## Community Forum Reminder

Once again we wish to remind and encourage residents of Hicksville to attend a Community Forum on the proposed Duffy Avenue Extension. Trinity Lutheran Church, 40 W. Nicolai Street in Hicksville will host the forum on July 2, 1981, from 8-10 PM. The meeting will be in the gymnasium.

Several community organizations have expressed considerable concern over the proposed extension and its overall affect on the community. Residents who live on Plainview Road and on the streets along that thoroughfare see the possibility of increased levels of commuter and commercial traffic through residential neighborhoods. Concern has

been expressed by members of the Hicksville Fire Department that the increased traffic on East Marie Street (as a result of the extension) would hamper their effectiveness. Some people feel that the proposed road will encourage more commuter and commercial traffic in and out of Hicksville.

Councilman Thomas Clark, who has supported the Duffy Avenue Extension and how it relates to the overall development of Hicksville. Mr. Siegfried Widder, Executive Director of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, will share the Chamber's views on the proposed extension.

There will be ample opportunity for those who attend to ask questions and express their opinions.

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## HHS Graduation

More than 650 seniors will take their diplomas at the 67th graduation of Hicksville High School this Sunday. Ceremonies will take place at 2 PM and 4:30 PM on the campus. In case of rain, commencement will be held in the boy's gym.

The invocation will be offered by Rev. John Krahn of Trinity Lutheran Church and Rev. Paul Ruggiero, assistant pastor of Our Lady of Mercy Church. Following the National Anthem, approximately 65 awards and scholarships will be presented to graduating students. Most of the awards are sponsored by local organizations and individual

donors; the range from \$100 to \$2,000.

Some department honors will also be bestowed; many are in the name of former educators of Hicksville High School, and are offered as memorials.

Raymond L. Rusch, retiring principal of Hicksville High School, will speak to the graduates and their families and friends. He will be followed by Dr. Wilber Hawkins, Superintendent of Schools, who will also join in the congratulations.

Valedictorian of the Class of '81 is Ricca Yao; salutatorian is Pamela Martin. Both are excellent students and both

will speak at each ceremony, according to Mr. Rusch. Ricca, the daughter of George and Concepcion Yao, plans to major in chemistry at Creighton University in the fall. Her ultimate goal is medicine. This year, her academic life was enriched by participation in yearbook, class fundraising and Modern Music Masters (Tri-M); she plays the cello. She is the oldest of three children.

Pamela is the daughter of David and Phyllis Martin. During her high school career, Pamela has participated in the Marching Band, Spanish Club, and the Thespians. She will enter George Wash-

ington University in September; she plans to major in theatre and creative writing with a career goal of theatre. Ron Millet, senior class president, will also address graduates. It will be his honor to present the gift of the Class of '81 to a member of the Board of Education.

The combined high school bands and choruses will add their talents to the commencement exercises. The choruses willsing "American Panorama." The bands will perform the New World Symphony by Dvorak.

## At The School Board Meeting

High school credit being given to students who satisfactorily complete junior high school Regents courses prior to grade 9 was the topic of much controversy at the Board of Education meeting held Wednesday night in the Administration building. Until this year, credit towards high school graduation was given to students taking advanced courses, but a new policy put into effect states that only Regents credit will be granted. In order to graduate, sequences of courses are required in each area of study. By the new policy, put into effect this year, a student could not begin earning high school credit in any area, whether or not advanced courses are taken, until entering the high school itself.

Superintendent Dr. Wilber Hawkins justified this policy,

saying that if students were allowed to receive the credit ("given as Carnegie Units") prior to entering high school, there was a possibility that they would not continue in the area in which they received the credit once they completed their sequence.

Dr. Salmon, Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Schools, added to this, stating that he feared, "...a slacking off in the areas of science, math, and foreign languages...because students would take courses just to get the sequence over with." Secretary Cornelius McCormack agreed, saying, "Students would be left taking only one or two courses a day, and having the rest of the day off."

Dr. Hawkins' statement was refuted by Trustee John Ayres, who stated, "To withhold credit is to penalize students for taking advanced courses." Trustee Charlene

Ancl added that this was equivalent to doing the work without receiving the credit for it. The problem of declining enrollment in classes was answered by Mrs. Ancl, saying, "Maybe the problem is that the courses should be made more stimulating..."

Residents addressed the Board on the matter, some several times, and all agreed credit should be given to those students deserving it. "If we don't give our children motivation now, when will we ever motivate them again?" said one resident.

Another resident claimed that students who would normally take advanced courses would be deprived of their chance to continue in such sequences as advanced science, which culminates in Advanced Placement Chemistry.

One woman, a former participant in the foreign language program, claimed

that most students she had attended school who continued to take courses after the sequences were completed, graduating with more than enough credits.

Other residents stated that to get one sequence over with enabled the student to take courses in other fields they did not have time for previously.

The situation was temporarily resolved by Trustee Virginia Germer, who asked for a motion to give the 8th grade students taking Regents exams this year the high school credit to accompany it. The motion was passed and a Goals and Objectives Committee will be formed to deal with the situation.

The credit controversy led to questions once again concerning courses dropped from the schedule for the

As with nearly every organization concerned with issues ranging across the entire political landscape ... From strategic nuclear posture to nutritional health levels among public school children ... The American Legion has smarted under some of this year's federal spending cuts proposed and adopted by this Administration and Congress ... In spite of some of the cuts being deemed ill advised by this organization, it can now be said that the general mood of Congress is more receptive. THIS YEAR ... to positions long held by The American Legion than at any time in several years ... Evidence of a more accommodating political climate can be shown by examining several issues currently under or about to be under active Congressional consideration ... within the next few months ... A few of these issues, of great concern to Legionnaires, include combating terrorism and insuring national internal security criminalizing the act of disclosing the identities of U.S. intelligence agents overseas ... Bringing legal and illegal immigration under control ... And restricting the jurisdiction of overzealous federal courts so as to permit voluntary prayer in public schools ... The elections last November had a great impact on today's Congressional

agenda ... And recognition must be given to the fact that whether or not seats in Congress are held by Republicans, Democrats, Liberals or Conservatives ... today's agenda is the direct reflection of popular sentiments overlooked at the federal level too long ... Shortly after the Congress reorganized itself for business under Republican majorityship and the Republican chairing of all Senate Committees ... it was learned that Chairman Strom Thurmond of the Senate Judiciary Committee

intended to reconstitute the Senate Subcommittee on Internal Security ... If you remember, that Subcommittee was dissolved in 1977 as a result of growing concern that its activities were dampening the free exercises of speech and associations of some citizens ... Since then Americans have matured and recognize that there are some who would use their own Constitutional guarantees to subvert those of the majority ... Senator Thurmond's decision to restore this Sub-

committee, Judiciary Subcommittee on Security and Terrorism ... is a welcome reflection of realistic pragmatism dormant too long in American policy making deliberations ... In a related issue the practice of identifying American intelligence operatives overseas had been overlooked by Congress during a period in which the entire U.S. intelligence community was being criticized for a variety of abuses both real and imagined ... Again reflecting a return to sober realism Congress readied legislation for action last year that would criminalize agent identity disclosure ... This initiative was in response to a shooting incident last July in Jamaica where an agent's home was fired upon shortly after his identity was revealed ... No action was taken last year due to the great crush of business on the floors of both House and Senate as the lame-duck session drew to a close in December ... This year it now appears that legislation is being readied in both bodies and is likely to be enacted into law very soon ... I will continue this theme of Legion Mandates in next week's column as this is a very important part of The American Legion's overall projects and interests ... Tomorrow night, June 27th, we will have a Las Vegas Nite and all members and friends are invited to the Post for this event.

# At The Town Board Meeting

"At their regular meeting held on Tues., June 23, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay reserved decision on Hearing No. P-9-31 the petition of Colonial Auto Body, Inc. for a special use permit to maintain an auto body and fender works on property bounded on the east by Alpha Plaza (a private right-of-way), 547-51' east of Charlotte St (also known as 485 West John St), in Hicksville.

Seven people appeared in opposition to Colonial using parking areas and areas necessary for ingress and egress to their properties.

As this matter is an extremely complicated problem, Tony La Marca, Esq., attorney for Colonial will be meeting with all those so affected, to straighten out the actual ownership of Alpha Plaza and to look into what each lease states as to tenants rights.

The Board also reserved decision on a Finance Hear-

ing to consider the purchase and installation of parking meters at various locations in Hicksville, for and on behalf of the Town of Oyster Bay Public Parking District, at a maximum estimated cost of \$37,800. No one appeared in opposition to this proposition.

The Board approved Resolution 487-1981, amending Resolution No. 1099-80, adopted Dec. 23, 1981, in connection with designating Bank and Trust Company Depositories to include Bank Leumi Trust Co., of New York which now has Plainview branch.

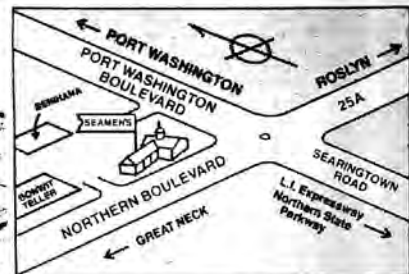

**QUOTABLE QUOTES** - Dr. Bernard Nathanson, former head of the largest abortion clinic in the world: "Now the most frequent question that I get asked is, 'Doctor, when and how did you change your mind about abortion?' Wasn't it because of your experiences at the clinic? Well, no, it was not. It was a result of directing and establishing the fetology unit and running it for four years. We studied the fetus with all the new dazzling, sophisticated technology of the 70's. We established in fact, a new specialty in medicine called fetology or perinatology. I will tell you that when I went into medical school, graduating in 1949, we used a textbook known as Williams' Obstetrics. It was in its eighth edition at the time. Williams' textbook is like

death and taxes - it just keeps going, edition after edition... In the 1945 edition which I used as a medical student, there were 22 pages devoted to the fetus. It was a book of 750 pages. In the 1980 edition... there are 137 pages on fetal health and fetal physiology. There are another 127 pages on fetal monitoring... A total of approximately 260 pages are devoted to the fetus, ten times as much as what I had in medical school. You can understand then that when I was a medical student, and a practicing physician, we knew nothing about the fetus. It was something more than a piece of meat, but certainly something less than a full human being which is now undeniably and unarguably is."

Dr. Carolyn Gerster, Vice President of the National Right to Life Committee: "Twenty abortions were done during the 8th and 9th month at four abortion centers in Boulder, Colorado, not a very large community... Abortion,

according to Dorland's Medical Dictionary, is defined as 'the premature expulsion from the uterus... of the embryo or of a non-viable fetus.' Any deaths after the age of viability, about 20 weeks, are more accurately referred to as infanticide."

Then we have Senator Packwood of Oregon being asked on television what the difference is between taking a child's life the day before it is born, and the day after. He replied, "It's viable the day after." The questioner continued, "It's viable the day before." Packwood had no comment, but as they walked out of the studio later he said, "You know, I don't know the answer to that." He didn't know, and he didn't care.
