high school. Also, the student government has held no meetings since school began. She felt it was due to the lack of a student activities coordinator. "Why has this position been empty so long?"

Dr. Hawkins answered "you're right. However, the student government has been dysfunctional previous to this year."

The duties of this position have been temporarily assigned to assistant principal Robert Passamenti. Dr. Hawkins stated that there was "no deterioration in the activities," since there were individual and class advisors. He also suggested she speak to the high school principal as to why there was no activity.

Following is information received to questions asked by residents and board members.

Reactivation of the school board advisory Long Range Planning Committee has been "talked about" but no action taken to proceed.

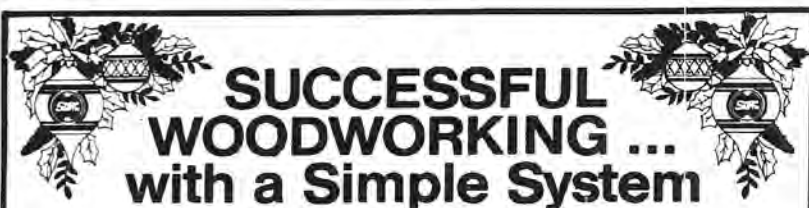

owners of the end pieces are holding out. Since the State will not give permission for curb cuts in the middle of the block and progress would be stymied by the hold-outs, one possibility might be an IDA (Industrial Development Agency) condemnation. Possible plans for Broadway would be shops with glass windows along the street for window shopping and parking in the rear.

Syrabu has asked the Town Board for permission

to build a sales office where the old gas station stands on Wyckoff and West John Street. A messenger service has applied for a site on West John and Burns Avenue, and Robert Chevrolet has an application before the Board for an office building on South Broadway near the Florida home.

The next meeting of the Hicksville Community Council will be held on Thursday, December 4th at the Library.



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# Fraud/9-Digit Zip Codes Discussed At The HCC

"Know something about the people you are buying from," said Phil Sweet, a representative of the Nassau County Department of Consumer Affairs.

"By next fall, the Post Office will tell each individual what their nine digit zip code is," stated Anthony Murello, Postmaster of the entire 117 and 118 postal area.

Both Sweet and Murello shared the podium of the Hicksville Community Council on Thursday night, November 6th and told the audience what to look out for and what to look for in the future.

"Negative option is the latest tactic to take consumer money," said Sweet. He used as an example a large credit card company which offered a FREE appointment and personal record book, a \$14.95 value for \$2.25 only for card holders. Sweet stressed that if a consumer decided to spend \$2.25 for his FREE book, he would get future editions and have to pay for them until he said "no," in writing.

Another tactic is to pay \$2.99 for 'program details' which is another way of saying that you pay for the company to mail you literature.

A representative of the North East Civic Association bought a kit, which cost her \$5, to the Council meeting. The \$5 was supposed to gain her entry into a program for consumers, but it only bought her an envelope worth of advertising.

Sweet said that the department is looking into a local catalog company that has dual pricing on every page. The company claims that the higher number is used for reference only but there is no guarantee that these prices are the usual cost of the article. This company recently received 50 violations for unavailability of merchandise.

Minerals are the 'hottest item' that you can mail away for, said Siegfried Widder, director of the Chamber of Commerce. Widder, who

began getting complaints from people all over the country, said that a 'minerals company' who had a Post Office box in Hicksville, was selling \$5 emeralds, \$10 silver ingots and \$5 diamonds. The advertiser forgot to explain that the emeralds were beryl, the silver ingots were 5 grams and the .25 point diamond was 1/400 of a carat. The 'company' has moved out of Hicksville and has taken residence in a neighboring PostOffice!

When Postmaster Murello took the floor, he added to the examples of fraud by explaining that a mailer was sending pornographic material out of the Hicksville Post Office and was caught because he was not producing what was promised.

In a lighter vein, Murello began building the basis for a nine-digit zip code system which will begin in 1981. Older residents can remember when there was a little Post Office on Broadway which employed 40 people. Today, Hicksville is a sectional center that processes three million pieces of mail a day!

Murello explained that the Post Office has attempted to keep up with business. He mentioned that while the 'private sector has decreased productivity by 11%, the Post Office has increased it by 23% in 10 years.

This increased productivity is due to the 'monster,' a 12 console machine which feeds a letter before a distributor every second. The distributor reads the zip and sends the letter into one of the 300 baskets in the rear of the machine for delivery and additional sorting.

Next year, the latest in sorting machines will read all nine numbers electronically. The zip will be 'bar coded' by the machine and will eliminate a complete distribution handling, thereby bringing the mail directly to the mail carrier. So in 20 years, we have gone from the person who had to memorize each state and community, to the machine

with the distributor, to the electronic reader!

The first five numbers of this new code will be the present five numbers that we use today designating the sectional Post Office and then the town. The additional four numbers will designate a street in that particular town and then a house number (or a street and a building, or a building and a business in that building.) Murello stated that next fall, if you provide the Post Office with a list of your correspondents, they will supply you with their new nine-digit zip.

During the question and answer period, Murello received complaints concerning the late distribution of a portion of Hicksville Soccer's bulk mail, the long lines at the windows and the lack of parking spaces.

This question and answer period flowed into the Hicksville Town meeting, during which Carolyn

Nacewicz a 30-year resident announced her candidacy for Fire Commissioner and asked that all Hicksville residents come out to vote on December 9 from 6 to 10 P.M. at the Marie Street headquarters. And Chris Cahalan announced that soccer's annual indoor tournament will be held on December 6th and 7th and again on December 20 and 21 at Lutheran High School.

Councilman Tom Clark, who remarked that the Community Council had a very interesting meeting, said that the Town budget has not been approved because Congress adjourned without deciding on revenue sharing.

There will be changes in our town, according to Clark. The lot between Barclay Street and West John, bordered by AutoVest and the sweater factory has been condemned and will be paved by spring to be used as additional parking. Clark expects the reposed

parking garage will be completed by 1983. The parking lot is being renovated at West Marie Street and Jerusalem Avenue and the Town is contemplating two hour

parking meters to prevent commuter parking.

Clark mentioned that the Town will not rezone Broadway until there is an application. He said that a local property developer has been purchasing several lots along Broadway, but the

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If one spouse is employed and not covered by a qualified plan, that working spouse is eligible to include the non-working spouse in his or her IRA. Or the couple may set up separate IRAs. In either case, an additional \$250 — to a maximum

of \$1,750 annually — may be contributed. If two separate plans are established, it will be to your advantage, tax wise, to contribute the same amount of money annually to each plan. For example, each year 15% of the working spouse's compensation, up to a maximum of \$875, should be deposited to each IRA.

As a person who was born and raised in the Bronx, I looked forward to my move to Hicksville with joy, optimism, and hope.

I loved the town, the people, and the spirit of my new home-town, and have

enjoyed every moment of my twelve years of residence. UNTIL NOW!

This past winter when I awoke on chilly morning, I looked out the window and saw three cars (mine, my husband's, and my father's) all tilted, I rubbed my eyes, put on my coat, and went outside to see what was the matter. You can imagine my horror when I saw two tires on each car slashed by a razor! Two of my neighbors cars were vandalized in a similar fashion. How cruel an act. I kept saying to myself "WHY?" "How could anyone do this?" "For what reason?"

## Families For Life Club News

Dr. Ada Ryan of Flushing Hospital will give a talk on Amniocentesis at the Families for Life meeting next Wednesday night. Amniocentesis is the controversial diagnostic procedure used to detect abnormalities in babies before birth. The meeting will be held at 8:30 PM at Levittown Hall on November 19th and the public is cordially invited to attend.

In a 1963 pamphlet Planned Parenthood said, "Abortion kills the life of a baby after it has begun." Today Planned Parenthood performs abortions, and makes abortion referrals to other institutions. The biological facts haven't changed - a baby is still a baby, even though not yet born. It is Planned Parenthood that has changed.

The right to life movement has no position on contraception. It concerns itself only with life that has already begun. A Human Life Amendment would give legal recognition to the

biological fact that a new life begins at fertilization and is entitled to the same due process protection before birth as well as after. It would put the unborn baby on the same legal footing as the mother. Planned Parenthood opposes a Human Life Amendment, and would allow the killing of human life at any time before birth for any reason.

To justify killing a human being, a civilized society requires that the person to be killed must have willfully committed a grievously wrongful act such as murder. Some societies don't permit capital punishment even for murder. It should be evident that an unborn baby cannot be guilty of a willfully wrongful act. It didn't create itself. In fact, especially in the case of rape, it should be crystal clear that the baby is an innocent victim, not an aggressor. The rapist was the aggressor, not the baby. Rational societies do not kill innocent victims; they try to help them.

And then there is the

danger in the logical extension of the idea of abortion. It has been said that every seemingly good argument for abortion is a good argument for infanticide. Does Planned Parenthood argue for infanticide? What about the aborted baby that remains alive? Will Planned Parenthood discard him, or try to save him?

The world is at the point of returning to the vicious barbarism of centuries ago, when an unwanted child in Sparta was exposed to die. The right to life movement recognizes this threat to basic human values, and is working to turn the tide.

## LILCO News

The Long Island Lighting Company together with the New York State Atmospheric Sciences Research Center has selected the New York Ocean Sciences Laboratory in Montauk as the site for an 18 kilowatt windmill turbine system. The windmill will be installed in the spring. It is part of a nationwide field evaluation program for small wind energy conversion systems funded by the U.S. Department of Energy.

LILCO is interested in studying what part windmills could play in Long Island's long range energy future. The utility's near total dependence on foreign oil has increased its interest in developing alternative

energy sources such as wind, solar and nuclear.

The windmill that will be installed at Montauk is 60 feet tall and its three fiberglass blades are 33 feet long. It will produce a maximum of 18 kilowatts at 24 miles per hour wind speed. Winds of at least 9 miles per hour are required to generate electricity with this wind turbine.

LILCO's participation in the windmill program will be another step in the Company's on-going effort to test new sources of energy and to find ways to use energy more efficiently. This year the utility has already generated electricity by burning shale oil and is continuing with its solar water heating and electric vehicle programs.

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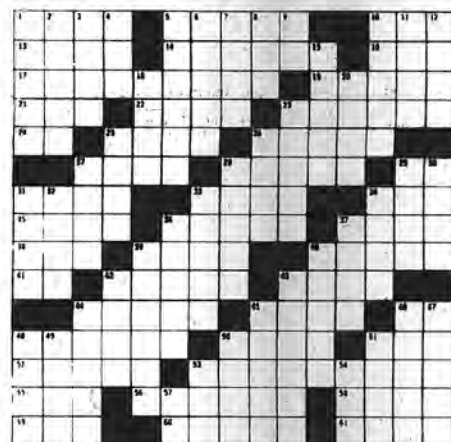

## HHS Track Renovation

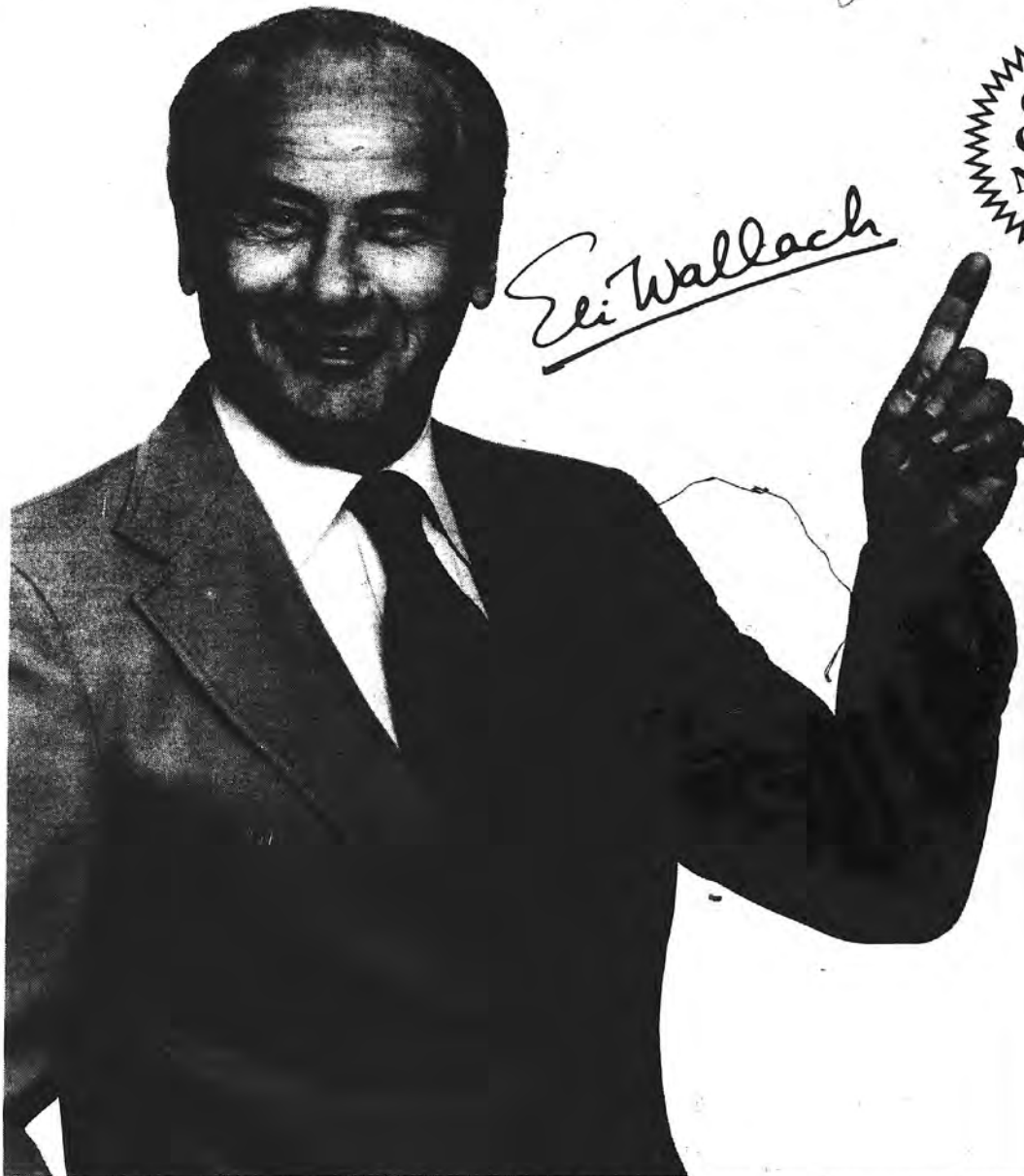

## SCHOOL BD. MEETING

The buildings and grounds employees and the school district have reached "tentative agreement". Their contract expired this past June 30.

The secretaries and clerical employees union gave the mediator another recommendation during impasse; however, the Board refused it, according to Delores Harth, union president. The next step in collective bargaining is factfinding.

Information on grade distribution and class sizes, requested by Mr. Syres at the last Board meeting, will be received by the Board "this week," according to Dr. Hawkins.

The Iowa Test print recently received by parents, can be misunderstood, according to Mrs. Germer and Mr. Ayres. For example, a student with a ranking of 97% nationally in

math and a ranking of 86% in language arts would be considered by the computer as having a strength in math, but a weakness in language arts. A 50 percentile is considered average. Assistant Superintendent for Elementary, Dr. Catherine Fenton, explained that the computer is giving a comparative weakness-strength reading.

The Substance Abuse Committee chaired by Dr. Salmon, has made recommendations to the Board. The Committee recently met to review the activities already in progress and those forthcoming. The Committee is "on going", with broad community and staff representatives, according to Dr. Salmon.

School Board Officers met with Dr. Hawkins last week to discuss a personnel item Mrs. Germer was concerned other Board members were not notified

of this meeting until the next day. She stated that legally this was not wrong but morally it could be questioned. Vice President Bill Bennet, however, did "not find this objectionable." It is the method used and practiced in prior years, restated. Mr. Ayres shared Mrs. Germer's concern, stating that the entire Board had met on the topic several times previously.

In other action the Board approved tuition rates for out-of-district students attending Hicksville Public Schools for this year in accordance with Board Policy. It also set the health service rate for the school year at \$112 per pupil. It approved budgetary transfers and budget operational reports. Transfers totaled \$68,164.66. And it awarded bids to various companies for industrial arts - electrical supplies totaling \$7,170.43.

It acted on various personnel matters including accepting the retirement of Helen Roberts, a teacher at the High School who has been teaching in the district for twenty-five years.
