## To Conduct Fire Flow Tests

The attention of all consumers of the Hicksville Water District is directed to the fact that the Insurance Services of New York will conduct fire flow tests on hydrants within the District for 2 days, beginning March 26.

We wish to advise both residents and commercial users, especially those dependent upon our usual clear water, that this type of extensive flushing may temporarily cause discoloration of water, due to dislodged iron in the mains.

This is not an indication of a deterioration in quality, the condition will clear up in short order when the flushing is completed. However, our consumers are urged to take caution in matters such as washing clothes.

The purpose of such flow tests is to determine the fire insurance rates to be charged in our area.

## IRS Ruling 80-55 Will Increase Property Taxes

A new Internal Revenue Service (IRS) ruling, scheduled to go into effect on June 1, could cost Hicksville taxpayers \$500,000 in school district revenues. The ruling, IRS 80-55, is being protested by school districts and municipalities for the effect it will have on generating investment revenues.

The controversial ruling eliminates the tax deduction that banks currently receive for the interest they pay on municipal and school district deposits. The impact of this ruling was explained by Hicksville School District Business Manager Richard Weigang.

The district yearly offers Tax Anticipation Notes

(TAN) to assist the district in routine cash flow problems. For example, while the district's fiscal year begins in July, most tax revenue does not start to come into the district until September or October. To assist with the normal operation of the district, short term borrowing becomes routine necessary. These are the TANs.

Usually, the school district is able to sell these bonds at a low interest rate. This is the result of federal tax credits banks receive for buying municipal bonds, i.e., they pass their savings onto municipalities in the form of the interest they charge for the use of the money.

Under IRS 80-55, those tax credits would no longer be available to financial institutions. Therefore, the TANs would no longer be as attractive to banks as they once were. The interest that is charged to the school district on short-term borrowing will increase to cover the banks' loss of a tax deduction. Therefore, the difference between the rate of interest the district is charged to borrow funds, and the rate of interest it

that money will divide. Instead of a healthy return on the money it borrows, it will most likely break about even in the whole process.

Mr. Weigang anticipates a \$500,000 loss in revenues if

IRS 80-55 is allowed to go into effect. That translates into about 50c on the Hicksville tax rate.

The community is urged to contact its representatives at the federal level to fight this ruling. US Senators Alfonse D'Amato and Daniel Moynihan can be reached at the Senate Office Bldg., Washington, D.C. 20510. US Representatives Gregory Carman and Thomas Downey can be reached at the same address.

The Hicksville Board of Education has asked the support of the Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association in this effort.

## Families For Life Club News

A campaign has begun to encourage pro-life members of the New York Senate not to capitulate to the Assembly when the annual attempt is made to restrict the funding of Medicaid abortions.

In past years, the scenario has been as predictable as a classical Japanese play. First the Senate amends the budget to cut off abortion funding. Then the Assembly passes a budget with abortion funding provided for. After a few days the Senate gives in to the Assembly and votes to approve the budget including the abortion money. To solve this conundrum the Senate then passes a separate bill cutting off abortion funding, but it never passes because the Assembly ignores it, and in any event, the Governor would veto it. In this way the pro-life senators can tell their constituents that they

did their best but that the opposing forces were just too much for them.

This year Patrons for Life, headed by Anne Nolan in Nassau County and Linda Zamparo in Suffolk are trying to establish an on-going program to finance lobbying throughout the state. They are attempting to get thousands of people to become more active in the pro-life effort, and not to be satisfied merely to vote pro-life. They are asking for a \$3 donation from each pro-lifer, and they plan to present each state senator with the names of those who are committed to the project together with red roses, a long time symbol of the pro-life movement.

This year the battle in Albany will be especially important because New York is one of the few states that continues to fund abor-

tions. Most others have cut off funding, and accordingly, women seeking free abortions will gravitate to New York, and New York taxpayers will have the additional expense of paying for abortions for out-of-staters.

According to Anne Nolan, the Senate must be convinced that the annual charade won't work any more, and the way to do it is to lobby intensively and on a continuing basis. This costs time and money, and frequently the people with the time and expertise don't have the money, and vice versa. Also, politicians are not really that impressed with lobbying by people who are not residents of their own districts. This effort is to encourage participation by grass roots people from all over the state to lobby personally, - and if not in

person, to lobby by giving their proxy to those who are willing to do the work. Thus the request not only for the \$3, but also for the use of the pro-lifer's name.

The writer recalls vividly a lobbying trip to Washington D.C. a few years ago when one attempt was made to speak to a U.S. Senator. Before allowing us to speak, he asked if any of us were his constituents. Upon learning that none of us were, he turned on his heel and walked away.

Nevertheless, to better understand the Museum's offer to the School Board and to forestall any misconceptions which may arise, the following information is provided to the public:

1. The Museum contract, or agreement, is for a single year's services, beginning

July 1st, 1981. The School Board in 1982 may renew, modify or dispense with this budget item. However, the museum trustees are confident from our experience of serving, at times, over 70 school districts, these last 17 years, that teachers, students and administrators will be eager to continue the museum's services.

The Board of Education, in accepting this agreement with the Museum, will in no way assume any administrative or fiscal responsibility for the management and support of the museum. The museum is acting, in a real sense, as a vendor of instructional services and materials.

3. The Museum's building, facilities and operations are properly insured.

4. The Museum will continue to make every effort to be strongly self-supportive. Its trustees and volunteers annually have self-generated or raised through governmental grant \$20,000-\$25,000. In this regard, the Museum Director has met this year's application deadline and has filed for grants with the New York State Council on the Arts and with the Institute of Museum Services of the Federal Department of Education.

5. The Museum trustees are in the midst of exploring an idea for guided tour contracts with the many school districts we serve. These contracts range from \$500 to \$1500 each. It is believed that BOCES may be able to administer and fund such tour contracts. Potentially, this support from non-Hicksville school districts can be a source of considerable annual support.

6. If the School Board accepts the Museum service contract for \$30,000 at the additional total tax increase of \$1.80 per average homeowner, other community government units (Library and the Town Board) will be encouraged to contract with the museum for programs or services. The School Board will be helping to "seed" the growth of a variety of museum support areas, a vital need for museum.

7. Among the splendid advantages to Hicksville residents of the museum service contract will be membership in the museum for every resident of Hicksville; free admission, at any time; unlimited, free guided tours for school groups; museum collaboration with the Adult Education Program;

museum programs for students of every ability; loan of museum exhibit materials to schools and much more.

A rejection of the museum's service contract offer by the Board of Education and school administration will result in the cessation of all museum activity. The museum trustees will direct that the guided tours scheduled for many schools this spring be cancelled. The community volunteers will begin the sad task of packing the splendid earth science and natural history collections for shipment to the distant L.I. communities which want them.

Something noble and delightful, uplifting and stimulating — a source of children's wonder and enlightenment, of community pride and honor will die within Hicksville.

We urge all who believe in Hicksville's future and its well-being to sit down today and write the Hicksville Board of Education, at the Administration Building, Division Avenue, urging them to accept the proposal this coming Wednesday evening, March 25.

This letter is written today for two purposes. The first is

Of course, his handicap is visible, but there are so many others who are not — asthma, emphysema, heart condition, etc. I started working on this goal when I first joined the Friends of the Library and continued to pursue while President of this group, working many many hours on book sales, plant sales, etc. When I was elected to the Library Board, it was necessary for me legally to resign my position in the Friends. The Friends joined with the Library Board in supplying funds for the initial blueprints which enabled us to be able to submit our proposals to the Town when Community Development Funds became available. The end result is the fact that we are the first Library in Oyster Bay to complete construction of handicap access.

My role as Trustee, and the many endeavors opened to me, in that role, have enabled me to help the Hicksville community in many areas. I have always taken my job as Trustee seriously, not only inside the Board Room but also by attendance at workshops offered by the Nassau Library System, the State Education Department, etc., that helped me become a more effective Trustee. I feel that my five years experience, plus the education I received on libraries by attending these

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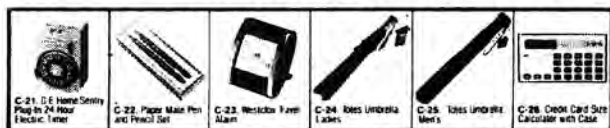

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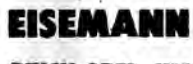
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
