

Dear Editor:

To The Editor:

I read with amusement and pity Mr. Larry Wolfson's letter in your last issue of the Herald. In replying to my tax-rate letter, he says in part, "the inaccuracies, misstatements and half-truths evidence lack of knowledge, short memory or obvious attempt to mislead the Hicksville residents." I am prepared to back up both figures and circumstances contained in my letter. I have attached to this letter copies of the material and data used in preparation of my material, and will gladly make them available to anyone who requests them.

Mr. Wolfson, as chairman of the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee, members of the committee and the Board of Education had access to the very same material as it relates to budgetary items - a complete Budget Book, including Bulletins number 1 thru 6. All of these are public record, and can be made available to anyone in the community who asks for it under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Law of January 1, 1978.

Mr. Wolfson was indeed in attendance at the August 6th meeting when the Board set the new tax-rate, however, Mr. Arena was not in attend-ance until later in the evening, and did not participate in the voting as Mr. Wolfson contends. I singled out Mrs. Germer and Mr. Avres for not considering lowering the tax-rate only because they were the makers of a motion the May 27th meeting reducing the tax-rate by 6.6 cents, and after the motion lost, Mrs. Germer and Mr. Ayres promised to review Ayres promised to review the matter again in August when the tax-rate is officially set - THIS THEY DID NOT DO. Mr. Wolfson further stated in his letter 'It must be assumed that the Board had deliberated for many months, viewing and Letters To The Editor

debating the facts, docu-ments and data available, upon which they based their decisions." NOT SO, it sounds very commendable Mr. Wolfson, but the Board did not deliberate on the taxrate issue for Mr. Ayres stated at the August 6th meeting, that the Board had made up its mind, and there was no discussion When pressed, Mrs. Germer pressed, Mrs. Germer snapped, "We don't hold illegal private meetings. With respect to the \$461,485.00 WINDFALL on the State Aid for the Handi-

stated in my letter, "In March the district received \$46,485,00 from the state for Handicapped Aid, it was called a "Windfall." It was the Administration that used term "Windfall" not me for if that definition were not used there would be no issue." It has been a practice in the district to use the funds in other areas. Mr Wolfson quotes the law and gives us a lecture on how the funds are allocated and for what purpose, but that does not answer my request of April 7, 1981, to Dr. Hawkins as to what areas it was to be disbursed. The Board or the public has no way of knowing if indeed the authorized if indeed the authorized funds were utilized in the areas earmarked in th application, and if the hand capped students received benefit from the aid as originally intended. Why was administration surprised to receive such a "Windfall" in March of '81. If the funds arrived as Mr. Wolfson so assuredly states, as regular disbursement regular disbursement of state aid, then why call it a windfall? - and if the handi-capped aid was spent the previous year for services rendered, then for what purpose will it be used in 1981-82 since the handicapped programs and services were already budgeted before the arrival of the windfall state aid reimbursement?

Wolfson alleges that I interfered with on-going negotiations by disclosing the sum of \$692,827.00 for salary increases for instructional personnel Surely, as Chairman of the Citizens Budget Advisory Commit-

access to the same Budget Bulletin # 4, that shows the salary increases, and matter of public record. The issue was brought up when I replied to Mrs. Germer, who stated at the August 6th meeting "That the District needed the \$132,420.00 to offset the costs of contract negotiations with the three negotations with the three bargaining units. If the Hicksville Congress of Teachers knows what is in Bulletin # 4 for salary increases, and Mr. Wolfson and his Committee knows, then why should not the pub-he know as well - since these are public records.

Mr. Wolfson again goes into a lecture on the value of surplus - if he read my it stated "This surplus was the biggest amassed ever (\$1,766,413.00). Since 1977, our surplus has averaged just under a million dollars - a sound fiscal policy by any standards, but why get greedy" So the point is, Mr Wolfson, not about hav-ing a surplus, but the issue is why a 1.8 million dollar sur-plus, and why didn't the Board pass on to the taxpayers a savings based on money the (The District) did not expect to receive, rather they placed it into an already bloated surplus.

We may be mere residents. Mr. Wolfson, but we are concerned about our school district and our hard earned tax dollars, and as Americans, we have a right to question without being ridiculed and defamed for taking that interest. If taking that interest. If I appeared to be too abrupt in my discussion with the Board at the public speaking session, then I apologize, and if my letters are too pointed it is only because I want to before methods. bring matters of conscience to light. I will not, as Mr. Wolfson suggested at the last Board meeting, do as former members in the past have done, just fade away and not be heard. I will continue to speak out on the issues as my conscience dictates.



## New Laws Affecting Drivers

As of September 1, a driver whose license or driving privilege has been taken away because of an alcoholrelated traffic conviction, or ecause he refused to take a chemical test, is subject to a chemical test, is subject to a mandatory jail term of from seven to one hundred-eighty days, a fine of between \$200 and \$500, or both, if he is convicted of driving while suspended or revoked, DMV Commissioner Leslie G. Fossion warns state motorists.

commissioner Leslie G. Fos-chio warns state motorists. "Laws aimed at the drunk driver are now tough and will get tougher," Foschio said. "A first DWI conviction can be costly and serious. Further convictions will have a catastrophic effect on one's personal life."

The Commissioner also

Commissioner also outlined other motor vehicle related laws which took effect on September 1:

A law that makes the violation date rather than the conviction date the de-termining factor as to whether a driver is liable for increased fines and penalties for repetitive traffic offenses within an 18-month period.

Under current law, a driver faces stiffer fines and jail terms for multiple speeding, misdemeanor and most traffic infraction convictions within an 18 month period. It is possible under

those provisions, that a driver could avoid increased penalties by delaying a con-viction date through court adjournments or refusing to answer a summons. As of September 1, a driver faces September 1, a driver laces heavier fines and jail terms if he or she commits two or more violations within 18 months, regardless of the date of conviction.

• A law making it illegal for a school bus carrying children to make either a right or left turn on a red

 Legislation providing that school zone speed limits are in effect from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. on school days. Current law provides that school zone speed limits are in effect only during noon hour, re-cess or while children are

going to or leaving school.

New provisions that allow the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to issue a six-character special registra-tion "vanity" plates for motorcycles. Commissioner motorcycles. Commissioner Foschio said that DMV will commence issuing motor-cycle "vanity" plates in the Spring of 1982.

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

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# YOUNG AMERICA GOES BACK .

It's back to school again. For some young people it's the time to greet old friends and compare notes on the Summer.

Some students will be going to new schools . . . meeting new teachers . . . new friends. Some little ones will be going to school for the very first time.

The health and safety of our young people is important to all of us. With countless school children on the streets, drivers must be extremely careful. Children do not think and act as adults.

Motorists approaching school buses must exercise caution whether they see children or not. Section 1174 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of our State requires motorists whose vehicles meet or overtake a school bus which is stopped to receive or discharge students, to stop their vehicles while the bus's flashing red signals are in operation. This same section of law mandates that school bus drivers instruct their passengers who cross the street do so in front of the bus. The driver, meantime, is required to keep the bus stopped and the red lights flashing until all children have reached the other side of the street.

Also a very new State law which became effective Sept. 1, requires that motorists must now observe the lower school area speed limits during the entire school day, not just at the beginning and end of each

Finally, watch out for bicyclists-not all of them seem to know the "rules of the road", which they are supposed to observe. Parents, these are important rules for you to teach those of your children who use bicycles.
