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Board Tables Youth Program Participation

The Hicksville Board of Education tabled action on approving an expenditure of \$7,500 to participate in a matching fund program with the Town of Oyster Bay which would provide recreational activities to Hicksville youth.

The motion to table came after an executive session, called by Trustee Virginia Germer to seek legal advice concerning the expenditure since funds have not been allocated in this year's budget for the recreation program. More information to the Board will be forthcoming from school board attorney Joseph Campanella and from the Town of Oyster Bay.

The proposed program includes winter and summer recreational and cultural arts activities. The winter program would be at the junior and senior high schools for those students, from January 15 to May 15, Monday to Friday, 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Activities include among others, basketball, volleyball, table games, disco roller skating, modern dance, yoga and ballet.

The summer program would be open to all age groups in the community and would be held at the senior high school. Both indoor and outdoor activities would be offered.

The proposed cost of the program is \$14,974, with the cost shared equally if the Town approves the district's application.

In other action, the Board withdrew an item on the agenda concerning administrative salary increases. Mrs. Germer stated that "the item should not be on the agenda" because new back-up material concerning the agenda item had not been received. Trustees Charlene Anci and Dan Arena stated that they also had not received the back-up material on the item.

President Tom Nagle suggested the Board do one of three things: remove the item from the agenda; go

into an executive session to discuss the matter; or set a date to meet to discuss the item.

The Board agreed to meet tentatively on December 3 to discuss the administrative salary increases.

These salary increases were brought up during the public speaking session by Mrs. Arlene Rudin. The "rumor of the week," according to Mrs. Rudin, "is that the Board is offering increases in salary of 9% to the secretaries, 7% to the custodians and 10% to the administration." She also asked if the Board was considering a position paper on the matter which "might put these rumors to rest."

Mr. Nagle replied that the Board had a tentative agreement with the custodians and the secretaries "demanded factfinding but did not request it in writing. We see no action on their part."

Trustee John Ayres distributed a report he received from Assistant Superintendent Dr. Dan Salmon concerning questions he had posed at previous Board meetings on the master schedule and grade distribution. Mr. Ayres was still concerned with several inconsistencies between master schedule numbers and numbers in the report. For example, the master schedule does not show a repeater class for 9th grade English although the report stated there are 31 repeaters.

Junior High School principal Gerald Klein stated that these students were "dispersed" in 9th grade English classes. The same situation occurs in social studies, science, math.

Also questioned were the health classes where 106 students failed. Dr. Salmon stated that state regulations required students to only take health, not to pass health. Also, passing health is not necessary to be graduated or promoted.

"Is this a defensible position?" posed Mr. Ayres.

Dr. Salmon stated the Board could adopt a local requirement but it could be challenged by the individuals in the local community to the Commission of Education as it has by other communities in New York state. In those instances, local school boards lost in their efforts to require students to pass health.

Mr. Ayres concluded his inquiries on the subject by stating Dr. Salmon's letter accompanying the report "had a tone of pain-in-the-neck" concerning the task of gathering the information. The task involved 9 staff members spending approximately 18 hours.

Mr. Bennett, on the other hand, thanked Dr. Salmon for the "most" clearest, professionally prepared master schedule I've examined in four years."

Mr. Ayres added that he was not criticizing the format. "In my opinion, after the report is done, no one analyzes the data to see what it means."

Mrs. Anci reported on the two-day gifted and talented workshop with Dr. Robert Taylor, who impressed her with his "realistic positive approach to gifted and talented." She thanked Assistant Superintendent Dr. Catherine Fenton for bringing him to the district; the teachers who attended; and the Hicksville Council of PTAs for their efforts in parent awareness concerning gifted and talented education.

During the public speaking session resident Pamela Kemmlein, a parent at the workshop, questioned the cost factor concerning the substitutes for those teachers attending the workshop and also the selection process for those teachers attending.

Dr. Fenton stated that invitations were sent to the following: those teachers and administrators who had attended a gifted and talented in-service course in

1979 and also attended other gifted and talented conferences on their own; names of people who were interested received from administrators and board members, such as parents; the teachers and administrators who attended the three-day workshop with Dr. Taylor in the spring "to build on what they learned;" and finally invitations were sent to those on a waiting list when initial responses to the others were negative. There were 65 people in attendance. No cost figures were available at this time.

The Board acted on numerous personnel matters including the following, among others:

-- Created the full-time position of physical education teacher/er consultant for special physical education and adaptive physical education classes. Trustee Neil McCormack voted no, stating regular physical education teachers should have the necessary training in special education. "If colleges are not doing the training, put them on notice." The service provided by this position complies with state mandates, which requires that all students receive some form of physical education.

-- Approved the appointment of Mr. Maynard Munch as Director of Student Activities in the senior high school;

-- Accepted the resignation for the purpose of retirement of Dr. Jerome Solovay, school psychologist, who has been in the district for 23 years.

-- Accepted the resignation for the purposes of retirement of Florence Maler a typist clerk in the senior high school who has been with the district 21 years.

The next meeting of the Board is December 17 8:15 p.m. in the conference room of the administration building.

Town Moves Hicksville Parking Plans

The Oyster Bay Town Board has approved the purchase of another parcel of downtown Hicksville land for future development of commuter parking.

After negotiating with the Pabst Brewing Company, the Town Attorney's staff reached a sale price of agreement of \$275,000 for 44,368 square feet of property between

Barclay Street and the north side of the Long Island Railroad at Wyckoff Street.

This is another of six parcels in the area the Town seeks to acquire for commuter parking. Purchase of three other of the parcels was approved on Oct. 21 by the Board. The 2.3 acres in that purchase were priced at \$460,000.

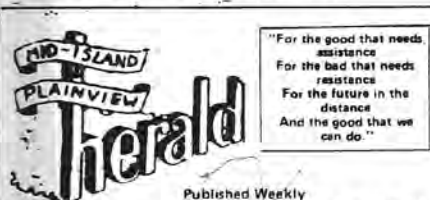

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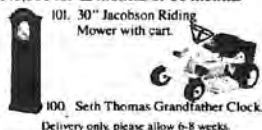

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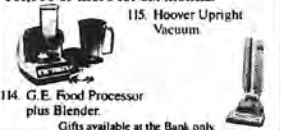
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Families For Life Club News

Mrs. Margaret McGeary, President of Families for Life of Nassau, has announced that plans are under way for the group's Birthright Benefit Boutique, to be held on Saturday, November 29th.

Coordinators, Mrs. Kay Malone, Mrs. Jean Ryan and Mrs. Dorothy Blair have indicated that a wide variety of unique and interesting gift items, including many hand-crafted articles will be available.

The Boutique will take place from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M.

at Levittown Hall, Beech Lane at Levittown Pkwy., Hicksville. This annual event is the eighth to benefit Long Island Birthright, a non-profit organization which offers positive alternatives to abortion.

At last Wednesday's Families for Life meeting the physician head of a pro-life medical group warned women against the indiscriminate use of amniocentesis (amnio). This is a procedure in which fluid is drawn from the amniotic sac for testing purposes. Dr. Ada

Ryan, President of Doctors and Nurses Against Abortion said that the only time its use is legitimate is when it can help the baby, such as when it is 3 to 5 weeks overdue. The test can determine if the fetal cells are mature enough for delivery. If the procedure were not used in that case, the child might die in utero. At other times, according to Dr. Ryan, the procedure amounts to little more than a search and destroy mission.

The nominal justification for amnio is to determine whether the baby has one of the 115 genetic defects that can be detected before birth. However, in almost all cases

nothing can be done to help the baby until after he is born. On the other hand, according to Dr. Ryan, there is a 2.6% to 4% chance that the baby will die as a result of the test, and there is a risk of major damage to vital organs. Moreover, a decision to abort could be based on a false positive report. The mother, herself, faces possible hemorrhage, infection, puncture of the bladder and spontaneous abortion. The earliest the procedure can be used is 14-16 weeks gestation. Then there is the psychological stress of waiting 4 to 6 weeks for test results. At that point the baby is a minimum of 18

to 20 weeks old, which is an especially dangerous time for an abortion.

Dr. Ryan says that many doctors do not fully disclose these risks to their patients, and imply that the procedure is standard practice. And many doctors will not perform the test unless the patient agrees beforehand to abort if a defect is found. There is great pressure on women to submit, according to Dr. Ryan, especially those over 35 years of age. First, the doctors pressure their patients because malpractice suits have been decided against physicians when a defective baby was born and the doctor did not advise the mother of the availability of amnio. Secondly, it is a source of additional income for the hospital \$75 for a sonogram to determine where the

needle should be inserted. And it has been noted that Medicaid patients receive much more medical services than those who have to pay their own medical bills.

Dr. Ryan's suggestions to counter the trend include informing all patients of the dangers, and the discontinuation of government funding. She suggests that every pregnant woman be told clearly that amnio is an option, that it is not required, and that a fact sheet be given to each expectant mother spelling out the dangers to herself and to her baby. She supplied copies of such a fact sheet at the meeting. These will be duplicated by Families for Life and made available free of charge to the public upon request.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$530,000 SERIAL BONDS OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF AN INCREASE AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE FACILITIES OF THE PLAINVIEW WATER DISTRICT OF SAID TOWN.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, by proceedings heretofore duly had and taken pursuant to Section 202-b of the Town Law, has approved an increase and improvement of the facilities of the Plainview Water District of said Town, as hereinafter described; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to provide for the financing thereof; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is an increase and improvement of the facilities of the Plainview Water District of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, consisting of the reconstruction of Wells Nos. 1-2, 3-1, 3-2, 4-2, 2-1 and 5-3, including appurtenant facilities and incidental improvements, all as more fully shown and described in a certain engineering report dated July, 1980, prepared by Holzmacher, McLendon and Murrell, P.C./H2M Corp., Consulting Engineers.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$530,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the

issuance of \$530,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is forty years, pursuant to subdivision 1 of paragraph 4 of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. There shall be annually apportioned and assessed upon the several lots and parcels of land within said Plainview Water District, in the manner provided by law, an amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as the same become due, but if not paid from such source, all the taxable real property within said Town shall be subject to the levy of ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money; or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in full in Plainview Herald and Mid Island Times, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

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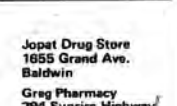

two-thirds of the parents objected to all three parts of Strand 111 - Human Sexuality, Personality Development and Family Life - for the Mental Health Part has once again been added, only this time under the name of Core V, rather than Strand 111.

Included in Core V are the following topics: Coping With Stress, Personality Development, Human Relations and Family Life Education. Sound familiar?

These are the same Sensitivity Training subjects which we objected to last year, which prominent psychologists pointed out could have harmful psychological effects on our children, as well as being an invasion of family privacy, and intruding on the rights of parents to teach them in the home, as they see fit. They also take valuable class time away from the basics of reading, writing and math, which we send our children to school

for in the first place. In addition they've added Death and Dying! It doesn't take a psychologist to point out the potentially dangerous repercussions this can have on young children, when taught without religious values, possibly by a teacher whose religious and moral values may be quite different from your own.

The head of this Curriculum Revision, Dr. Roy Illowit, who ironically enough is a Human Sexuality teacher at C.W. Post, claims to have little knowledge of the past Strand 111 controversy and claims to be unaware of the fact that two thirds of the parents were opposed to the Mental Health parts of Strand 111. It seems strange that this Administration would hire a consultant and then fail to fill him in on all the facts. Are they trying to pull the wool over his eyes or ours?

We have been told that the input from parents will have a large part in determining what material this health curriculum will include.

Thus we urge you to make a real effort to once again come out and voice your concern about this potentially harmful program.
