School Hotline

A few months ago, an information hotline was established by the Hicksville School District to help residents find out anything they would like to know about their schools and their district. Many calls have been received on a variety of subjects.

The taped message tells

callers their inquiries will be answered within a few days, either in writing or by phone. The hotline will continue to operate, and residents are encouraged to call at any time with comments or questions.

The number is 733-2104, and may be called 24 hours a day.

The Hicksville Memorial Day Parade and commemorative services will be held on Monday, May 25th, the day schools are officially closed this year. This year's parade and program is being chaired by the AMVETS under the direction of Commander Dan Housin and the Combined Veterans Memorial Day Committee.

Assembly time will be between 8 and 9 A.M., at the Sears parking area off north Broadway. The parade of community organizations, veterans groups and school bands will "kick off" at 9 A.M. and proceed over the route of recent years: south

on Broadway to Old Country Road; west to Newbridge Road, and south to the High School Field.

The parade will feature the Hicksville Fire Dept., veteran organizations, color guards, high school bands, elementary school bands, Comanche Raiders, St. Ignatius Drum and Bugle Corps, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Twirlers, Little League, Soccer and various fraternal organizations, along with Supervisor Colby, Assemblymen Parola and Yevoli, Councilmen, and Congressmen Lent and Carman.

A change in organization of the services will place the

reviewing stand for the parade on the playing field opposite the grandstand. All community groups are urged to seat their marching units after passing in review at the formal Memorial Day services which follow the parade.

Grand Marshal for this year's parade is Fred Turner of the American Legion, a World War I veteran who served with 212 Signal Battalion of the 12th Army Division. The Honary Grand Marshals are Past President Carmela Vitiello of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, William M. Gousse, Post Auxiliary and Past President Joan Rizos of the

Charles Wagner Post Auxiliary, American Legion. Joseph Normandy will be the M.C.

The Principal Address will be delivered by Past Department Commander Arthur Klingel of the AMVETS. The Hicksville High School's Memorial Day student speaker will be Ronald Miller, President of the Student Council. Among the distinguished guests will be the Gold Star Mothers whose number is sadly reduced this year by the recent death of Mrs. J. J. Madden whose son, James gave his life in the Nation's service in World War II.

At The Town Board Meeting

Hearings Set
At their May 5 meeting, our Town Board passed Resolution No. 355 directing

the Town Clerk to advertise Notice of a June 23rd hearing on the petition of Colonial Auto Body, Inc. for special use permit to maintain a public garage and an auto

body and fender works in an Industrial H District on property bounded on the east by Alpha Plaza (a private right-of-way), east of Charlotte Street a/k/a 485 West John St. in Hicksville.

At their May 19 meeting, our Town Board passed Resolution No. 382 directing the Town Clerk to advertise a Notice of a July 28th hearing on the petition of BP Oil, Inc. for a change of zone from Business F to Business G District and for a special use permit to demolish the existing structure and construct, maintain and operate a modernized gasoline filling station with kiosk canopy where no repair work of any kind will be done on the northwest corner of South Oyster Bay Road and Plainview Road in Hicksville.

Others Matters

The Board reserved decision on the petition of General Mills Restaurant Group, Inc. Red Lobster Division for a special use permit to construct, operate and maintain in a Business G District, a restaurant containing 267 seats on the

northwest corner of the intersection of Nevada St. and Bethpage Rd. in Hicksville. No one appeared in opposition to this petition. Mr. Richard Clark, assistant secretary of this petitioning firm said that this firm intends to hire locally, with "in-store" training. In answer to questions from the Board, he explained that the bar involved is only a stand-up type for service, as this is a family type of restaurant.

The Board approved Resolution No. 385 relating to authorizing consultants to proceed with engineering services for interim waste water treatment study at Old Bethpage Incinerator complex.

The Board approved the petition of Boy Scout Troop 683 the use of TOB public parking field H-9 for a car wash on June 6 and 7.

The Board approved the petition of the Charles Wagner American Legion Post for the use of TOB public parking lot H-15 for June 13th for an official Flag Burning Ceremony.

Dear Editor,

I'm writing in reference to Clarks Truck Bypass or the Duffy extension.

I live on Plainview Road and the traffic is more than a residential road should have. A constant stream of cars and heavy trucks which exceed the 30 mile speed limit, especially the 18 and 22 wheel sand trucks and trailer trucks. It's a short cut, without traffic lights, and no one to enforce the speed limit.

There is a school crossing at East Street with a guard on duty, but on non school days the children cross this road to play in the school yard.

The constant traffic day and night is very disturbing to the residents. We have problems getting in and out of our driveways. It is especially annoying in the early morning hours when these trucks return empty, speeding and hitting every bump and pot hole in the road. It's disturbing enough with the noise and traffic, but the exhaust and dirt from the diesel trucks is overpowering. With the proposed Duffy Extension this will increase the traffic, noise and pollution. This is more than the residents, and TAXPAYERS, of a tree lined residential street should have to endure. In time the trees will be cut down and the road widened to accommodate the traffic increase.

A few other problems to consider in the Fire House. Our volunteers are hampered with the existing traffic now, but with the extension they will be completely bogged down. Traffic lights will not help, it's just impossible to get through the maze of traffic. We have a few businesses left in town, but the stores on West Marie Street will be cut off. The west side of Broadway, with many stores, was destroyed years ago in the name of progress. It is now a dumping ground.

How many more small, cut up parcels of nonproducing tax property can we afford in Hicksville? You can always make more parking fields to accommodate non residents at the tax payers expense!

Our taxes are extremely high now and what do we have to show for it? We have very little shopping left on Broadway, but we do have tax-exempt parking fields. We have no food shopping facilities except on the outside corners of town. One definitely needs a car to food shop in Hicksville. There is no concern at all for our Senior Citizens.

We once were a proud and beautiful community a nice place to raise children, a quiet peaceful residential town with adequate shopping on Broadway, but it's all over now. Still another highway is proposed to hinder and further destroy Hicksville.

I think it's time the local residents and taxpayers of Hicksville spoke out. We want our town cleaned up, and Broadway rebuilt with stores, restaurants, markets, bakeries and all that goes with a towns main street. We don't need Duffy extension, or Clarks truck bypass.

As Pastor John W. Krahn mentioned in the May 1, 1981 Herald Elections do come up

in November!

As reported in Mr. Harknett's column of May 8th, the Oyster Bay Town Board was presented with more than 10,000 signatures protesting the existence of an abortion clinic in Hicksville which violates a town ordinance. I am Jay Schwartz, and last week I announced my candidacy for the Hicksville School Board. My decision to run for the school board is due to both personal and public concerns which I would like to share with you.

As parents of two preschoolers my wife Gail and I want for our children a stable educational environment that is ongoing, predictable and of a high quality. I believe that educational programs should not fluctuate with every varying or downturn

in the economy. From my observations of the Hicksville School Board in the last years, the aforementioned philosophy does not seem important to the current Board majority.

Program stability is not the only problem I find with the Hicksville School Board. It is with increasing alarm that I detect from Board actions an increasing lack of concern for the youth of Hicksville.

My experience and education cause me to focus on these concerns. As a tax preparer I am familiar with the heavy burden taxes place on all of us and the need for financial restraint. I believe that an open mind, a willingness to listen and the ability to make carefully-weighted decisions are essential to being a responsible board member. 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STATEMENT

The Hicksville Chamber of Commerce is opposed to the present proposal of extending Duffy Ave. to the intersection of Marie St. and B'way with the probable dead-ending of West Marie St. at B'way.

The Chamber's objection to the Duffy Ave. extension is based on the fact that the proposed extension would merely transfer a potential traffic problem from one intersection, Duffy & Newbridge, to another intersection, Marie St. & B'way, a matter of three blocks away as the streets are laid out at present.

The professional planners (the Planning Advisory Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, with the technical assistance of Raymond, Parish & Pine, Inc., Planning Consultants, made specific recommendations, after meeting with the Hicksville Citizens Advisory Committee, who spent considerable time studying and preparing their recommendations to the Town of Oyster Bay) suggested that both Duffy Ave. and John St. should be extended to meet Woodbury Road at Bay Ave., as was published in the 1971 book entitled "Hicksville Triangle Plan".

The Chamber of Commerce agrees with the extension of Duffy Ave. through to Woodbury Road, but does not approve of the current proposal to extend Duffy Ave. to Broadway and stop there.

Many merchants and businessmen in the Hicksville Downtown area have expressed their concerns and objections to the present proposal, but none, to our knowledge, have expressed a favorable opinion.

The Chamber feels that this extension will probably leave numerous small parcels which could not be economically developed, to be added to the many vacant lots on B'way which have been left undeveloped since the State widened B'way in Hicksville 12 years ago.

lunch to work instead of eating in restaurants or make long-distance telephone calls when the rates are lower. Do you really need a car right away? Maybe the money spent on car payments and related expenses could be used now for other things you want. While you use public transportation.

You can begin building up a good credit history by opening savings and checking accounts and paying your utility bills and rent on time. Regular payments on your student loan also show future creditors that you know how to handle money.

Before you even begin a

cash flow statement or budget, be sure you understand the withholding tax rates for your salary level and marital status. If you are single and have one employer, you can claim two exemptions which means less tax will be withheld from your pay. Examine your pay stubs for the amount of federal, state and city and social security taxes withheld. If the amounts seem unreasonable, ask your employer to go over the tax tables with you to be sure there isn't too much (or too little) tax being withheld.

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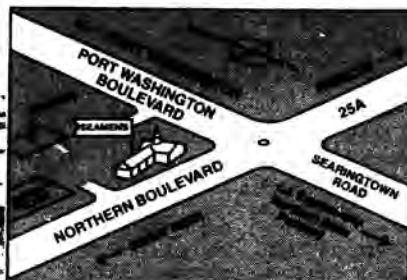


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
