Letter To The Editor

To The School Board and Administrators:

As a very concerned parent and taxpayer, I am demanding that you sit down and negotiate with the Hicksville Teachers immediately.

I helped to elect this Board in good faith, thinking that you cared about the quality of education in Hicksville. The disaster that could result from your lax attitude toward immediate, CIVILIZED negotiations will harm MY CHILD for years to come. Those of us who supported you this election will be looking for more sincere candidates in the next election.

You are not standing behind your campaign promises. You are not moving fast enough to the negotiating table. I pay an enormous amount of school taxes, enough for you to find a 3.9 Million Dollar surplus; for which I expect my child to receive the best education possible.

Education, as we know it now, will become extinct if you allow a strike to occur. I do not want to see another Levittown. I do not want to make your attorney a wealthy man, on my tax dollar.

One board member, just received a 12% increase for teaching in Long Beach, where the students testing scores are so much lower than ours. Yet, this same

board member offers our dedicated teachers a 3.7% increase. Where is the logic?

There is a ratio of about 18 students to one class teacher in Hicksville. In Levittown, there is a ratio of 12 teachers to one administrator. I think you are lining the wrong pockets with my tax dollars.

I also want Music, Art, Gym, Band, Chorus, Library and a School Nurse, available for my child. Please explain why these special teachers are not covered by the contract. My child is entitled to these extras and I want them to be taught by qualified personnel.

Why do you allow negotiations to become so drawn out and bitter when many of our neighboring towns can negotiate peacefully? Perhaps a more understanding attorney with an interest in children would be the answer.

Why is the salary of the Hicksville Teachers one of the very lowest on L.I. (the bottom 25%) when the quality of education is so high?

We have some of the best teachers on Long Island here in Hicksville. I don't want to see them change their loving and caring attitude. The only losers in this battle will be our children.

A prompt response will be greatly appreciated.

Letter To The Residents of Hicksville

Dear Residents and Taxpayers:

The leadership of the teachers' union has made a public announcement that they will take the teachers out on an illegal strike on October 13 unless they have a contract satisfactory to them by that date. We feel you should know what is preventing a peaceful settlement.

The sticking point, of course, is always money.

At the present time, the union demands a 19.3% raise for this school year (county-side, the average teacher raise is about 8%). Although negotiations began on March 6, the union leadership

refused to state its salary demand in percentage or dollars for 5-1/2 months. Finally, on the night of August 24, when the Fact-finder appointed by the State told them he had never heard of such a thing, they submitted a demand for a 23.3% salary raise, reduced to the 19.3% on September 15.

The September 15 meeting ended with the Fact-finder setting October 14 and 27 for the required Taylor Law hearings. The union leadership consented to these dates. A week later, they set their October 13 strike date.

The scenario above is nothing more nor less than negotiations by intimidation and threat. If it works, it means that the only limit placed on the settlement will be that which the union leadership dictates. We will not allow ourselves to be stampeded into a settlement which we would not make but for the pressure which the leadership is attempting to create.

We cannot afford to lose sight of the fact that over 50% of teachers receive more than \$25,000 in salary and that 15% of them receive over \$28,000; that these

salaries do not include the added 21% above salary paid by the district for retirement; and that other fringe benefits (health insurance, etc.) cost another 12% of that salary. In combination, it costs the district an average of over \$34,000 per teacher for 181 days of work.

UNION DEMANDS

SALARY

19.3% increase of the present \$12,000 teacher payroll for 465 teachers.

INCREASE

Automatic increase in fringe benefit costs (retirements, contributions)

LONGEVITY

This demand alone is over 25% of the present teacher payroll.
An additional \$1,000 automatic raise for teachers with 25 or more years of credited service in Hicksville, plus another \$1,000 beginning with the 30th year of such service.

WORKLOAD

Workloads-the maximum number of pupils special teachers may have contact with-will be "locked in" to either set numbers, or certain fixed ratios. Additional teachers would have to be hired if more pupils need to be worked with than these "workload" numbers would allow, even if the numbers are educationally acceptable and sound. Teachers involved are elementary art, music, P.E., and librarians, and guidance counselors, attendance teachers, psychologists, speech therapists, school nurse/teachers, and special education teachers.

Under this proposal, we would be "locked in" to the following ratios:

One guidance counselor for every 290 pupils
Nassau County average: 1 counselor for every 507 pupils
N.Y.S. average: 1 counselor for every 720 pupils
One School Nurse/Teacher for every 520 pupils
Nassau County average: 1 SN/T for every 890 pupils
N.Y.S. average: 1 SN/T for every 1,858 pupils
One librarian for every 630 pupils
Nassau County average: 1 librarian for every 759 pupils
N.Y.S. average: 1 librarian for every 1,070 pupils

ESTIMATED ADDITIONAL TEACHERS NEEDED: 24, to start.

WELFARE FUND

The School District would have to deposit \$500 for each teacher into a \$ 235,000 teachers' "welfare fund" for benefits over and above the present fringe benefits.

WORKDAY

Teachers would be limited to a workday-from the time they start working in the morning, until they go home in the afternoon-of 6 1/2 hours. Activities such as parent conferences, after-school help for pupils, staff meetings, lesson planning, IEP preparation, grading pupils, and so forth, if not handled in 6 1/2 hours, could be considered "overtime." The estimated cost is based on an average of 30 minutes of overtime per day, at time-and-a-half pay.

AGENCY FEE

This demand would require that the approximately 150 teachers who are not now members of this union in power would be legally required to pay dues to that union, even if they choose not to join the union.

ELEMENTARY SPECIAL SUBJECTS

The demand says that elementary art, music, reading, library, and physical education must be taught by teachers certified in these areas. The union says they are only asking for a guarantee of what already exists. Yet, the demand as presented is susceptible of an interpretation which would prohibit the classroom teacher from conducting a music or reading lesson as part of regular classroom work, and from supervising pupils in recreational activities.

CONTINUATION CLAUSE

This demand would require that all parts of the teachers' contract remain fully in effect after the contract expires, until a new contract is agreed upon.

RETIREMENT INCENTIVE

Though this demand is called a retirement incentive, it requires a lump-sum payment of \$10,000 to a teacher who retires or resigns, if the teacher meets certain eligibility requirements. This would be in addition to the lump-sum payment now made to a retiring teacher of unused accumulated sick leave.

Feel that chill in the air? Notice the changing colors of the foliage? Fall is definitely here to stay - that is until winter inexorably pushes its way into our region. With the onset of fall and winter, our oil burners or gas heaters are put to use to keep us comfortable. Better start now to tighten up your house. Current tax law provides for a 15% conservation tax credit for insulation and other energy conserving items. The credit applies to expenditures of up to \$2,000 to purchase and install insulation, storm windows or doors, and an automatic energy-saving thermostat. The equipment must be installed before January 1,

1986. Current law also provides for a forty percent tax credit on the first \$10,000 of expenditures for solar devices. For more detailed information, contact the Internal Revenue Service, 114 Old Country Road, Mineola, telephone 294-3600.

A few more tips for your consideration when you're trying to conserve energy:

- Keep range top burners and reflector pans clean. They will reflect the heat better and save energy.

- Match the size of your cooking pot to the heating element. More heat will get to the pan, less to the surrounding air.

- Watch the clock, or use a timer when baking in the

oven. Opening the oven door continually to check food wastes an enormous amount of heat and, therefore, money.

- Wash your clothes in cold water. If they are very soiled, use warm water, not hot water to wash them. Then turn rinse cycle to cold water.

- Don't use too much detergent. Over sudsing makes your machine work harder and use more energy.

- Keep the lint screen in the clothes dryer clean. Remove lint after each load.

- Separate drying loads into heavy and light weight items. Light weight items take less time to dry.

- Only use your dish-

washer with a full load of dishes.

- If your dishwasher is so designed, set it for "air dry." Don't let the dryer "dry" them. By opening the door of the dishwasher when the wash and rinse cycles are finished, humidity is put back into your room, which helps relieve the dryness caused by the heating unit.

National Stamp Collecting Month, Oct. 1981

"Discover Stamp Collecting - The Hobby of a Lifetime" is the theme of the first annual National Stamp Collecting Month, to be observed October 1-31. Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Anthony M. Murello of Hicksville, said today.

"The fall observance will include issuance of a special souvenir card, unusual post office lobby displays and philatelic items especially designed to attract newcomers to the hobby," Postmaster Murello continued.

"Millions of Americans re-

cognize that stamp collecting generates increased knowledge of geography, biography, history and science. Children who engage in this hobby have a good time acquiring new or used stamps, and the hobby stimulates their intellectual growth. Teachers tell us that boys and girls frequently use their stamp collecting information in preparing and presenting class projects."

"An adult who introduces a youngster to the hobby is giving that child a lifetime gift," Postmaster Murello said, "because stamp

collecting does not depend on age, stamina or the weather."

"Many families treasure stamp collections, work on them together, and pass them along from generation to generation. In an age when all too many of us spend our leisure time solely as spectators, stamp collecting is a hobby in which everyone can participate. That's the message the Postal Service wants to get across next October during National Stamp Collecting Month," Postmaster Murello concluded.

Legionnaires' Log

By Artie Rutz

Students who study and closely follow developments which affects veterans have known for years that problems encountered by Vietnam era veterans were unusual, sometimes a bit unique. Veterans of the Vietnam War have faced much the same readjustment difficulties met by veterans of earlier wars when trying to make the transition from the stresses of combat to the challenges of normal civilian life. These challenges (family, job, lost opportunities) have always been a part of the price paid by those whose responded to the call to arms. But during the Vietnam era, veterans returned home, a few at a time over an entire decade and found themselves to be social outcasts.

Our nation, frustrated by lack of military success and reeling under the impact of social turmoil at home, desperately sought a convenient target for its rage. Unfortunately, the returning veteran became that target. He, unlike his predecessors, was encouraged to apologize for his participation in the war and remain silent on his war experiences. Many such veterans became confused, and then bitter, finding it easier to drop out of society than deal with it. The traditional sources of readjustment assistance were spurned because they were perceived as being unresponsive to the special needs of this youngest generation of veterans. The American Legion recognized in the mid 1970's that a series of special efforts would be necessary to insure that these veterans received the proper readjustment assistance. Despite this knowledge and general support in Congress, a consensus on the specific type of services to be provided was not reached for several years. In 1979 legislation was enacted to establish a nationwide

system of psychological readjustment counseling centers designed to address the unusual nature of emotional fallout from the Vietnam War. Despite initial Administration opposition early this year, it now appears certain that the program will continue for another three years and that it will be expanded beyond the currently existing 92 "vet centers." With the enactment of P.L. 96-466 in 1980, Congress concurred with the Legion by establishing the Department of Labor's Disabled Veterans Outreach Program as a permanent operation. This program, available to disabled and Vietnam era veterans, has been authorized by Congress to function with a staff of 2000 nationwide. The increased accessibility of services through "outreach" has been the key to its success. Two other legislative initiatives designed to cure specific problems encountered by the younger veterans appear ready for final approval. First, legislation has cleared both chambers of Congress which, when enacted will provide the follow up medical treatment in VA hospitals for certain disabilities that may be related to AGENT ORANGE exposure. The American Legion has energetically supported this proposal as a legitimate response to the Agent Orange controversy until such time as definitive medical evidence can determine the long term health effects of exposure. Second, legislation to provide a limited and individually applied extension of the G.I. Bill delimiting date has been approved by both chambers of Congress. This proposal, designed to assist those younger veterans who lack high school diplomas, seeks to establish eligibility for up to two years of vocational or other specific job oriented assistance. The Legion has recognized the value of this concept and has testified in its behalf.

THE GOD I DON'T BELIEVE IN

Psychologists tell us that it is quite common, as well as normal, to have a recurring dream. Perhaps from time to time each of you have had one. I have. But more prevalent in my experience in the ministry is several recurring conversations. There are images and beliefs in God that baptized Christians hold which do not correspond to the testimony of Scripture and its description of God and His attributes. Therefore, this morning, our sermon title might seem somewhat unorthodox as we look at the subject, "The God I Don't Believe In."

The first god that I run across in recurring conversations, which I don't believe in, is what I call a good and evil god. A god who on a whim snatches life before it has blossomed fully. I can recall a conversation with a woman who lost her husband. He was killed in the city as he tried to aid two elderly people who were being robbed. He was 35 and dead. She, 30, widowed, with two children. "Pastor," she said, "I've lost my faith. I no longer believe in God." I asked why. "I can't believe God would take Paul so tragically from me. Why did he do it?" I told her that I do not believe in that god either. God is not the source of the evil that visits us in life. He does not sit in heaven and say, "Who am I going to do in today?" The God I believe in is good, loving, steadfast, there is no evil found in him.

Another god I do not believe in is a god that can be put on the pad. On a religious broadcast last week, I heard a man say that he just swung a \$400,000 deal, and he attributed it to his faith in God. The way in which he told his story gave me the uneasy feeling that he had put God

on the pad, was paying him off for special favors. In recurring conversations, I sense that some believe in a god that grants them great success in life, protection against calamity and long life if they will give him weekly worship, token prayers, and occasionally a few major contributions. God can't be bought. The point is not what we need to lay on God in order that he will continue the shower of blessings, but rather what we need to give God in response to his daily goodness.

There are other gods that I meet in recurring conversations, but I will mention just one more. I don't believe in a Roman Roads god. "All roads lead to Rome at one time, but all roads have never led to the Triune God," Statements like, "It doesn't matter what we believe, what really is important is that we all believe in god." Christianity is not one of many acceptable religious expressions of God, but it is the way of salvation. And we must be about inviting people onto that road.

Now what about the God I do believe in. The God I believe in has an unmatchable gift for all of us. Heaven is that gift, eternal life with God forever. It is not something we can earn; it is not something we deserve. My God is a god of unreasonable mercy. In the Bible we read, "I have loved you with an everlasting love." God loves us and does not want to punish us.

But my God is a god of unbridled justice. He will not indiscriminately pardon the guilty. Because of my God's unquenchable desire that all mankind be saved, he sent Jesus, his perfect Son, to receive the verdict of guilty in our place, to walk the road of the cross, paved for our feet, and to house the spikes in his hands and feet so that our flesh need not be marred.
