

Fire District Election

The Hicksville Fire District will hold election for Fire Commissioner on Tuesday, Dec. 9, from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. at Fire Headquarters, Gebhardt Plaza (opposite the Hicksville Theatre), Hicksville.

John McMahon, Mario Misturini and Carolyn Nacewicz are the candidates for the position of Fire Commissioner, a five year term.

The following is an alphabetically-arranged outline of the qualifications of each of the candidates:

JOHN McMAHON

John McMahon has been a resident of Hicksville for 32 years. He has been an active member of the Hicksville Fire Dept. for over 28 years, serving as Ex-Captain of Vol. Hose Co. # 4, from 1968 to 1969 and was Past Captain of the Racing Team from 1965-1966-1967. He is presently Recording Secretary of the Hicksville Fire Dept. (1978-1979-1980) and member of the Budget Committee (1978-1979-1980).

He has served on numerous Labor Day Committees and other Department functions.

He is a member of the Exempt Benevolent Association and a member of the Hicksville Elks Lodge # 1931.

MARIO MISTURINI

Born in Astoria, Mario Misturini has been a resident of Hicksville since 1946. He is employed by the New York Daily News since 1945 and holds the position of supervisor, for 22 years. He is the inventor of the Fran Dee Color Process which is a color-separating method still used for printing purposes by the N.Y. Daily News.

During World War II, he enlisted in the Navy, and is one of the survivors who served on the destroyer U.S. Strong, a fighting ship that was torpedoed and sunk in the Pacific Battle of Kula Gulf.

He joined the Hicksville Fire Dept. in 1955 as a member of Chemical Co. # 3. He served as Captain of Co. # 3

for three years and was a member of the Rescue Squad (now called Paramedics).

He also served as Secretary/Treasurer of the Rescue Squad; Assistant Fire Inspector for 7 years; Chief Fire Inspector for 8 years; and was elected by his fellow-fighters and continued on as Third Assistant Chief, Second Assistant Chief, First Assistant Chief, and finally served as Chief of the Hicksville Volunteer Fire Dept.

Mario and his wife, Lillian, who is the 1980 President of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Hicksville Fire Dept., have six children, Anne, William, Nelson, Susan, Sal and Pat.

CAROLYN NACEWICZ

Carolyn Nacewicz, a candidate for Fire Commissioner has been a Hicksville resident for 30 years. She is a graduate of Hicksville High School, Class of 1960.

Carolyn and her husband, Bill, a Hicksville Fireman,

have been married 10 years and have two daughters, Dana and Tracie.

Prior to resigning due to pregnancy, she was employed by Aetna Life & Casualty Co. for 14 years. As a Claim Representative she dealt with the technical aspects of many types of insurance. Carolyn is presently employed part time by Sears.

Her original involvement with the Hicksville Fire Dept. was on a community relations basis representing St. Stephens Lutheran Church for NFD Company 1's 100th Anniversary Celebration.

Carolyn has been active at St. Stephens for over 20 years. She was a Luther League advisor for 11 years, Sunday Church School teacher, Department Superintendent and Secretary. She has also been a choir member for 15 years and a member of the Lutheran Church Women.

New "Park and Ride"

Nassau County Executive Francis T. Purcell today announced the opening of a new, 250-car "Park and Ride" site located adjacent to Hempstead Lake State Park on Peninsula Boulevard in Rockville Centre, one-quarter of a mile south of Southern State Parkway.

Construction has been completed of a left-turn lane for vehicles traveling in a northerly direction on Peninsula Blvd. This site was opened specifically for traffic moving east and west on Southern State Parkway for trips into the five

boroughs. Signs denoting the location of this new "Park and Ride" site have been installed on the Southern State Parkway in both directions and also on Peninsula Blvd. The site is equipped with lighting.

The Rockville Centre location brings the county's "Park and Ride" sites to five. The others are: Eisenhower Park in East Meadow; Morley Park in Roslyn; Cantiague Park in Hicksville; and asite on Wantagh Ave., Wantagh, one-half mile south of Southern State Parkway.

Wylder To Serve As Senior Advisor

U.S. Rep. John W. Wylder (R-N.Y.) has accepted President-elect Ronald Reagan's request to participate as a senior advisor on Reagan's National Aeronautics and Space Administration transition team.

The NASA team is one of many being set up by the President-elect to inventory and assess existing policies, programs, personnel and budgets of the various agencies, commissions and corporations within the federal government.

Wylder, who is retiring at the close of this term after serving 18 years in Congress, said he is "delighted to assist Reagan in the transition."

"I'm very anxious to do

whatever I can to make the transition a smooth one for Mr. Reagan," said Wylder.

"And I'm glad that my background with the Science and Technology Committee will be helpful to the team evaluating NASA."

Wylder is Ranking Minority Member on the Science and Technology Committee, formerly the Space and Astronautics Committee, which has jurisdiction over NASA authorization and oversight.

Transition officials said Wylder's "experience and unique insights" will be "invaluable in providing a smooth passage of authority to the new Reagan Administration."

Caution On Home Fire Safety

The Nassau Village Officials Association is cautioning all residents to check their local village or town building departments before installing wood or coal burning stoves.

"It is not a question of subjecting any homeowner to undue government interference, but one of protecting the lives of their families and loved ones," stated

Sheldon Shane, mayor of Hewlett Neck and president of the 64-village association.

"Our greatest concern is that homeowners seeking less expensive sources of heat for their homes will rush into a potentially dangerous installation. The villages and towns have fire safety and permit requirements designed to prevent unnecessary loss of life and property damage."

Shane also cautioned on the purchase and use of Kerosene heaters.

"Village mayors, trustees and clerks met with Chief Andrew Steinmuller of the Nassau Fire Marshal's Office at their November monthly meeting to discuss the safe use of Kerosene heaters," Shane said. "If the kerosene heater does not bear an Underwriters Laboratory or other nation-

ally recognized testing organization label, the seller or user are liable to a fine, in addition, the use of an untested appliance could raise fire insurance premiums."

Shane said there also are regulations involving the storage and use of kerosene. He advised residents with any questions about kerosene heaters to call the Fire Marshal's Office at 292-4820.

wastes, keeps the bill alive.

As a strong supporter of this legislation—who helped put together a bipartisan bill in the House of Representatives—I am very gratified to see common sense prevail in the Senate. We almost lost this new program in the House last summer, when well meaning, but overly-enthusiastic supporters launched a similar effort to "kill the bill with kindness" by loading the bill with provisions the House would not accept. But we finally got through the House a superfund bill that establishes a first step in this new area of environmental protection, an area of major importance to Long Island where contamination of ground water supplies by toxic wastes could threaten our drinking water.

After our success in the House, the attempt to kill the superfund bill with kindness

began all over again in the Senate as super-enthusiastic Senators loaded the bill with provisions unacceptable to the Senate majority. Then, just as the bill seemed doomed, the super-enthusiasts backed off and the Senate approved a version very close to the House bill. As a result the Congress could send a final version to the White House this week.

A strong environmentalist who supported the revised Senate bill, Blake Early of the Sierra Club said: "This is a good first step."

Exactly. And that was our argument when the bill was being put together in the House. It is far better to take this first step into a new area of environmental protection, than to drift along with no program at all.

I hope the House and Senate waste no time in working out a compromise.

We greet all our friends of the Jewish Faith at this Hanukkah season... a time of rejoicing, a time of sharing...

And it is in this spirit that we share with you excerpts from the Acceptance Remarks of our friend, Siegmund Spiegel of East Meadow, who was honored as "Man of the Year" by the ADL last month:

"I accept this award with immense pride, this pride is not only based on my being the recipient of this cherished honor, but that it is bestowed upon me by my peers, my co-workers for Jewish survival. It seems things do not change: the current bombing of a synagogue in Paris, Graffiti in Argentina screaming out "Jews To The Ovens"... the U.N. with its seemingly main occupation, the condemnation of Israel and its obscene resolutions to equate Zionism with racism. Has given carte blanche to anti-semites the world over to pursue their dastardly avocation of hate, vilification, destruction and murder."

"It reminds me of the 30's in Germany. I was there! Yet, they are only too reminiscent of similar events taking place from generation to generation of Jewish history. Oil, in the hands of people wishing us ill, is charming even heretofore friendly peoples away from humanitarian precepts... and twisting them into tools of destruction. The list of places where Jews were wantonly killed fills volumes. As a boy in Germany I heard of the pogrom in Kishinev. Now history indelibly wrote into all our minds names like Auschwitz, Treblinka, Buckenwald, Theresienstadt, Munich, Kiriati, Schmona, Maalot and now... Paris. Will there ever be an end?"

"I was shocked, recently, to hear a young Jewish man, active in Jewish charitable affairs exclaim that the holocaust is a thing of the past, it is not their bag, the now Jewish youth feels no relation to it. Is this what we have taught our future generations? ... Just as the Haggada we read on Passover commands us to tell our children of our deliverance from Egypt's slavery, and tells us of the joys and pride of freedom, we will fail our obligation as parents and teachers, if we neglect to teach also this black period of our history. For in the words of Santayana... "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it!"

"I am proud that this burden has been so beautifully shouldered by the generous contributions of all of us here, Jew and Gentile alike... true friends all!"

Let us remember all the good with joy, and the bad, so that it need never be repeated. Then, let us all go forward together, to help build a better world

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Doris A. Martens To Be Honored

During the week of December 8th, the office of Seaman & Eisemann, Inc. plans tribute to its President, Mrs. Doris A. Martens, (nee Healy) in recognition of her fifty years of faithful service to the firm. Festivities will commence on Monday evening with a dinner party for the firm's entire staff, and their spouses. Doris, born in Hicksville, is the eldest living daughter of the late Louise and Joseph Healy. As one of eleven children, three of whom died in childhood, she has always been a source of inspiration to her brothers and sisters. In the words of one sister, Augusta, also affiliated with Seaman & Eisemann as Assistant Vice President, "Doris has been the instrument of each of our successes. In her own way, she has guided, assisted and encouraged all, while giving of herself in the humane fashion."

Educated in the local school system, illness forced her to leave Hicksville High School during the Freshman year. Upon regaining her health, Doris attended Drake's Secretarial School in Jamaica. With the completion of this one year course, it was time to tackle the business world, which she did with great determination to be successful.

Her first position was with Karlson & Reed Construction Co., Inc. on West Barclay Street but a casualty of the Great Depression, her job lasted only a little more than a year. As the contracting

business like so many others felt the severe reduction in operations, it was necessary to tighten the belt and reduce staff. Doris, being the most recent person hired with the first to join the unemployed. Fortunately, her boss at the time, Mr. Charles Reed, was also one of those special human beings who felt compassion and he tried to find other employment for her. He called his friend, the late Henry G. Eisemann, who in spite of the lean days, upon learning of the capabilities and sincerity of Doris Healy said "send her over!"

"Over" was both "over and up" for she had to walk up to the second floor of the office of Seaman & Eisemann, Inc., then located at 90 Broadway. Each step was difficult for Doris as she headed up to the insurance office - a business totally unfamiliar to her. She was apprehensive, scared and yes, reluctant but she needed that job! As she waited on the bench for the interview with Mr. Eisemann, she was asked by one of the members of the staff, "What are you doing here? We hardly have enough work for the ones already here." However, fate destined in her favor and following her interview, Henry Eisemann hired Doris A. Healy on December 8th, 1930, as an employee of Seaman & Eisemann, Inc. Thus began an outstanding career in the Insurance Agency profession. This new job was a real challenge to her and Doris faced it with determination to learn the business to its smallest detail and to do her job whatever it might be, to the very best of her ability.

While thus happily employed, Doris Healy on February 26th, 1938 married Charles A. Martens, the son

of Mary and Herman Martens, also a Hicksville family. Doris and Charlie were blessed with two children, Gary and Janet, now Mrs. Michael Lambert. In turn, these children have further blessed them with ten grandchildren. After the birth of each, Gary and Janet, Doris returned to the position in the business world she loved so much as a valued employee of Seaman & Eisemann, Inc.

With each passing year Doris proved her knowledge and quality underwriting of insurance to even the most experienced and respected experts in the field. She knew what she was doing and the reasons behind it and thus gained the respect of her peers. It was this understanding and her determination to do a good job that led to ever increasing responsibility within the firm. Thus she was fully prepared for the great responsibility that came with the sudden death

Peggy McGeary, President of Families for Life reports that the Holiday Eoutique was a smashing success with over \$1,500 earned for Birthright. This was substantially better than last year. Heavy buying was paced by a number of patrons who were reported to have spent anywhere from \$50 to \$100 each. Obviously the bargains were there, with top notch quality matched by extremely attractive prices.

So many people participated in organizing the work, doing the publicity, donating gifts, pricing them, and by assisting at the Eoutique itself that it would be futile to try to list them all. There is evidently an enormous reservoir of good will in the community, and Peggy McGeary would like to thank everyone who worked so hard to make it the success that it was.

The official results of the recent elections were to be available sometime this week. Pending review and analysis, enough information is available to be able to comment on Joe Margiotta's recent remark that Right to Life Party endorsement hurt Republican candidates. The three candidates he named who lost were all running for office for the first time, and had a considerable

recognition problem against entrenched opponents. Virtually everywhere else Republican candidates on the RTLP line won by greater margins than two years ago. Al D'Amato won the U.S. Senate seat by 90,000 votes, with the RTLP line having contributed 150,000. Also two new congressmen - McGrath and LeBouillier won, as did incumbent Norman Lent. In the state Senate Caemmerer won, and in the Assembly Healy, Parola, Gulotta, Reilly, Hannon, Armand D'Amato, Skelos and Madison won. The RTLP line was not the margin of victory in all cases, but there was no evidence that the endorsement was counterproductive.

In the 10th A.D. race, newcomer Doug Hynes the Republican, Conservative and RTLP candidate lost to incumbent Democrat Louis Yevoli, but the latter's plurality was reduced by about 900 votes from two years before when Sal Mosca ran. From that it would seem that Hynes should be considered a leading candidate to replace Gregory Carman as Oyster Bay Town Councilman when Carman reports for duty as U.S. Representative for the third C.D. on January first.

Calls For Progressive Revenue Source For State Method of Financing Education

In testimony prepared for a public hearing (Dec. 3 at the Division Avenue High School, Levittown) by a commission examining the current system of State financing of Education, Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby urged more effort be made to develop a formula that eliminates heavy dependence on the property tax.

"Property taxation is, fundamentally, regressive," Colby told the Rubin Commission (the Special Task Force on Equity and Excellence in Education). "It need not and often does not bear any direct relationship to one's ability to pay."

In strongly urging the committee to examine state-wide revenue sources other than the property tax in order to pay for elementary and secondary education, Colby pointed to the senior citizens as a clear example of a large segment of the population who are, and will

be, significantly disadvantaged by continued reliance on the property tax.

Colby pointed out that under the current system, which has been declared unconstitutional, the average homeowner on Long Island is paying a property tax bill that is funding too many needed, expensive services. "The taxes homeowners pay for public education amount to somewhere between 50 and 62 per cent of their cumulative property tax liability," Colby noted.

Basing his testimony on the second interim report of the Rubin Commission, Colby noted that the commission seems to be heading toward an educational financing scheme that continues to rely heavily on the property tax and utilizes a "robin hood" approach to overcome the court objection to the inequity of the current local property tax system. Such

an approach would take funds from "property rich" school districts and give them to "property poor" districts.

In presenting an argument against such a scheme, Colby said: "While the Task Force stresses that it is seeking a finance plan that is constitutionally and financially acceptable, it must also look for solutions that are politically acceptable. I don't think that property tax-based proposals that would take aid from at least 125 of New York's 726 school districts - the minimum number of districts that would lose under the preliminary simulations developed (by the Commission) to date - will be greeted with wild applause in the Assembly and Senate."

Colby also noted that continued reliance on property taxes, which are related to "property wealth" of a district, can lead to

future confusion on an annual basis. He pointed out that under recent court orders much of the commercial property on Long Island - property that initially led to a district being labeled a "property rich" district - is having its assessment lowered. "In one school district, Bethpage, a loss of commercial assessment, of about \$4.4 million resulted in a forced school tax increase of about \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation earlier this year."

Colby concluded his remarks by again urging the commission to give more attention to developing a system that utilizes another, broader revenue source as the foundation for financing education in this State. He noted that the commission should keep in mind the need to retain and preserve the

Saladino Named To District Court A Month Earlier

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Joseph J. The appointment, effective Dec. 8, is scheduled to be confirmed by the Board of Supervisors on that day.

Purcell made the appointment to fill a vacancy created by the death last April of District Court Judge Julius Schwartz. The early appointment was made at the request of Nassau County Administrative Judge Paul J. Widlitz.

Saladino, 54, was appointed to the town board in January, 1971. He was elected to a full term the following November and won

re-election to four-year terms in 1973 and 1977. His current term would have expired in December 1981.

A graduate of Brooklyn College, with a law degree from St. John's University, Saladino served in the U.S. Army during World War II and in the Marine Corps during the Korean conflict.

Twice honored as "Man of the Year" - in 1973 by the Galileo Galilei Lodge of the Sons of Italy in Hicksville, and in 1977 by Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7763 in Massapequa Park - Saladino is a member of the Massapequa Post of the American Legion, the Massapequa Amvets Post 88, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Kiwanis, the Elks, the Southeast Nassau Exchange Club and the Knights of Columbus.

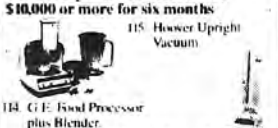

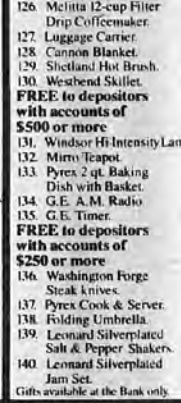

"Indictment Is A Political Witch Hunt" Margiotta

Nassau GOP Chairman Joseph M. Margiotta has labeled an indictment against him as a continuation of a "political witch hunt" that the U.S. Attorney's office has been conducting against Republican leaders in Nassau for the past eight years.

In a detailed 11 page statement that specifically responded to the charges,

Margiotta said that the charges about the insurance commission-sharing system are "merely an indictment of a longtime and widespread patronage system, which I never originated but which I inherited when I became Nassau County Republican leader" of Hempstead Town and Nassau.

He added that the patronage practice "has

never before been considered criminal or illegal in any manner."

"It is astonishing to me," he continued, "that a Federal prosecutor could now consider these longstanding patronage practices as alleged criminal schemes by seeking and procuring such a baseless indictment."

Margiotta noted that long before the U.S. Attorney

ever began his investigation, "I had already terminated the insurance patronage program which is the subject of the indictment."

The County GOP Chairman emphasized that following a State Investigation Commission report, Nassau District Attorney Denis Dillon, a Democrat and a former Federal prosecutor, reviewed the commission's

report and found that neither a further criminal investigation nor criminal charges were warranted in Nassau.

"...I have been subjected to an intensive investigation by the IRS investigators," Margiotta said, "to the point where my close personal friends, neighbors and even local merchants with whom I have dealt have been questioned to ascertain

whether I have committed any crimes..."

"The net result of the United States Attorney's extensive eight years of investigation, his expenditure of untold sums of taxpayers money and the wasting of thousands of hours of manpower time, is the yielding of this preposterous indictment. I look forward to the opportunity to clear my name - once and for all."

- Test battery, check battery cables for cracks and corrosion. Clean battery posts and cable terminals and make sure all connections are tightened. Apply

- waterproofing solution to all exposed ignition wires.
- Check alternator belt for proper tension.
- Drain and flush radiator and refill with anti-freeze unless an all-year coolant is used. If all-year coolant is used, be sure to have its potency tested. Check the hoses, connections and fan belt.
- Examine the exhaust system and muffler for possible carbon monoxide leaks.
- Tune engine. Check the spark plugs, ignition timing, distributor points, carburetor and air filter.
- Check automatic choke, a frequent cause of "can't start."
- Test and adjust brakes, including the emergency. Check brake fluid level.
- Get snow tires on before likelihood of first snow. Have them examined for cuts and breaks.
- Check heater, defroster, windshield wipers and lights, including tail and brake lights.
