## **Caution On Home Fire Safety**

The Nassau Village Officials Association is cautioning all residents to check their local village or town building departments before install-ing wood or coal burning stoves

"It is not a question of subjecting any homeowner to undue government inter-ference, but one of protect-ing the lives of their families and loved ones," stated

Sheldon Shane, mayor of Hewlett Neck and president of the 64-village association "Our greatest concern is that homeowners seeking less expensive sources of heat for their homes will rush into a potentially dangerous installation. The villages and towns have fire safety and permit require-ments designed to prevent unnecessary loss of life and property damage.

Shane also cautioned on the purchase and use of Kerosene heaters. Village mayors, trustees

vising mayors, trustees and clerks met with Chief Andrew Steinmuller of the Nassau Fire Marshal's Office at their November monthly meeting to discuss the safe use of Kerosene heaters," Shane said. "If the hearersne beater, does, and kerosene heater does not bear an Underwriters Laboratory or other nation-

Then, just as the bill seemed doomed, the super-enthusiasts backed off and the Senate anonymed a the Senate approved a version very close to the House bill. As a result the Congress could send a final version to the White House this week.

A strong environmentalist who supported the revised Senate bill, Blake Early of the Sierra Club said: "This is

a good first step." Exactly, and that was our argument when the bill was being put together in the House. It is far better to take this first step into a new area of environmental protection, than to drift along with no

program at all. I hope the House and Senate waste no time in working out a compromise.

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### **Calls For Progressive Revenue Source** For State Method of Financing Education

In testimony prepared for a public hearing (Dec. 3 at the Division Avenue High School, Levittown) by a commission examining the current system of State (inancing of Education, Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby urged more effort be made to develop a formula that eliminates heavy denendence on the

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formula that eliminates heavy dependence on the property tax. "Property taxation is, undamentally, regressive." Colby told the Rubin Com-mission (the Special Task Force on Equity and Excel-lence in Education). "It need not and often does not bear any direct relationship to one's ability to pay." In strongly urging the committee to examine state-wide revenue sources other

committee to examine state-wide revenue sources other than the property lax in order to pay for elementary and secondary education, Colby pointed to the senior citizens as a clear example of a large segment of the population who are, and will

be, significantly disad-vantaged by continued reliance on the property tax. Colby pointed out that under the current system, which has been declared unconstitutional, the average homeowner on Long Island is paying a property tax bill that is funding too many needed, expensive services. "The taxes homeowners pay for public homeowners pay for public

borneowners pay for public education amount to somewhere between 50 and 52 per cent of their cumulative property tax liability," Colby noted. Basing his testimony on the second interim report of the Rubin Commission, Colby noted that the commission seems to be heading toward an educational financing scheme that continues to rely heavily on the property tax and utilizes a "robin hood" approach to overcome the court objection to the inequity of the current local property tax system. In presenting an argument against such a scheme, Colby said: "While the Task Force stresses that it is seeking a finance plan that is constitutionally and financially acceptable, it must also look for solutions that are politically accep-table. I don't think that proposals that would take aid from at least 125 of New York's 726 school districts – the minimum number of York's 728 school districts --the minimum number of districts that would lose under the preliminary simulations developed (by the Commission) to date --will be greeted with wild applause in the Assembly and Senate."



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
